I was not permitted to use the tele-

phone for business purposes. My business was a fairly extensive one, with an anual turnover of approximately about one million sterling, and it was, of course, impossible restrictions. I told the man so, and informed him that I declined to do any business whatever under these conditions. He replied 'n effect that it was not the intention of the German Government to hinder us in business, that, on the contrary, they wished us to continue trading, and that it was

my duty to do so. This, of course, was mere sophistry, as it is obviously impossible to trade under such conditions. Besides, found out later on that, unknown to me, the superviser had given orders to the Post Office and telegraph office not to deliver any mails or telegrams to us. These were only delivered subsequently after having been held up unknown to me-for nearly a fort night. When I noticed that neither letters nor telegrams were arriving I wrote to the Post and Telegraph offices, but received no reply. These letters were submitted to the superviser, who even then refrained from telling me that the mails and telegrams were being held up by his own

I have however, no official intimation of this. I also saw later on in the German newspapers that a law had been passed absolving the Government from any liability for any acts which such receivers or rustees for alien enemies' firms might

All the measures adopted by the German authorities in connection with British businesses undoubtedly were intended to throttle and destroy them; they certainly were carried out so as to secure this effect. We were told at the time that these were merely acts of retaliation as all German firms in Great Britain were being treated

I have confined myself strictly to ecounting only the facts as I experinced them myself.—Dundee Adver-

Bulgarian Premier's Remarkable

A remarkable change appears to have come over the Bulgarian Government as exemplified in a statement of M. Radoslavoff on the occasion of the debate in the Sobranje on the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. After speeches from the leaders

of the Opposition in favour of the unity of different parties and the Government in reference to foreign policy, M. Radoslavoff in a speech admitted that Bulgaria had entered the war by reason of certain obligations which she had as

The Premier further recognised, as Dr. Danoff, the ex-Premier had done that the Bulgarians should not be so arrogant as was the case three years ago at the Balkan peace conference in Lon-

Radoslavoff declared he would not oppose the establishment of an autonomous Albanian state, while regarding Serbia he was ignorant of what would happen. The Premier also made the significant observation that Bulgaria was not in close relations with either of her neighbours, and as regards the Convention with Turkey he said the agreement had been already executed. He added that Bulgaria could be more reassured were the Convention ratifled, while the document could tomorrow become but a scrap of pa-

Member of Duma Outlines Conditions Acceptable to Czar and the Slavs

New York, June 10.—Ivan I Narodny, Secretary of the Russian- American- Asiatic Corporation in this country, has received

Narodny said that he could not reveal the name of the official, but he knew the statement was authentic. He would not say whether he thought the conditions represented the sentiment of Rus-The statement follows:

-That Teutons must evacuate Belgium, France, Serbia and the Russian provinces held by their armies.

7—The Teutons must pay for the damage they have done to the captured provinces, return the money provisions and goods they have requisitioned.

3-The Kaiser should renounce his sovereign power over Saxony, Luxemburg, Hesse, Wuerttemburg and other small territories which belong now to the German empire.

1-Germany and Austria shall keep limited armies and cease to advocate militarism. 5 Germany shall cede Alsace-Lorraine to France and Aus tria shall cede Herzegovina to

6—Germany and Austria shall give independent government to the Poles, the Bohemians and the Hungarians.

7—Russia will give her Poles the same independent government as Germany and Austria, and a republic of Poland shall be formed, composed of the Polish provinces of Aus-

tria, Germany and Russia.

8—The Poles will be compelled to give autonomous government to the Lithuanians that

9—Russia must get the part of Asia Minor that her armies now occupy and in addition part of Persia and Palestine.

Russia will disarm her armies and give perfect independence to the national ities living in Russia, besides giving freedom of speech, education and press throughout

her empire. 1-Russia will abolish the old fashioned passport and police system.

2-England shall get the German African provinces, part of Asia Minor, but she must abolish most of her navy and give freedom to India.

12—Constantinople shall be made a free international trade city, under the supervision of the United States.

14—The Teutons must yield to Russia, giving a prefer-ence tariff to the United States. "These are the vital points on which the Russian people are willing to consider peace," the statement continues. "Russia main tains that the peace negotiations should be held either in Cambridge, Mass., or in New Haven, Ct. Russia is ready for peace negotiations, but only under the mentioned conditions."

### ANOTHER LETTER FROM MR. GOSLING

Deals With the Present Conditions of Our City Drains and Tells of What Improvements the Present Board Have Made in This Respect Since Assuming

(Editor Mail and Advocate) Dear Sir:-It is unnecessary to the gratings, and side drains in those streets where the houses are without water and sewerage connections. People have to get rid of their slop water and kitchen refuse, and for want of a better means of disposal empty it into the cobble-stone side drains.

The stench from these drains is dreadful and the condition in Spring, when the snow melts, unspeakable.

Nothing could be more dangerous to the health of the residents or objectionable to passers-by than the condition of these

I write in the present tense because there are still unfortunately a few places still in that condition, but the great majority of them have been cleaned up.

I do not like to name the localities, but surely every observant citizen must have noticed them places which used to reek but are passed who could avoid them, but are now as wholesome as any street in the City—Cess-pools by the dozen removed, which menaced the health of the neighbor-

This has been accomplished by placing in all localities, catch it was all that could be expected and basins connected with the sewer, into which people could pour their slops and empty their kitchen refuse.

The Board cannot claim to have the evil which existed, as a catch beautiful and perfect in their ar basin has been erected by the late rangement around the pulpit Council in College Square, but the improvement effected by it was noticed, and a cheap and convenient catch basin was divised and carefully tested. When its utility was established beyond doubt, about 130 similar catch basins were placed wherever wanted, and the results have been

remarkable. I make bold to say that the greatest stride ever made toward the cleanliness of the City was then taken. Some women at first objected to the extra trouble caused them, but I do not believe any of them would like to return to the old condition of filth, and I take pleasure in saving that after the plan was understood the great majority of the residents cordially co-operated with the Board in bringing about such satisfactory

In any case this seems to be the only remedy, until every house in the City is connected with the sowers, and as there are hundreds of houses in which it would be impossible to instal water and sewerage the ultimate cleaning up of hte City depends upon the Hous-

The reports of the Board have several times told how the number of night soil carts has been reduced from 17 to 5. The time of the Sanitary staff thus savel is now devoted to the regular sweeping and cleaning of the town and think the results are evident.

June 10th. From J. Butt (Blanc Sablon to Forteau)-No traps, boats or skiffs are out yet. There is just sign of cod and plenty of caplin and lobsters. There is no ice about and prospects are good.

June 10th. From W. R. Andrews (Great Jervis Head to Pass Island)-Twelve traps and 200 dories and skiffs are fishing. Prospects are improving and there is plenty caplin at Hermitage, Pass Island and Connaigre Bay. The traps are getting from 5 to 20 qtls. a haul and one had over 80 qtls. ashore at Pass Island. The total catch is 1500 qtls. with 400 for last

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
