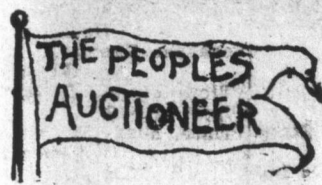

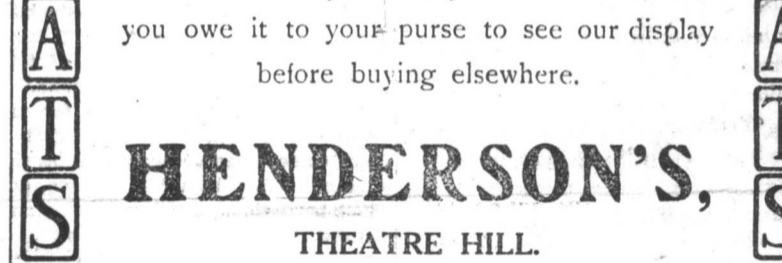

Graphic Stories of Memorable Derby.

The Derby of 1892 will never be forgotten by the sporting fraternity of England. Truly it was the most sensational Derby of the 20th century in many ways. Firstly because the horse that ought to have won was poisoned. Secondly, because there was more money won and lost than any race on record. Lastly, as the race ruined more nobility than any other on record.

Orme, the celebrated son of the famous sire Ben d'Or and brother of the mighty Orme, was considered a sure winner, almost a moral certainty. The public invested tons of money on his chance; the bookmakers accepted all they could get against Orme winning. The Duke of Westminster, perhaps the best sportsman in the world, took every precaution to see that the horse was not tampered with. He engaged detectives to watch the stable day and night.

John Porter, the veteran trainer, fed and watered Orme himself; but the bookmakers were determined that Orme should not win if he had to shoot him going to the post.

Betting at the clubs was brisk. Orme was backed down 5-4 on. But it was noticed by the shrewd ones that every time a large offer was made "the bookmakers" would take it, especially "Steele, the king of the penellers."

Lord Dudley, then a heavy plunger, mortgaged his estate. Mr. Abington invested thousands, also many other reputable plungers at that time. The Prince of Wales and party came down for the race and stayed at Lord Rosbery at the Durdans, in Lordship's Epsom mansion.

Old Sol shone at his best; it was truly a Derby Day in every respect. The Downs were packed with people on before sunrise, the motley crowd of betting, amusing themselves with various "card tricks," Aunt Sally's, "merry-go-rounds," and all other usual Derby Day amusements. There was the usual "tipster" with the absolute certainty up his sleeve "for the bob"; Mr. Pickpocket in evidence, losing a roaring race; last, but not least, the "proverbial welsher," taking the costers' bobs galore.

Up went the starting numbers and Orme's. Orme was placed 3rd, with Jack Watts in the saddle, and party thirteen finely bred horses, with their coats shining in the sun like silk, paraded in front of the grand stand. Orme looked the picture of success, a beautiful bright bay, with black points, a lovely arched neck, which Jack Watts patted to calm his eagerness to get away from the rest. 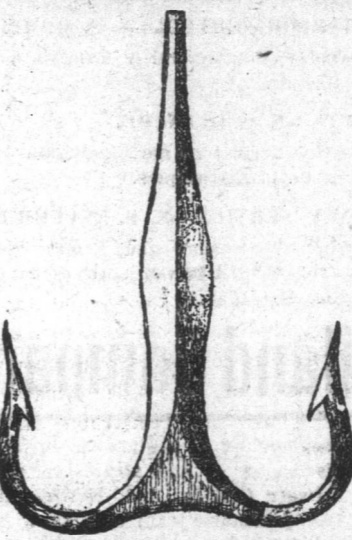

Reciprocity and Newfoundland.

We notice that Mr. Knox, the Secretary of States at Washington has been considering Reciprocity with Newfoundland. According to a cable message from Washington he has decided not to proceed with the negotiations for Reciprocity until Congress has pronounced on the arrangement with Canada. He finds his decision on the belief that the task would be useless, should the arrangement with Canada collapse. Apparently he believes that if Congress should refuse to ratify the arrangement with Canada, it would refuse to ratify any arrangement with Newfoundland. It seems to us that Newfoundland would be much less willing to welcome an arrangement, if the Reciprocity agreement between Canada and the States should be brought into operation. The main value of Reciprocity to Newfoundland is the free entry of our fish into the markets of the States and its dependencies, unembarrassed by the competition of free fish from Canada, which after all has the permanent advantage of geographical situation, and direct railway connection with the States, unbroken by the sea. It seems to us that the States cannot compensate us for free bait, should the Reciprocity arrangement be endorsed at Ottawa and Washington. The message also contains these words: "It is believed that Newfoundland is willing to remove existing export restriction on Pulpwood." The Daily News declares this seems out of the question. We hope so. But on what is the belief founded? It will be remembered that last fall Mr. Pepper, the United States expert, was sent here to discuss the pulpwood situation, that he interviewed Premier Morris, that the latter was in Washington in January and had an opportunity of discussing informally this matter with Secretary Knox. The only ray of illumination comes from some words of the News editorial, which run as follows:—"It is quite possible that during his flying visit to New York, the Premier may have informally discussed the matter of reciprocity with Mr. Knox, but there the matter begins and ends."

Canada Offers the "Glad Hand."

Our readers will observe that an expression of opinion on the Union of Newfoundland and Canada was voiced yesterday in the House of Commons at Ottawa. The opportunity was the

propounding of a question during the discussion of the steamship service between Canada and Newfoundland. The questioner wanted to know if the Dominion Government was taking any steps to bring Newfoundland within the confines of the Dominion. The Premier, Sir Wilfred Laurier, stated that the Dominion Government had made no overtures since 1894. Mr. Fielding, at present Finance Minister, and curiously enough one of the principal opponents of Confederation at the time Nova Scotia was brought within the fold, held out the glad hand to the public men in authority in Newfoundland. He thought it impolitic that the Dominion Government should make formal overtures to the Government of Newfoundland. But he expressed as a fact that Canadian public men, without regard to party, were in favor of the entry of Newfoundland into the Dominion, and he assured the House that the public men of Newfoundland knew that any offer on their part would be cordially considered here. Now, no public men except those in authority could make any practical overtures. How does Mr. Fielding know as a fact that men in authority in Newfoundland know that any offer of theirs will be cordially considered at Ottawa? Why is Mr. Fielding, the hope of the Liberal party in Canada, and Mr. Laurier's successor, making an informal offer to negotiate now with Newfoundland? We pause for a reply.

Men Won't Go to the Labrador.

People from Change Islands say that several planters there have endeavoured to get crews for the Labrador fishery for the coming season but find it next to impossible to do so. Only a few men are inclined to go, and some cannot get men under any conditions. It is hoped that men who are now at work lumbering will return when the "drives" are all over and that most of these will go to the fishery; but friends of these men say that they will prefer to go to Sydney, Bell Island and Grand Falls instead of taking the risk of making very small or possibly no wages at Labrador. Last year's failure of that fishery has caused this. The same conditions apply at Herring Neck, Moreton's Harbor, Twillingate and other places.

EL PASO, May 10.
The white flag has been hoisted over the barracks where General Navarro and some of his men sought refuge. Juarez was surrendered this afternoon, by General Navarro and the federalists who had made a last stand for two days. The battle resulted in a victory for the revolutionists under General Madero. The victory was not secured without terrible loss of life on the United States side line, as well as on the field of battle. Juarez has been transformed from its usually tranquil appearance, into a mass of ruins. As soon as the white flag was hoisted over the barracks and the surrender was completed, Mexican flags were unfurled on the house tops, and the church bells rung out in celebration.

WASHINGTON, May 10.
The annexation of Canada, instead of Reciprocity, was advocated to-day by Ladd, of Massachusetts, State Grange. At the Senate Finance Committee hearing on the Canadian Reciprocity Bill, Ladd argued against any trade agreement, declaring that it should be by annexation, so that Canada might share the burdens of the States as well as enjoy its benefits. A number of representatives were heard in opposition to the agreement. Hall, Master of the Michigan State Grange, presented written protests against the Bill, in which thousands of democratic and republican farmers pledged themselves never to vote for any one who worked or voted for the agreement.

WASHINGTON, May 10.
Secretary of State Philander Knox, whilst ready to negotiate with Newfoundland for a Reciprocity Treaty, has decided to await action of Congress on the Canadian Bill, before proceeding with what would be a useless task in the event of the Canadian arrangement proving a failure. It is believed that Newfoundland is willing to remove existing export restriction on Pulpwood and Pulp.

EDINBURGH, May 10.
The Empire theatre was yesterday burned to the ground. Eight dead bodies have been recovered, including Lafayette, the well-known vaudeville actor and conjurer.

LONDON, May 10.
The health of the Marquis of Lansdowne, Unionist Leader in the House of Lords, is so poor that he is forced to take a long rest.

LONDON, May 10.
King George was given an ovation at Newmarket races. His horse was made the favourite, but was hopelessly beaten.

TORONTO, May 10.
Most Rev. Pergus P. McEvoy, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Toronto since 1898, is dead aged 59.

OTTAWA, May 10.
Quebec Liberals held a caucus to-day. It is understood that Minister Brodeur informed them that they would do well to be in readiness for a general election at an early date.

EL PASO, May 10.
The Federal Army has evacuated Agu Prita.

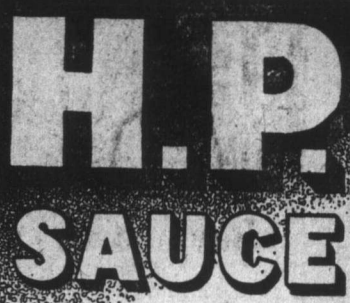

**Confederation
Talk at Ottawa.**

Special Evening Telegram.
OTTAWA, To-Day.
During a discussion on the subject of the steamship service with Newfoundland in the Dominion House of Commons yesterday, and in reply to the question if the Government was taking steps to bring the Island Colony into Confederation, the Premier replied that no steps had been taken since Newfoundland rejected the offer in 1894. Finance Minister Fielding added that any overtures on Canada's part would be misunderstood in Newfoundland. Canadian public men, without regard to party were in favor of the entry of Newfoundland into the Dominion, and the public men of Newfoundland knew that an offer on their part would be cordially considered here.

Gorst Disappointed.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.
Sir Eldon Gorst, the British Agent and Consul-General in Egypt, in his report on Egyptian affairs, frankly acknowledges that the efforts made to develop self-government have been disappointing. The Legislative Council and the General Assembly have become mere instruments of the Nationalist agitation against the British occupation. They seek to render the business of Government impossible. The conclusion to be drawn, says Sir Eldon, is that the policy of ruling this country by co-operating with native ministers, at the present time, is incompatible with that of encouraging so-called representative institutions.

To Aid Refugees.

MEXICO CITY, To-Day.
British subjects declare that in the event of disturbances here the British warships now in West Indian waters will be rushed to Vera Cruz, Tampico, and other gulf ports, and prepared to care for refugees and for any contingency which might arise. The above despatch was filed in Mexico City prior to the receipt there of the news that General Navarro had vacated Navarra, and that the town had been taken by rebels.

**Industrial Training
in Canada.**

Statement by Dr. J. W. Robertson.
Dr. James W. Robertson, C.M.G., Chairman of the Canadian Royal Commission on Industrial Training and Technical Education, has just arrived in England. He is accompanied by the other members of the Commission—the Hon. John N. Armstrong, K.C., member of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia; the Rev. George Bryce, of Manitoba College; Mr. George De Serres, civil engineer; Mr. Gilbert M. Murray, secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association; Mr. David Forsyth, member of the Berlin (Canada) Collegiate Institute; Mr. James Simpson, a representative of organized labour; and Mr. T. Benough, secretary and reporter.
Dr. Robertson, who is also Chairman of the Lands Committee of the Canadian Commission of Conservation, has made the following communication to The Times:—

The Commission of which I am chairman began a systematic survey of Canada at Halifax, and we covered the whole Dominion, visiting 100 places, including every industrial centre of importance. We examined 1,470 of the leading men and women in Canada in the fields of education, industrial enterprise and labour. The result of our inquiries is a great volume of authentic information concerning the needs of our people based on close observation and derived from experience of the actual conditions obtaining in the various localities.

The head men—the manufacturers—who had achieved the foremost positions, were unanimous in speaking of the great value to them of practical experience of workshop conditions during their training. In regard to technical education in general, there was an expression of disappointment or discontent with the results of the schools from the point of view both of the employer and the worker. These two sets of people were of opinion that the curriculum, consisting mainly of book studies, had not developed the habit of close observation or brought out any power of management; they complain of this as making the young people, when they came to the factories, lacking in initiative and wanting in the qualities which make a good effective workman.

The rapid development of the country and the many openings for ambitious boys and young men have led them into all sorts of employment, yielding high wages for the time, but leading nowhere after the end of a few years, so that the boy at 18 finds himself too big for the job for which he was engaged and without any kind of trade to enable him to increase his earning power or to help his locality by becoming a good productive member of society. Many of our employers said very frankly that the rush of business in a new country was so great that they could not be bothered to train apprentices.

There was a general expression of opinion that our people are desirous of having more constructive hand-work taught in the schools, primarily to enable a boy to reveal to his teacher and his parents the bent of his ability so that he may have some development of his power and inclination for productive occupation. Many said that the boys would continue longer at school if the kind of work they did there appealed to their own judgment as being likely to increase their earning power, and particularly if it was a kind of work that a boy found he excelled in. Many a boy finds himself unable to keep pace with the brightest boys in the book and theoretical studies, was discouraged and did not want to continue longer at school. Such boys some-

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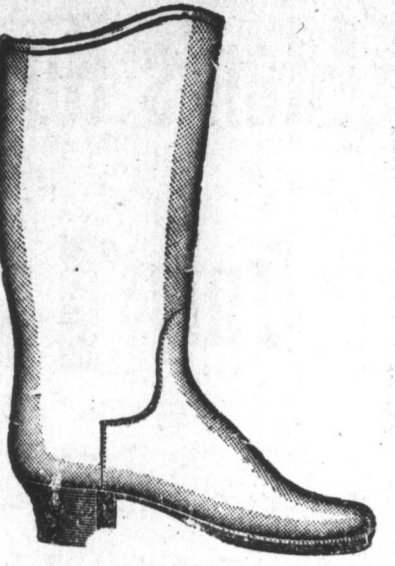
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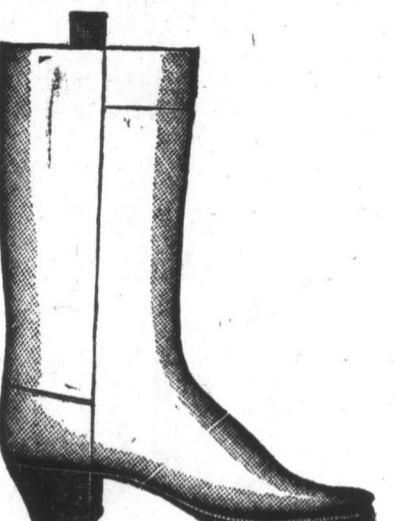



SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shotes are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes, only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work. W. & G. RENDELL.
