HAMILTON AND NORTHWESTERN RAILWAY.

RAILWAY.

We see by the Hamilton papers that a meeting of the Provisional Directors of the above Railway was held on Thursday, when it was resolved that stock books will be opened in Hamilton on the 1st of April. The report of Mr. Askin, the eugineer who made a preliminary survey of the proposed route, was submitted to the Directors. A committee was also appointed and empowered to engage an engineer and secretary, as soon as a gaurantee fund of two thousand dollars is obtained, and to obtain a map of the route. prepare a prosmap of the route. prepare a pros-pectus, and to attend to any other preliminary business that may be re-

pectus, and to attend to any other preliminary business that may be required.

From Mr. Askin's report we gather that the country through which it is proposed the line should pass is very favourable for the construction of a railway. There are less than ordinary difficulties on the portion of the proposed line from a point near Waterdown and Nelson, through Militon to Georgetown. The valley of the Credit can thence be followed, passing by the numerous mill sites on that stream to Cheltenham, and thence to Paisley and Lockton, over perfectly level ground to where the highlands known as "the Caledon Hills" are met. These hills, offering a serious difficulty to lines passing through them in an easterly and westerly direction, do not by any means offer the same obstruction or difficulty in this case, as arms of the Humber river joining the main river near Lockton afford a comparatively easy route through the hills, which are composed entirely of sand and gravel, casily excavated—the latter material of value for ballasting throad. The valley of the Nottawatega and its brunches is a perfectly level and uniform plain. The railway line can be carried northward to Barrie along the valleys within a range of 10 miles east or west at pleasure. The line may be carried along the Penetanguishene road for a considerable distance from Barrie, and bearing of castward can reach the kays without serious work.
