





A MONSTER SHARK.

A MONSTER SHARK.

The American Museum of Natural History, New York city, has recently placed on exhibition one of the most imposing of marine wonders; a shark's jaw big enough to hold, with room to spare, six men standing upright, and having more than two hundred dagger-like teeth, many of them more than six inches in length. The length of the shark itself must have been eighty feet or more, if we may estimate its size in proportion to that of the teeth. It lived some millions of years ago, during what is known to geologists as the Ecocene period, and frequented the coast region of South Carolina, where the teeth were found in the phosphate beds. It was so far as there is any evidence, the biggest and fereest fish that ever lived. Only the huge teeth are now found, and these have been the guide in the preparation of a model of the jaw. It is the only mounted specimen of the kind in the world. The teeth grew in the jaw in the same way in which they grow in the big white shark, or man-eater, of the present day. The largest species of living sharks are the whale-sharks, and the basking-sharks. These, although they attain a length of from forty to fifty feet, are harmless.
