The train continued for about a quarter of a mile before being stopped.

## DEATH OF C. H. BALDWIN.

Although not unexpected the news of the death of Mr. C. H. Baldwin, which occurred at Tillsonburg on Sunday afternoon, caused genuine sorrow among a wide circle of friends. Deceased, who was only in his thirtieth year, had been in failing health for the past year with a malady that the skill of the best physicians and attendance could not prevail against. He made a brave fight for life but it was not to be. Mr. Baldwin, who was born in Forest, was the youngest son of the Rev. J. A. Baldwin, a veteran Baptist clergyman who has filled many appointments in Western Ontario during his long service in the ministry. Possessed of remarkable energy, business ability and ambition he had a bright future before him, and it seems hard that a bright young life should go out on the threshold of its usefulness. Naturally of a whole souled, genial disposition, he made friends wherever he went, and no young man ever left Watford who was more generally liked for his many good qualities of head and heart. Generous to a fault he was incapable of doing a mean action, and none were more ready to assist those who needed aid. About six years ago he came to Watford from Arkona and entered into partnership with J. White. Subsequently in company with Mr. L. Carrothers, he opened a dry goods store and the firm built up a successful business. Some two years ago they gave up business here, and after a trip to the West located in Tillsonburg. Health failing he was obliged to withdraw from taking an active part in the business, and for the past year he had been under treatment. The remains arrived in Watford on Friday night and

were taken to his old home in Arkona.

The funeral which was largely attended took place on Wednesday afternoon from the home of his brother, the Arkona Cemetery. The funeral service was held in the Arkona Baptist Church and was conducted by the Rev. J. J. Ross, pastor of Talbot Street Baptist Church, London, who frequently visited him during his long illness in Victoria Hospital, The Rev. A. J. Bowen, of London, and Rev. Mr. Harber, of Arkona, assisted at the service. The pallbearers were intimate personal friends from Watford, J. W. McLaren, Dr. F. B. Kenward, E. A. Brown, C. Howden, H. Lawrence and F. P. McDonnell.

Deceased is survived by two brothers, William, of Arkona, and Rev. Russell Baldwin, of Calumet, and one sister, Mrs. (Dr.) E. T. Lamb, of Pentwater, Mich., and Mrs. McDonald, a step sister, of Tillsonburg. The deepest sympathy of many friends is extended to the sorrowing relatives.

Everybody is familiar with the humming noise which these wires make on certain days. The telegraph wires running north and south never hum at the same time with the wires that run east and west. When the wires running east and west hum it indicates that there will be a fall of the temperature. They begin humming ten hours or more in advance in the fall of temperature. But the wires that run north and south indicate that there is to be a rise in the temperature.

### DOES ANYONE KNOW HIM.

A 15 Year old boy With Feet Frozen in the Barnia Hospital.

Thos. Meadows, aged 15, came to town on Friday last in a pitiable condition from exposure to the cold. Both feet were badly frozen and the charitable chairman of the indigent poor committee, Mr. Dagan, sent the unfortunate lad to the General Hospital for treatment, where he now lies awaiting amputation of parts of the frozen members.

The story the boy told was that he came in here that day from Kingscourt, but that he had been living in Strathroy for some time previously. He gave the names of Strathroy citizens, who, he said, knew him, but on inquiry through the chief of police here from the police of Strathroy, no one in that town seemed to know him. Since then the boy furnished another history of himself. He said his original home was in Brussels county of Huron; that from there he went to Stratford, and after living there for some time removed with his mother to Strathroy. He lived in the latter place two months and a half, during which time his mother died and was buried there. He then left to look for work and while going from place to place along the line between Strathroy and here his feet were frozen.

It is doubtful whether the boy's last story is any more reliable than his first one proved to be. The police authorities here desire to call attention through the newspapers to the lad's present whereabouts and his statements as to his former homes with a view, if possible, of establishing his identity.

### STALLIONS IN DEATH STRUGGLE

Lucan Men Have Terrific Experience Cooped in car With Maddened Beasts.

Strathroy, Feb. 28.—Mr. Fred Paisley and his brother, of Lucan, Ont., had an experience on the Grand Trunk between London and this place yesterday afternoon which they both declare they are never likely to forget. They were caring for two blooded stallions which were being shipped to a western state, when the animals engaged in a savage battle, which ended in the death of one of the animals, the serious injury of the other, and some painful cuts and bruises for the two men.

The stallions had been placed in a horsecar at Lucan, which was attached to a fast freight at London.

Shortly after leaving London, one of the horses became panic-stricken, broke from its fastenings and attacked its mate. A terrific struggle ensued, the free stallion using heels and teeth with telling effect. The other animal finally broke from its halter and then the two enraged beasts fought all over the car until one of them weakened from loss of blood fell to the floor in a dying condition.

Meantime the two men had made every effort to save the two battling stallions, but without success. Repeatedly they were knocked down and several times narrowly escaped being trampled to death. Both are severely cut and black and blue from bruises. The car was sidetracked upon reaching this place and a veterinary surgeon secured to attend to the surviving animal. The Paisley Bros. place their loss by the death of the horse at \$1,000.

**HORSE RACING AT FALL FAIRS.**

Association Wishes the Matter Left in the Hands of Local Societies.

A discussion of the new Act governing Fairs and Exhibitions was the feature of the closing session of the Ontario Association of Fairs and Exhibitions held in Toronto last week. The clause relating to horse racing was the subject of some criticism, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"That this Association memorialize the Government to amend the clause of the Act relating to horse-racing, and replace it with a clause permitting the individual Fair Boards to use their own discretion as to whether horse-racing shall or shall not be permitted, subject to restrictions, tending to eliminate all objectionable features, such as gambling, pool-selling or betting."

Expressions of opinion on the resolution went to show that racing was considered a valuable attraction to a fair.

Dr. Kaiser, Mayor of Ottawa, held that racing was a perfectly legitimate form of amusement, and, on his motion, the Executive, with W. A. Foy, of Dunnville, D. H. Price and Dr. Kaiser were delegated to wait upon the Minister of Agriculture. An audience was arranged and Hon. Mr. Monteth, promised to consider the matter. He expressed the opinion that horse-racing had sometimes been introduced at the expense of agriculture.

Mr. H. B. Cowan explained the purposes and scope of the new Act. On the clause limiting Government grant to the proportion expended by societies in prizes in encouragement of their object several delegates thought credit should be given for improvement of buildings and grounds.

In this connection it was explained that the authorities had been guided by a fear that societies would spend their grants for objects contrary to the real purpose of existence. A motion asking for a moderation was lost.

**LOCAL OR OTHERWISE.**

It is claimed that more voters were sworn at the recent election of West Middlesex than ever was known in the history of the riding.

MR. JOHN WARREN, station agent, Kerwood, for some time, has been transferred to Watford. Mr. G. Dowling is now in charge there.

D. DAVIS, sexton of the Strathroy cemetery, reports 16 burials so far during February, the largest number made in any month during his experience of 28 years.

THE County of Middlesex and Township of Metcalfe have decided to build a new steel and concrete bridge over the Sydenham River, two and a half miles west of Strathroy.

THE marriage took place quietly at 6 o'clock last Wednesday evening at the home of ex-consolidator Henry Owens, Strathroy, Rev. M. L. Pearson uniting in wedlock his youngest daughter, Lydia, to Luther Harris, of Adelaide.

MARCH, April, and May constitute the spring season in the calendar, so that in this sense the first of March may be considered the first day of spring. Spring proper, however, begins on March 21st, when the sun crosses, or appears to cross, the equator, going northward, and is said to be at the first point of Aries.

HAY and live stock shippers of this section are again reporting a shortage of freight cars. It is almost impossible to get one, even after a wait of ten days and sometimes longer. The shortage is not alone felt along the G. T. R. but all the other roads as well. The railway companies say they have not sufficient motive power to move them. Geo. Robotham, the most extensive hay shipper of this section, has been seriously handicapped of late owing to his inability to get cars.



Logan received and read from J. R. Logan Esq., Solicitor, Sarnia, claiming damages on behalf of S. Lucas, for injury to his land by clay thrown out of the Watson drain, offering to accept \$150.00 in settlement. Left to Commissioners over drain.

Engineer's report on proposed repairs to Zetis Campbell drain read, showing estimated cost to be \$207.00.

Another report served on Council by Clerk of Enniskillen was also read, for the proposed repairs to 4-5 con. drain in that township across lots 30, 31 and 32. Cost of work \$224.00, of which amount \$94.00 was assessed to Brooks.
