



One of the Oddest Houses on Earth.

One of the oddest domiciles in the world is that erected at Yokohama by a noted Japanese bacteriologist. It may be described as a dustproof, air-proof, and germproof building of glass, which stands on the open, unshaded rounds of the hospital of Yokohama.
The house is forty-four feet long,
wenty-three feet wide and seventeen feet high. Large panes of glass, one naif inch thick and about four inches apart, are set in iron frames so as to form the sides of a cellular build-ing block. Of these blocks the walls
