> Good Sign of Fish Along the Coast-Earliest Spring for Twenty Years.

The s.s. Sagona, Capt. Parsons, ar-

rived in port at 9.15 this morning

from the Labrador after an absence of 14 days. The ship left here at 6 p.m. on the 13th inst. and called at ntermediate ports in Conception Bay Trinity Bay, Bonavista Bay and Twil ingate, where she took on passenger and freight. On leaving Twillingate she proceeded direct for Battle Harbor and visited all the important fishing stations as far north as Emily Hr., where she dropped anchor June 20th. The captain reports dense fog close on the shore all along the coast, which prevented the Sagona from making much progress. The fishery is the best that has been seen for many years at this season of the year, as is evidenced by the large catches secured in a few days. Two traps at Francis Hr. accounted for 100 qtls. during the time the ship was going north and returning from Emily Hr., and had not a heavy sea tangled the twine the quantity would ave been doubled. At Griffin's Hr. trap 40 gtls.; Battle Hr., 30, and several other good catches. The settlers say this spring was the earliest for twenty years and that winter did not set in till almost up to the middle of December. There is not speck of snow to be seen on the coast while in other years it has often been from two to five feet deep in places at this date. Unfortunately the fur business was the worst for a long time. The winter being so mild, furpearing animals could obtain food in and instead of approaching the coast and bays where they frequently resort in the winter months to feast on fish and seals. The Sagona passed the s.s. Meigle at 10 p.m. Saturday night at Battle Hr., while the latte was making port.. The trip south was made in good time. The traps are not doing much as the cod holds off in deep water. The catch is 1,758 qtls. with 1.220 for last week. Four whale boats, 46 traps and 75 dories and skiffs are fishing.
