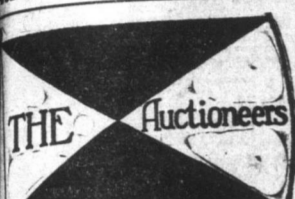

#### Eighteen Ships Sold

BY THE UNITED STATES SHIPPING FOR \$1,020,000—TO THE NEW YORK EXPORT CORPORATION.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The Shipping Board to-day sold the American Export Line to the Export Steamship Corporation of New York City for \$1,020,000. Eighteen vessels were involved and sold at \$750 a ton, with guaranteed operations for five years. The vessels ply between New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore and Mediterranean and Black Sea ports. It was the last remaining Shipping Board freight line between the Atlantic Coast and the Black Sea ports. Commenting on this and other sales of the Shipping Board, Chairman O'Connor, said:

"If foreign owners start a rate war against American buyers of shipping lines recently sold by the Shipping Board with the idea of putting the American ships out of business, the Shipping Board will immediately take these lines back and operate them until Congress meets and considers the general question of protecting American ships under private operation."

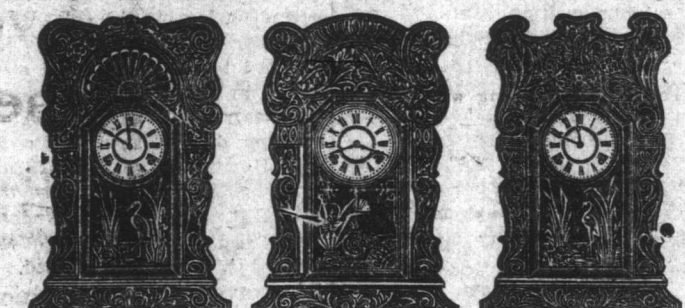

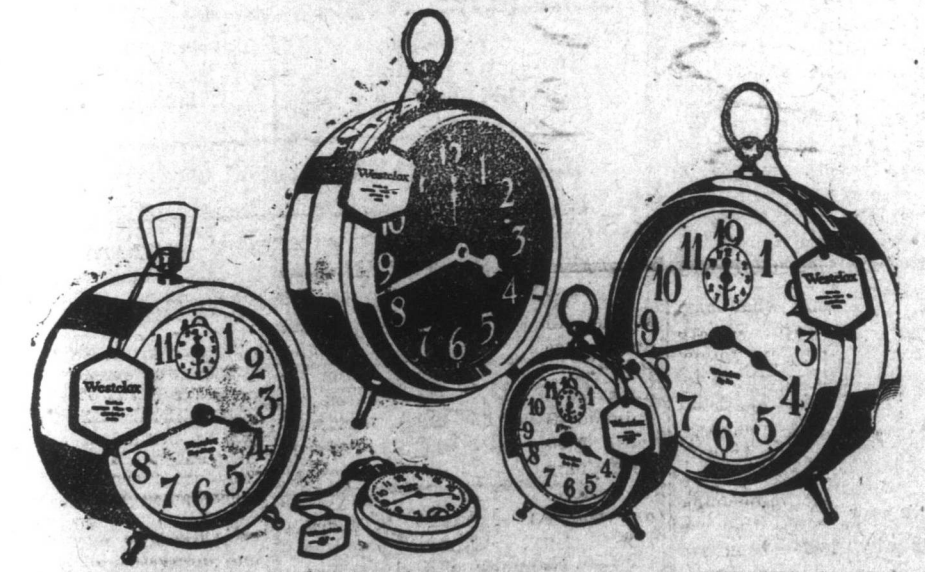

In the fiscal year which ended on March 31 last, the Irish Free State had a budget deficit of £532,000 as compared with a deficit at the close of the previous fiscal year of £7,225,000.

### HOW WE TRAIN OUR FAMILIES.

"What do you suppose I've just found out," said my neighbor "and from an outsider, not from anyone in my family. That Richard almost got drowned last summer at camp! Wasn't that terrible! And just imagine having an outsider tell you that about your own family! That sort of thing has happened to me several times. I don't like it at all. I don't know what makes them do it."

She ought to know. I believe she does know in a way, though she does not like to acknowledge it to herself. The reason her family try to hide things like that from her is because she worries inordinately.

"Don't Let Father Know" There are a great many families in which "Don't let father know" is a watchword, and in which those who are always hiding things from their parents.

The fault, of course, is their own. The excess of my quality in any person always develops certain other qualities in those they live with.

The person who is a very harsh critic of all his subordinates' acts is pretty sure to develop subordinates who are afraid of taking and responsibility.

He Develops Hypocrisy. The wife or husband who is of an exceedingly jealous disposition is likely to develop the quality of hypocrisy in his or her mate. Not necessarily hypocrisy of act, perhaps, but hypocrisy of expression.

Of course the humans generally have inhibitions of character or ideals that modify these developments. The very frank person may be unable or unwilling to develop hypocrisy. The very independent person may continue to act fearlessly and thereby fall out with his employer—or perhaps win his reluctant admiration.

But it remains true that any excess of a quality in one personality tends to develop a protective quality in those about him and the person who has that quality should take his own effect on people into considerations.

### Trees Keep Us Cool

FOLIAGE AND TEMPERATURE.

Everyone knows that a house standing among trees is far cooler in summer than one that stands bare and unprotected, but if asked the reason most people would answer, "Why, because trees give shade and keep off the sun's rays." This is only half an answer, for trees do very much more than give shade. They tend to lower the temperature in their neighborhood, for during the day they give out large quantities of moisture and so cool and purify the surrounding air.

A certain botanist who has given much thought to the matter estimates that a good sized foliage tree, such as an elm, may produce a crop of no fewer than seven million leaves. The combined surface of all these leaves amounts to no less than 200,000 square feet. In other words, one tree may expose to the air nearly five acres of foliage, and during a hot summer day the whole of this immense area of greenery is exhaling a cooling moisture. Preparing For Heat Waves. From such figures as these it is easy to see the enormous value of trees around a house, and to realize how important they are in towns. Even in Britain, where we get a really hot spell only once in three years, the advantage of planting trees in streets is self-evident; in warmer countries trees in towns are not a luxury, but a necessity, and in most cities in America, as soon as a new residential street is planned, the first thing done is to plant a row of trees down either side. In most Southern cities every residential avenue is lined with fine trees, and houses in these tree-shaded streets are found to fetch rents from thirty to seventy per cent higher than those in streets which are not so planted. MARKET LETTER  
(From Our Boston Correspondent)

The bull market continues to set new records. It shows the utmost disregard of the opinions of those who comment on a miscellaneous collection of adverse factors. A very high level of prices, record broker's loans, a large business volume and sharp upward movements accompanied by imaginative talk on the part of pool manipulators are among the things enumerated as reminiscent of the culminating phase of bull markets. The importance of such things is, of course, relative, and must be considered in terms of other prevailing conditions. Things which are recognized as phenomena of a stock market situation which is unhealthy may appear long before the end of an upward movement is imminent. As a matter of fact, most of the things currently receiving comment as indicative of the approaching end of a bull market I have been present to some extent since last Fall. After the rise which has occurred it is natural for stock market diagnosticians to search for indications of a bear market. But are we to ignore the combination of easy money, record building activity, full employment of the major industries, record earnings in many lines of trade, recovery of the agricultural sections and many other favorable factors and turn bearish because of high brokers' loans and other phenomena, the relative importance of which no one is qualified to estimate? No one can say with finality that, before this market terminates, brokers' loans will not be very much larger, that prices will not be much higher, that business will not be much more active or that upward movements will not be much sharper.

We can't have a bear market unless people are willing to sell stocks. We know that the public are cheerful and would rather buy than sell. It is not public selling which ends bull markets, however. It is liquidation by so-called insiders—people of large financial resources—who take advantage of general optimism to dispose of large blocks of stocks. Their selling increases the floating supply of stock to an amount greater than public purchasing power can take care of and, therefore, causes. But important interests do not dispose of stocks without good and sufficient reason.

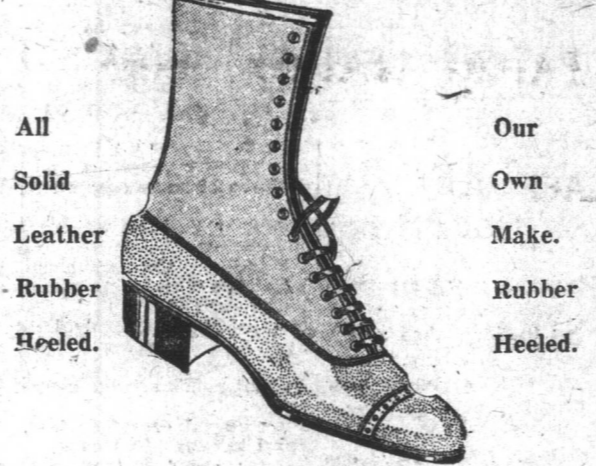

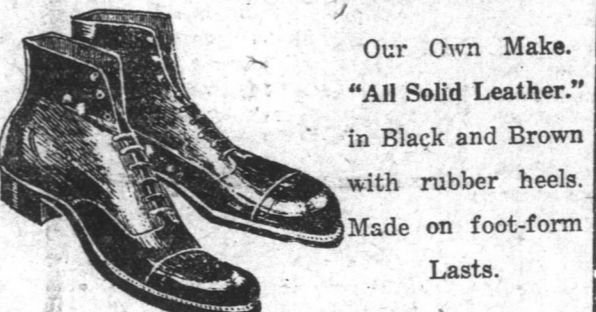

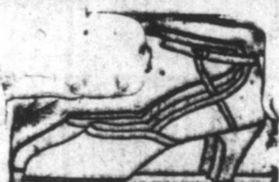

### The Germ's Own Germ

"Small fleas have other fleas to bite 'em," declares the poet. And in like manner, the germs that produce in us the symptoms of disease may have fatal diseases of their own, produced in turn by smaller parasites. Obviously it is worth our while to cultivate the acquaintance of these enemies of our own foes, and this has been done by their discoverer, a French bacteriologist, and by others. Writing in L'Echo de Paris (Paris), Dr. R. de la Vaux gives interesting particulars of this discovery and its possible results. We read:

"What is the smallest size that a living being may have? It seems that we are far from an answer to this question, and that every day should bring new surprises. The time is far gone when the amoeba was considered as the most simple of living forms, and the bacteria themselves are now dethroned. A considerable obstacle, it is true, seems to limit the field of discovery. The most powerful microscopes do not allow us to distinguish an object less than two ten-thousandths of a millimeter long, and the wavelength of light forbids all hope of going further. We should then have to give up all hope of knowing living beings smaller than these dimensions, if the ingenuity of scientists had not succeeded in avoiding the difficulty. We now not only know of beings smaller than a wave-length of light, but we may study them, cultivate them, count them, and measure them.

"Of all these infinitely small creatures, the most curious and interesting, on account of the services it may render us, would seem to be the bacteriophage, discovered and studied by d'Hérelle, of the Pasteur Institute. The facts that led this eminent bacteriologist to his discovery were these: If we form an emulsion with bouillon of some of the discharges from a patient recovering from bacillary dysentery, for instance, and filter it, we obtain a limpid liquid devoid of visible germs, but if we add several drops of this apparently sterile filtrate to a culture of dysenteric bacilli, we find that in 18 to 24 hours, the culture becomes clear—the bacilli have disappeared; they have been killed, 'bacteriolized.' Several drops of this clarified culture bring about, in their turn, the bacteriolysis of a new culture, and this series may thus be indefinitely continued.

"Note that despite the successive dilutions of the initial filtrate, the bacteriolyzing action, instead of weakening, increases strongly at each passage. This proves that we are dealing not with an inert chemical principle, but with something alive, that multiplies and increases in strength progressively.

"By ingenious experiments, M. d'Hérelle has shown that the bacteriolyzing action is due to living beings that may be counted, which he has named 'bacteriophages' (bacteria-eaters). If we spread over a gelatinized culture of bacilli a drop of solution of the bacteriolyzing filtrate, properly diluted, we observe, at the end of a certain time, the formation of sterile spots. Each of these, where the bacilli have been killed, indicates the presence of a colony of bacteriophages; and as we know that every colony originates from a single germ, the number of spots enables us to calculate that of the bacteriophages contained in the filtrate. According to the conditions of culture, this number varies from fifty millions to three billions per cubic centimeter!

"By carrying the dilution sufficiently far, we may obtain a solution such that bacteriolysis takes place only in one culture out of ten. This crucial experiment proves that we are surely dealing with discontinuous elements—with beings—for in the case of a liquid we should have a homogeneous product all of whose drops would produce the same action.

"The bacteriophage is an internal parasite of the bacterium, and can be cultivated in pure bouillon. The attacked bacillus swells, becomes spherical and finally bursts freeing the parasites that have developed within it.

"The discovery of the bacteriophage enables us to understand many facts

that have hitherto been obscure: we now see that a convalescent carrier of bacteriophages may transmit his cure to others, just as a patient may transmit his disease.

"From the purely biological point of view it is especially interesting to show that such tiny bodies may present all the characteristics of life—assimilation, reproduction, variability. Pranzitz has calculated that the bacteriophage is only about two hundred-thousandths of a millimeter in diameter. Now we know of ultra-microbes smaller still, that of avian plague passes through colloidion filters whose pores, according to the calculations of physicists, measure only two millionths of a millimeter! And when we recall that chemists give the molecules of albumin a diameter six times as large, we ask in wonder, what may be the constitution of such a living being as this!"

### Sky Fireworks

**EARTH'S AUGUST VISITORS.**

Shooting stars are generally associated with November, but many fine meteors fall during August. Anyone who looks at the north-section of the sky between ten and midnight may, if the night is fine, see a splendid display of "fireworks."

Out of the twinkling stars there will suddenly flash a point of light which, as it travels across the sky, leaves a trail of fire, finally exploding in a shower of sparks.

The reason for the sudden appearance of these meteors is the intersection of the orbit of the earth with that of the "Perseids." The Perseids are the remains of a certain comet which was last seen in 1862. The earth passes them once a year.

The force of the earth's gravity attracts the Perseids, and when they enter the atmosphere at a speed of twenty miles a second, the friction makes them white hot. The temperature which they reach is sufficient to vaporise almost any substance.

Although the meteors appear to dis-

solve and only strike the earth on rare occasions, they leave a fine-called cosmic dust—which is dredged up from the bottom of the sea.

When a meteor does reach the earth it plunges its way into the atmosphere and dies down to a depth of forty feet. Large meteors sometimes do great damage, destroying life and setting them on fire.

All meteors contain metals which given them their colour. Those August are yellow, the colour due to the presence of sodium.

Strictly speaking, it is a mistake to call a meteor a shooting star, whereas the nearest star is millions of miles away, a meteor only becomes visible when it is about eighty miles from the earth.

After travelling about thirty miles in just over a second, the meteor comes so hot that it melts and appears. Of course, the larger meteor is the longer it lasts, but generally it is only visible for about a second.

**The Oil Nuisance on the Coast**

Thousands who at this holiday season of the year are at our seaside resorts (which are certainly the most attractive in Europe), will earnestly hope that an early step may be put to the pollution of the sea with waste oil. This nuisance is still proceeding on a very disagreeable scale near many of the great ports.

Here and there the pollution is so bad that it interferes with bathers, though such cases are, fortunately, not numerous. But almost everywhere it is beginning to affect living things other than man. The sea birds, creatures of beauty, whose grace adds so much to the charm of our coasts, are dying off wholesale. When once their feathers have been smeared with the heavy oil, as it floats on the surface, they appear to be doomed, and perish by a slow and painful death. Whether this discharge of oil affects fishes is a matter of controversy, but to those who apply common sense there can be very little doubt that it does, and that its results are exceedingly serious.

Fishermen are almost unanimous in holding that the marked decline of recent years in the productivity of many British fishing grounds is due to the discharge of oil. If it is true it is not enough to forbid and punish the discharge of oil within British territorial waters, which by international law extend only three miles. Most of our south coast towns are agreed that all discharge of oil in the Channel ought to be forbidden, the prohibition to be enforced by a strict international patrol.

The official view is the comfortable one that the trouble is decreasing from economic causes, as shipowners require greater and even greater care to be taken in avoiding even the smallest waste of oil. It is also held officially that to some extent the nuisance has been the result of the war. Hundreds of vessels with oil in their tanks were sunk and have gradually broken up as the years have gone on.—Daily Mail.

**When Criminals Are Made**

By a PSYCHOLOGIST.

Is there a "danger period" for men? According to a Blue Book on Criminal Statistics issued by the Home Office, there is.

More men fall foul of the law in early manhood, it seems, than at any other time of their lives. Of the 48,807 persons convicted of all classes of crime during 1923 no fewer than 10,856 were men between the ages of 21 and 30.

Curiously enough, the danger period for women is not until ten years later. Perhaps, up to the age of 30 women are hopeful of achieving matrimony, and then, as the years advance and that hope disappears, follow come, either through economic necessity or adventurous spirit, which lead to trouble.

As was only to be expected, these statistics clearly demonstrate that the age of youth is the age of daring and callousness, for there were 2,000 odd convictions for acts of violence, including burglary, against men between 16 and 30.

Incidentally, 22 women were convicted of burglary, one being well over 80 years of age. Truly the spirit of daring manifests itself strangely.

For some reason or other, forgery is regarded in popular imagination as an offence peculiar to elderly men—the wicked uncle, the unscrupulous lawyer, and the like. Actually it is a young man's crime. Ninety-five men under 40 years of age were convicted of this offence in 1923, four being under 21.

It seems, too, that we must revise our idea of the "recidivist." Ever young, imagine this king of criminals as an old man steeped in vice—a misleader of foolish youth. The truth is that only nine persons over 40, one being a woman, were convicted during the year under review. But there were 138 between the ages of 21 and 30 and 106 between 30 and 40.

All men, so we are told, are liars. Apparently women run them very close, for of the 21 persons convicted of perjury 13 were men and 8 women. Another curious psychological fact is that, although 164 women were convicted of cruelty to children, only 3 were guilty of cruelty to animals.

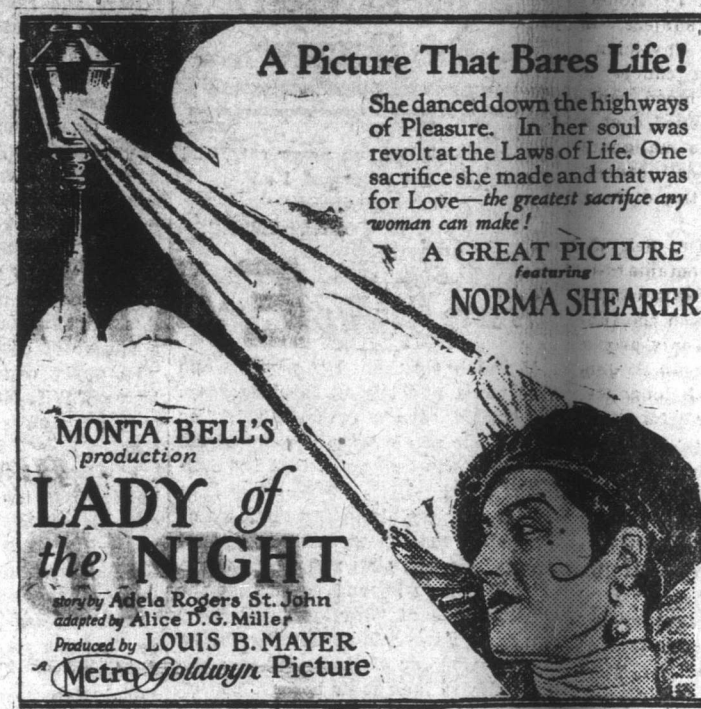

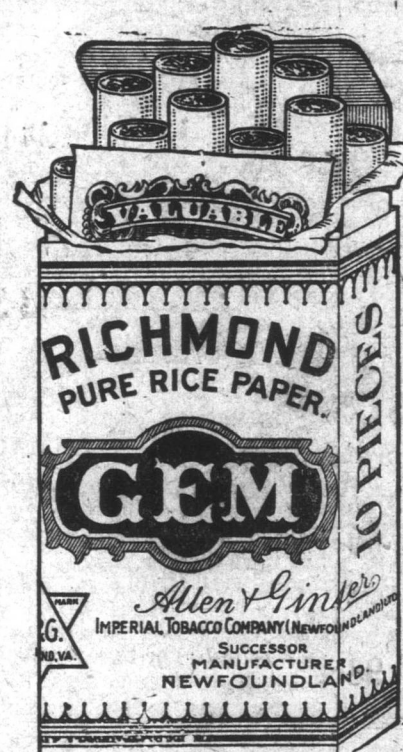

### What Causes "Singing" in the Ears?

Hearing is due to vibration of air passing upon the tiny drum of our ear, which are translated into sounds to be picked up by the brain.

The "singing" may be due to several causes. It may not be most serious at first, but an inflammation which makes the ear work as though responding to sound. In this case our brain gets the impression of hearing when there really is nothing to hear. Certain things, too, will produce this effect. In the tube whose purpose it is to have the air pressure in the ear be the same as outside, perhaps as the result of a cold, in which case our balance of air will be out of proportion, and we listen to the tiny beats of our blood, enormously magnified by the drums of the ears.

For the wax which is always forming in the ear, the result of natural secretion may be removed quickly enough. This system, and here again we are liable to get an improper pressure, just as though something were accumulating in a real drum, resulting in the sound we know as "singing."

### Fatal Wasp Sting

A MAN'S DEATH WITHIN TEN MINUTES.

An inquest was held at Newmarket (N.H.) concerning William Deney, a laborer at the gas-works, who collapsed and died within ten minutes of being stung on the left forearm by a wasp.

The widow said that her husband was out at work on August 27, and she saw him return home at 7 o'clock.

Mr. Donaghy, who made the post-mortem examination, said death was due to shock following the wasp sting, to the poison, which the man was peculiarly susceptible. Some persons are very sensitive to such poisons as those injected by wasps.


