ALASKA MINES.

Increased Activity Everywhere—New Mineral Discoveries—Prospects General. (Juneau Mining Record.)

The last lot of mill machinery for the Eastern Alaska Mining and Milling Co. in Silver Bow basin, to work the mines in the Jumbo group, is now being placed in position. The mill will be in running order by the first of August, but will not be started until about August 25th, when the tramway also will be completed.
