

Cochin with wildest cheering when he showed himself on the balcony. The correspondent states that the crowd after-wards marched to the French Lega-very closely followed. #### BALKAN SITUATION CRITICAL.

PARIS, Nov. 17. Our expedition to the Balkans is eaching a critical stage, telegraphs the correspondent at Salonika to the Journal, under date of Sunday. Our enemies have decided to nip in the bud, at any cost, our offensive in the east, and are prepared to adopt any means to obtain the necessary assistance. 

When whack comes someone's boots Appendicitis.

Appendicitis is something that usually happens just before some doctor buys a new, automobile. Fifty years ago nobody heard of appendicitis. Also no one heard of the automobile. Now a man cannot be said to be up-to-date unless he has had apendicitis, while the doctor and the automobile are boon companions. 
