





Shortly after midday four old French battle-ships joined in the bombardment, and battleships were withdrawn and relieved by six more British battleships of a similar type. LONDON, To-day. It is officially confirmed that a Russian squadron has approached the Northern port of the Bosphorus, says Reuter's Petrograd correspondent. The appearance of the squadron caused great panic in Constantinople.

RUSSIANS OCCUPY MEMEL.

LONDON, To-day Beyond the operations in the Dardanelles, the most important news concerns the reported occupation by the Russians of Memel, a German port on the Baltic. Memel is a town of importance in Northeast of East Prussia. The presence there of Russian forces is taken by military observers here to indicate that the Rus-East Prussia in an endeavour to comland has been transformed into an immense bog by a thaw which has set in, just as Field Marshal Von Hinderburg has started his offensive against Przasnysz. It is declared it is impossible except at widely separated high places to move, let alone fight. The Germans, however, have started the offensive in Central Poland where they have commenced an attack on the Russians in the region of Pilica River. There is also heavy fighting in Galicia, Carpathians and Bukowina, despite heavy snow. the Western front no operations of great importance have taken place although the French continue their efforts to work their way forward in Champagne and Argonne regions, and the Belgians still are active in the little bit of their territory remaining in their hands. 

SUEZ CANAL FIGHT. Fact Revealed when British Captured Large Quantity of Ammunition.

First, a large quantity of ammunition fell into the hands of the British, nearly the whole of it being for rifles and revolvers. The cartridges are all dum-dums. The revolver cartridges have a flat leaden nose and four sliks in the body of the bullet. On the base of both kinds of cartridges are the letters "D.W.M." indicating that they were manufactured by the Deutsche Waifen and Munition Faoriken, a large German concern which manufactures Mauser rifles and the ammunition packets that contain them are, in the case of the rifle ammunition, marked "Fertig Metall Patronen," or ready metallic cartridges, together with the name Calcutta, and the description. "Ausfeh-

> THE WORD "TON" IN SPEAKING OF SHIPS.

what is meant when one speaks of a ship of 50,000 tons, especially when we read that the ship has a displacement of 57,000 tons, gross tonnage of 52, 117 tons, deadweight capacity of 12,-

To begin with, the word ton has not the same meaning as in the case of a ton of coal. It is not a ton weight. out a measure of capacity represening 100 cubic feet of space in a ship. Several kinds of tonnage are spoken of by shipping men, and the method of asccertaining them is sometime very complicated indeed, so compl cated that it has been said that no two men could calculate the tonnage of a ship and reach exactly the same

The two chief tonnages are displacement and gross tonnage. Displacement tonnage, which is usually spoken of in conection with warships, means an actual weight of water displaced by a vessel when, say, she is leaving port fully laden. This, in the case of a battleship, includes not ony the weight of the ship's fabric, but that of all the coal, guns, ammunition, officers, men, stores, that she is carrying. The estimate is made by calculating the exact number of cubic feet occupied by the vessel-including the rudder, propellers and propelle shafting-below the water-line and dividing this by 35 cubic feet of sea

water weighs one ton. Gross tonnage is the cubic contents of the vessel's interior, ascertained by measuring all spaces below the second deck and all permanently enclosed spaces on that deck and all decks above, and dividing the result by 100.

If the time specified, a penalty of \$5.00 per day shall be paid for


