It is much to be regretted, however, that the display of fruit made by this province at the exhibition is not more creditable. The local government has spared no pains or expense to make our display of fruit a success, but it now appears that nearly all the collection of apples had spoiled before they could be placed on exhibition. The Messrs. Starr, of the duty of arranging our display of fruit, report that they found the apples either rotten, from having been frozen, or so injured by the mice, while in the cold storage-room at Chicago, that only a very small quantity remained fit to be placed on exhibition. This is unfortunate. In long-keeping varieties of apples Nova Scotia could, without doubt, lead the world; and as this is especially an exhibition of that kind of fruit, but for these unavoidable circumstances, our apples would doubtless have received an adversement which would have been world-wide. However, no blame can be attached to any one for the result, as the government had made every effort to make our exhibit creditable to the province.


