An Open Letter to the Hon. Donald Morison.

Dear Sir,-I recently returned to this city after being absent from the Colony for about five months, and on looking over the daily papers, I saw that you wrote a letter to Sir E. P. Morris on April 20th past, in which you made certain reflections on me. In that letter I find the following statements:-

"His Excellency is correct in assuming that neither the Company nor the Government knew, when the applications were made and dealt with, that a very large proportion of the land applied for was absolutely worthless.
