EARLY HEADING.—Some of the fall wheat in the townships of Normanby and Carrick is already headed out.

FOR THE PENITENTIARY.—Sinclair, the shop breaker, left this morning for the Penitentiary, in charge of Mr. F. Grange, Deputy-Sheriff and Constable Lynch.—The culprit was fettered, but had the use of his hands.

On Friday of last week a child of Mr. George Rupp, near New Hamburg, fell from a second storey window, and was not seriously hurt.

Small pox has broken out on the 8th concession of Wallace, and one death has resulted. The contagion was communicated by a family lately come to reside in the neighbourhood.

LUCKNOW.—This village which was partially destroyed by fire some time ago is rising from its ashes, and gives evidence of the enterprise of its inhabitants.

Sir Benjamin Lee Guinness whose name has for a long time been associated with excellent Dublin porter died a short time ago. He was extremely charitable, and far famed for his restoration of St. Patrick's Cathedral at a cost of upwards of £250,000.

An Irish girl from Lowell, while leaving the cars at Groton Junction last Saturday had her pocket cut out by a thief, who secured \$619, being all her factory earnings. The poor girl screamed and fainted when she discovered her loss.

Brantford sent five more men and one woman to the Penitentiary, on Tuesday, as a part of the annual quota furnished by that town to the above named institution. One of the men was a notorious burglar, who has been lying in the Brantford goal nearly a year awaiting his trial for having broken a safe and taken therefrom cash and jewelry to the amount of \$5,000.

STATISTICS OF PUSLINCH.—The Township Clerk has furnished us with the following statistics of the Township of Puslinch, taken from this year's assessment roll. Number of acres 58,778; amount of real property \$781,195; personal property \$132,600; population 4,022; number of cattle 5,610; of sheep 8,327; hogs 1,795; horses 1,590; dogs 375.

A large bear, supposed to be the same whose appearance in Mount Forest was noted a while ago, has taken up his summer residence somewhere near the Arthur and Minto townline, whence he makes nightly raids upon the adjacent farms. Several attempts have been made at hunting him down, but without success.

ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday or Thursday last Mr. Caleb Spragge was at work on the inside of a building in town, and while engaged in adjusting a tackle to a beam he fell a distance of 24ft. breaking his left arm, spraining his right wrist, and suffering a severe internal jarring. He is able to be round, and with the exception of the broken limb will soon be all right.

ACCIDENT.—Casualties from falling trees, for which the last winter and spring have been noted, have not yet ceased. The Listowel Banner says that a young man named Swan, living two miles from that village was almost killed on Friday last in consequence of a tree falling on his head, which rendered him unable to move for four hours. He is likely to recover; but the same paper tells of another accident of the same nature by which a man named John Thompson residing in Wallace, was struck by a tree on the same day as Swan, and so badly injured that he died the following Monday.

Quartering the Volunteers.

Quartermaster Harvey made the rounds of most of the hotels on Thursday in order to ascertain how many of the Volunteers each of the proprietors would be willing to provide with bed and board during the term of their stay in Guelph. The following hotel and saloon keepers have been called upon and have agreed to accommodate the numbers following their respective names: Thos. Ellis, 55, or the entire Elora Company; R. Oakes, 20; T. Lynch, 6; E. Jones, 12; M. Casey, 6; J. Bunyan, 10; V. Wald, 14; P. Murphy, 20; J. Nicholls, 6; D. Coffe, 8; Thos. Pallister, 6; Jas. O'Neil, 10; R. B. Coulson, 10; Jas. Lindsay, 4; J. Bookless, 2; Denis Bunyan, 2. Provision has thus been made for 195 men, and some of the hotel-keepers have not been seen yet, being absent from home. But there are 150 more who must find board and lodging somewhere, and it is to be hoped that compulsory measures will not have to be resorted to.—Some of the hotel-keepers in the foregoing list have acted with much generosity and patriotism, and it is to be hoped that others will stretch a point to prevent an appeal to the billet and ten cents a day per man for bed and the use of cooking utensils. The time is short, and it is not probable that hotels will be the losers.—Some people appear to think that the Government pays for the keeping of the men, but this is a fallacy; each has to pay his own board bill, the officers interfering only to see that every man does so. There are other places in the county not only willing, but eager to extend their hospitalities to the Battalion, but it is evident that Guelph is the place most suitable, and will not surely on the present occasion show a waning zeal in the cause of the Volunteers. Nearly four weeks ago the Waterloo Battalion assembled at New Hamburg, not by Government orders, as the 90th Battalion is about to do, but by request of Col. Goodman, the hotel-keepers of that village having previously agreed to accommodate them at the rate of \$1 a week per man; and the testimony of the proprietor of the principal house of entertainment is, that he lost nothing, and that he would do the same over again. Here 25c. per day is offered, or nearly double as much as satisfied the people of Hamburg. Surely if they lost nothing, there is no reason why our hotel-keepers should.

Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church.

MONTREAL, June 18. The Canada Presbyterian Synod agreed that a day of thanksgiving shall be appointed for the bountiful harvest and all other mercies. The discussion on the question of marriage with a deceased wife's sister terminated in adopting Mr. Inglis' amendment, affirming a simple adherence to the doctrine of the Westminster Confession by 53 to 37. It was decided by 68 to 8 to invite Rev. Mr. McVicar to the theological chair of Montreal College. The appeal from the Presbytery of Ottawa was settled by the appointment of a commission to try the whole case. A committee was appointed to announce to Mr. McVicar his election as Professor.—The question of a General Assembly was remitted to a committee. Steps were taken to open fraternal intercourse with other churches. The English Presbyterian hymn book was sent down by Presbyteries. Various reports and appeals were disposed of, and the Synod will finally close to-night.

LACROSSE.—We announced some time ago that a match at Lacrosse would be played between the Guelph and Paris Clubs, and we again noticed its postponement. But a meeting has been appointed at half past one o'clock on Monday next, and barring accident will take place without fail, on the Cricket Grounds. Our Lacrosse Club has been but recently organized, yet it is said that they play very well, and we hope to be allowed the opportunity of recording their victory in the coming match. Lacrosse is now universally acknowledged to be the national game of Canada, and certainly the Guelph Club deserve credit for their efforts to popularize it.

THE PRESS EXCURSION.—On Friday evening the 10th July, the Town Council of Collingwood will give a public dinner to the Press Association, and a public demonstration has also been tendered by the people of Owen Sound, to take place on Saturday evening, the 11th. Arrangements have been made for the publication of a daily paper on the steamer during the trip, the type, &c., being furnished by Mr. Palgrave, type founder of Montreal, and the paper by Messrs. Buntin & Co., of Toronto. Arrangements are also in progress for a nightly re-union during the excursion.

AMMUNITION.—A quantity of what is called extra ammunition arrived yesterday by the Great Western. This has nothing whatever to do with the coming Battalion Drill. Companies are allowed a certain amount of ammunition for ball practice, and they are obliged to keep a certain quantity on hand. If they shoot off any above their allowance they can purchase more, and that which arrived yesterday was some ordered and to be used in private practice, or to replace that which had already been so used.

A correspondent of a contemporary writing from Niagara Falls has seen what has stricken him with wonder and admiration. He says:—One of the most pleasing little excitements here is the rivalry among the fair brides in the way of dress. Up to this date the charming Mrs. Saml. J. J., of Philadelphia, Pa., who is stopping at the International Hotel, stands high above all competitors. Her costume takes up the entire space of six large trunks. This lady has been stopping here for five or six days, and making numerous changes of dress each day, yet she has never appeared in public the second time in the same dress. Yesterday she appeared in the drawing room in the most exquisite costume, which was composed of a white satin dress with a long train, cut a la Pompadour, and trimmed with the most expensive lace, cherry colored cape, trimmed with white ermine, which blended well and made a neat and pretty contrast, and of course nothing could be more showy or attractive. Eramosa Council.

CENTRE INN, June 15th.—The Council met here this day pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, Revue in the chair. The minutes of preceding meeting were read and confirmed. A by-law was introduced by Mr. Farris to reduce the width of portions of Main and Guelph streets in the village of Rockwood, which was read a first and second time. Another by-law was introduced by Mr. Rea, to regulate the height of lawful fences and to divide the township into Poundkeepers' Divisions, &c., which was read a first and second time. Twelve dollars were ordered to be paid to Mr. A. Wishart for road improvements, and \$5 50c. to John Gavin for gravel from his pit. A report by the Inspector of Licenses in favor of Thos. Shephardson, of the Drumhill Inn, was presented, and a certificate for License granted. The Council, on motion, went into Committee of whole on the by-law respecting fences, poundkeepers, &c., and on motion it was read a third time and passed. The Clerk was then instructed to furnish each Poundkeeper with a certified copy of said by-law for his guidance. The by-law to reduce width of portions of Main and Guelph streets in the village of Rockwood from 99 to 86 ft. was read a third time and passed. The Council in Committee of the whole on the reports on Roads and Bridges, made the usual appropriations for the improvement of the same, one case being reserved for consideration at next meeting of Council. The Clerk was instructed to advertise when and where the Council would meet with parties desirous of contracting for the improvements aforesaid. Eight dollars was voted for the relief of Mrs. Patterson. On motion the Council adjourned to meet again at the Centre Inn, on Monday, the 3rd day of August next.

Medical Inspection of Volunteers

A circular has just been issued by Adjutant-General's Office, Ottawa, directing a medical inspection of all volunteers before leaving home to take the service. The circular provides that such cannot be made in consequence of the rapidity of concentration, and to be undergone at the brigade headquarters immediately on the troops there. The inspection is with a view of ascertaining whether any are laboring under diseases, rheumatic affection, diseases of the heart, viscera or abdomen, or any are short-sighted or have injuries of the joints, or overstrain, and also whether a man has a position to any of the above. Such men, if any, are to be strengthened of the battalion for active and their places supplied, if possible, by efficient men, in order first, health and lives of the men who are physically unfit shall not be risked, hardships or exposures inseparable service in the field, and secondly, country shall not be subject to compensation on account of the part of men who are not fit for it. Each member of the brigade vaccinated previously, have to be vaccinated for the purpose by the medical officer of the brigade. Mr. Bright was entertained at a public
breakfast at the Philharmonic Hall, in

and blessings achieved in our time. It is
a measure for which we are indebted very
much more than to any other member of
the present House of Commons to my hon
friend Mr. Milner Gibson. (Cheers) Has
there in our time—within any time in
England—been a measure carried by Par
liament which has so largely promoted
education and instruction as that? Take
this very country, during the last seven
years, when so much suffering existed
during the cotton famine. Every man
and every woman in my end of the coun
ty, was informed of the cause of the dis
tress; and when men are told the cause of
their suffering, when they know that it
has not been brought about intentionally,
not by any injustice of other men, they
learn to be patient, and they abstain from
that anger and that violence which suf
fering naturally promotes among a popu
lation. (Hearty hear.) I believe that
during that period we were very
much indebted to the newspapers which
are now so cheap and universal. What
did the opponents of that measure say?
They—The Times and other papers—said
that the penny papers would be made up
of paragraphs and leaders taken from the
dear papers. Now, I believe that the
penny papers write just as good leaders
as dear papers. They said further, that
we should have a newspaper press that
would be immoral, that would be slan
derous, that would be libelous, and that
whereas, nothing is more clear and more
universally admitted than that the char
acter of the newspaper press in all these
things has been gaining and improving
for many years past, and that at this mo
ment there is nothing whatever to be said
in favor of a dear ancient press over the
cheap newspapers brought into life by the
abolition of the taxes upon newspapers.
I charge upon Mr. Disraeli and his friends
that they are fermenters of discord in this
kingdom—that they are endeavoring to
set up again those cries out of which
come some of the greatest evils with
which nations can be afflicted. The "No
Popery" cry was a cry of great power in
days far past. Whether its power is to
totally gone we shall have an opportunity
of seeing within the next six months. I
am happy to believe that one of the great
blessings of the cheap, and universal, and
honorably written newspaper press, will
be found to be that that cry now will
have lost its power, and that we shall find
that the intellect, thought, and civiliza
tion and sense of justice, and morality and
of true Christianity of the people of the
Kingdom, will rise superior to that cry,
will wholly disregard it, and will sup
press the pretensions to power of the
Ministry and party who have sought to
use it.
