Church Unions.

The papers for the last two or three weeks have been largely taken up with the reports of the proceedings of the different ecclesiastical bodies, who hold their annual meetings in this month. For some years past the tendency among the churches which are only divided on certain minor points is towards union, and at the meetings lately held, such satisfactory progress was made in two instances that the object in view may be said to be practically effect-

In regard to the proposed union between the Canada Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church in Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, our readers are no doubt aware that steps towards its accomplishment were taken some three years ago, that the matter has been fully and fairly discussed in the Church Courts of both bodies that joint Committees met for the that joint Committees met for the purpose of fixing on a basis of union, and that now happily all difficulties have been removed. The basis agreed to was fully discussed at the late meetings of the Assembly and Synod, and adopted by overwhelming majorities, and it has been sent down to Presbyteries for approval before being finally passed and carried into effect. The Presbyterian Church in Canada when thus consolidated and united. will be numerically strong, and will exert a powerful interest for good in the Dominion. It will have full scope for expansion, and in the outlying parts of the older Provinces as well as in the new and freshly opened up field in the West, it can easily make available all the funds at its disposal in organizing new churches and in extending the privileges and blessings of religious truth to the thousands of settlers who have made, or will yet make, Manitoba and British Columbia and the vast country between these Provinces, their homes. Another noteworthy feature in the sheme which has engaged the attention of the Wesleyan and New Connexion Conferences, for the confederation of the Wesleyan body in the Dominion into one great Conference, and for the union of the two purpose of fixing on a basis of union

connexion Conferences, for the confederation of the Wesleyan body in the Dominion into one great Conference, and for the union of the two bodies above mentioned. The scheme was fully discussed, and finally approved of at the meeting of the Wesleyan Conference which closed at London on Wednesday last, and as far as the New Connexion body is concerned, it only requires the sunction of its quarterly Boards to accomplish a union between these two churches. This sanction we have no doubt will be given, and ere long we expect to see the union carried out in conformity with the scheme already chalked out. Such a confederation and union will add greatly to the strength of the Methodist Church in Canada, and give a new impetus to the wonderful development and emergy it has manifested hitherto in occupying every available missionary field, and drawing within its fold thousands who belong to no church, and who had been living a life of practical heathenism

With regard to the union question at home between the Frée and United Presbyterian Churches, the proposal for immediate union has been for the present dropped, but the mutual eligibility clause has been adopted, which is the entering of the wedge, and which, we are satisfied, will before long lead to a permanent and satisfactory union between these two large and influential bodies.


