THE TITANIC AND HOW IT LOSE LIVES IN THE WRECKING OF A BRITISH VESSEL ATTACK ON RIGA MAY MEAN STARTING OF NEW WAR

GERMAN-RUSSIAN ATTACK ON RIGA MAY PRECIPITATE NEW WAR FOR ALLIED POWERS

Lettish Government Is Expected To Make Appeal for Military Help—Peace Conference Will Be Asked To Furnish Troops To Resist General Von Der Goltz.

London, Oct. 11.—Allied powers have the hardest problem that they have encountered since the armistice, thrust upon them by the German-Russian attack on Riga. It is believed the Lettish Government will expect the peace conference to furnish troops to resist General von der Goltz and his Russian supporters, but who will furnish the new armistice is a very serious question.

VOLUNTEER ARMY ABSORBED. All of Great Britain's new volunteer army has been absorbed in the making up of forces of occupation in the Near East. Drafted soldiers are still in the service, and their relatives are agitating for their return from India, Egypt and Mesopotamia.

GERMANY SCHEMING CONTROL. Latest news received by the Government is described as confirming the view that Germany is deliberately scheming to secure a controlling position in Russia, and that she probably contemplates the occupation of Petrograd. There are more than 100,000 German soldiers with headquarters in the Baltic States, with the exception of Finland.

GERMAN-RUSSIAN TROOPS TO TRY AND OUST REDS

Von Der Goltz Plans To Defy Berlin Government.

Berlin, Oct. 11.—German-Russian troops under Gen. von der Goltz and Col. Avaloff-Bermond, intend to oust St. Ulanov, Lettish premier, take possession of Lettvia, and then, with the assistance of Baltic Landwehr, advance against the Bolsheviks, according to a private letter which has reached here from a German officer at Mitau.

"FLYING PARSON" IS READY TO HOP OFF FOR THE PACIFIC. Leader in Aerial Derby Is Delayed by Minor Accident.

Chicago, July 11.—Leading flyers in the transcontinental airplane race between Chicago and San Francisco today, expected to complete the first half of their journey, were deterred by a minor accident in his plane, Lieut. Belvin Maynard, the "flying parson," leader in the great reliability and endurance test, was prepared this morning to take off for the Pacific from Salt Lake, Utah, his over-night stop.

GERMANS REGARD PLAN OF REACTION AS A REAL HUMILIATION. Berlin, Friday, Oct. 10.—Discussing the coming International Labor Conference at Washington, the Vorwaerts declares it is "impossible for Germany to submit to the humiliation of seeing her delegates in a penitential garb while Haiti, Liberia and other negro republics may decide for themselves whether they will attend the conference."

DUTCH SUPPORTING GERMANS. London, Oct. 11.—Dutch delegates to the International Labor Conference will be held in Washington soon are discussing details of the meeting with a representative of the German government, according to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam. It is stated that the Dutch representatives will raise the question of full rights being accorded the German and Austrian delegates, who arrived here yesterday.

BELGIAN ROYALTY REACH END OF WESTERN TRIP. Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 11.—King Albert, Queen Elizabeth and Crown Prince Leopold completed the transcontinental trip here last night. This morning they will be in Santa Barbara, where they will spend three days as the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Hoover before returning to San Francisco.

GABY WANTS GOOD HUSBAND AND A LOT OF BABIES. New York, Oct. 10.—Gaby Deslys, internationally famous dancer, who arrived here yesterday from Paris, today insisted she will not marry until she is ready to retire from the stage. Then, she declared, she must have a husband capable of supporting her "and a lot of babies."

Britain's Promise to Fulfill Terms of the Peace Treaty

London, Oct. 11.—According to the Mail, the text of the essential part of Great Britain's ratification of the German peace treaty, signed by King George yesterday, follows: "We, having seen and considered the treaty, protocol and agreement aforesaid, have approved and accepted and confirmed the same in all and every one of their articles and clauses, and we do by these presents approve, accept, confirm and ratify them for ourselves, our heirs and our successors, engaging and promising upon our royal word that we will sincerely and faithfully perform and observe all and singular the things contained and expressed in the treaty, protocol and agreement aforesaid, and that we will never suffer the same to be violated by anyone, or transgressed as far as it lies in our power."

CAPTURE OF RIGA BY GERMANS HAS NOT BEEN CONFIRMED

"Germany's New War" Is Featured in the London Newspapers.

ATACK IS CONFIRMED. London, Oct. 11.—It was stated in authoritative quarters here this afternoon that a German-Russian attack on Riga was carried out on Friday under cover of a heavy bombardment by German guns, forcing the Letts to evacuate the city.

London, Oct. 11.—Confirmation of a newspaper report that German forces have captured Riga is being awaited here, but if the disparity of the rival despatches, the success of the attack on the city would be surprising.

"Germany's new war" is featured in this morning's newspapers, but reports printed here add nothing of importance to dispatches received by the Canadian Press. The whereabouts of General von der Goltz continues to be the subject of contradictory rumors and estimates of the size of the army commanded by Col. Avaloff-Bermond, also show a wide divergence.

He has established headquarters at Shavli, while von der Goltz has his headquarters at Mitau.

The Morning Post, which is pronounced anti-German, attacks the British government for having "fumbled the whole question, it sees Poland in danger of being throttled by the Teutonic grip now tightening on her throat," and says Premier Paderewski's flying visit to London recently was for the purpose of imploring help from Great Britain, which the paper hopes will be granted.

The Daily News, representing an opposite view from that of the Morning Post, also attacks the government and the allies.

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10 MILLIONS READY TO LEAVE GERMANY

Austrians, Too, Want To Emigrate to America.

Washington, Oct. 10.—Ten million Germans are awaiting opportunity to leave their native countries, according to official diplomatic dispatches presented to the House Immigration committee today.

The dispatches described the situation in Vienna as "hopeless." It was said that thousands were idle and unrest general. Many Austrians, the dispatches said, were anxious to go to the United States as soon as possible.

Identity of Vessel Has Not Been Ascertained—Loss of This Ship Is the Greatest Sea Tragedy in the World's History

Archangel, Friday, Oct. 10.—Two thousand lives have been lost in the wreck of an unnamed British ship on the Norwegian coast, according to a wireless dispatch received here from Hel-singfors.

If the loss of life in the wreck reported in the foregoing dispatch is as large as indicated, the disaster will mark a new record in the annals of the sea. It would seem probable the ship which was wrecked was a military transport bringing British soldiers from Archangel, from which port Great Britain has been embarking large numbers of men during the last month.

The largest recorded loss of life in a marine disaster occurred when the Titanic was sunk after colliding with an iceberg south of Newfoundland on April 4, 1912, the list of deaths showing 1,503 names. The Lusitania, sunk by a German submarine, May 7, 1915, carried with her more than 1,200 of her passengers and crew.

REPORT IS DISCREDITED. London, Oct. 11.—Neither the admiralty nor Lloyd's have received any information relative to the wreck of a British ship on the Norwegian coast. At these sources the report is discredited.

GREAT BRITAIN AND ITALY HAVE ADJUSTED DIFFERENCES

Conference Between Representatives of the Two Countries Result in a General Understanding Being Reached—Co-Operation Will Mark Efforts To Solve Peace Problems.

Rome, Oct. 11.—Foreign Minister Tittoni had a cordial conversation with the British ambassador to Italy yesterday, according to a semi-official announcement, and as a result all misunderstandings have been cleared, and a friendly and cordial collaboration by the two countries in solving peace problems has been brought about.

Couple Parted For 22 Years Remarried, Husband Writes His Proposal on Battlefield

Sergeant Joseph Colby of Brantford Wins Back Love of Wife He Married in 1897—Son of the Pair Long Separated Acts As Best Man At Wedding.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 11.—Sergeant Joseph Colby of Brantford, Ont., has remarried his wife from whom he was divorced in 1897. He won back her love in a proposal written on the battlefield of France.

There the old world was burst into flame again, and he wrote back home asking forgiveness. He then learned his former wife was in this city. His first thought was to return here and claim for his bride the wife from whom he had been so long separated.

"Our separation was a mistake," said Sergeant Colby today. "We were young and foolish, and we thought we would never agree, but we found it was all a mistake."

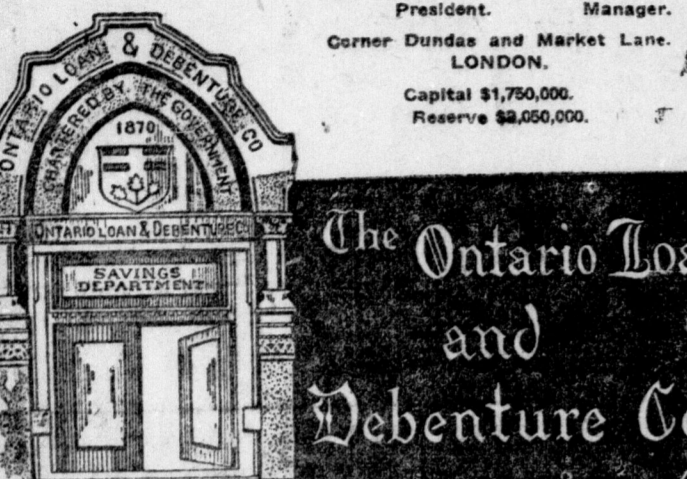

MORE TRAFFIC IS NEEDED FOR CLEVELAND BOAT

L. & P. S. R. Issues Frank Statement Concerning Lake Connection.

A candid intimation to shippers and travellers of London, St. Thomas and Western Ontario that the newly established all-year Cleveland and Port Stanley steamship service cannot survive on the measure of patronage at present accorded it, has been issued by the London and Port Stanley.

The warning has been given out in the hope that a friendly interest may be taken in the new connection, while it is developing its field. The L. & P. S. R. commission has agreed to share the first month's deficit, but the fear is held that unless a change for the better occurs the owners will throw up the sponge.

Those who have used the new boat, which was placed in service in the latter part of September, are agreed that its riding qualities are splendid, that the ship is maintained in an excellent condition and that there is nothing to be desired in matter of convenience or accommodation. The steamer, "Pere Marquette" Line No. 2, sails from Port Stanley each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday night, and from Cleveland each Monday, Wednesday and Friday night. Passengers are allowed to go to their berths at 8 o'clock in the evening and to remain there, if they desire, until late in the morning.

Cheap Rates.

The fare from London to Cleveland is only \$2.70 as compared with \$5.35, the all-rail ride from London to Cleveland via Detroit, or \$10.37, for an all-rail trip via Buffalo. Reduced rates for return tickets via Port Stanley afford an even more favorable comparison.

Fares from various parts of Western Ontario, where a certain amount of patronage is being found, are also advantageous. Even Toronto people are finding it convenient and profitable to proceed to Ohio through London and Port Stanley. A Toronto man can go to Cleveland by this route for \$7.75, covering the 225 miles in about 12 hours. If he wishes to visit Cleveland for 13 hours, and his ticket costs him \$2.25, he can go to Cleveland via Detroit, the cost of that 400-mile trip being \$12.50. Thus it will be seen that the man who uses the Cleveland-Port Stanley passenger service finds it profitable.

Splendid Freight Service.

There is likewise a substantial saving in freight charges to shippers who use the trans-lake service. The service is incomparably better than can be secured from the all-rail carriers. A London and Cleveland shipment of goods is never known to come through in less than eight days, and sometimes deliveries are delayed as long as a month. Such shipments if placed on the boat in Cleveland one day are delivered by the L. & P. S. R. in London on the next day. The service from London to Cleveland is equally as good. It is in fact express service at freight rates.

Thus it will be seen that the service is adequate and that lack of patronage must be due to other causes. Since the commencement of operation the number of passengers per trip has varied from seven to thirty. Less than fifty passengers makes it certain that the ship cannot pay her way. There has been a small volume of freight from Cleveland for London and Ontario points, shipments from London, or the Canadian side, for Ohio, are almost nil.

An Appeal.

The situation then is that London Chamber of Commerce, and St. Thomas Board of Trade, worked painstakingly to secure a service which the people are not using. Unless patronage increases the service will be lost. If that occurs it will unquestionably be a more difficult matter to interest any other boat company in a second attempt.

The London and Port Stanley Railway regards it as expedient to state the situation frankly to the people. The remedy is more patronage. Every shipper canvassed expresses great gratification that the connection has been secured. Everyone proclaims its desirability. But unless a special interest is taken in the service until it gains strength and maturity, the fear is held that it cannot survive.—Adv.

Government Hopes To Have Possession of the G. T. R. Soon

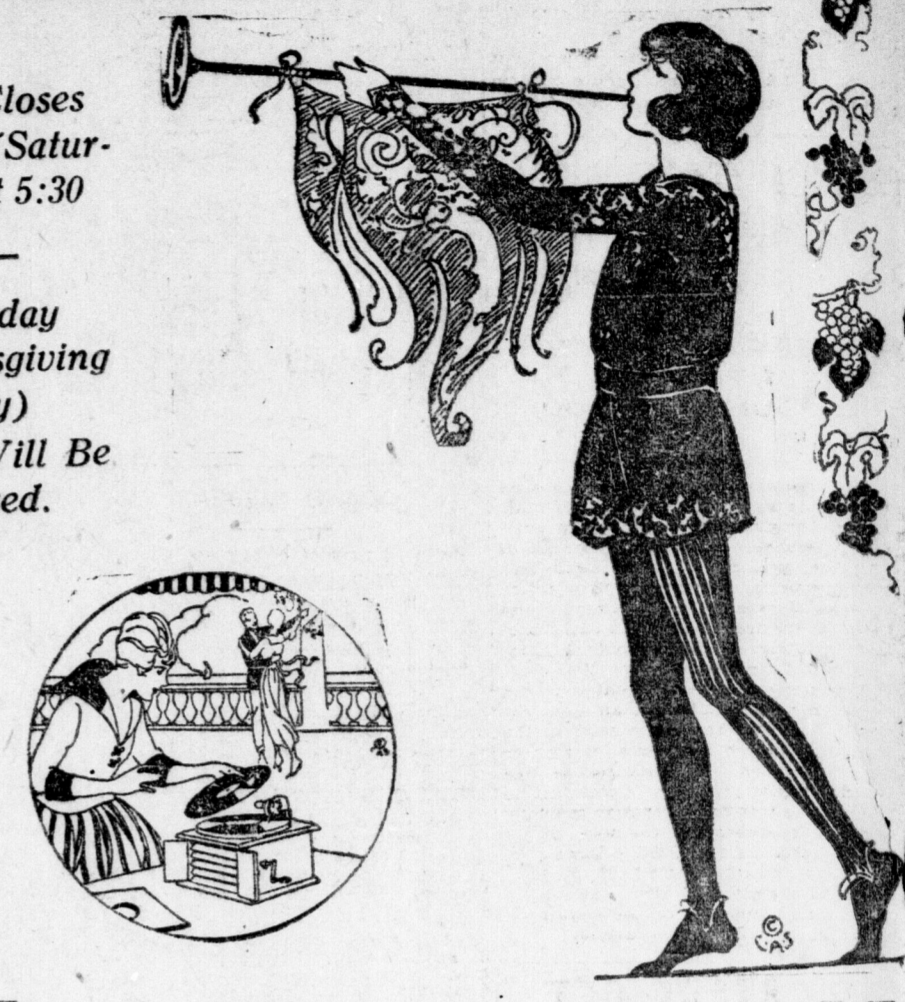
OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—The Ottawa Journal this afternoon says: "Within a few weeks—months at most—the Government expects to have possession of the Grand Trunk Railway System in both Canada and the United States, and turn it over for operation to the Canadian National Railway Corporation, which is now operating the intercontinental Railway, the Prince Edward Island Company Railway, the Canadian Northern Railway, the National Transcontinental Railway and the Government's mercantile marine. After nearly eighteen months of negotiations, during which the Grand Trunk Railway directors stubbornly held out for higher terms and resisted offers of arbitration, Sir Alfred Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk board, has accepted the Government's offer to arbitrate.

"A statement in connection with the entire Grand Trunk question will, it is understood, be given to Parliament in a day or two. Meanwhile, however, it is known that the cabinet is in full agreement in regard to the terms which are to form the basis of arbitration. The board will consist of three persons, one to be appointed by the Government, one to be appointed by the Grand Trunk, and the third to be named by the chief justice of Canada, the chief justice of Ontario and the senior judge of the exchequer court.

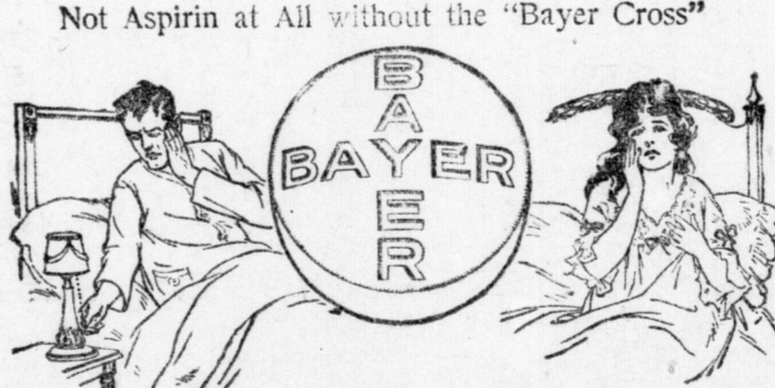

Committee Finds Three Evicted Families Unable To Pay Increased Rents.

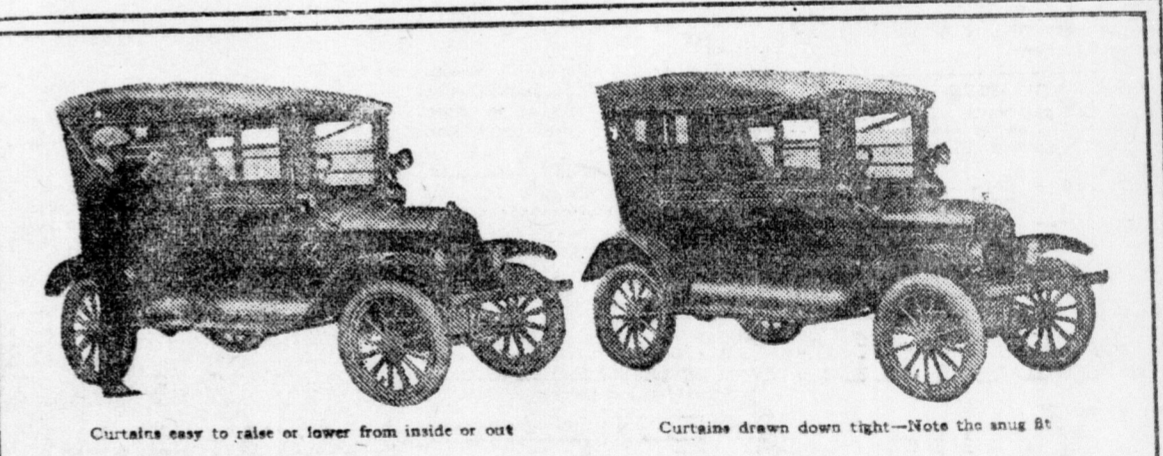
Windsor, Oct. 9.—Profiteering landlords are not unknown in Windsor, as the civic fair rent committee has discovered.

Mrs. Alice Durocher and her three young children were evicted from their home on Arthur street today because she was unable to pay increased rental demands. The committee also discovered two cases of similar nature later in the day. If further investigation reveals more instances the city will ask the Government to enact special legislation to deal with the rent profiteers.

Strikes, Boycotts and Blacklists Are Strongly Condemned

Representatives of Capital Object to Collective Bargaining.

Washington, Oct. 10.—Opposition to collective bargaining and the closed shop were outlined by the group representing capital, and presented today to the national industrial conference here. Sympathetic strikes, black lists and boycotts were declared to be "indefensible, anti-social and immoral."

While deploring strikes and lockouts, the principles set forth that the right of strike or lockout "should not be denied as an ultimate resort after all possible means of adjustment have been exhausted." This right, however, should apply only to private industry.

In public utility service it was proposed that the state impose regulations as would assure continuous operation, at the same time providing adequate means for the prompt hearing and adjustment of complaints and disputes.

For the settlement of disputes in private industry, it was proposed that each establishment be regarded as an industrial unit with adequate methods for adjustment of misunderstandings between employees and management. Other of the principles dealt with conditions and hours of work, wages and the right to associate, and it was declared that every association whether of either employees or employers "must be equally subject to public authority and legally answerable for its own conduct or that of its agents."

KILLING OF AMERICAN SOLDIER BY RUSSIANS LED TO ULTIMATUM

Protest by Omsk Government Resulted in Withdrawal of Demand.

Omsk, Sept. 30.—An American soldier in Vladivostok was shot and killed recently by a Russian officer, it was learned here. This and other incidents led to a demand from the allied commanders in Vladivostok for the removal of the Russian troops from the city. A vigorous protest by the Omsk government, however, led to the withdrawal of the demand.

Husband Shoves Wife Off Train; Decree Granted

Judge Oodd Says No Man Ever Can Have Occasion for Such an Act.

Detroit, Oct. 9.—It was as much as intimidated in high legal circles Thursday afternoon that a husband really has no right to shove his wife off a moving train. The point came up in Judge George F. Oodd's court, when he was hearing the divorce case of Florence J. Hamilton vs. Spencer Hamilton.

Mrs. Hamilton's sister was on the witness stand to corroborate the plaintiff's claims of brutal treatment.

"You have witnessed such treatment, have you," asked the plaintiff's lawyer, the sister.

"Yes," said the witness, "once he shoved her off a moving train."

"And had she given him any occasion to do that?" pursued the attorney.

"Really now?" put in the court, "can a man ever have any occasion for shoving his wife off a train?"

Mrs. Hamilton got a decree.

A few moments later, the case of Jennie LaMonde vs. John S. LaMonde was in progress. Today is their twenty-first wedding anniversary. Mrs. LaMonde said that John left her several years ago "as he did not want the responsibility of maintaining a home." Mr. LaMonde was in court. The decree was granted.

MAKING A NAME

Although only in business for eight months, The Universal Varnish Company, London's baby industry, is doing the city credit. A multi-million London varnish is not only being shipped to all parts of Ontario, but also the Maritime Provinces, and a certain amount to the West. At present the plant is operating overtime, preparing for next spring's trade.

AVIATION EXPERTS SEE EARLY END TO MANY OF PRESENT OBSTACLES

Machines Easily Overcome Bad Weather Conditions.

New York, Oct. 10.—Aviation enthusiasts at the American Flying Club here last night were loud in their praise of the feats accomplished by Lieut. Maynard and Capt. Lowell H. Smith, who met at North Platte, Neb., on their way west and east. Some of the end of all transportation difficulties within a few years. Chance M. Vought, chairman of the contest committee, said the club, said: "Lieut. Maynard's arrival in Cheyenne, Wyo., 1,696 miles away from the point he started from Wednesday morning, flying only in daylight and with compulsory stops at official controls en route, and Capt. The organization is made up of Croats, who are leading the movement for the annexation of Fiume.

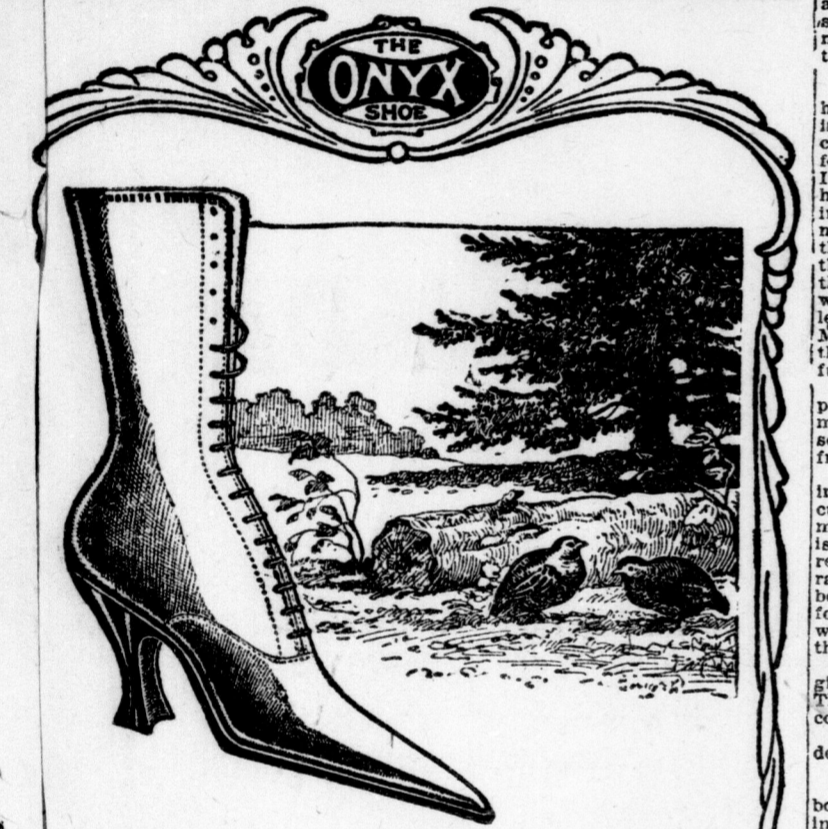

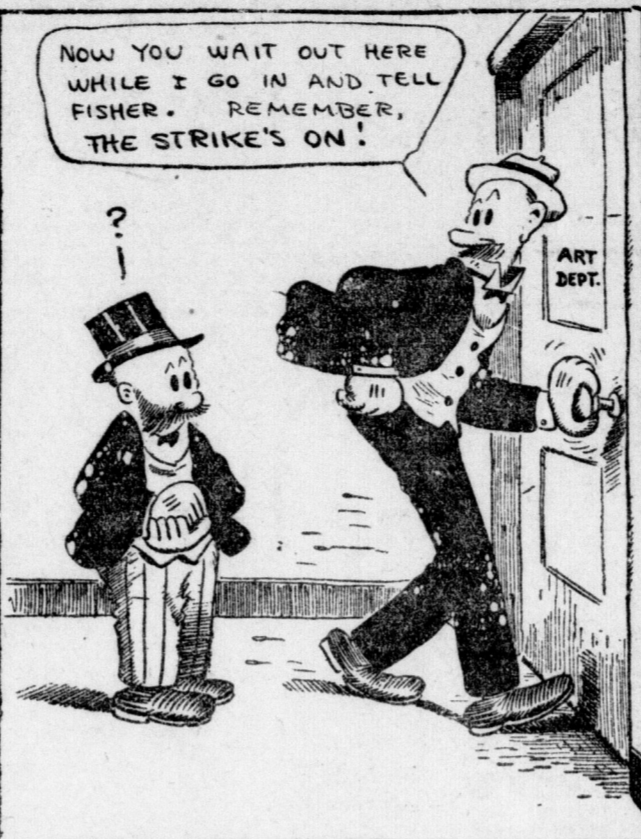

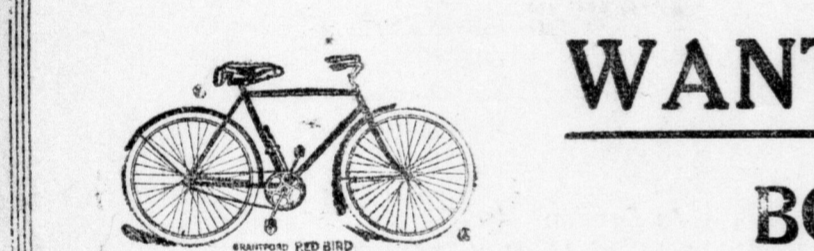
Western U. Placed With St. Mikes and Varsity Seconds

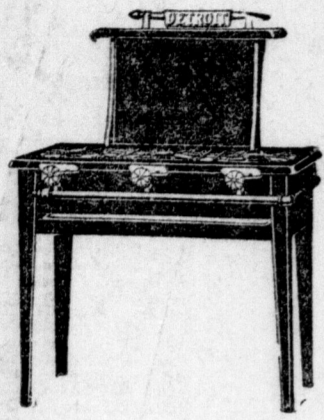

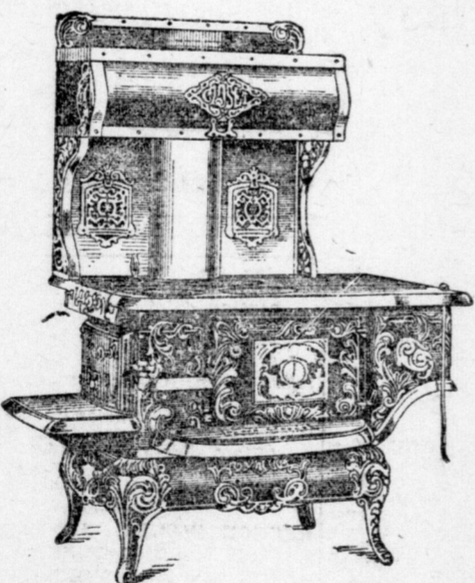

FORMER DRUMBO DOCTOR GUILTY, MANSLAUGHTER

Detroit Jury Convicts Dr. Geo. A. Fritch—Served in Prison Before.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 10.—After being out forty minutes a jury in Judge Wilkins' court his afternoon returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter against Dr. George A. Fritch, formerly of Drumbo, Ontario.
Fritch was arrested, following the death of Mrs. Victoria Kalandia, who, it was charged, had been illegally operated upon by him. Three other cases pending against the former Canadian physician will be pushed immediately, the prosecuting attorney declared.
Dr. Fritch has been arrested many times in connection with alleged malpractice. He had so far not been convicted, except in one case where he served part of a seven-year term at Jackson State prison.

Ex-Mayor Hughes Drops, Leaving Sir Henry To Take Nomination.

KINGSTON, Oct. 10.—The latest political rumor here is that the Liberals will put up a fight for the seat at Ottawa in the by-election. Ex-Mayor J. M. Hughes has retired as a Union candidate, leaving the way open for acclamation for Sir Henry Drayton. It is known that local Liberals were very busy yesterday in consultation with the heads of their party, and the name of Hon. Geo. P. Graham is prominently mentioned today as candidate for Kingston in this election.

SAYS RETURNED MEN ARE NOT IN DEMAND AMONG EMPLOYERS

G. W. V. A. Representative Quotes Veterans.

AN AIR FORCE PROTEST

Witness Alleges Discrimination Against Men of This Service.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—A communication was received from the Halifax branch of the army and navy veterans of Canada by the special committee on re-establishment this morning, asking that soldiers who had served at Halifax be considered as having given active war service. Halifax was under war conditions and had suffered through the war and it was urged that soldiers having served in the garrison there had been in a theatre of war. The letter was filed.

Mr. MacNeil called attention to Victory Loan advertising in regard to vocational training, and he submitted a number of questionnaires from men vocationally trained who claimed they were unable to follow the trades for which they were trained. One man in Calgary declared he was unemployed because "nobody wanted the services of a returned soldier."
Mr. Greig, representing the air service association of British Columbia, submitted that imperial soldiers should be given equality as compared to the C. E. F. Certain departments of the Government in this country discriminate against the air force members, whenever there was an opportunity. Men, he asserted, were brought back from the air force to the R. F. C. for one day purposely to reduce them to the rank they held three years before and their pay was therefore also reduced.
"Dropped Flat."
Mr. Greig asserted that there was discrimination in regard to the 50 or so men chosen for the Canadian air force units who were kept on consoling pay and gained over their consoling officers, he asserted.
The militia and S. C. R. departments were absolutely callous when help for imperials was requested, the witness said.
"There are going to be bread lines this winter," declared the witness. He thought Mr. Stevenson's report on employment conditions in Vancouver was far too conservative. He thought the D. S. C. R. should be given a wider

scope in regard to training. The men who made good in an eight-months' course would have made good without the D. S. C. R.
Britain's aid to her returned men in the matter of re-education and re-establishment were outlined by Mr. Greig, who placed a copy of the British act in the hands of the chairman. Answering Mr. MacNeil, the witness said England was doing for her soldiers practically what was being asked by the G. W. V. A. in Canada. Imperial soldiers who had come to Canada to reside were cut off from the benefits of re-establishment grants.

SINN FEINER SENT TO JAIL FOR 18 MONTHS

Dublin, Ireland, Oct. 10.—Patrick O'Keefe, Sinn Fein member of parliament for the northern division of Cork, who was acquitted by a court-martial on the charge of having arms in his possession, but was held on further charges, including the accusation of sedition, was sentenced today to eighteen months' imprisonment for seditious utterances. He was arrested on September 12 during the raids and searches for arms carried out by the authorities here and elsewhere in Ireland.

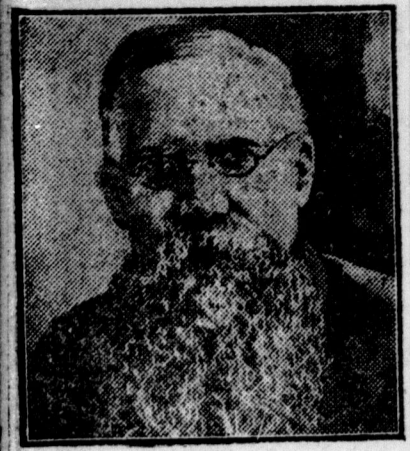

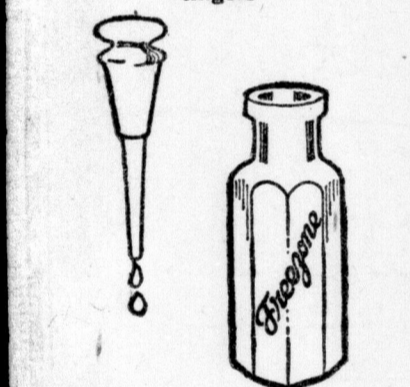

CIVIL SERVICE CHAIRMAN GETS \$1,000 INCREASE

Salary Is To Be \$7,000—Other Commissioners To Get \$6,000.

NO OPPOSITION
Reclassification Bill Goes to Committee Stage, Goes For Third Reading.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—The civil service reclassification bill put through the committee stage in the House of Commons this evening and will come up for third reading on Tuesday next. There was but little opposition to the details of the bill, which had been thoroughly gone over by a special committee of the House, and no amendments were introduced. Before it was taken up, a resolution providing for an increase in the salary of the chairman of the civil service commission from six to seven thousand dollars per annum, and from five to six thousand dollars in those of the other commissioners was carried.

A. E. Fripp, championing the cause of the temporary employees of the civil service, wished to have provision made for granting these clerks permanent appointments without having to pass the civil service commission examinations. He believed an examination in office duties would be sufficient.

This view was not concurred in by Hon. A. K. MacLean, in charge of the bill, who thought nothing could be more injurious to the service than legislating temporary employees into permanent positions.

A request of Dr. R. J. Manion, that a returned soldier be appointed to the commission prompted Mr. MacLean to state that, though he considered such an appointment unnecessary, in view of the fact that soldiers were given preference in appointments to the civil service, he would not oppose an amendment providing for such an appointment if introduced on the third reading.

LOYD GEORGE SAYS NATIONALIZATION IS A POLITICAL ISSUE

LONDON, Oct. 10.—An official report of the speech of Premier Lloyd George to the miners' delegation yesterday shows that he declared the nationalization of mines was a political issue which must be decided by the whole nation and not by a section of the country. The premier added that in his expression of the Government's view on nationalization was unacceptable to the nation there were means whereby the nation could not only carry out nationalization, but could also carry out the Government.

COL. GUEST IS NEW OFFICER OF HEALTH IN LONDON DISTRICT

TORONTO, Oct. 10.—Dr. N. O. Thomas, R. H. M. D., a returned soldier, of St. Thomas, has been appointed director of the provincial board of health's new public laboratory at Fort William.

Colchak's Armies Have Regained the Tobol River Line

OMSK, Sept. 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Siberian armies of Admiral Koichak have in their advance to the river now regained the line of the Tobol River along a front of 25 miles immediately north of the city of Kurgan, where the trans-Siberian railway crosses the river. Kurgan itself is under fire, and its occupation is imminent. Heavy fighting is reported further north around the city of Yalutorvsk, where the Tobol branch railroad toward Ekaterinburg crosses the Tobol River.

BULGARIANS ARE GIVEN A TEN-DAY EXTENSION OF TREATY-TIME-LIMIT

PARIS, Oct. 10.—(Havas.)—The supreme council has decided to grant to the Bulgarian plenipotentiaries an extension of ten days to the time in which they are required to return their objections upon the draft of the Bulgarian treaty submitted to them September 19. The additional period will end October 24.

FRENCH CEREAL CROP WILL BE FAR BELOW THAT OF LAST YEAR

PARIS, Oct. 10.—(Havas Agency.)—An official estimate given out by the ministry of agriculture shows that the wheat crop for the current year will be 48,428,170 hundredweight, compared with 61,435,840 last year and 76,936,065 in 1914. The rye production will be 6,070,010 hundredweight, against 7,240,300 last year; barley, 5,143,920 hundredweight, against 3,352,000 last year; millet (a mixture of wheat and rye), 927,330 hundredweight, against 959,820 last year, and oats 24,429,323 hundredweight, against 25,613,769 last year.

Maples To Preserve Canadians' Memory At Buxton, England

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Associated Press.)—In commemoration of peace and the memory of thousands of Canadian soldiers who passed through the discharge depot at Buxton, several maple trees have been sent from Canada and were planted at Buxton Thursday by the mayor and aldermen and Col. Hanson, commandant of the discharge depot.

Britain's Ratified Copy of Treaty Is On Way to France

Will Be First of Ratifications by Great Powers To Reach Paris.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—King George today completed Great Britain's ratification of the German peace treaty. The document ratified by him has been dispatched to Paris.

Britain's ratified copy of the peace treaty, as indicated by the foregoing, is likely to be in Paris by Saturday. It will be the first of the ratifications by any of the great powers to be deposited there. Advises from Rome have announced the ratification of the treaty by King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, but so far as is known the Italian ratification has not reached the French capital, there being some question, indeed, as to whether the king's act, still lacking the sanction of the parliament, will be considered a valid ratification.

Action by the French Senate on the treaty is still pending, ratification by France thus far being incomplete.

ALLIED WARSHIPS AT RIGA READY TO ACT

British and French Vessels Will Force Von Der Goltz To Leave.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 10.—British and French warships in the harbor of Riga have cleared for action, according to a dispatch from Riga to the Lettish information bureau, on account of the attack by German troops under the command of Gen. von Der Goltz upon the Lettish army defending Riga.

PARIS, Oct. 10.—Gen. von Der Goltz, the German commander in the Baltic provinces, is persisting in his refusal to evacuate the region, the supreme council has been informed. The council this afternoon received a telegram to this effect from the French mission in the Baltic States.

TEN DOLLAR MEAL.
WINDSOR, Oct. 10.—When the Prince of Wales comes to Windsor this month, out of the seventy-one persons selected to dine with him at the Essex County Club, only two will be Detectors, Mayor Cousins and Howard G. Meredith, British consul. This was settled at a meeting of the committee this afternoon. The cost of the banquet will be \$10 a plate. The city will spend \$1,600 of street decorations.

NEW PLAN FOR GRATUITIES IS NOW PROPOSED

Colonel Margheson Suggests Fixed Amount For Every Day's Service.

70c FOR FRANCE MEN
40c and 20c Respectively For Every Day Served in England or Canada.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—An alternate plan of assisting veterans, according to length and character of service, was submitted to the special committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment this afternoon by Col. J. W. Margheson, a member of the board of pensions commissions. His plan was presented as coming from himself and not from the Government or any member. Neither was it presented as coming from the Ottawa branch of the Great War Veterans' Association as such.

Col. Margheson's plan is to give every man who served in a theatre of war as a combatant, 70c per diem from enlistment to discharge. Men serving in England or Siberia would receive 40c per diem, and men who served in Canada 20c per diem. There would be a limit of \$1,500 on the amount any man could receive, this to include gratuities. In that way officers who had drawn big gratuities would not receive any large amount in re-establishment grants.

Col. Margheson would treat married and single men alike with the exception that regardless of the amount of gratuity already paid a married man, he would be considered to have only been paid the rate of a single man.

Only \$500 Cash.

He would limit the amount of cash to \$500 and place the rest of a man's re-establishment to his credit with the Government, so that he could draw on it for any amount of the Government's re-establishment plans.

Under Col. Margheson's plan widows of deceased soldiers would be paid a stated sum, all alike, regardless of their husbands' service, this sum to be paid as additional to their pensions.

Col. Margheson said his plan had been placed before the Ottawa branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, but had not been voted upon. Col. Margheson said, including cash and credit, his scheme would cost from \$150,000,000 to \$200,000,000. Of this he estimated fully \$40,000,000 would not be claimed for various reasons; \$35,000,000 in cash would be needed, and \$115,000,000 would be placed to the men's credit. He estimated 300,000 soldiers had served an average of 800 days in France, a cost to the Government of \$168,000,000; 60,000 in England costing \$19,000,000, and 175,000 in Canada, an average of twenty days, total cost, \$13,000,000. He thought these figures were 10 per cent too high, and though that 50,000 returned soldiers did not ask for aid and would refuse to touch the money.

T. A. Cox, officer in charge of gratuities, department of militia and defence, recalled, said the estimated total for gratuities was \$124,000,000. Eleven thousand men discharged prior to Nov. 11 had not yet applied for gratuity, but applications were coming in at the rate of 3,000 daily. Of 35,000 questionnaires sent out, 7,000 had been returned, as the soldiers had changed their addresses.

Covered by Order.

In regard to the charges made by Lieut. Greig of the Air Force Association that officers were brought back from the R.A.F. and paid gratuities at their original rank, Mr. Cox said that was covered by a bill dated Aug. 22. This provided that gratuities should be on R.A.F. basis.

Major Brown of the department of records, supported Mr. Cox's estimate of the men who had gone to France, but he could not give definite figures, but estimated the total number at 360,000. The Great War Veterans' Association figure of 235,000 was too low to allow for casualties, etc. The G.W.V.A. total of 320,000, however, was too high, approximately \$40,000,000 too low, in Major Brown's opinion.

CHARGE AGAINST LICENSE BOARD IS REITERATED

Dewart Repeats That Hearst and His Government Are Guilty.

AND COMMISSIONERS Latter Should Be Dismissed From Office For Their Misconduct.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—While passing through Ottawa from the meetings at Pembroke and Almonte yesterday on the way to Peterborough, Mr. Hartley Dewart, the Liberal leader, with reference to the statement of License Commissioner Flavella, said that it was contrary to any fair interpretation of the law that the importation of wine to be used at the evening meal over which a blessing was said, could be stretched to be considered "wine" used in divine service. If this was a fair interpretation of the law, why was this application never thought of until the week before a general election?

By no special ruling could the wholesale importation of liquor, equal to proof spirits of 62.84 per cent, be justified.

Mr. Dewart added:

Not Against Jews.

Mr. Flavella says that the board feels justified in assuming that the authorities of the Jewish Church have acted in perfect good faith. The charge is not against the Jews of Toronto; it is against the license commission; the responsibility and duty is theirs. The charge still stands, that this license board, in the interest of its masters, the Hearst Government, in their hour of emergency in an election campaign, has lent itself to an illegal act. The board should have known that its action was illegal. If they do not know it, the members of the board are not fit to hold their positions. If they do know it, they should be dismissed for their misconduct.

One of the important questions before the people today is whether the Liberal party cannot be better trusted to enforce the law than a premier and a Government which allows its violation almost under their very eyes.

"I can promise that the Liberal party will see to it that there is no such a fall-down in the administration of the law as the present conditions disclose."

PRINCE PAYS A RETURN VISIT TO WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, Oct. 10.—The Prince of Wales revisited Winnipeg this afternoon, and will remain until Tuesday morning. The visit will be of a more less informal nature. There will be two outstanding events to mark his stay in the city, a military dinner and a ball tonight, and a public reception on Saturday afternoon.

U. S. SENATORS VISIT PITTSBURGH DISTRICT TO INVESTIGATE STRIKE

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 10.—Senators investigating the steel strike put in a busy day in the Pittsburgh district and viewed everything from the incandescent metal in the rolling mills to the culinary equipment in the homes of the mill workers. They discussed strike conditions with plant superintendents, and held informal caucuses with strikers in the back streets of Homestead and Clairton.

Chairman Kenyon said they wanted to be sure and hear both sides, and volunteer and visible interpreters made it easy for the foreign-born elements among the strikers to be heard. Each side continued to express satisfaction with the progress of the big strike.

MYSTERY WOMAN ADDS FOURTH SIDE TO "ETERNAL TRIANGLE"

Wife Says "Mina" and Another Stole Husband's Affections.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 10.—A mysterious woman named "Mina," adding into a police case here today, in which Charles W. White, taxi driver, was convicted of non-support, enlarged the "eternal triangle" aspects of the case into the "unusual quadrangle." The second woman in the case is Mrs. Belle Russ of this city.

Mrs. White charged her husband with being a non-support, and named the mysterious "Mina"—other name unknown, and Mrs. Russ as those who had alienated her husband's affections and a great deal of his night time. Sometimes the nights dragged into the morning after, with "other women," the wife charged.

Hunts Trainers, Finds Letter.

She produced a letter in court as evidence, which she explained she had found in a search of her husband's trousers pockets.

The letter was written by White to Mrs. Russ, then living in London, inviting her and her friend "Mina" to St. Thomas. The writer promised to have a motor car waiting at the St. Thomas station to meet them two women.

Mrs. White testified that when her husband discovered she had taken the incriminating letter he had tied her up with a rope. Her sister, Miss Grace Cole, rescued the letter just before it fell into the clutches of the husband, and so saved it for court evidence.

Alleges Husband Threatened.

Then White threatened to shoot Miss Cole for interfering, his wife testified. The one child of the White couple is working in this city. She worked for some time in London, but returned recently to St. Thomas.

Magistrate Maxwell declared after he had heard the evidence against White that it impressed him so deeply he did not feel justified in sentencing the prisoner the same day. White was remanded to jail for one week and was refused bail after he had been found guilty.

Predicts Heavy Sentence.

"It would be better for the community if men who fail to support their wives like you were sent to the penitentiary," the magistrate told White, but he commented the prisoner's counsel, Charles McClurg, for his efforts to secure a dismissal or lenient sentence for his client.

The magistrate declared the evidence fell into the clutches of White that the prisoner could not hope for anything but a heavy jail term. Sentence will be imposed next Friday in the police court.

IRISH QUESTION AND LABOR PROBLEMS TO BE GIVEN PRIORITY

These Will Be Discussed First When British Parliament Meets.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Labor problems and the Irish question will be given priority over other subjects of discussion when parliament meets Oct. 22. The alien bill is down as the first matter for consideration, but it will probably be postponed. The special cabinet committee dealing with Ireland, composed of Lord Birkenhead, the lord chancellor; Sir Laming-Worthington-Evans, the home minister for pensions; Edward Shortt, secretary for home affairs; H. A. L. Fisher, minister of education; Walter Long, lord of the admiralty; Sir Eric Geddes, minister of transport; Sir Ian MacPherson, chief secretary for Ireland; and Viscount French, lord-lieutenant of Ireland.

The nature of the debate on the Labor situation will depend upon the attitude taken by the Labor party in connection with the conference with the prime minister yesterday regarding nationalization of the coal mines. Robert Smillie, president of the Miners' Federation, and Frank Hodges, its secretary, state that the miners will probably take no immediate steps with reference to nationalization, since the matter is now in the hands of the Trades Union Congress. C. W. Bowerman, secretary of the congress, said that if a special congress were considered necessary to discuss the matter to be taken the gathering would probably not be held until after the return from Washington of the British delegates to the international labor conference.

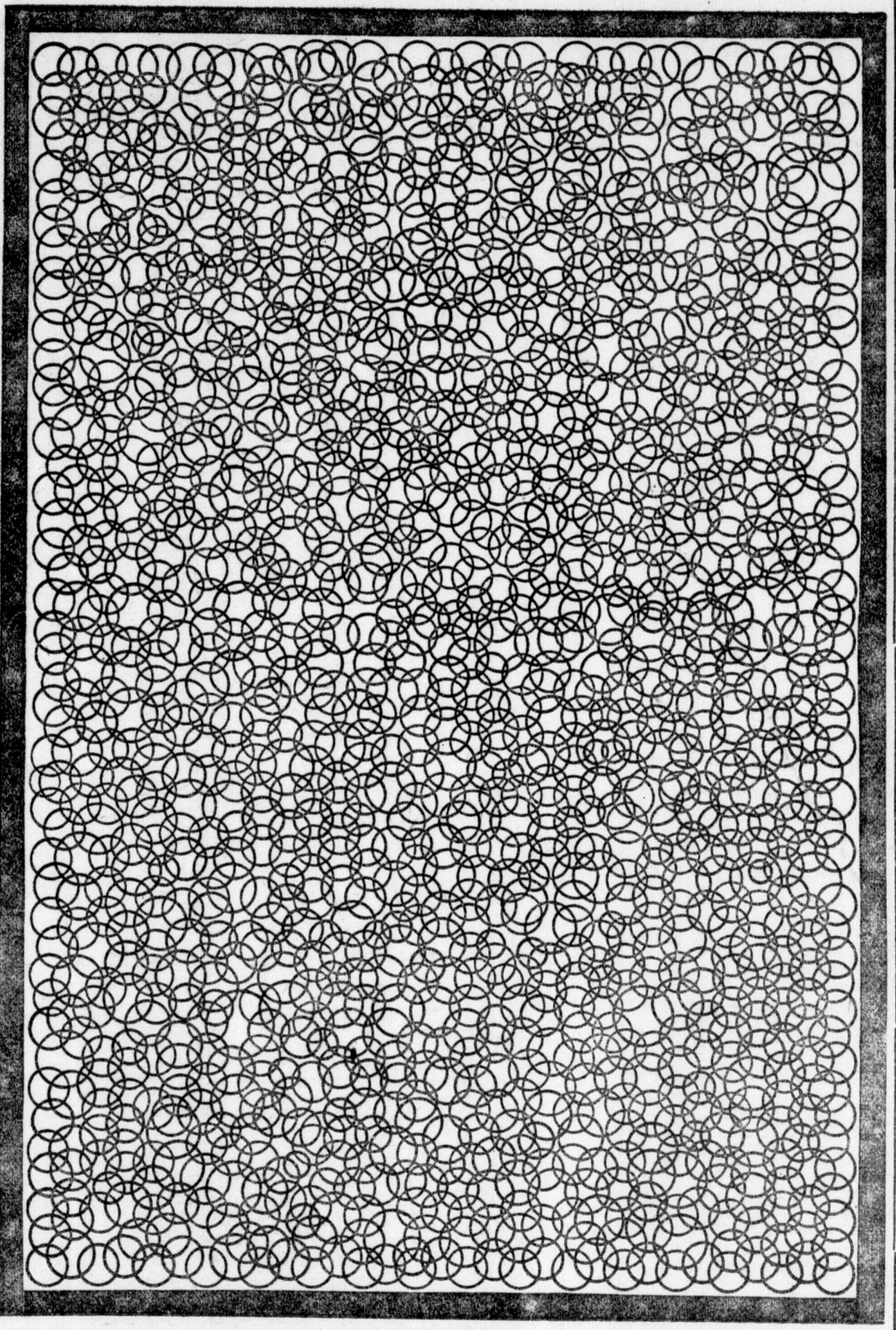

Chickens in Great Demand For Thanksgiving Day. Some 70 loads of hay were sold on the local market during the week, prices being strong, with the exception of Wednesday, when hay dropped \$1 per ton, selling at \$26.

There has not been much wheat sold on the market during the week, although there was a ready demand at from \$1.90 to \$2 per bushel.

A general weakening in the potato market is being looked for. Prices this week ranged from \$1.30 to \$1.50 per bushel, and a drop of at least 10 cents a bushel is looked for today.

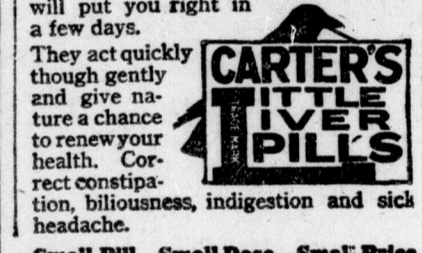

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ADVERTISER: Dear Sir,—I called this morning at the Ontario Government dispensary to buy a bottle of Imperial whiskey, but not having a medical prescription I had to go without whiskey. They offered me a 40-ounce bottle of Walker's Imperial whiskey for one dollar and eighty-five cents (\$1.85), which is equivalent to seven dollars and forty cents (\$7.40) per gallon of 160 ounces. The last quotation I had from Walker for similar whiskey was one dollar and fifty-five cents (\$1.55) per gallon in bond. The excise duty is now one dollar and eighty-seven cents (\$1.87) per gallon; freight, five cents (5c) making a cost in London of three dollars and forty-seven cents (\$3.47) per gallon, which deducted from seven dollars and forty cents (\$7.40) leaves a balance of three dollars and ninety-three cents (\$3.93) for profit in favor of the dispensary. In the old days of license I sold thousands of barrels of this same kind of whiskey at a profit of from ten cents to fifteen cents per gallon, or in other words from four dollars to six dollars profit on a barrel containing forty gallons. The consumer now pays one dollar and eighty-five cents (\$1.85) plus two dollars (\$2.00) for prescription, or three dollars and eighty-five cents (\$3.85) per quart, or fifteen dollars and forty cents (\$15.40) per gallon of 160 ounces. This is reducing the high cost of living with a vengeance. It is simply daylight robbery of the public, but particularly on poor people who cannot afford it. Yours truly,

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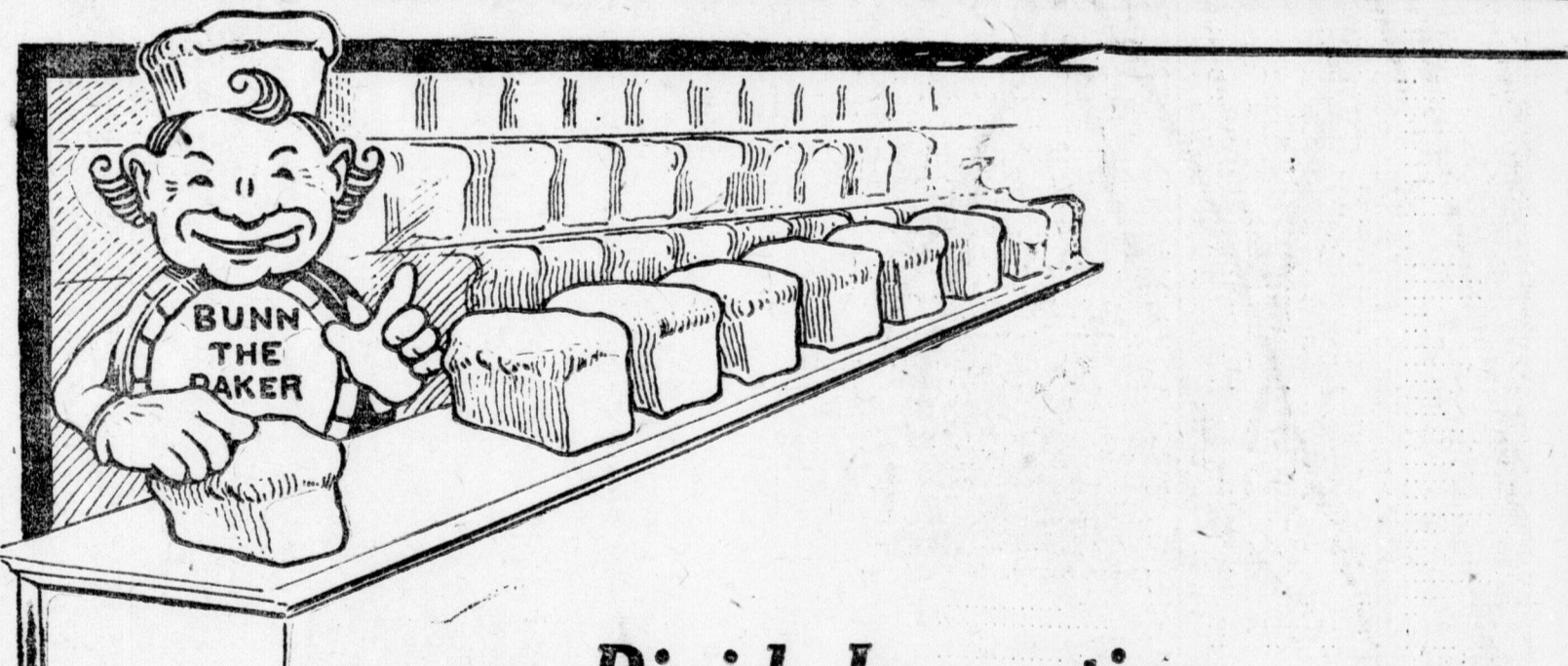
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
