RESIGNED UNCONDITIONALLY

Principal Woods Tenders His Resignation, Which Is Accepted.

The Charges Are Withdrawn and Three Months' Salary Voted Him.

Gathering in the Evidence of the Investigating Committee - Stationing Teachers in the Different Schools - Teachers Let for Board Supplies.

With one or two exceptions all the school trustees were on hand before 8 o'clock last evening and began to form in little knots and discuss the all-pervading theme of Principal Woods' position.

The report of No. 2 Committee was presented by Chairman Turner, recommending that the following contracts be awarded to the names attached to them:

Trustee Cook then rose from his chair with a motion already in ink. He said: "Seeing that the Principal has resigned, I beg leave to make the following motion:

The motion was seconded by Trustee Durrin and carried. Messrs. Dewar and Luskumbé did not vote. He said, "I object to voting on an illegal appropriation of money."

Trustee Johnston moved that the Chairman of the Board and the Chairman of No. 1 Committee be appointed a committee to make arrangements with the Collegiate Institute until a new principal be appointed.

Trustee Durrin supported the motion, which was put and carried.

Trustee Durrin moved that the vacancy in the position of principal be called for immediately. "My object," he said, "is to prevent any political harking, so that there will be no round robin to see what the candidates are for the position."

The motion was defeated and the matter laid over for discussion at the meeting of the Board on Tuesday evening.

SOME SILENT CONCERNS. Trustee Luskumbé on point of privilege, rose to contradict some clauses which had appeared in the stenographer's report of the committee meeting dealing with the Woods charges.

Trustee Johnston, on behalf of the committee, sought to explain the difficulties. He read an extract from the ADVANTAGE'S report of the meeting in question, and stated that he had the letter in his pocket from the Minister stating that he would not deal with them.
