Let Them Prepare.

On Saturday we gave notice to the Government and to the heads of departments that the Opposition will expect them to mend their ways in regard to the supplying of information and the answering of questions put by the Opposition. The last two sessions were notorious for derelictions of duty in this respect. The country has a right to full information, particularly as regards expenditures, and members of the House of Assembly have a duty imposed in them to elicit such information. The Opposition will be sufficiently strong to insist on departmental heads giving full information and doing so promptly. The Government members must put one of their number as Speaker, and this will give them, according to present reckoning, twenty members on the floor of the House, and fifteen members against them. This gives the Government party a small majority of five which may be still further diminished by the results of two bye-elections, which in ordinary course the Government should hold to try to put in the House of Assembly, either the two defeated Ministers or two others in their place. But even if this majority is not decreased, the Opposition will be strong enough to insist on fair play, and will be active enough to make the Government put estimates through the Committee of the House of Assembly without a stiff stubborn and prolonged fight, if the Opposition should decide on resistance, and of a surety, the Government will meet with a strong and stubborn fight, if they attempt to play any of the pranks they did last session and trick the Opposition out of information which is necessary for the intelligent discussion of public matters. We repeat the advice we tendered on Saturday. Government departments should have ready for the opening of the session all information which is called for by statute and all information which is asked for as a matter of course and may be anticipated, in order that the departments may be ready to prepare answers to questions they can not intelligently anticipate. Otherwise, omissions to answer and delays in answering will cause ructions.

LARGE CARGO.—The Red Cross Liner Stephano, which left New York on Saturday for Halifax and this port is bringing an unusually large cargo, chiefly provisions to supply our market for the Christmas season.

Hindu Exclusion Illegal.

Special to Evening Telegram.
VANCOUVER, To-day. Chief Justice Hunter has given a sweeping decision, condemning as illegal, all federal Orders in Council which have hitherto kept Hindus out of British Columbia. The only grounds on which Hindus may now be excluded are those of idioy, disease, crime, mendicancy, merely grounds which apply against British-born citizens entering Eastern Canadian ports. For instance there is nothing now to prevent entire ship loads of Hindus entering British Columbia. Judging from persistence with which they have for three years been pressing the question of entry, these shiploads may not be slow in taking advantage of the chance to come. The decision specifically is in favor of a priest named Singh. Three days ago the Chief Justice gave an oral judgment giving Singh his freedom in Habeas Corpus proceedings. On Saturday Chief Justice Hunter added a written judgment which went further than the brief court pronouncement. If Saturday's decision is good law, it is difficult at this distance to see how new regulations can be made effective by the Government to keep Hindus out without distinctly mentioning them in a manner which might give serious offense to their British citizenship.

New Zealand Left For Portsmouth.

HALIFAX, To-day. Relying on oil fuel and the supply of coal, bunkered at the dock yard to take her across the Atlantic the Dreadnought cruiser, New Zealand, sailed last night for Portsmouth to complete the circle of the globe. It is now twenty days since the collier, Invergie, sailed from Cardiff with Welsh coal for the New Zealand. She has not been reported so far. The stormy conditions of the Atlantic are stated by officers of incoming ships to be such as might easily delay a heavily laden tramp for a week.

INJURED MAN ARRIVES.—Patrick Mansfield, of Conception Harbor, who had his foot crushed between two cars at Bell Island, on Saturday last, came in by the local to-day to enter the hospital.

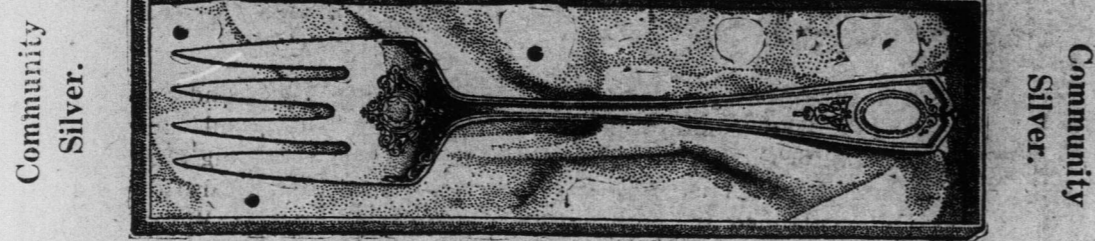

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 29.

Twenty-four hunters were killed in Wisconsin and Northern Michigan and many wounded during the deer season which opened on November 10th.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.

The National Railway of Mexico pay the interest due on Monday on its twenty million dollars, two years six per cent. notes, according to the announcement made at the Company's offices to-day. Owing to financial losses, resulting from the strife in Mexico the ability of the Company to meet its obligations had been in doubt.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 30.

Hoping to placate the rebels Dr. Urrutia, former Minister of the Interior, has been suggested to Huerta. It is said, for the formation of an almost entirely new Cabinet, granting to the Constitutionalists certain concessions. Under the plan General Blanquet would be left at the head of the Department of War, while Urrutia would be reinstated as Minister of the Interior. Urrutia, it is said, believes the plan will not meet with the approval of the States. Prior to Urrutia's elimination from the Cabinet last September, it was common gossip that should Huerta resign he would leave Urrutia the Presidency.

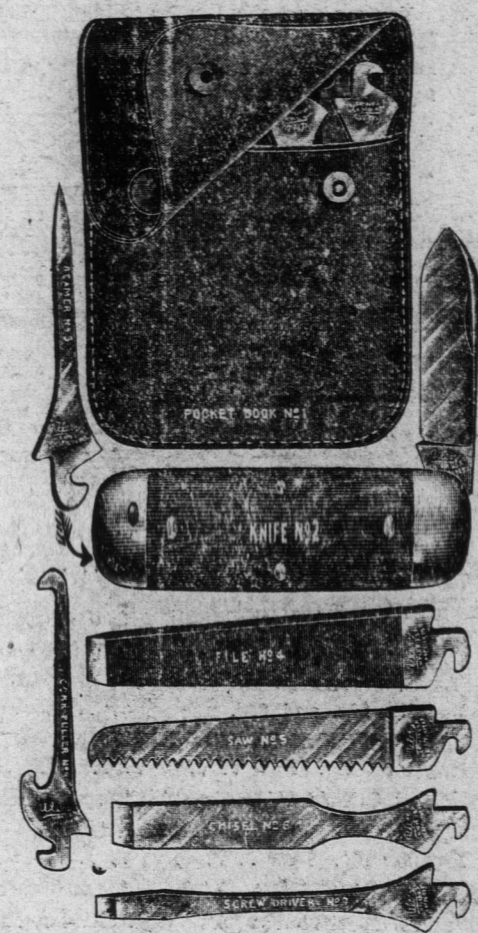

Sunday Services.

Rev. Dr. Ferwick gave a model sermon at George Street Church on Sunday morning from 2nd Cor. 8 chap. 9 v. For ye know, etc. The Rev. Dr. Ferwick himself an argument for many of the best Christian virtues so greatly needed, both in pulpit and pew, in this day of subservient practices, unwholly alliances and unscrupulous expedients, wide from the mark of revealed truth and at the cost of the higher principles governing life and conduct. In opposition to this it is not too much to say that the preacher is a "living epistle, known and read of all men." In his discourse there was a reflex of the preachers own mind—an expression of true Scriptural orthodoxy, firmness and loyalty to the truth that does not change to suit any selfish emergency.

"For ye know the Grace of our Lord, etc." This was the great wonder of the ages. How Jesus could submit to the amazing act of self-abnegation that characterized his life and death when he gave himself as a sacrifice for the world's sin. The great fundamental and universal law of truth is, the death of sacrifice is the process from which the emanation of all life begins. It was the power of God, apart from all other means and methods, as Paul himself testifies, that made him the great exponent of the Gospel in his day. Personal testimony appeared to be the great lack of the age. It had been spoken of as a "lost art." Wet-ey preaching was referred to as having its place in the economy of public ministrations—the truth faithfully spoken until its earnest appeals were responded to by the emotional nature. Paul said, "It was for your sakes Jesus laid aside his riches and became poor—that ye through his poverty, may be rich." If our pulpits rang out such preaching as this more frequently, there could be no doubt as to the genuine and permanent good that would accrue to all our congregations. The doctor's Sunday morning service will not soon be forgotten.

SUNDAY EVENING SERVICE.

Sunday evening's service was exceptionally bright and interesting. A large and interested audience awaited the opening. The large choir with their splendidly cultured voices merit special notice and very high appreciation. There were in the choir last night nine gentlemen and fifteen ladies, and both choir and organists were in excellent form. The service opened with that fine old hymn, by H. Twells, commencing with the words "At even ere the sun was set, etc." and if the writer's opinion is worth anything the choir outstripped all previous records. In our little report of last week we intimated that there would be something above the ordinary for the "Sunday evening following and the selection rendered by organ and choir, before scripture reading last night fully justified our highest expectations. The harmonious rendering of a selection comprising so many diversified sounds and musical expressions seemed to enrapture the whole congregation, and the grandeur and perfection of the organ—the magnificent gift of Hon. Mr. Ayre, who sat and listened to its impressive tones last night, were appreciated as never before. Then followed an able and interesting discourse by the Pastor, Rev. Mr. Bartlett, based on Rev. 21: 23.

The Mexican Situation.

Special Evening Telegram.
MEXICO CITY, To-day.
The possible treatment of the Mexican question by President Wilson's coming message has aroused considerable interest and alarm because of a deep rooted conviction that, neither intervention nor supply arms and ammunition of the financial blockade President Huerta will not regard as a vital blow to his administration, however entangling it may be. Anything short of these measures will be regarded with comparative complacency by Huerta, who is prepared to pursue a dogged course of resistance against his enemies, although he realizes it means indefinite warfare. Special taxes have already been announced which will become effective and will be at least \$17,500,000 annually. Government would be quite feasible. Friends point out that although the Government may be bankrupt, the Provisional President is far from being without funds, and is not likely to be entirely without money so long as private institutions and corporations possess funds. They are of opinion the President will not fail for sake of what he considers right to resort to forced loans, and indeed such methods have already been used in several cases. There are many men rated millionaires and several large corporations whose properties might be available for prospective taxation. Huerta's admirers declare he would be acting in accordance with justice and his duty to the country if he utilized this money for defense. No confirmation is available of yesterday's report that the Government obtained 7,000,000 pesos loan, nor is there evidence of any marked optimism of further foreign loans being obtained. The banks still hope for small loans from time to time. The military situation throughout the country has shown no improvement the past week so far as the Government is concerned. There are slight indications of much progress being made the coming week. Steps have been taken to strengthen the garrison at Tampico, but there is known to be a greater force of rebels in the Northwest. Whether this force will move finally towards the coast or advance toward Monterey is problematical. It is in a position to do either.

At the Cathedral.

His Grace the Archbishop occupied the pulpit at the Cathedral last evening and preached an impressive sermon on the General Judgment.

Before the sermon he referred to the notice recently published in the newspapers concerning the persons who are in our midst, in the guise of Original Priests soliciting contributions for Church purposes. These persons, he said, are obtaining money under false pretences and warned the congregation against aiding these contributions. He read extracts from the encyclical issued by the Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda which is the voice of the Church on matters ecclesiastical.

His Grace went on to say that these so-called priests of the Oriental Church are impostors, and not even Christians in many cases. They usually bring false papers and documents, written in unintelligible languages and on this account he strictly enjoined the congregation not to subscribe to any of these collections unless they have the sanction of the Archbishop or Vicar-General. He referred to the necessity of strict obedience on the part of the laity in all ecclesiastical matters. During the course of his remarks he paid a tribute to the people for their generosity in all charitable collections, which was evidenced yesterday by the magnificent sum received for the Christian Brothers.

Cable News.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 30.
The town of Mazatlan, the most important port on the west coast, has been captured by the rebels. It is believed that the foreigners resident there are unharmed, as several attacks recently made there have resulted in the general exodus on the part of foreigners and of many Mexicans. Practically every boat leaving has carried a full list. The capture of Mazatlan is considered extremely important in view of the fact that this practically isolates the West Coast, giving the rebels the control of the entire state of Linaloa.

GRAND RAPIDS, Nov. 30.
More than a score of spectators and a dozen firemen were burned, bruised and cut by flying debris, when a quantity of dynamite, gunpowder and gasoline exploded, burning a building. Several women and children were missed after the explosion and until the ruins have cooled sufficiently to permit their being searched, it cannot be learned whether there has been any loss of life. The force of the explosion tore the structure to bits and scattered it over an area of four city blocks.

Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting.

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitiate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—

Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jameson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions, could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilating had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Dudley, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.

I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort sit through an hour's lecture, or witness a play through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewes, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov8, 13

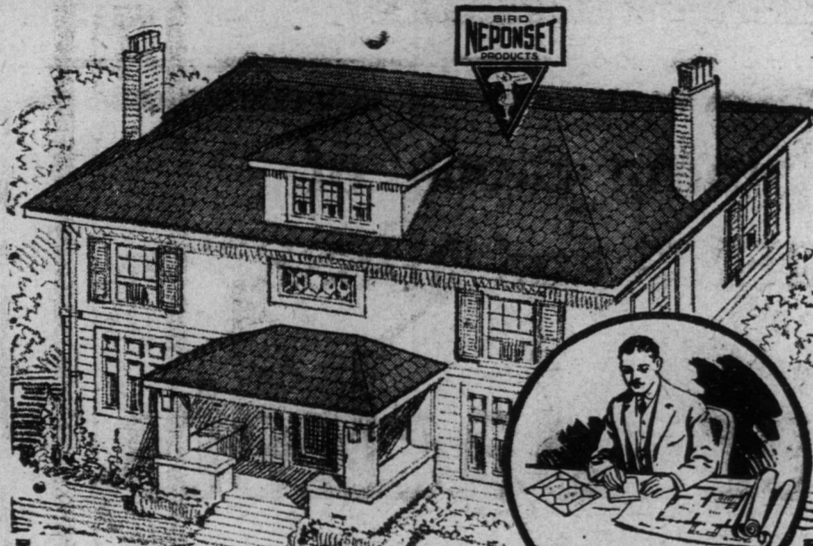

Ponderous Personages.

HANNIBAL.

By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "At Good Old Swasth."

Hannibal was the man who put Carthage on the map, and almost crased Rome. He was a shining example of the fact that one strong, practical man with an ever-ubiquitous, quadruple expansion brain is worth more to a country than a million citizens who serve merely to pad census statistics. Carthage was a hinky town before Hannibal was born, but it had made no particular dent in history, and had for years been booted around by Rome with great enthusiasm. This located the proud spirit of Hannibal, Hannibal's father, and when Hannibal was five years old he took him by the ear and made him swear eternal enmity to Rome. A great many men have sworn oaths before and since, but few have kept them with such painstaking and gory fidelity.

Hannibal immediately began preparing for his job of vengeance, and for years he was a familiar sight as he practised balk line two cushion and masse strokes with his sword, and cravay, boyish legs and arms protruding weirdly from his outgrown armor. At the age of 26 he had a complete knowledge of field tactics, slaughter in its various forms, elephant maneuvering, fort building and plain and fancy foraging. He was then elected commander-in-chief of the army, and seven minutes later declared war against Rome. This caused some amusement in Rome, which at that time was about all the country there was, and ambassadors were dispatched with orders to spank Hannibal and reduce him to the rank of water boy in the elephant brigade. But Hannibal did not wait to be spanked. He hopped nimbly through Spain, eradicating Roman legions wherever he found them, and soon arrived at the back door of Rome, with only the 12,000-foot Alps between him and Italy.

There was considerable amusement in Rome when it was discovered that Hannibal had run up against the Alps. In those days the tourist trade had not been developed, and climbing the Alps was an unknown art. Consequently Rome went blandly on, fixing its attention on the daily standing of the Gladiator league. And one cold week Hannibal took his army over the Alps and fell upon the enemy with a crash that has resounded through centuries.

For hundreds of years afterward, Roman mothers frightened their children into obedience by telling them of Hannibal. He was the greatest pest that had ever gotten loose in the empire. For sixteen years he roamed about devouring armies, eating up crops, riding over peach orchards with his elephants, and making himself such a nuisance that Roman shares fell to nothing, and general after general threw up his job and retired in two or more pieces from public life. Finally Scipio, a Roman who seems to have been equipped with something inside of his helmet, took command of the Roman troops. Instead of botching Hannibal he embarked and set upon Carthage. Hannibal then left Italy in great haste and in due time was defeated in his own country, and the Romans began going out nights again.

Hannibal did all his damage with about 30,000 troops and a few elephants; it seems incredible that he should have mused up Rome for years with this force—until we remember what George Washington did with his barefooted crowd.

Christian Brothers' Collection Yesterday.

The annual collection in aid of the Christian Brothers, was taken up at all the Masses in the Cathedral, St. Patrick's, St. Joseph's, Kilbride, and Mount Cashel, yesterday, the result being a record one, as the following figures show. The amount received was \$4,130.34, an increase of \$106.75 over the collection of 1912, which was \$4,023.59. This is excluding Kilbride and many of the outlying sources from which contributions are annually received, and which returns are not yet in. Considering the appeal to the Catholic people a few weeks ago to provide funds for the Holy Cross extension, the sum realized is a magnificent one, and reflects great credit on the citizens of St. John's. After last Mass the collectors of St. Patrick's proceeded to the Deanery where the amounts were tallied, showing a substantial increase over last year's. Mr. E. M. Jaekman who presided as chairman for the past ten years, and who has changed his residence to the East End, is succeeded in the chair by Mr. T. J. Ryan, who thanked the collectors for their appreciation. Having expressed his regret at the absence of the retiring chairman, Mr. Foran, on behalf of the people of the West End, tendered to the Brothers, through Treasurer Bambrick, the magnificent sum of \$1,131.04, which was \$62.37 above the collection of the previous year. Rev. Bros. Cashman and Aheyn heartily thanked the people for their donations, and paid a special tribute to their truly charitable spirit in all such matters. The remarks of both, which were expressed in beautiful language, conveyed their deepest gratitude and were received with great enthusiasm.

Following the celebration of Last Mass at the Cathedral, the collectors repaired to Mount St. Francis, where the total amount was handed over to the Rev. M. C. Ryan, the Superior of the Brothers, by the Hon. J. D. Ryan, Chairman of the collecting committee, who made a speech, which though brief, was a happy and humorous one. It afforded him great pleasure to say that the collection was a record-breaker and was glad to see that the people, as their generosity amply testified, had realized the increased cost of living, the increased staff of brothers, and the increased amount in proportion necessary for their upkeep. He hoped that as the years went on that the collection for the good Christian Brothers would continue to increase. Mr. Ryan, the Reverend Superior, then spoke, expressing, on behalf of all the Brothers living at Mt. St. Francis, his deepest gratitude to the generous people of all the parishes for their munificent donations. Rev. Mr. Ryan referred to the many calls on the people, notably the recent proposed collection for the addition to Holy Cross Schools, but despite these appeals the people of St. John's were more pronounced this year with their contribution for the Brothers than ever. The speaker also mentioned the fact that the Superior General of the Brothers in Ireland, had intimated, most willingly his intention of helping in the proposed addition to Holy Cross Schools in every way possible. In conclusion Mr. Ryan again thanked the people one and all, of every parish, for their goodness and generosity to them. Mr. Foran, on behalf of St. Patrick's Parish, Mr. Fitzpatrick, on behalf of St. Joseph's Parish, Rev. Bro. Ennis, for Mount Cashel, made speeches; also Sir E. P. Morris, Mr. V. P. Burke, Inspector of Schools and Mr. Devine spoke in relation to the Brothers, who were working so unselfishly and zealously but with effectiveness in the cause of education in the country. The opinion of the various speakers was voiced that whilst the collection was a record one, the people here were getting off cheap in keeping such a good and noble band of workers on our shores, for the annual contribution, above-mentioned, and was practically and clearly illustrated by School Inspector Burke.

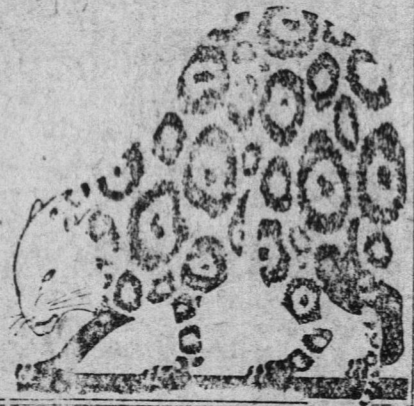

Father Matthew's Diamond Jubilee.

Extract From a Lecture of the Rev. Dr. O'Reilly at the C. M. B.A., St. John, N.B.

Rev. Dr. O'Reilly, before the C.M.B.A. of St. John's N.B., spoke in part as follows: In reviewing the work of Father Matthew as a Temperance Apostle, we never try to apply his principles to the practical needs of the hour as speculation without practice is like faith without works "dead in itself." Temperance work to be successful, must begin with the young. The best advocates of Father Matthew's mission were those who as youths took his pledge. Now this is the 75th year of Diamond Jubilee of Father Matthew's mission. In 25 years more the boys at present of 10 years will hold his hundredth anniversary in their 35th year. The best monument we can place to Father Matthew is to tell his story to a new generation so that they—the youths of the period may be inspired to continue the crusade. It is no exaggeration to say that there are in every province of Canada thousands of Catholic boys who could easily be converted into Total Abstinence brigades. There is certainly need of an extensive educational campaign beginning at the beginning. The story of Father Matthew's crusade appeals equally to young and old. And therefore not? It was the latest of the crusades: it was the voice of the century declaring war against the infernal slavery of alcohol. And that is that story? Father Matthew was born in 1790 in Thomas Town, Co. Tipperary, Ireland—near Cashel, in the Kings of Anglo-Irish family. In 1798 as a boy of 8 years, he was profoundly impressed by the terrors of the period, and especially by the dreadful severity used in suppressing the Irish insurrection. He went to pursue his ecclesiastical studies, and subsequently became a Franciscan priest, stationed in Kilkenny, whence he was transferred to Cork, about 1815. Any who reads the literature of that period will see that temperance was no very popular virtue. Alcohol was in possession. It was a fashionable vice and like all fashionable vices, it was imitated very faithfully by the democracy. In vain the preachers showed forth its dangers. Liquor was a very highly organized force. Its paid or unpaid agents were everywhere.

That Was the World in the Days When Father Matthew

arose to initiate a total abstinence crusade. For many years he made individual efforts by pulpit exhortation to advance the cause of Temperance, but still the tide was too strong until the hour came to organize the forces of temperance against the cohorts of whiskey. The story reads like a romance of individual chivalry and indeed we wonder why the modern artist has not seized this inspiring subject for drama or volume. If indeed this moving picture corporations were zealous to teach temperance they would certainly give their patrons some scenes from that dramatic time when Father Matthew bore the standard of temperance through three Kingdoms and unfurled it even in the U. S. A. It was on the tenth of April, 1838, that Father Matthew at the invitation of William Martin went to the Temperance Hall in Cork and added his name to the 12 already on the register. 69 more names were added on the instant and such was the beginning of the greatest temperance crusade that the world has ever seen, or possibly ever again shall see. Providence only sends its world leaders at rare periods. When O'Connell appealed for Emancipation it was to the political instincts of the people; when Brian of Clontarf, it was to their military instincts; but Father Matthew asked them to mortify their passions and that

is always unpopular. But some person may say: I deny that Father Matthew was a Greater Leader Than O'Connell.

O'Connell depended on Father Matthew. If it were not for Father Matthew's temperance crusade O'Connell would not have been able to assemble such gatherings as those of Tara Hill and Clontarf and then disband them without civil war; not even a violent word used by a million of men on Clontarf. O'Connell could excite the political enthusiasts of the Irish even as Demosthenes influenced the Athenians. But it was Father Matthew's temperance crusade that taught an aroused people to reign in their passions and not dash over the abyss of rebellion. But it will be objected: What has that to do with us? We are living in Canada. Father Matthew lived in Ireland seventy-five years ago. Bring forward some more living interests! The problems are the same, the enemies are the same. Times change but principles abide. Canada at this very moment, New Brunswick, St. John need Father Matthew's work as did Cork, Belfast or Glasgow of 75 years ago. But we have had a Father Matthew Society since 1871. Here is practical federation. Supporting our Catholic societies were to hold a general convention in this town this winter? Well, then, in so doing they should resolve to support Father Matthew's crusade until it achieve 1,000 members. But regarding Catholic women's temperance associations we should say that there is scope for such! The fact that our Catholic women are as a class temperate is clear proof that they were taught this successful if organized against this destructive vice. By all means let us have organized temperance, and women's temperance societies; yes, and youth of both sexes. Begin in the homes, continue to schools and colleges, then to shops and offices. Bring temperance into your politics, but be very careful about bringing politics into your temperance. You must always begin with a new generation, so that the boys of to-day may be the temperance advocates of 1913.

Father Matthew's Centennial Year.

But how was Father Matthew greater than the political leaders of the country? He was the greatest temperance leader the nation ever had. But temperance leadership in Ireland included everything else. O'Connell's great conventions would not have been even possible, were it not for the temperance of the people. If drunkenness prevailed, all would have ended, and drunkenness did not prevail, precisely because Father Matthew's crusade had taken such deep root in the soil of public opinion. O'Connell himself recognized Father Matthew's supremacy in the Cork procession of 1842. Certainly Father Matthew was Ireland's greatest temperance leader, and being its greatest temperance leader, included all other elements, or nearly so. How prove this tribute to Fr. Matthew? The destiny of the race for time and eternity was menaced by the curse of alcoholism. It was the signature of death to humanity. How was it to be abolished? Carlyle said he made a temporary row against whiskey. This was indeed grudging praise. But history is more just because the no-drink crusade has continued. The very fact that as regards juvenile total abstinence, it would appear to be, according to common sense and tradition, that youths of 15 are much better for temperance organization than men of 17 who may have already fallen under the sway of liquor organizations. Temperance in the school. Two great names occur to me. They are those of Rev. Theobald Mathew and Rev. Edmund Rice. Fr. Mathew was certainly Ireland's greatest temperance leader. But he that leads the nation in the pathway of temperance reform. By directing public opinion in a temperance direction, the young who are the hope of the future will be drawn along just as they too will be drawn in an opposite direction by enemies of temperance. No boy is too young

Not to Know Drunkenness, and so too None

too young for a total abstinence pledge. Boys who take a temperance pledge at 10 are more apt to keep it than those who take a pledge at 20. Here in N. B. we have possibly thousands of youths who might be congregated into temperance brigades. See all the boys in our city, these require organization on a Catholic plan. Consider the A. H. Cadets, would not they make a good nucleus for a Total Abstinence Federation? In fact the strength of every total abstinence effort is neither more nor less than its juvenile branch. Boys, take kindly to military temperance organization. Then temperance rallies are good but they fail of their effect unless they be held at frequent intervals. Temperance work needs it should become a part of a boy's education then it grows with the growth and strengthens with the strength of each new generation like nature in the spring-time. We now hope and pray for the second spring of Matthew's temperance apostolate and that second spring must be with the youth of the land. In a cause like this perseverance is

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everything. Notwithstanding the marvellous success of Father Matthew's mission even at its very beginning he was not content until he had dedicated 18 years to this mission of temperance and brought its blessings within the reach of ten million of people in Great Britain, Ireland and U. S. A. If health permitted he would have

Toured Canada,

but Canada in 1856 was not the Canada of to-day. Father Matthew used the weapon of organization to forward his work. Since his death and during his life there were temperance societies everywhere and their work has been deepened and strengthened by conventions and rallies. To-day liquor drinking has lost the note of glory that erstwhile attached to it. Nowadays a man is not described as gloriously drunk; it has become rather a reproach as in effect it is. Drunkenness is no longer glorious but the reverse and this effect is due to Fr. Matthew—all honour to his name. It is truly the reverse of hopeful for a new generation to find it starting life with liquor. The public should sustain the politician. The politicians need public support—a conscientious public will extend such support. Why not? Unless they have motives. But the social side of temperance work was clearly appreciated by Father Matthew. He would have constructive temperance work and consequently heads and literary circles, but all these things cost money. Every temperance club insisted on having a hand but when it came to paying for all these bands the temperance clubs were not at home: ("See I to Calligan y'd better call again." And this debt accumulating shadowed the last years of Father Matthew's career. A hundred American cities to-day treasure the name and tradition of Father Matthew. In Ireland at present there is a national and industrial and educational revival and all these have been made possible by the temperance revival. Ireland sober! Ireland free! Yes, and Canada sober! Canada free. Almost striking instances of the grave in which intemperance can bury even a city is found in Corinth.

But Fr. Matthew may be compared to St. Patrick. The Apostle of Ireland exterminated the serpent of paganism, and Fr. Matthew did likewise for the paganism of alcohol. St. Patrick converted nearly a whole Ireland to Christianity; Fr. Matthew converted the land to Christian temperance. St. Patrick traversed the land for the cause of the Gospel; Fr. Matthew did so for temperance. St. Patrick's work lived for this and so did Fr. Matthew's. He may be compared to all the great men who arose in Ireland's annals. Like the Irish monks of the 5th, 6th and 7th centuries to make Ireland renowned as the land of saints and scholars, Fr. Matthew also shed renown on his land. Like those, especially carrying the gospel to tons, so did he bring the message of temperance to heights and lowlands; like another Brian he wrestled with the enemy, not of flesh and blood, but of alcoholism in its original form; like Sanfield he won a glorious victory at Limerick. He attacked intemperance in its native strongholds of Belfast; and like O'Connell, he prepared Ireland by his temperance for all that splendid progress of the outgoing 75 years when its churches, schools, colleges, indus-

trial institutions are all an ornament to a national resurrection. Modern Ireland in its war against intemperance; modern Ireland in its educational and literary growth; modern Ireland in its crusade against socialism; modern Ireland in its revived self-respect as a nation is Father Matthew's

Best and Most Enduring Monument.

But for Fr. Matthew's mission the political excitement of the last 50 years would not have been without bloodshed, and if the Unionists were to take a pledge against whiskey and keep it, they would show themselves more fit for self-government than they have yet done. But monuments, organization work is therefore the need of the hour. Father Matthew's individual efforts were great, but he depended largely on organization and worked in and through organization, and you must do the same. En-

roll your school children, boys and girls in one grand total abstinence, and see how the work will advance! Aye and your Catholic women's total abstinence societies, too. But this is the paradox about temperance work that whilst in every town we have

perhaps even thousands of persons who easily admit that alcoholism is a curse, still these same people do not seem to advance the cause of temperance. Why? From lack of organization. Fr. Matthew worked through others. He used the oratory of theirs rather than spoke himself. Application the need of temperance rallies. All Catholic societies collectively and individually should stand for temperance; temperance by means of night schools is another excellent idea. All holidays should be observed with sobriety and nothing is more incongruous than to find such Christian festivals as Christmas and the New Year turned into occasions of indulgence, and that at the bidding of a monstrosity perverted public opinion. A hundred thousand Canadian school boys pledged to temperance would prove a monumental preparation for Fr. Matthew's centennial in 1913. So be it.
