On the continent of Europe, Mr. Scott is stationed in Stockholm, where he is favoured with the friendship of some of the most distinguished members of the Swedish National Church, through whose recommendation he has been appointed Foreign Secretary of the Swedish Missionary Society.

In Germany, Mr. Mullar continues to labor with unabated zeal in the kingdom of Wirtemberg. About 46 persons have been raised up in the religious societies collected by his instrumentality, who are now assisting him in prosecuting the work which it was his honor to commence. He has formed four regular circuits: one in the vicinity of Winnenden, his native town; a second, twelve miles from that place, in a westerly direction; another, twenty-two miles northward of it, and a fourth, in the Black Forest, on the borders of France. In these four circuits, Mr. Mullar and his assistants conduct about 100 religious services every week. Although these excellent individuals have to contend with many difficulties which private opposition and the restrictions of law place in their way, they continue to enjoy the divine sanction and blessing, and many of their countrymen have been turned by their endeavours from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God. The number of persons in Society amounts to 448, while 50 others remain on trial as candidates for membership.

France.—Mr. Newstead labors in Paris, in the English department of the work, with zeal and success. His congregation has considerably increased, and a gracious influence frequently accompanies the ministry of the word. The week day meeting which is held for prayer and familiar exposition of the Scriptures, is numerously and respectably attended. A Sunday School has been formed, and a considerable number of young persons have undertaken to work for the Missionary Bazar. The efforts made in the support of the cause of religion are very praise worthy. Respecting the French department of the work at Paris, Mr. de Jersey reports, that the number of persons who attend public worship remains much the same as formerly,—that the Sabbath is strictly observed by the members, and that the services of the Sanctuary are attended with the divine blessing. A small Sunday School is taught, and a Female Working Society, which is not confined to the members in society, has also been formed, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to the support of the missions. The state of the missions in the South of France affords great encouragement. At almost every place the spirit of religious enquiry increases, and the endeavors of the missionaries in their several departments of labor are followed by obviously beneficial results. The people evidence their love for the mission by their increasing liberality in its support. The missionaries have been surprised at the amount of the contributions made in the Upper Alps. A considerable diminution was expected in consequence of the failure of the harvest, instead of which

the subscriptions considerably exceeded the amount raised in preceding years.

In the old station of Gibraltar some opposition has been raised of a peculiar character. The Roman Catholics have opened a school, to conduct which teachers have been sent by the Propaganda, and they are making the greatest efforts to draw away the children from the Mission School. Mr. Rule, one of the missionaries at Gibraltar has made the attempt to introduce the Gospel into the interior of Spain, and though he has not yet succeeded, his attention is earnestly fixed upon the object. A gentleman who writes from personal observation intimates that the Spanish nation has many sober and thinking individuals who are thoroughly disgusted with the useless rites; and foolish superstitions of the Romish church; who would gladly welcome some simple and purer creed, and that unless some such be speedily presented to their notice, the only alternative must be, a dark and fearful infidelity, like that which deluged France with blood, and for which the exclusiveness, the superstition, and the bigoted cruelty of the Roman Catholic church have so well prepared the minds of the people.

In Continental India, in the Madras district, exertions are being made by the Society's missionaries to diffuse the leaven of the Gospel, and the Parent Committee has agreed to the formation of a seminary in Negapatam, for the instruction of native youths for various offices in the mission.

It may arouse the sympathies of the Christian to learn, that there are many nations in India, to whom the Gospel has not yet been offered by the preaching of a single missionary, and that into some of the languages of that vast empire, the Scriptures have not yet been translated. In Ceylon, as much success has attended missionary efforts as could well have been anticipated. The press is in active operation, and the schools, and other auxiliaries to the missions, both in the south and north of the Island, are conducted with vigor and useful effect.

In New South Wales and Van Dieman's Land, prospects are very encouraging. Many have experienced the renovating power of the Gospel, and the missionaries find an open and effectual door for the promulgation of the glad tidings. In New Zealand, several chiefs are now employed as instructors of their countrymen: some of them have become avowed preachers of the Gospel, and are actively and usefully employed in publishing the doctrines of the Cross among their benighted and degraded countrymen. The state and prospects of the missions in the Friendly Islands, are contemplated by the Committee with deepest feelings of devout thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church. In those distant isles of the sea, a work has been wrought than which no modern missionary achievement has brought greater glory to God, or yielded a larger amount of spiritual benefit to any portion of the human family.

The rapidity of this work deserves especial notice ; the word of prophecy has had its accomplishment, and a nation has been born in a day. The divine influence, which began to descend at Vavou, spread over Habai, and extended to Tonga in such swift progression, as to exceed the power of description ; and multitudes in this extraordinary visitation were brought almost simultaneously to experience the peace and joy of saving faith ; and the depth of this work is equal to its extent. Its character is not so strikingly apparent in the excitement which has taken place, and in the rapturous joy of the new converts, as in the deep implantation in their minds of all the Christian graces. Mr Cargill observes :—" They set a high value upon the means of grace : it is not a trifle which prevents any of them from attending the house of the Lord : and when there, their eyes are rivetted on the speaker, and frequently the abundance of their tears bespeaks the joy of their hearts. Their whole behaviour is a practical illustration of that feeling which prompted Jacob to exclaim, 'How dreadful is this place !' The Sabbath is kept holy in the most literal and extensive signification of that term. Not only is all worldly business laid aside, but the whole day is employed in exercises of public and private devotion. I do not know any who spend any part of that day in idleness or diversion. Their respective class leaders watch over them with scrupulous care, and if any of them engage in duties which are not decidedly religious, and absolutely necessary to be done on that day, they affectionately admonish them to remember the command of the Lord, and to consecrate his day to his service."

The missions in Southern Africa are daily increasing in importance. The Rev. Thos. L. Hodgson, who has spent many valuable years in the mission work, has returned to this the former sphere of his successful labors.

The present state and prospects of the Kaffer Missions make a forcible appeal to the philanthropy of the religious public. The friends and supporters of the Society will rejoice to learn that the Rev. Wm. Shaw has made arrangements to resume his labors in this part of South Africa. His long experience and his influence among the Kaffers, which is equalled only by the confidence reposed in him by all classes in the Colony, mark him out as the fittest person to be employed in reorganizing and extending these Missions which mainly owe their origin to the instrumentality of his zealous and persevering endeavours.

In the various Districts of Southern Africa, the congregations are increasingly large, and new requests are continually made by the various tribes, for missionary instruction. In Western Africa the missions during the past year have been attended with the divine blessing.

In Sierra Leone, the laborers of the missionaries have been so abundantly successful, that they have now under their immediate pastoral

care upwards of 1000 persons, who are either regular members of society, or are meeting in class as candidates for membership. At the same time the number of persons who attend the public ordinances of religion, has so greatly increased, that it has become necessary to enlarge or rebuild several of the places of worship. The mission at St. Mary's, on the Gambia, is in successful operation. The schools are gradually rising into importance; they contain 102 boys and 50 girls. Mrs. Wilkinson devotes herself to the schools with great assiduity: as yet she has to toil almost alone, but she is encouraged in her endeavors to elevate her degraded sex, by the proficiency made by several of her pupils, from whom it is hoped that she will ere long derive considerable assistance. Mr. and Mrs. Fox had been obliged to visit England on account of ill health. Mr. Fox has however returned to the station. He thus speaks of his reception: "Several of the members were in the bush, but immediately on hearing of my arrival, came with all speed to tell me, 'they glad too much to see me again; hope I no go to England no more.' The reiterated enquiries after my dear wife at length became painful to me, but it proves to me that the color of the skin, the formation of the head, and the shape of the nose, have nothing to do with the affections of the heart." Dr. Luidoe and his friends at Southampton have generously offered to raise, in addition to their annual contributions towards the support of the Foulah mission, the sum of £1000, for the purpose of meeting in part the expences which must necessarily be incurred before translations of the Scriptures can be prepared for the Press.

The manifestation of religious feeling which was witnessed in the West Indies, where the Act of the Imperial Legislature for abolishing slavery was brought into operation, must ever be considered as one of the most gratifying circumstances connected with that event. The satisfaction with which the conduct of the negro population was at the time contemplated, is only exceeded by that which is afforded by the fact, that no abatement of the interest then displayed in favor of religion has since taken place. A new era in the religious history of the West Indies appears to have commenced. The missionaries at Nevis, adverting to this topic, observe, that the desire for religious instruction continues undiminished. Religion exerts the same influence, and has all the attraction that it manifested immediately after the ever memorable 1st of August, 1834. Some were of opinion that the ebullition of feeling which then took place, was a mere excitement, depending solely on the novelty of circumstances: but we have now proved that it is a steady principle. While we are thankful that the sweets of liberty are beginning to be tasted, we rejoice over many who have pressed after, and obtained the higher liberty of the children of God. The Parent Com-

mittee have engaged, in common with other Missionary Societies, to aid in promoting the Government plan of Negro Education. The Committee has already obtained assistance towards building nineteen school houses. This undertaking will increase very considerably the annual cost of the West India missions. The sum granted by Government, (£3,000) is to be exclusively expended in *building*, and the Society has to raise £1500 additional for the same purpose. The support of the Schools, which cannot be estimated at less than £2,000 per annum, remains therefore to be wholly provided for. The general tenor of the reports of the West India districts is highly satisfactory : a considerable increase in the Societies and Schools, having been effected under the divine blessing during the past year.

The stations occupied by the Society in various parts of the world are about 177 ; each station being in general the head of a circuit of towns and villages around, embracing a numerous population brought under religious instruction.

The missionaries, who are accredited ministers of the Church, are nearly three hundred. They are aided in their arduous labors by assistants, catechists, schoolmasters, artizans, &c., of whom 260 are engaged at a moderate salary, and 1400 afford their services gratuitously.

The members of Society under the pastoral care of the missionaries, exclusive of those in Ireland, is 54,000 ; the members of the mission congregations, not in Church communion, may be fairly estimated at double that number. To these may be added the individuals under school instruction ; making a total of more than TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND persons, who are directly receiving spiritual advantage by means of the Society's missions.

In Ceylon, Southern Africa, Tongataboo, and in New Zealand, the Society has printing establishments. Valuable translations of the Sacred Scriptures, and of various other works, have been effected by the missionaries ; by whom, in *twenty* different *languages*, the Gospel is preached to some of the most remote and idolatrous nations of the earth.

The income of the Parent Society, for the year ending December 1836, amounted to the sum of £87,772 9s. 3d.

The Committee cannot but esteem it a great privilege that they have the opportunity of appealing, in this public and formal manner, to the Society and their friends at large, in behalf of the millions of their fellow creatures, to whom the bread of life has never been broken ; and they would beg leave respectfully to suggest to the consciences of the supporters of the Wesleyan Missionary cause in this Province, whether it is right that they should borrow so largely from the funds of the Parent Society, while so many heathen nations are still left in a state of mo-
