

Gordon ("Ralph Connor"), estimates the wheat yield of next harvest in Manitoba and the Northwest at from 110,000,000 to 150,000,000 bushels. Like all western men Mr. Gordon feels very strongly on the railway question, and is inclined to radical measures. If the harvest reaches 130,000,000 bushels he says the Canadian Pacific and Canadian Northern, with their present equipments trebled and their roads from Winnipeg to Port Arthur doubletracked, would still be unable to handle the crop. A general traffic blockade is now paralyzing Manitoba and the Northwest, and the actual loss to the west in consequence is between \$4,000,-000 and \$6,000,000. There is not only a wheat blockade of freight from the east, so that it is nothing unusual for carioads of merchandise from Montreal or Toronto to take six weeks to reach Winnipeg. Mr. Gordon declares the one great desire of the west is for a Government road from Winnipeg to the Atlantic. If the Dominion Government, with the Governments of British Columbia, Manitoba and the Territories, could come together and decide on some united railway policy, they should surely be able to find some almost immediate plan for compelling the Mackenzie & Mann people and the Canadian Pacific to adopt measures to greatly relieve the situation, but no plan would be effective which did not provide for enormously increased railway facilities over the present settled areas of the west. Population was rushing in at an astonishing rate. Only oneeighth of the soil of Manitoba was cultivated last year. This would be greatly increased for next harvest, and all the talk of Mackenzie & Mann and the C. P. R. about increased equipment only meant that they would be able to handle part of the enormous increase





But Francis Joseph Says He Can't Stop Newspaper Criticism.

Vienna, Feb. 17.-The Berlin authorities having repeatedly inquired why Austrian papers are permitted to criticise the German Emperor without suffering fine and confiscation, Minister von Korber gave Count Buelow to understand that it is better to close one's eves to such things than to intensify public feeling by harsh measures.

The Kaiser thereupon wrote to Emperor Francis Joseph, asking for protecton, but Francis Joseph replied that he must leave such matters to his ministry, suggesting at the same time that if criticism of a foreign monarch were suppressed in Austria, the Hungarians would blackguard him still worse.




