The Proposed County of Dufferin.

The copy of Mr. Charles Clarke' Bill for the creation of a new County to be called the County of Dufferin lies before us. The preamble is to the effect that the population of Orangeville, Amaranth. Luther, East Garafraxa, Mono, Mulmur, Melancthon, and Adyala by last census was 20,200; that these corporations are inconveniently absent from the county towns; of their several counttes and that they are of such size and wealth as to warrant them in being formed into a new County. The reeves and deputy reeves of these Municipalities are to form the first Provisional Council. Section two provides for the calling together of the Council, the election of Warden, and making arrangements for taking a vote of the electors on the question of the reection of the new County. If the majority are opposed to the erection of the new County then the Council is to be dissolved; but if there is a majority in favour of it then the Council may proceed to business. It is specified in the bill that Orangeville is to be the County Town.

The bill has been read a first time, but we are of opinion that it will not be passed this session, but will be laid over for the consideration of the solution of other Counties.
