Chicago Correspondence of Toronto Globe. Chicago will have something new under the sun, within ten days from date. The police authorities, after long studying over the matter, have finally perfected an arrangement, and the telephone will be brought at last to play effective service in the cause of law and good order. The fact is, the telephone, notice is at the number of about thirty, have been erected in different parts of the city. They are large enough to allow a man to step aside, so as to exclude the noise of the street and intruders, are painted blue, of neat shape, and are the latest and most conspicuous of recent street sights. Keys to these boxes are furnished to respectable citizens living in the vicinity, but entrance cannot be obtained without the aid of special keys, to be carried by police-men after the manner of the locks in safe deposit vaults. Entrance having been thus obtained, by simply pulling a peg in the telephone arrangement, notice is at once given to the Central Police Station. There a wagon, two horses, and a guard of three officers will always be on duty, ready to start at the signal, for the place from which the alarm has been sounded. Upon reaching the scene the captain of the relay, after making examination, will at once send a telephone message, notice is at the facts to the station. If further assistance is needed, a general alarm will be sounded by striking a signal on the bells of the Police Stations. This will call all the officers on beat in the district to the several telephone boxes, and enable the Superintendent to at once communicate with the police force.
