

Even company commanders frequently depute others to do their official duties while in the trenches and remain well back from front. This is so different from the relations between our own officers and men that it is freshly impressed on the minds of the Germans on every occasion when there is hand to-hand fighting, in which our officers invariably lead their men, while the German officers seldom so so. They are not actuated by fear, and it must be assumed that they are obeying orders in thus hanging back. Very great losses of the German officers' class early in the war may have made it necessary to conserve the enemy's leaders. Whatever is the reason for their failure to take risks as great as those to which their men are subjected, the fact remains that they are doing so. Hence the hearty greetings from Lens.

Save 550 From a Torpedoed Liner, and Bring Transport Into Port.

London, Sept. 30.—Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency—Reuter's learns that a Japanese admiral reports that Japanese destroyers were escorting a liner and transport when the liner was torpedoed. The Japanese destroyers produced smoke screens to protect the liner from further attack. While others rushed to discover and attack the submarine the Japanese alternately protecting the liner and firing in the direction of the submarine rescued 550 persons from the liner, including women and children in less than an hour and brought them and the transport safely to port.

RUSSIAN ANARCHISTS IN PROTEST AGAINST BERKMAN'S PUNISHMENT

Petrograd, Sept. 30 .- (Delayed) .-Several thousand members of the Bolsheviki, at a mass meeting tonight, adopted a resolution of protest against the imprisonment and reported imposition of a death sentence upon Alexander Berkman, the anarchist. Agitators who came here recently from the U.S. A harangued the crowd, which packed a big circus tent. The speakers scoffed at American liberty, and said that the bourgeois ruled that country, but the Bolsheviki audience applauded only mildly.

A threatened demonstration against the American embassy was not carried out. The Government, preparing for sventualities, had sent an armored motor car and a detachment of troops to guard the embassy. Enemy Posts Forced To Retire For Distance of 1,000 Yards.

Petrograd, Oct. 1.—Russian troops have made another advance in the Riga region, according to today's war office announcement. German posts were pressed back south of the railway in the Spitals Farm sector, the Russians advancing between

800 and 1,000 yards. The text of the statement reads:

"Northern Front: In the region of Riga, four miles south of the railway, in the Spitals Farm sector, our vanguard detachments pressed back enemy posts and advanced between 800 and 1,000 yards."

VATIGAN SURPRISED AT FRENCH ATTITUDE TO PEACE PROPOSAL

Gasparri Says France Is Specially Favored In Note.

The letter then refers to the statement of former Premier Ribot, that he is in accord with the Provisional Government of Russia, admitting that in eventual peace negotiations war indemnities should not be claimed, but are reserving for France the right to require reparation for damages caused by "the malevolence of military commandeers outside the necessities of war." The letter adds:
"The pontifical note is couched in general terms and does not exclude reparation for such damages caused needlessly by the fault of military commanders. It is for France to judge if it is suitable for it, even in the hypothesis of victory, to prolong the war, were it only for one year, to require of the enemy reparation for these damages with due account taken of the losses in money and men and the heaps of ruins in which the war would leave the Belgian and French territory now occupied."

It then says that the pope does not and could not propose any solution concerning Alsace-Lorraine. It adds that the pope expresses hope that France and Germany will examine in a conciliatory spirit the aspirations of peoples taking into account what is just and possible. Finally, the letter contends that the pope's note favors France in different points and offends it in none.

A., met Manager Perry at 10 o'clock this morning, and after an hour's discussion Mr. Perry addressed a communication to Chairman Malette of the committee, providing that all of those now on strike would be taken back at once without discrimination, that the question of compensation of ticker and branch operators would be ad-justed with the committee, that the wage scale for linemen would also be adjusted, and that if there should be any misunderstanding as to the meaning of any part of the majority report (of the conciliation board), the company will submit the matter to the minister of labor for his de-cision.

Even more impressive was the terrific din of the guns. The campaign is planned to raise, at least \$3,000,000,000 in subscriptions and treasury officials have set the "amount expected" at \$5,000,000,000. Half again as large as the first liberty loan, the second offering is the largest the people of the United States have ever been called upon to absorb. Secretary McAdoo formally opened the campaign with a speech in Cleveland, the first of many he will deliver on his tour of the United States to stimulate interest in the sale of bonds.

Concerning rumors which have reached The Advertiser to the effect that tea is still on the upgrade and a further advance in price to the consumer will be one of the interesting little higher cost of living events of the near future a local man who thoroughly understands the tea situation said: "You can say from one who knows what he is talking about that there is still no reason why tea should retail at a higher price in this city than at the present time. There has been a considerable advance in price this year, but I cannot see that a further advance will be justified this year at least. It is all nonsense about the going to a dollar a pound, so far as conditions warrant.

"To be sure it costs a good deal more to lay it down here than formerly, owing to shipping conditions. In large shipments it costs now about 18 cents a pound to bring tea from India, Ceylon and Java, our chief sources of supply. In smaller shipments, probably the price is a little higher. Good quality tea is retailing from 50 to 75 cents a pound. The tea that is selling at 50 cents a pound today is the same quality that was sold for 25 cents five or six years ago, and the 30-cent tea has also doubled. But there is no reason in the world why a still higher price should be asked by dealers just now."
