





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LAWFUL PRICE OF MIDDL-INGS.

Dealers who attempt to sell niddlings at a higher price han that fixed by the Food Controller for shorts are violat-ing the law and rendering them-elves liable to heavy penalities. They may also lose their licen-es if the practice is continp-ed. Under authority of an Order in Council under the Adulteration Act, the Depart-nent of Inland Revenue had onstrued "shorts" and "mid-lings" as being the same pro-luct. The sale of middlings it a higher price than that pre-cribed for shorts is therefore lifegal.







IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT OF POLICY OF DEPART-MENT IN REGARD TO SEED AND BIGGER IM-PLEMENTS.

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Scotia. The third bulletin is on "Greater Labor Efficiency on the farms of Nova Scotia By Using Bigger Implements" by Prof. J. M. BOYS AND GIRLS CAN ASSIST TO INCREASE FOOD PRO-DUCTION.


DUCTION. Mr. W. J. Black, Commissioner of Agricultural Instruc-tion, points out that boys and girls can help to increase the production of food in Canada this year. He says: "Every arm boy and girl should be encouraged to rear a pig, a chif, a batch of chickens or to grow a plot of polatoes, beans, corn or vegetables. Seventy-one thousand boys and girls of school age last year increased the agricultural output of Optario to the va of \$125,000. Other provinces did equally well. From this it will be seen the boys' and girls' clubs and competi-tions, the principal channel through which this work is a not to be despised. "The movement should be extended still further, and its with it should make clear to the boys and girls, who are our unior clitzens, that they can in this way add their quota to her common cane. 
