Unenviable Notoriety.

Since the Morris-Morison combination obtained power three and a half years ago, it has obtained notoriety in many directions. We have already commented on its failure to induce the British public to subscribe for the whole or even a substantial proportion of the last loan issued in spite of the liberal inducements offered. As to the liberality of the offer, the Investors' Review of July 13th last had the following:

"Nominally the price asked was 93, but the actual cost to the buyer is substantially less, as a full six months interest will be paid on January 1st, although the final installment of 53 per cent. is not due until November 15th."

As to the failure to induce the public to take the whole or a substantial portion of it, the Outlook of July 20th calls the issue a complete failure. At home, the notoriety the Morris-Morison combination has earned is unenviable. The Morison episodes stink in the nostrils of the electorate. Morris's pandering to Morison's lapses has disgusted everybody, and the weakness displayed by the Governor has earned contempt for Sir Ralph Champneys Williams. The plucking propensities of the party are the scorn of young and old. The givings out are scandals, and the extravagances and the piling up of debt have outraged public opinion as much as the lack of financial grasp of the Branch Railway projects has staggered the community.

The pledges to reduce taxation and make it easier to live is callously ignored, and the carnival of wild expenditure continues, the combination careers along under the delusions that givings out in the electoral districts will be a safe panacea to cure all wrong doings and to capture the electorate.

But the day of reckoning is drawing closer every month, when the electorate will bring those to book who promised to put food on the prime necessities of life, on the free list, and have completely ignored their sacred pledge. People will want to know why the promise to cheapen coal has not been carried out. Has Sir Edward forgotten? Does he not remember that nearly four years ago he stated in his Manifesto:

"The serious situation created by the present price of coal is so far-reaching, touching as it does every freeman in the colony, as well as every industry, that it has become a national grievance."

"A means must be found for effecting a reduction in the price of coal, and, if elected, we shall take steps to bring about such a result."

Is the situation less serious to-day. Does it form less of a national grievance? Why then has he not kept his promise?

In all these directions the Morris-Morison combination has earned for itself a notoriety which is not only unenviable, but will bring about its death-blow at the next General Election.

An Open Letter to the Hon. Donald Morison.

Dear Sir,—I recently returned to this city after being absent from the Colony for about five months, and on looking over the daily papers, I saw that you wrote a letter to Sir E. P. Morris on April 20th past, in which you made certain reflections on me. In that letter I find the following statements:—

"His Excellency is correct in assuming that neither the Company nor the Government knew, when the applications were made and dealt with, that a very large proportion of the land applied for was absolutely worthless. The Company relied upon representations made by Mr. Strong, which have turned out to be wholly false."

"When the Company made their applications they relied upon Mr. Strong's representations, and expected, out of the large area applied for, to be able to select one or more eligible sites for pulp mills. Since they have completed the survey of a large portion of the area and will have to reject at least four fifths of the total quantity applied for because of being barren and worthless."

Now, Mr. Morison, I will ask you to answer a few questions, which I expect you to answer in a short time, and please don't forget:—

(1) Who made a written report on the Labrador timber lands applied for by the Anglo-American Development Company, and made it before the Company was incorporated?

(2) Who made subsequent written reports on the prospective yield in pulpwood and timber of all the areas now owned by the Anglo-American Development Company?

(3) Who signed these reports?

(4) What Government official was invited to certify the correctness of these reports?

(5) What Government official did certify the correctness of these reports?

(6) Were those reports certified in the presence of a Notary Public?

(7) Did that Notary attach his seals to the certificates?

(8) Who was that Notary?

North Sydney Mariner Again After Treasure.

Captain Hackett Starts on Another Expedition in Search of the Famous Cocos Islands Millions.

Lured on by the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, one more expedition has set forth from Victoria for Cocos Island bearing the "only original" map of the burial place of millions of money, jewels and other treasures.

Ten Year Old Boy Had Deadly Aim.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 15.—Fighting for his father, Henry De Waters, ten-year-old Rudolph De Waters, killed two people and injured a third in La Fayette Annex Park, a noted fashionable residential suburb last night. The dead are Nichola Bamillere and Marie Bamillere, his wife. Mike and Charles Bamillere, brothers of Nichola, are in hospital.

De Waters and Bamillere renewed a quarrel last night and Henry De Waters was shot in the arm. The Bamilleres it is claimed, charged on De Waters at the latter's home.

The boy who had hid behind the front door of his home opened fire on the Bamilleres when they reached his front porch. He fired three shots and all three found their mark.

Nichola and Marina Bamillere fell dead with bullets in their head. Chas. and Mike Bamillere were shot in the hip. One of the two wounded men was struck by a shot from the elder De Waters' gun according to the police.

Russian Prince and Wife Wounded.

Warsaw, Poland, Aug. 20.—General Prince Nicholas Tumanoff, the commander of a brigade, in the garrison here, was wounded in the chest to-day, while one of the logs of his wife, Princess Tumanoff, was shattered by Private Powanski, of the Russian Army, who entered the general's flat and fired a number of shots from his carbine. Several orderly officers who were in the room at the time, were also wounded, but they drew their revolvers and killed Powanski as he was about to leave. The motive for the crime was vengeance for punishment that had been inflicted on Powanski by his superior officer.

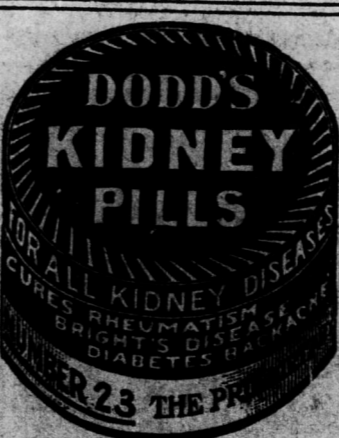

SPECIAL EVENING TELEGRAM.
EASTBOURNE, England, To-day. One of the greatest mysteries in the annals of British crimes seems likely to be placed on record in connection with four murders and a suicide, committed by Hicks Murray here on August 18th. Ever since that date the detective department and a host of reporters have been investigating every possible clue to the murder and the identity of the suicide, but no progress has been made towards solving the problem. He was supposed to be an officer in a Scotch regiment, but this has proved erroneous. LONDON, Aug. 23.
General Booth's body to-day lies in state at his late residence at Hadley Wood. At Congress Hall, Clapton, plans for the lying in state will be the same as those when the body of Mrs. Catherine Booth, the "Army's Mother," lay in state. The coffin will lie on the same spot, over which a huge canopy hangs. At the side of the coffin will be the portrait of his wife. Flags of all nations will adorn the walls, representative of the vast extent of the Army's operations. Throughout the day a stream of callers passed in to the late General's modest residence. Nothing about the exterior of the two-story villa indicated the presence of death. The blinds were drawn down only in the windows of the small bedroom, containing a single brass bedstead on which the General's body lay, clad in full dress uniform of black with red jersey. Above the bed drooped the Army's flag. At the head hung the flag which General Booth had carried on his visit to Calvary when he toured Palestine in 1905. Messages of condolence have been received from the Queen Mother, Alexandra, King Christian of Denmark, Louis Botha, Lord Islington, Lord Rosebery and many others of world prominence.

LONDON, Aug. 23.
In a message to Scotlandists throughout the world, published to-day, General Bramwell Booth indicates the direction of the Army's coming activities. He speaks confidently of its future. He says, the Army's reorganization and achievements are the outcome of God's Spirit, which cannot die. It still vivifies us. Though the Spirit does not change, the forms and methods with which it is clothed must change. New methods must be employed, and new channels of activity opened to keep pace with human advancement. Asked whether the Army would still be governed on military lines, the General replied that it would, because military discipline gives a tremendous cohesion of simplicity and power to the organization of a similar kind to that displayed by the Roman Catholic Church. Speaking generally, he confessed that he would rejoice in the decline of the Army, if the Spirit left it. "I should in brief, be for not keeping dead things above ground."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.
John D. Archibald to-day told the Senate Committee investigating the Campaign Funds, that the Standard Oil Company's \$125,000, contributed to the Republican war chest in 1904, was made up of assurances from Cornelius N. Bliss that the contribution was acceptable to Roosevelt, and that further contributions would be acceptable. Members of the Committee conferred over the advisability of inviting Roosevelt to testify.

follows a gang of men who enlarge this core. Behind those come another gang enlarging and so on until the hole in the mountain reaches its ultimate height and width—thirty feet by thirty-five, respectively.

In the first two hundred feet very little rock was met with and hand drills were sufficient. Now, however, the solid rock has been reached and drills driven by compressed air are employed. These are much more powerful than the hand drill and consequently the work goes on much faster.

The air compressing plant is in a building of eighty by fifty feet. Four giant compressors they are, electrically driven. Three of these have a capacity of 1,100 cubic feet per minute at a pressure of 100 lbs. per square inch, and the fourth, 2,300 cubic feet per minute at same pressure.

All the power supplied will be electric and for this 10,000 volts are required. This, of course, can be transformed to meet the need.

The rock and debris will be hauled to the mouth of the tunnel by gasoline locomotives and then dumped into a train drawn by electric traction. This stone will be crushed for use in building the ten miles of roads through the model city. Force and suction pumps are employed to rid the tunnel of water. These also are operated by compressed air. Just inside the portal at the Model City a mineral spring has been discovered.

The tunnel will pass directly under the City Reservoir, McGill University and follow on down McGill College Avenue coming out at Lagacheville Street. It will be one hundred and thirty-five feet below the Reservoir and twenty-five below McGill. The Company has assumed responsibility for any damage caused by the settling of the buildings.

The Model City just now has the appearance of a great lumber and work yard. All over its twenty square miles of area is scattered machinery plants and shops, lumber piles, stone crushers, spur tracks, ditches, cuts and embankments, engines of all kinds, two great electric cranes, a steam shovel and some seven hundred workmen. It is said that in time this number will reach two thousand.

Throughout the Model City there will be no level crossings—all will be depressed.

After passing through the three miles of tunnel the C. N. R. express of the future will proceed by some sixteen hundred yards of a viaduct to the water front, freight sheds and yards. The rails of this viaduct will be set in cement so as to eliminate as much noise as possible.

Once the train enters the Island of Montreal the steam locomotive will be replaced by electric ones. In fact an electric train will be operated between here and Ottawa. Stations will be built in the business part of the city, at each end of the tunnel and at the north side of the island. This tunnel will prove of great advantage to business men as it will enable them to reach their business in ten minutes where it takes thirty to do so to-day. The Model City will be the ideal residence of the future. Its splendid layouts of parks, play grounds, etc., make

it indeed a Model City. The whole is expected to be complete in two years time.

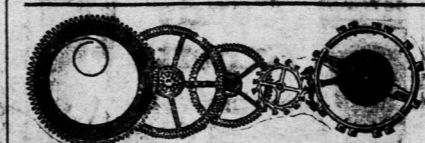

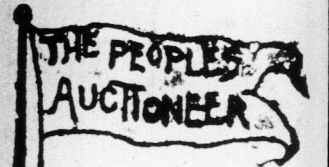
