An effort is being made to build up our Board of Trade into a more effective organization for the promotion and protection of the town's interests, and a rally of the enterprise and public spirit, that is working in so many directions, to this cause is the only way to successfully accomplish this object.

The result of the examinations at Dalhousie were posted on Monday, and it is the fact that it is well nigh impossible to present the scheme in a sufficiently advanced stage of agitation to ensure an intelligent vote among a representative meeting called by the Council.

Prof. Sears, of the Nova Scotia College of Horticulture, through a comparative stranger in the province, has evidently become deeply impressed with its possibilities. Recognizing the loss of our agricultural and orcharding culture sustains through the exodus of the young men from the farms to the neighboring Republic, he is seeking to lay bare the cause and, if possible, check the drain.

—Next Saturday is the last day for getting discount on town orders.

—The inventory of the estate of the late H. E. Baker, of Yarmouth, has been valued of real and personal property at \$230,511.

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—The D. A. R. steamer Prince Edward, which has been down South all the winter, is being renovated and repaired at Boston.

—The first Canadian contingent at the seat of war is now reduced to 715 men in arms. Forty were killed, some have died from illness, and the rest have been laid up from exhaustion, wounds or sickness.

—The school board of Yarmouth is considering the possibility of establishing a manual training department in connection with its public schools, for the training of pupils in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

—The apple house is being completely emptied. A shipment of one thousand barrels, which will constitute the last export for the season, is being sent to Liverpool via steamer from Halifax. The London market is reported as being a shade lower than during March.

—The old millinery business at the old station "Boston" leaves Yarmouth every Wednesday and Saturday, after the arrival of the express trains from Halifax. The service will be increased to four trips per week the latter part of June.

—Mrs. Orator wishes to thank, very much indeed, the kind friends who prepared for her such a pleasant and acceptable surprise. The writing desk and chair will always be highly valued by her as a practical proof of the kindly feelings exhibited towards her by her friends in Yarmouth.

—The Board of Trade meeting last Thursday evening in Mr. Daniels' office was not largely attended, owing, no doubt, to the disagreeable weather, and it was adjourned to meet to-morrow evening at the same place at 7:30. It is hoped a large representation of the membership will be present, as a business of importance is to be transacted.

—William Wigginton, policeman of Annapolis, was brought before Judge Leavitt, Esq., Magistrate of that town, yesterday, on the charge of embezzlement. J. G. E. Parker appeared on behalf of the crown, and O. T. Daniels for the prisoner. No evidence of the commission of any crime was produced, the Justice ordered his discharge.

—Rev. E. B. Moore gave his second discourse to men only at the Y. M. C. A. last Sunday afternoon, subject "The Ministry of Strength." The address was practical and very appropriate to the work of the Association. Mr. Moore will deliver another address next Sunday week, May 6th, subject "Honor and Honesty." Every young man will find it to his advantage to attend these meetings.

—The death of Edward Harold was discovered in the room at West Parades by Mr. Harold's mother, Mrs. Norman Longley. Mr. Harold made his home with Mr. W. McKay, near Lawrencetown, and had been working in the woods during the winter. Death was due to apoplexy. Warrant had been about \$250 in money on his person, and a bank book showing a balance of nearly \$2000. The deceased was a bachelor, 52 years of age, and his early home was at West Dalhousie.

—Sunbeam Lodge, I. O. O. F. of Middleton, is to unite with Crescent Lodge next Sunday in celebrating the 51st anniversary of the order in America. The members are to meet in the lodge room at 2:30 o'clock, and, headed by the Bridgetown band, march to the Baptist church, where the anniversary services will be preached at three o'clock by Rev. Mr. Stevens, of Paradise. These Lodges are both strong and a large attendance and profitable services may be expected. The public will be welcomed to the service.

—The Shamrock was the basket ball league trophy last Wednesday night after a sharp contest with the Bankers, by a score of 7 to 4. The game was, perhaps, not as good an exhibition of sharp, clean play as one or two of the preceding ones, but was undoubtedly hard play, and the winners left no ground for dispute as to their right to the championship. This game practically ends the basket ball for the season. The games have proved very interesting and profitable, as the Y. M. C. A. receipts attest, and have developed a picked team that would easily give a good account of itself in a match with any other team in the province.
