Insurance in Canada.

The Superintendent of Insurance has published his usual report upon the insurance business done in Canada last year. There are thirty-four companies now doing business in the Dominion.

During the twenty years ending with 1889 there was paid for insurance premiums in Canada \$80,022,000 and the losses paid by the companies were \$56,610,852. The losses amounted to 70 per cent of the premiums.

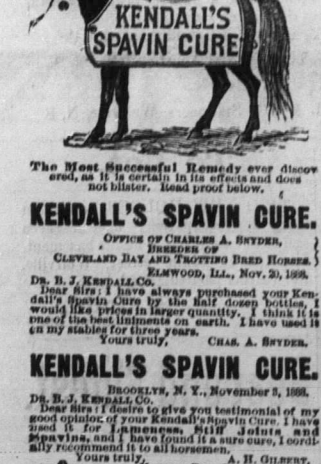

FATE OF FORTUNES.

It Doesn't Take Long to Scatter Them in America.

There Are Not More Than Three Generations Between Shirt-Sleeves and Shirt-Sleeves - A Common Fallacy About Great Possessions.

Much apprehension is felt and often expressed concerning the concentration of enormous wealth in the hands of a few persons. The idea being that a sort of plutocracy will be established which will tend to destroy republican institutions in time and to subvert the liberties of the people.

The danger of a dynasty of plutocrats is rather imaginary than real. Large fortunes become scattered in much less time than might be imagined, or put it as it has been already expressed by an American writer, "there are not more than three generations between shirt-sleeves and shirt-sleeves."

It is reducing the case to the simplest possible terms, for it must be apparent that with a family of sons and daughters the inherited fortune will be dissipated even more speedily. Take a few figures by way of further illustration: Our imaginary representative of the second generation dies worth, let us say, \$2,000,000, but leaves two sons and two daughters. His fortune is then divided into four equal parts, giving \$500,000 to each child.

Of course the absence of the law of primogeniture and the fact that in this country this dissolution of fortune more probable in the United States than it would be where those laws prevail. In Great Britain landed estates descended to the eldest son, and the inheritance became so strictly entailed that successive holders have what in reality is only a life interest in the land and only one child to inherit.

Remedy for Sore Throat. ITEMS OF INTEREST.

Peaches are likely to be dear fruit this year. The crop in the eastern States is reported away below the average. There has been good discoveries at West Chertook, Halifax Co., and some excitement exists in that community.

The annual excursion of the Maritime Press Association will take place during the third week in August, to P. E. Island. Ivy Lodge, I. O. O. F., of Amherst, numbers 130 members, and since its organization in 1878 only two members have died.

The wine product of California this year is expected to reach eighteen or twenty million gallons, the largest for several years. Buenos Ayres despatches say the city has quieted down again and business is reviving, amnesty being granted to all the rebels.

The announcement that an English syndicate has completed negotiations for the purchase of the Halifax breweries is said to be premature. On the fourth of July one ice-cream manufacturer in New York sold 50,000 quarts of cream. It is said that the profit on this was \$7,500.

The acquisition of the New Brunswick railway by the Canadian Pacific will add 415 miles to its length, and bring its mileage up to 5,389 miles. The Dartmouth ferry war is not ended. The town bought out the old ferry company and a new company is being organized in opposition to the town ferry.
