LONDON, Aug. 28.—A promising infant has come before public notice this week in the person of John Noakes, aged 4½ years, of Stoke-on-Trent. An inquest was held at that place on the body of a child who was drowned in the canal, and it was found that young Noakes had pushed him in, and also that the same infant had previously assisted two other children of about his own age into the same place, whence they had been rescued with difficulty. The coroner said that he was unable to punish so young a child, but said that he should ask the Home Secretary for a special order to place the precocious homicide under control.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—Lord Charles beres-ford, one of the most competent of English naval officers, has broken silence regarding the importance of Heligoland to Germany, and is quoted as saying that the real value of the island lies in its relareal value of the island lies in its relation to the new canal which is to connect the North Sea and the Baltic. From the moment that Germany aspired to be a maritime power the necessity was imposed upon her of maintaining two fleets, one in the North Sea and one in the Baltic. In case of war either in the east or the west these two fleets can unite through the canal without any danger of interruption by Denmark or any hostile power in making the transit by sea. But so long as Heligoland was neatral; the union of the two German fleets could be prevented, or at least rendered

neatral; the union of the two German fleets could be prevented, or at least rendered precarious, by an enemy's fleet stationed near the island. The possession and fortification of Heligoland by Germany renders it impossible for an enemy to prevent the junction. The acquisition of the island, therefore, means to Germany that the value of her navy in those eventualities, which are most probable, is something like doubled.

A PITTSBURG SENSATION. The Swedish Vice-Consul Commit Forgery to the Extent of Half a Million Dollars-Sate in Europe.

New York, Aug. 28.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Sueubenville, Ohio, says: A sensation was caused here yesterday by the discovery that Baron Lagerfelt, Swedish vice-consul to Pittsburg and vice-president and member of the Board of Directors of the Jefferson Iron Works, had forged certificates of the stock of the company and disposed of them to Pittsburg banks and also forged the name of his father-in-law, C. B. Doty, a prominent citizen and wealthy iron manufacturer. The principal sufferers by the transactions are the Alleghany Bank, \$100,000; Keystone Bank, \$7,000; Nelson & Sons, \$3,000. The face value of the certificates on which these amounts were realized must have been \$400,000 to \$500,000. Lagerfelt sailed for Europe July 19. It has been learned that he was removed from the consulship at Pittsburg and left for Sweden with the ostensible purpose of securing the consul-generalship at New York. It is not thought he will return from Sweden, as the extradition treaty of 1867 will not allow his being brought back. The fugitive is a man of fine physique. His marriage to Miss Mary Doty on Dec. 11 was solemnized with great splendor. His home was in Pittsburg, and his social relations were pleasant, although lately he had been leading a fast life.

WATER-RATE CHANGES. combers of the Board Leave for Hamil

Members of the Board Leave for Hamilton and Buffalo-Changes That
May be Expected.

Chairman George C. Davis, Mayor Taylor, City Engineer Tracy and Secretary Eliwood, of the Board of Water Commissioners left on the afternoon train yesterday on a trip of investigation to the cities of Hamilton and Buffalo, where they will examine the internal workings of the systems in vogue for the levying and collecting of water rates. In the first mentioned city, what is known as the frontage system, is followed out and apparently gives good satisfaction. Its chief merit lies in the fact that by it holders of vacant land are compelled to pay the rate on water whether used or not, provided the pipe passes the property.
Clause No. 12 of the original London Waterworks Act vested the same power with the local commissioners, but on account of the scattered condition of the houses in the outlying portions of the city it was found advisable to have the clause removed in 1878. The grewth of the city since that time has in turn removed this objection and the clause was recently restored to the act. The extensive pipe-laying of the past year will be greatly benefited by the introduction of the frontage system tor the reason that there will be several miles of pipe down on which vacant land will front. Under the frontage system to the maintaining of the waterworks system although the introduction of the system although the introduction of the commissioners as an inducement for purchasers.

The present water rates levied by the city are fixed according to the number of rooms, the rate being 75 cents per room with 20 per cent. off for prompt payment. By act of Parliament the right is secured to the commissioners to expropriate any land found ussirable for water purpose within fifteen miles of the city, but until the arbitrators make their decision it will be impossible to ascertain what the land recently appropriated by t

the arbitrators make their decision it will be impossible to ascertain what the land recently appropriated by the commissioners will cost, the commissioners' valuators having valued the land on the basis of farm property, while the owners contend that as the property is wanted for its water resources, the latter consideration should form the basis of ascertaining its real value and not its farm value. While some hold the opinion that the waterworks should be used as a means of raising revenue, it is not likely that the commissioners will adopt any such course, but that so soon as they have been notified of the decision of the arbitrators as to the cost of the land they will base the water rate on the frontage system at very little over its cost value. The frontage tax scheme will affect speculators more than any other class—men who hold large sections of land in the outskirts of the city and pay nothing but wild land tax on it.






