#### The Passing of the Trails

panning. Like the fading remonuments in some ofd a former generation are being steadfly obliterated by the silent hand of nature or the newer works of man. Where the Indians' war-cry or the voyageur's chanson once woke the forest echoes, the whistle of the locomotive now startles the frightened wild fowl, and where once the heavy ox-cart of the pioneer marred the prairies' grassy surface, rich fields of wheat are yielding forty bushels to

the most noted is the Dawson Trail, which takes its name from S. J. Dawson, after much delay and many discussions, finally received a grant from the Canadian Government to construct a road from Thunder Bay to Fort Garry. This route had long been the connecting link between the East and West. This was the way that the adventurous Verendrye had taken when he set out to explore those western solitudes hitherto undisturbed by the white man's footsteps. Along this trail the reckless courier-du-bois played dice with death, as his frail bark leaped madly through the plunging rapids. This was the highway, too, that bore those waturbie-fars which each year found their way it the scokaded block-houses at Fort William. By this route, once more came the supplies from Eastern Canada to the growing settlement on the Red river and to points on the distant Saskatchewan.

Then came Dawson, the Government surveyor who, in his report of the country west of Lake Superior, urged the necessity of building a Canadian road to compete with the great American highways. He was given a grant of money and set to work He constructed a road of about 450 miles. A special transport service was organized, and the trip which is now made by train, in fitteen hours, was then a tollsome journey of about three months.

But Dawson's dream of a great frade-route from the prairie wheat belt to Lake Superior by way of the Rainy River has at length been realized. To-day the Canadian National Railway, following the general trend of the country through which the old trail ran, carries its millions of bushels annually to that monster elevator, the largest in the world, which overlooks "the shining Big Sea Water." Once more the old trail has come into its own as a gateway between the East and West.

From Fort Garry numerous trails had been broken northward and westward by the agents of that great Company of Gentleman Adventurers whose scattered fur-posts extended from Hudson Bay to the far Pacific. At a later date stout Nor' Westers "and fought the elder Com

As settlement progressed and road allowances were surveyed, many of these trails were abandoned, but a number of them constituted such desirable highways that provision was made in the Northwest Territories Act for having them surveyed and made permanent rights-of-way. Yes, the old trails are passing, but faithfully have they served their purpose as highways in the wilderness for the men and women who believed in Canada's high destiny.—W. Canadian oats lead the world for quality and are in great demand for seed in every civilized country, but oats generally receive little attention and are raised in a haphazard sort of way. Very few farmers put in seed plots, although there is no other crop

plots, although there is no other crop which responds so readily to intelligent selection and treatment.

Careful experiments have proven conclusively that the formaldehyde treatment of the seed for smut frequently increases the yield more than would be naturally expected from simply replacing smutted heads with sound ones.

This is probably due to the fact that the grain is attacked by other seed-borne parasites which are as effectually checked as smut, adding to the general health of the grain.





"None but a madman," writes F. L. Glaser, speaking of Peter the Great of Russia, "could have carried his former mistress in his own arms to the scaffold, as Peter did, kissing her fainting form as her head was laid on the block. Still the same man who blithely sent favorites to torture chamber and scaffold could bear with patience the blows of an exasperated cook whom he had infuriated by some practical Joke."

This paragraph is the parable of Peter the Great. It explains him. It discloses the paradox of that miserly swashbuckler, the man who was kind and cruel, yet never forgot his dream of a great Russia.

A man about to perish on the scaffold extends his hand to the czar, crying that he is innocent, whereupon Peter roars:

"Die, wretch! If thou be innocent the guilt of thy blood be mine."

Not long after Gen. LeFort, a favorite of the czar, died, and in place of the implacable figure of the episode just narrated we have this:

"When-the moment for removing the body came the grief and affection of the czar were manifest to everybody, for the czar shed tears most abundantly, and in the sight of all the vast crowd of people who were assembled on account of the solemn ceremony he gave the last kiss to the corpse."

Peter is more than all these things convey. He is the man who loved to consort with servants and who loved best of all and more constantly the costume of a Dutch sailor. #### Cleaning Dairy Utensils.

Cleaning Dairy Utensils.

A little precaution on the part of the user of tinned dairy utensils will prove well worth while in the resulting improved conditions. After using a utensil or piece-of tinned dairy machinery of any kind it should be thoroughly cleaned and wiped dry. Closed or covered parts should be allowed to remain open when not in use, thus permitting a circulation of air through them and relieving strain on the rubber washers. The result of these few little essentials will be brighter and sweeter utensils, lengthened life of equipment, and a more wholesome dairy product produced.
