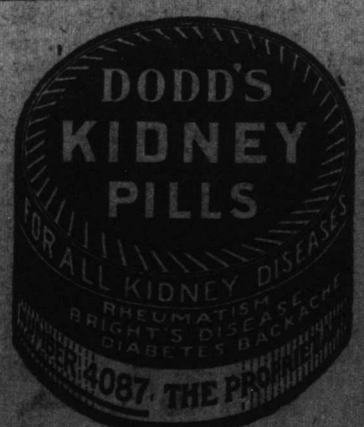


Just Folks

Whispers That Start Avalanches.

Avalanches are sometimes started by the most trivial causes. Even a whisper has been known to set them off, and many a life has been lost by a climber shouting to his comrades while crossing a snow slope. The tinkle of sleigh bells was said to be responsible for a terrible fall which swept away a caravan of sleighs crossing a dangerous Alpine pass some years ago. Now the use of bells on this route is strictly forbidden. Visitors to Switzerland often ask what purpose is served by the little wall-like objects dotted about the great scars which mark many of the steep mountain slopes in summer.



These are avalanche breakers, without which traffic on many of the Alpine lines and passes would be impossible. Experience has shown that it is futile trying to stop an avalanche by placing obstructions, no matter what their thickness may be, across the foot of its track. One the mass has gained momentum it will obliterate with the greatest ease walls, forests, and anything else that gets in its way. In a recent case in the Rhone Valley entire fields over an area of four hundred square yards were displaced by a huge fall of rock, turning the flat plain into an elevated plateau. To prevent these great masses of snow and rock from "getting a move on," thick stone barriers are built across the tracks usually taken by an avalanche, sometimes up to its starting point on the summit of the mountain. This is both arduous and dangerous, as much of the material has to be transported on the backs of labourers along slopes affording only a precarious foothold. Some valleys, however, are too steep for work of this kind, so other measures have to be adopted. This is the case with the famous Lotschberg line, which just before it enters the Rhone Valley at a height of 4000 feet runs through a series of rock tunnels. Over the tops of these the great spring avalanches thunder harmlessly down to the valley below. Visitors to Zermatt in the early

summer often enjoy the experience of passing through the "snouts" of several avalanches which annually drop across the railway line in spring. As the mass has spent its force, however, there is no longer any danger. Avalanches are nothing if not regular in their habits, and when and where they are likely to fall can be told to a nicety by inhabitants of the district. How a case of champagne was lost by an avalanche not appearing to schedule, so to speak, is shown by an incident which happened this winter in the Engadine. Snow of the powdery variety had been falling for two days, and one of a party of Americans was discussing with the hotel manager their chances of crossing the Bernine to Italy on the morrow. "Bet you a case of champagne we get through all right," quoth he. "Done!" said our host, "and if you have to come back I'll put you up free for the rest of the week." The American won, but by the narrowest of margins, the expected avalanche falling not ten minutes after the train had crossed the danger zone. It took several days to clear the line of snow. CABLE RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

The Cable Resolutions were briefly discussed yesterday afternoon and passed through Committee. The House then adjourned until Thursday when the Prime Minister promised to introduce the proposed railway legislation. The most interesting information imparted during question time was the Prime Minister's answer to Mr. Moore's question concerning the amount of money owed by Mr. E. Colishaw to the railway on account of freight. The answer was that Mr. Colishaw owed \$11,991.17 and had entered a counter claim of a little over \$1000 for lumber, labour and freight overcharges. Steps would be taken to obtain payment, but until Mr. Colishaw returns to Newfoundland nothing can be done in connection with the disputed amount.

THE CABLE RESOLUTIONS.

When the House went into Committee on the Cable Resolutions, Sir Michael Cashin made brief comment on them. He had already expressed an opinion on this matter and there was little he could add to his former remarks. The Minister of Posts, in introducing the resolutions, forgot to mention the offers made by other cable companies. After hearing the offer made by the Anglo Company in 1919, how could the Minister justify the present contract? Sir Michael read the offer made by the Anglo Company in 1918-19. A contract with this company would be more beneficial than one with any other company, as the Anglo people had fifty offices and over 600 miles of wire throughout the country. Consequently they did three times the business of other companies. Owing to the delay in coming to terms with the Anglo Company, the original offer was withdrawn and for it was substituted one which the country could not accept. Sir Michael then asked if it were true that the British Admiralty had offered the Mount Pearl wireless installation to the Government.

The Prime Minister said the Admiralty contemplates discarding the station for various reasons. He thought the Government would be enabled to get it very cheaply.

Sir Michael Cashin impressed upon the Government the fact that messages could be transmitted at a much lower cost by wireless than by cable. Some arrangement whereby wireless could be utilized should be made.

Mr. Hallyard said the beauty of the contract with the Commercial Cable Company was that there was no monopoly and the Government were free to make a wireless contract when they so wished.

Sir Michael Cashin said he was glad that something was being done, but he wished it to be made clear that the Government's neglect had lost the Colony \$200,000.

Mr. Hallyard admitted this, but declared the responsibility was on the Government which cancelled the arrangements with the Commercial Cable Company in 1919.

Mr. Higgins laid stress upon the rapid progress of wireless, and the fact that its commercial utility was fast being recognized. He passed some comment upon the enormous loss due to inaction in cable matters. The Resolutions passed Committee.

The Prime Minister promised the Railway legislation for the next sitting.

The House adjourned until Thursday, Mr. Walsh speaking on the matter of supplies on the motion to adjourn.

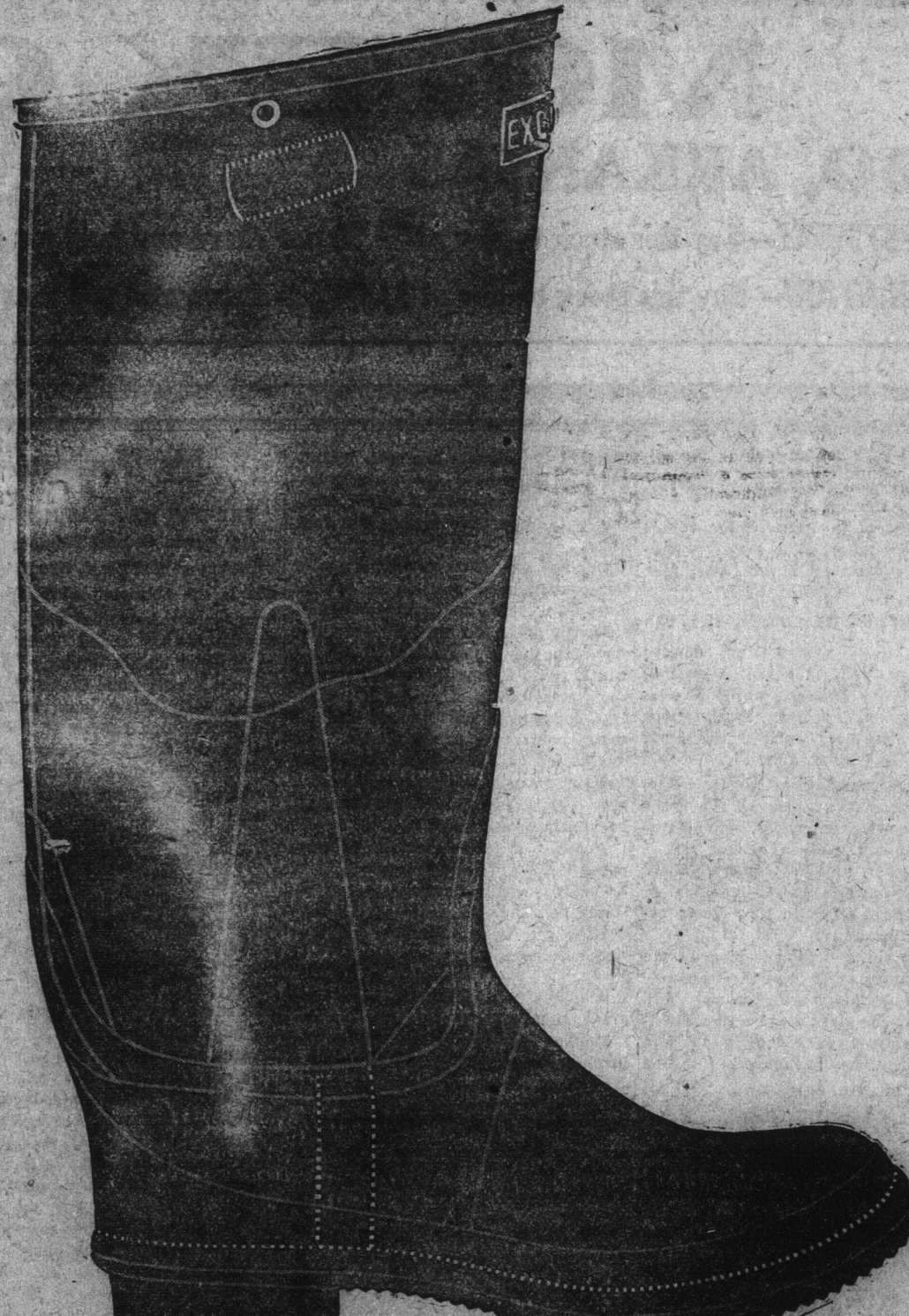

Teachers to Go Overseas

A VISIT TO THE BATTLE GROUNDS OF EUROPE.

America's New Radio Station.

SENDS MESSAGES ALL OVER THE WORLD.

The most colossal wireless station ever built is now in full working order and, night and day, messages are flashing through space to all parts of the world.

The station is situated near Fort Jefferson, Long Island, about seventy miles from New York.

It was declared open in an official ceremony by President Harding, despite the fact that he never visited the station.

This is not a paradox: the President sat at his desk in Washington, and pressed a button which set in motion, an automatic sending device which was electrically coupled to the wireless station.

The President's message was received by wireless stations in twenty-nine countries. The writer received it on a home-made wireless set with an aerial erected in a suburban back garden.

Within a few minutes the various

countries sent out their replies—from Britain, Germany, Norway, Sweden, France, Italy, etc.

The site of the new station covers ten square miles. The aerial is supported by six steel towers, each four hundred and ten feet high.

THE CENTRE OF COMMUNICATION

The latest transmitting devices which are installed permit a sending speed of one hundred words a minute; by an ingenious arrangement twelve messages entirely different may be sent simultaneously.

The transmitting range is world-wide; there is no part of the globe that the wireless waves, which travel through the ether, cannot reach; and another unique feature about the transmitter is that it is controlled from a head office in New York, seventy miles away.

The receiving station is placed some sixteen miles away from the transmitter. No operators are stationed there either, as the signals are automatically transferred on reception to land telegraph wires and received in New York.

The action is simultaneous from the

moment the signals are sent out abroad; picked up by the wireless receiver, to the moment of actual sending by the operators at the New York office.

England has taken full advantage of her geographical position to control European cable lines, and America is evidently going to follow our example; for with the construction of the gigantic radio station, America becomes the virtual centre of the world's wireless communication. Poland has already contracted for a station. An agreement has also been made with Britain, France and Germany, that a new high power station in Chilt shall be jointly owned and operated.

Another wireless "giant" is proposed for Brazil; and others will soon be built in South America. But of all these, the Radio Central—as the new Station on Long Island is called—will be supreme!

Mr. Montagu.

THE MAN WHO HAS HIT BACK.

Mr. Edwin Samuel Montagu, whose exposure of Mr. Lloyd George's methods is the political sensation of the hour, comes from that very orthodox Jewish family which controls the prosperous bullion broking firm of Samuel Montagu and Co. in Old Broadstreet, E.C., whose main business is the buying and selling of silver. His father, the first Lord Swaythling, son of Louis Samuel, a Liverpool watchmaker—the surname Montagu was assumed by royal license—familiar in the city by reason of his patriarchal white beard, left the comfortable fortune of a million and a half to his children on condition that they remained Jews and married persons proposed the same faith. The Hon. Venetia Stanley, the youngest daughter of Lord Sheffield the educationalist and close friend of Mr. Asquith, before marrying Mr. Montagu became a convert to Judaism.

It was probably his friendship with Mr. Asquith that introduced Mr. Montagu to his wife; it was certainly his friendship with Mr. Asquith that gave him his first chance in politics. Educated at the City of London School (as was Mr. Asquith) and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he was president of the Union Society, he entered Parliament in 1906 as Liberal representative for the Chesterton division of Cambridgeshire.

Mr. Asquith struck by his cleverness, made him his private secretary and successively advanced him as Under-Secretary for India, Financial Secretary to the Treasury, Chancellor of the Duchy, and Minister of Munitions.

When Mr. Asquith fell, his clever young friend also lost his job, but Mr. Lloyd George with the tempting bait of the Indian Office drew him from the Asquithian camp into his own fold, and only the influence of Mrs. Montagu some time later made it up between the old man and his errant protegee.

Mr. Montagu, who is only 43 years of age, has not yet shed either the appetites of youth or the supercilious manner which accounts to some extent for his unpopularity among the Tories (in his day, equally hostile to young Disraeli).

Tall, loosely built, and addicted to a moniclie, he has the gift of getting on, but not the gift of "mixing."

B. W. I.-Canada Pact Stimulating Trade.

Canadian products are very popular in the British West Indies and the natives have a very warm feeling for the people of Canada, according to Hon. F. B. McCurdy, who has just returned from Trinidad and Jamaica, where he was staying for some months.

"The West Indies have not been immune from the depression so evident in other countries," said Mr. McCurdy, "but the people are facing the future with confidence."

"A topic frequently discussed everywhere among the people there, is Canada. The trade agreement with the West Indies which recently became effective has done a great deal to increase trade between the two countries. There is still a large market, however, which can be developed by Canadian exporters which will solve the question of supplying goods in the form of quantities required. The West Indies is an old country and the established customs should be cultivated if further trade progress is to be made."—Family Herald.

Vancouver Island Grass Always Green.

GOLFERS PLAY AT CHRISTMAS.

Vancouver Island folk pick roses in the garden when Christmas bells are ringing and the golfer is never off his game so far as being able to play is concerned, because there he can drive, approach the green, and putt almost every day in the year. In the fall and during the winter the grass is rich and green, and bloom is perpetual. This is due to the warming influence of the Japan current, which is the Gulf Stream of the Pacific Ocean. Vancouver Island was named after Captain George Vancouver, of the British navy, who discovered it in 1782, and has an estimated area of 15,000 square miles. Its trees, among them the stately Douglas fir, which towers 300 feet above the roads over which the traveler glides by automobile, or by the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway which runs northward through half the length of the island, are magnificent beyond description, some of them being six or seven feet in diameter. Along the road are many comfortable hotels and country chalets, many of them like the Inns one finds on English country roads.—Vancouver Daily World.

A Crown of Steel.

A royal crown is associated in the popular mind with gold and jewels. There is one crown at least which is of plain steel, the symbol of an indomitable people who have just regained their freedom after it had been apparently quenched by the Hun. On State occasions it is assumed by King Ferdinand of Roumania.

It was made by command of the late King Charles, from the steel of a Turkish gun captured at Plevna, the siege which won Roumania independence in the Russo-Turkish War. On May 10, 1881, after the steel crown had been consecrated by the Metropolitan King Charles took it in his hands with the words:—

"I assume with pride this crown, wrought from a cannon sprinkled with the blood of our heroes, and consecrated by the church. I accept it as a symbol of the independence and power of Roumania."

To-day this crown remains as a fitting symbol of a brave people and a brave king.

The Great Antarctic Ice Cap.

What will be the end of the world has always been a fascinating subject. Will it come in a fiery cataclysm? Or will heat die away and all life expire under an intense cold? Or will there be a deluge?

Some leading geologists have it, that this last, in spite of the rainbow's promise, appears to be more probable than either of the others. Maybe history of the earth will repeat itself then.

When the Antarctic ice cap began to form aeons ago is commenced pulling the waters of the world over the equator into the Southern Hemisphere.

There are prehistoric sea margins which to-day reveal that the ocean once stood at a much higher level than it does to-day. In British Columbia and southward—along the Rocky Mountains, Andes, and highlands, and running summits of the Old World, these tidal records are found; and everywhere at an average of a thousand feet higher than at present.

It has been averred the enormous mass of water now missing is contained in the ice cap of the Antarctic. And the ice cap, increasing in immensity and weight, has slowly but surely displaced the centre of the earth's gravity to the southward until it is two or three miles from the position held before the ice cap began to accumulate.

Some scientists deduce more than that. The development, they state, of the immeasurable glaciers at the South Pole is reaching the point which may immediately precede the eruption of them into parts. Then at any time after this danger has come about the breaking up of those many billions of cubic miles of ice will let loose all the accumulated waters of the Southern Hemisphere. And it comprises four-fifths of the entire waters of this globe. These waters, when thus freed, will set in a flow northward.

THE SWEEP OF THE WATERS.
They will surge across the equator, bearing on their surface the gigantic remains of the Antarctic ice caps. This oceanic cataclysm will gradually sweep into Australia and Africa, and invade the low-lying lands of Asia, and the Americas and Europe. These will be flooded, hundreds of fathoms deep, and the ice fields still afloat remold in their passage the higher contours of the deluged lands. Only the mountain tops can escape.

The disintegration of the glaciers and ice ranges of the ice ranges of the Antarctic spells the end of this world to all its inhabited continents, for the water will engulf them. Man-kind will flee to the mountains tops. And where for ages has been all ice and snow, as at this day, a new hemisphere will come into existence and life will slowly evolve itself once more.

But, may not something similar have happened in the primordial past, and proceeding from the Arctic? The Deluge, apart from the Biblical relation of it, is discredited in many quarters to-day. Yet there is no tradition so universal in general terms. It cannot be accounted for on the hypothesis that nations in the same stage of civilization arrive at nearly the same results for the tradition of a deluge has not been—and is not—confined to civilization. Nor is it to be accounted for by immigrant influences from Asia, invading—say, the Pacific region and the Americas.

What did that good scientist, the late Lord Salisbury, once say? That is half imagination. But science is deadly accurate.

One of the Oddest Houses on Earth.

One of the oddest dwellings in the world is that erected at Yokohama by a noted Japanese bacteriologist. It may be described as a dustproof, airproof, and germproof building of glass, which stands on the open, unshaded grounds of the hospital of Yokohama. The house is forty-four feet long, twenty-three feet wide and seven feet high. Large panes of glass, one-half inch thick and about four inches apart, are set in iron frames so as to form the sides of a cellular building block. Of these blocks the walls are constructed.

There are no window sashes, the air escape being through several small openings around the upper part of the second story, but through which no air from the outside is admitted. The air supply is obtained from a considerable distance, forced through a pipe and carefully filtered through cotton wool to cleanse it of bacteria. To insure further protection and sterilization, the air is driven against a glycerine-coated plate of glass, which captures all the germs the wool spares. The few germs brought into the house in the clothes of the visitors will soon die in the warm sunlight with which the place is flooded.

The space between the glasses of the building blocks is filled with a solution of salts which absorbs the heat of the sun, so that the rooms of the house are much cooler than those protected by the thickest of shades. In the evening the place is heated by the salts radiating the heat they have absorbed during the day. So effective is the system of regulating the temperature that a few hours of sunlight, even in freezing

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

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
