

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SYNOD

OF

THE DIOCESE OF RUPERT'S LAND.

The Synod was opened on Wednesday, May 23rd, 1877, by the celebration of Divine Service at half-past 10 o'clock A.M. in St. John's Cathedral.

Morning Prayer was read by the Revs. Canons Grisdale and O'Meara. The Lessons were read by the Rev. H. George and the Rev. S. Pritchard. The Epistle was read by the Ven. the Archdeacon of Cumberland.

The Bishop delivered the following Address instead of a Sermon:

REVEREND BRETHREN AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY:

When we look back on the past year we have great cause for thankfulness. That which has been for a long period such a courge to the country did not trouble us. There was a satisfactory harvest. Later on the energetic measures of the authorities, with God's blessing, preserved the Province from the small-pox that raged so virulently among the Icelandic immigrants. And when we look forward the prespects of the country are bright indeed. Immigrants are coming in large numbers from the older Provinces. The steamers are crowded. The result is very appreciable.—Winnipeg is growing with marvellous rapidity, and other small towns begin to rise up, while a considerable population is being scattered over the face of the whole Province. Various questions that retarded the progress of the country are being settled. The railways have not been built with all the despatch we could have wished, but they are constantly being pushed on, and there seems a probability of a greater advance this year than ever. The issuing of patents and the settlement of the reserves seem at length to be proceeding satisfactorily. We are no longer Isolated. By means of telegraphic communication, connecting us with the States and Canada, newspaper enterprise presents us daily with the latest telegrams from all parts of the world. The telegraph already has been carried for about a thousand miles to the west of us. The expenses of living are considerably less than they have been for some years. We can have in our houses the conveniences and luxurles of modern life. We may look forward to a near future when we shall have tasteful and substantial public buildings and residences and when the fertile land of this country will be buildings and residences and when the fertile land of this country will be made to beautify their surroundings.

But if as citizens we feel gladdened by the signs of progress and prosperity, we have further reason as Churchmen to feel thankful for the marked advance which our Church has made in the past year, and to be encouraged by it to renewed efforts. Within eighteen months five new churches have been built and opened for divine service (four of them being conservated), and another church has been considerably enlarged. Four other churches are in course of erection. These are all within the Province, and represent contributions from ourselves of over \$10,000. Outside the Province there has been a good deal done in the creation of buildings at mission vince there has been a good deal done in the erection of buildings at mission

There has also been a considerable advance made in contributions from the people towards the support of their ministers. One congregation

Is now entirely self-supporting. Most of our congregations will this year by paying part of their infinitet's salary. Still only a beginning has been made of this duty so important for the spiritual life of the people, as well as for our very existence as a Church, and for our possessing the power of expansion. I do not think there is much eal for animadversion on the past. Doubtless with the exercise of some self-denial and self-sacrifice more could have been done notwithstanding the difficulties that have been a burden, and not a few have spent in intersperance what would have filled the Church's treasury, and is given as freely to the Lord been a blessing to themselves. Still the loss of crops year after year, either wholly or to a great extent from the locusts, is a quite sufficient explanation of many shortcomings. And though in the past year there was not such loss, yet is was but the first year of prosperity, and the losses of preceding years have only in too many cases let burdens and difficulties. I think, then, that though much has not yet been done throughout our parishes for our chergy, yet that when we took at what has been done in the pat year for church-building, we are not without cause for hope.

But while inclined to look hopefully to the future, I cannot conceat from toyself the urgent necessity for immediate effort on the part of our property of the urgent as n Church in the great country that is opening before us.

We have made various efforts to obtain help from Canada, but without any permanent success. There is no spontaneous feeling in the Charch of Canada to give help beyond itself; and so, although we have been much aided by the kind contributions obtained through the visits of the Beshop of Saskatchewam, Archdeacon Cowley, and myself, yet there has not resulted any definite and appreciable income on which we cay depend in sétung on foot necessary missions. We are very much indebted to the earnest ciforts of Archdeacon Cowley ast year to awaken at inferest in Canada; but he had to contend with the additional difficulty that his visit was at a time of great commercial depression, which indeed still continues. Canon of Meara will be visiting Canada this summer, and will endeavor to secure a guaranteed sum for a mission to include Woodlands and Victoria, which is very pressing. There seems an especial obligation lying on the Caurch of Canada to help us in our missionary citorts in the fact that the scattered settlers whom we are anxious to supply with the means of grace come mainly from its own parishes. But then there should be a holy ambition to take a part in establishing the Church firmly in this great western land, and there should be a further incentive in the really noble efforts that are being made by other denominations.

But, after all, wealth in Canada is limited to a few places, and these have thrown upon them mainly the burden of their own work with constant cails for new missions. Our chief defendence, then, for outside help must for some time be on England, which has already so gener usly aided us. We are under judnite obligations to the religious societies of England, first of all to the Church Missionary Society, and then to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and the Coloniat and Continental Church Society. Our old parishes still receive each £100 or more from some English society. The condition of thereserves has been a great hindrance hitherto to their becoming selfsupporting. From the hand being tied up, adjacent settlements that would have increased the population of the old parish, or could have been worked with it, have been prevented. For our new mission work we have been obtaining only grants of £50 or £65. The mission board (in each case on a guaranteed sum of three hundred dollars from the people) provided in isionaries for two districts—Emerson and the Boyne—with salaries of \$800 each. But the sums guaranteed by the people have not yet been paid up. This increases the difficulty of starting another mission. I have asked the S. P. G. to give a grant towards the Woodlands and Victoria mission, and I am afraid it can only be taken up if the society complies. But we should also have a missionary in the extreme west of the Province, and we shall soon require one for the townships on the east side of the Red River. The blocesan Fund has hitherto met all its obligations; but if our missions are extended it will require to be taken up much more heartily and generally by our people. I think the time is rapidly approaching when we must work the mocesan Fun I in a different way, and review all our mission arrangements. The whole question will have to be most carefully considered, when we should assist, to what extent, and how the help of the people may be best obtained. And then there will have to be active and regular efforts for raising funds. All this points to the need of of an effective secretary for the massion board. Hitherto I have acted as the treasurer of the Synod Funds. But the work is extending and will evidently rapidly extend in the future if no disaster happen to the country, and we are equal to our opportunities. I purpose visiting England, if God will, next year, to be present at the Conference of Bishops that has been called by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and for other business mainly for the Diocese. I think that will be a proper occasion for my passing this work into other hands. I shall publish with the text Report of the Synod the funds that I have received since the last published report of such funds.

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oubved Resolutions have been sent down to you by the executive committee enabling me to convey the funds belonging to St. John's College and the Cathe Iral to their corporations, and the miningement of the Diocesan funds can pass to the secretary I have spoken of. I hope the whole subject will receive the thoughtful attention of the Synod during the coming year. The success of the mission work of the Chu ch will largely depend upon the business efficiency and qualifications for dealing will be copie of the secretary. I hope the appointment, if made, will be after the wisest consideration of the Synod. There will need to be some payment for his services, but an efficient secretary will soon repay any such cost.

The last Synod passed a resolution appropriating the Epiphany offertories and the disposable income of the Native Pastorate Fund to the Stoux miss on. I Issued a circular before the Epiphany collection this year explanding the position of the mission. I regret to say that the loss from the burning of the hay has proved, when everything has been taken into account, much more sections than was at first calculated. Between loss of wages, and of provisions prepared for the winter, the journeyings, and the cost of maintaining the cattle, I am afraid it has not been much under \$1,000. This will cause us a good deal of difficulty in completing the mission buildings as we destred.

The Bishop of Moosonee has expressed a desire for that part of the Native Pastorate Fund which has been contributed from York Factory being transferred to his Diocesun Funds. I pressure that it will be the wish of the Synod to fall in with his request on the understanding that the money will be kept in trust for the purposes for which it was obtained—the formation of a Native Pastorate Fund. The Executive Committee has agreed to a resolution for this and similar funds.

There is another question relating to the Clergy which I think should be receiving the attention of the Syned, and that Is the administration of the patronage of the Parishes, when they become self-supporting or independent of the aid of English Societies. I do not think it would be well that we should take any hasty action on the subject, for it is one on which opinions are very much divided; but it would be well that it should be receiving thought.

You have already learned from the report of the last Synod that the clauses in the Temporalities' Act incorporating the Synod were removed before the Act passed our local Legislature. No difficulty was raised in Parliament, but the Lieutenant-Governor considered that as part of the North-West Territories lay within the bounds of the Synod they required the sanction of a Dominion Act.

Accordingly an Act was introduced in the Dominion Parliament, and meeting with no opposition passed the House of Commons. But in the meantime the question had been raised in the Senate with respect to a similar Bitl, whether all such Acts of Incorporation were not reserved for the Local Legislatures, and the Judges gave this as their opinion when they were consulted. The consequence was that the Bitl could not be carried further, and as no solution of the difficulty has yet been made the matter must rest for the present. In accordance with the powers given to the Synod by the Temporallites' Act, the Executive Committee has prepared for the Synod to Canon on Parochial Organization, by which, among other things, the duties of Churchwardens and Vestrymen are defined.

The Executive Committee also recommends a Canon for Lay Readers which they trust will be useful.

A subject intimately connected with our Church work, and in which as a Church we must feel particularly interested, is that of Education. Not many years have passed since the schools in our Parishes throughout the Province were largely, indeed I may say mainly, dependent on the English Societies and friends that helped us. When, then, we look at the question of the support of our Ministers, we must not forget how much our people have already taken upon themselves in these past few years—years of many and special trials and difficulties—in raising salaries for schoolmasters, and in some cases building schools. I for one am not dissatisfied with the progress that has been made in Education. I do not mean that much progress has been made in raising the qualifications of masters and so in increasing the efficiency of teaching. That will follow. A great deal had to be done before that could be touched. And a good deal has been done. A very large number of districts has been formed. And an interest has been shown in raising salaries that is very hopeful. Efficiency in the school will no doubt react in encouraging an increase of salary; but the foundation of all efficiency depends on the qualification of the master, and though inspection of schools and examinations of teachers may materially aid, there must be first of all adequate compensation, and that we may be satisfied from what we have already seen is simply a matter of the growth and prosperity of the Province.

But while I see no doubt that as the country grows and means increase in it, we shall have good schools for the secular subjects of Education, it is with me a matter of regret that it seems so difficult to maintain hi our Protestant Schools the giving of a religious education. If the leading Protestant denominations were unable to accept the same translation of the Bible, or if they differed from each other on the essential truths that are found in the Apostles' Creed, then it might be hopeless to come to any understanding. But it is not so. There is nothing to prevent in our schools the daily accognition of the necessity of the Divine Blessing and of the Word of God as the source of all wisdom and knowledge in the opening and closing of the school by a simple form of prayer and the reading of God's Further, there is nothing that should prevent the learning of the Apostle's Creed, the Ten Commandments and the Lord's Prayer, and the use of a Catechism explaining these that would bring before the minds of the young the leading facts of revealed religion and of the Christian faith. sonally t should be prepared to go further, and whilst I do not think the Bible should be used for ordinary English or grammar lessons, yet I should see no greater difficulty, from a denominational point of view, in the reading of it and in examining on its facts and in Illustrating them, than in teaching English History. Tacknowledge the first importance in these days of a good secular education, and it is perfectly impossible for any separate Protestant denomination to undertake the work of efficiently supplying primary education in its parishes. Therefore we must endeavor to work heartily with the system that is established by the State, and, as far as we can, supply its deficiencies. For example, we might hold examinations in religious knowledge with prizes for excellence. But I make these remarks because I see no necessity for our Protestant schools being deprived of what I consider the precious privilege of religious teaching. If need not be compulsory. As in England, it might be restricted to the beginning or the close of the day's work, so that no child need be present whose parents disapproyed. But for various reasons 1 view with deep regret and suspicion its ab-God should be honored by our looking to His blessing and teaching. Religious teaching will rarely be effective unless given in the school in the week-day. Such teaching is necessary for setting up what is the only true standard of right and wrong. Above all, the tone of an education is to be dreaded from which the Word of God and religion are purposely shut out, by which they are made to seem subordinate. There is the danger of the en couraging of a spirit antagonistic to revealed religion. For there is not a little teaching on secular subjects at the present day by which facts and theories are presented in a way unfavorable to the truth of the Word of God.

As regards Higher Education, I hope we shall have the means of securing a sound and religious education. Sr. John's College continues in a satisfactory state as regards both its studies and its discipline, but termarter term we have suffered scriously from being unable to receive the applicants for admission. We should have at least room for thirty more boarders to meet the wants we have experienced in the past two years. The expenses of building and refitting since the first addition of a kitchen to old st. Cross have, from the piecenneal character of the alterations, been very great exceeding \$5,500. Though this has been mainly met by funds given to the College, stid the interest required to meet the purposes of these funds, though at a low rate, are a burden on the institution and are not met by the charges. The Rey. Canon Grisdale is going to England for the purposes of the Diocese, and his first effort will be to raise what may enable all such burdens to be paid off and the funds invested for the purposes of their trust.

We hope in the course of the summer to have another great addition to our institutions in the erection of St. John's College Ladies' School. This will supply a want that has been much felt. We owe this to the generous help of a friend of the C. M. Society, interested in us on account of the labors in this land of that Society. The Board of Governors tound that the comparatively small difference of cost would make it false economy not to erect a solid brick building with a stone basement. This will, however, make the building more costly than was first calculated. Every effort will be needed to meet the expense of the building, with the preparation of the grounds and the furnishing. It is to be hoped that every member of Synod personally and by frien's will do what he can to obtain funds.

Advancing from Higher School Education, I have to congratulate you on the passing of an Act last session creating the University of Manitoba. On the whole it has a constitution about as satisfactory as could be devised for the immediate condition of things. It unites all the Denominations and Colleges in the examinations for Degrees in Arts, Sciences, Medicine, and Law. By its recognition of denominational colleges with their own internal government secured to them, it satisfies those who feel the first importance of a religious character and control while it does not prevent the future affiliation of Colleges independent of such direction. It also at the same time secures for the different denominations, with the consent of their governing bodies, the power of establishing in their Colleges a Faculty for conferring Theological Degrees. I feel very much gratified with the result. All is gained that I desired.

The executive committee has prepared resolutions by which St. John's College will be fitted for taking fully its part in the University. These resolutions also alm at organizing a body of alumni to be associated with the college, who will, I trust, be a great encouragement and support to it. Knowing the deep affection felt by the numbers of many ancient schools for the school that nurtured them and encouraged their early citoris, I trust to see such a khadly feeling fostered in St. John's. Nothing, I am sure, could be more helpful for its usefulness.

I have now touched upon the different subjects which I have thought it well to bring before you; but I cannot close without expressing my deep thankfulness that in this Dlocese we have been kept from those divisions that separate brethren and distract the attention and efforts from what should be the work of the Church for Christ. Especially would I thank my Reverend Brethren the Clergy for the unbroken loyally of their conduct not to me but to the Church, and for their submission of any preferences they may have of their own to the use of the Dlocese. There is a great field opening before us here—needing men of faith and prayer—men of alving, self-denying spirit. In all our work we shall need the sympathy and cordial help of all our people. This can only be secured by every one forgetting self and sinking his own private conceits and joining hand in hand with his Brethren in working with all his might for his Lord. It we honor God and think first of exalting Christ in all our ministry and Christian life, then God will work in us and with us and we shall both enjer His peace ourselves and be blessed by Him in our labors for His Glory.

The Bishop was assisted in the administration of the Elements by Archdeacon Cowley, Canon Grisdale, and the Rev. H. George.

It was moved by the Rev. R. Young, seconded by the Rev. H. George, and carried with acclamation,

That this Synod desires to express its appreciation of the kind efforts on behalf of the Diocese rendered by the Ven. Archdeacon Cowley during his late visit to Canada and England. And while they are aware that many causes militated against a more successful appeal financially speaking, yet at the same time they cannot but feel that if no other result sprang from the Archdeacon's visit than the liberal offer which will shortly enable the erection of a suitable building for a Ladies' College, that a substantial benefit has been conferred not only on the Diocese and the Province, but the whole of the North-West.

The Canons prepared by the Executive Committee were then considered clause by clause and adopted in an amended form as follows—being afterwards agreed to unanimously as so amended.

CANON I.

PAROCHIAL ORGANIZATION.

- 1. The Cathedral as the Church of the Diocese having the seat of the Bishop shall, for the purposes of this Canon except as regards its Parochial boundaries, be considered Extra-Parochial and be governed by its own Statutes.
- 2. Any District where services are performed and a congregation organized according to clause 4 of the Constitution of the Synod may be erected by the Bishop into a Parish having defined limits with a Clergyman in charge, who shall be called the Incumbent, and may be collated or instituted and inducted with such forms as may be enacted by the Synod, or till such forms be enacted, as the Bishop may appoint. But such District shall not include any part of an existing Parish without the consent of the Incumbent and the majority of the Vestry of such existing Parish: provided that if such consent be refused the Bishop may refer the matter to the Executive Committee, and the Executive Committee shall on full consideration of the case report to the Bishop, who may then carry out

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n of out the division of the existing Parish if the Executive Committee report in favor of that measure, but not otherwise.

- 3. The Bishop shall appoint a Commission to determine the boundaries of the existing l'arishes as defined by the late or the present Bishop of Rupert's Land, or where there has been no such definition, by custom; and the boundaries so determined shall, if approved by the Bishop, be the boundaries of such Parish; but if the Bishop think it advisable he may remit any part of the report to the Executive committee, whose decision respecting the boundaries shall be final; and the boundaries of Parishes so defined shall be recorded in a book to be kept in the Diocesan Registry.
- 4. The Bishop may at any time, if he think it advisable, change the boundaries of a Parish or Parishes on the petition of the Incumbent and Vestry of the Parish or Parishes interested.
- 5. Whenever a Parish shall become entirely self-supporting, it shall be called a Rectory.
- 6. Every male member of the Church being of full age and who shall have subscribed the following declaration of church membership, is entitled to act as a Parishioner or Vestryman.

DECLARATION.

I do hereby declare that I am an attendant at Church and member of the Church of England or Protestant Episcopal Church in Rupert's Land.

- 7. In every Parish there shall be two Churchwardens selected from the communicants,—one to be appointed by the Minister, and one to be selected by the Parishioners, and not less than four nor more than twelve Vestrymen elected by the Parishioners.
- 8. The Incumbent, every clergyman licensed to the cure and regularly officiating, and churchwardens shall be ex-officio members of the Vestry.
 - 9. The Churchwardens and Vestrymen shall be

annually chosen at a meeting of the Parishioners on Easter Monday, or as soon afterwards as may be convenient.

- 10. Notification of the election of Churchwardens and Vestrymen shall be given by the chairman of the meeting to the Secretary of the Synod.
- 11. Churchwardens and Vestrymen shall continue in office until their successors are appointed.
- 12 If the office of the Churchwarden chosen by the Parishioners, or of a Vestryman, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, a meeting of the Parishioners shall be called, as soon as may be convenient, to elect some other fit person to the vacant office.
- 13. If the office of the Churchwarden appointed by the minister shall at any time become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the minister to appoint some other fit person to the vacant office.
- 14. As soon as may be after such appointment the minister shall make a return in writing to the Vestry, of the name of the person chosen by him to fill the vacant office, and shall cause a written notice of the said appointment to be forthwith attached to the church door.
- 15. Every person elected to fill the office of Churchwarden or Vestryman shall, before acting in such office, sign the following declaration:

I declare that I will faithfully and truly execute the office of within my Parish, to the best of my skill and knowledge.

DUTIES OF CHURCHWARDENS.

- 16. It shall be the duty of the Churchwardens, and they are hereby empowered—
- a. To see that Divine service is decently and regularly performed; to have, jointly with the Incumbent,

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custody of all monies belonging to the Parish; to procure all things requisite for Divine service, and for the supply and safe custody of Parochial Records; to have the joint disposal with the Incumbent of all offertories, except on days when collections are ordered by the Synod, when they shall be assigned as directed by the Synod.

In the case of any disagreement between the churchwardens and the Incumbent respecting the disposal of the offertories, there shall be an appeal to the Bishop of Rupert's Land as Ordinary, who shall finally decide

the question.

- b. To collect the offertories and have them entered in a book kept for the purpose; to keep the parochial accounts, and to pay all sums received for the specified purposes.
- c. To attend on the visitation of the Bishop or his Commissary or the Archdeacon, whenever cited, and in case of the death of the Minister or his inability through sickness to perform his duties, to report the same to the Bishop.
- d. To keep the fabric of the Church and its appurtenances, in repair and insured, subject to the direction of the Bishop or Archdeacon.
- e. To maintain good order and quiet in and about the Church or place of worship, and in the adjoining roads and public places, during Divine Worship; and, if necessary, prosecute all offences against that good order and quiet.
- f. To take care as far as possible that the Parishioners are accommodated in the church.
- g. To give attention to the Parsonage and grounds during any vacancy of the cure, communicating when advisable with the trustee or trustees of the property.

DUTIES OF VESTRYMEN.

17. It shall be the duty of Vestrymen and they are hereby empowered:—

- a. To assist the Church Wardens in the collection of offertories and contributions for general or special purposes; and in taking care, as far as in them lies, that the clergyman's stipend is regularly paid, according to Diocesan regulation.
- b. To see that the yearly accounts, duly audited, are laid before the Parochial meeting, and that a copy of the audited accounts are transmitted to the Secretary of the Synod.
- c. In Vestry meeting to deal with all matters committed to them by the Synod or other authority, to consider and determine upon whatever may be remitted to them by the Minister or Churchwardens, and by resolution to express their wishes on any subject to the Minister and Churchwardens.
- 18. The Parishioners are to be duly summoned for consultation and co-operation when any large outlay of money is proposed, or when means must be raised to meet such an outlay.
- 19. After the accounts have been audited, any balance in hand must be handed over to the new Churchwardens, together with the Church goods, inventory and terrier
- 20. The following books are to be kept by the Parish:—
- a. A book for entering the minutes and resolutions of all Parish and Vestry meetings.
 - b. A book for the Parish accounts.
- c. A book for entering the amount of alms and collections in Church.
- d. A book for entering all services that take place in Church with the name of the officiating elergyman, if not one of the clergy of the parish signed by himself if possible.
- e. A register of the names of Church members resident in the Parish, distinguishing those who have

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s resihave signed the declaration of Church membership, and those who are communicants.

21. An inventory shall be kept of all Church goods belonging to the Parish and a terrier of the lands.

PAROCHIAL AND VESTRY MEETINGS.

- 22. In every Parish there shall be a meeting of the Parishioners on Easter Monday or as soon as possible afterwards, for the purpose of receiving and passing the year's accounts and of appointing and electing. Churchwardens and Vestrymen.
- 23. The Incumbent shall be the convener of all Parish or Vestry meetings; if there be no clergyman, the churchwarden or churchwardens shall convene such meeting.
- 24. The Incumbent shall call a meeting of the Parishioners or of the Vestry, on receiving a written requisition to that effect, signed by a majority of the Vestry.
- 25. The presence of at least one-third of the members of the Vestry including one of the Churchwardens, shall be necessary to constitute a meeting of the Vestry, for the due exercise of its powers.
- 26. Notice of every meeting of Parishioners must be given in writing or printing, signed by the convener and affixed to the Church door, at least three days, including one Sunday, before the day on which the meeting is to be held.
- 27. The notice must state the time and place at which, and the purpose for which the meeting is to be held; and shall be framed in the following form:—

FORM OF NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that a meeting of the Parishioners of Parish will be held on day of at o'clock in the for the purpose of at which time and place all male members who have signed the declaration of Church membership, being

of the age of 21 years are entitled to attend and to vote.

Dated this day of 18 Convener.

- 28. Similar notice shall also be given by the obciating elergyman, in the Church, on a Sunday before the meeting.
- 29. At a meeting of the Parishioners duly convened, the votes of those only who are registered shall be recorded, and their decision shall bind those who are absent.
- 30. The Clergyman is ex-officio cheirman of all Parish or Vestry meetings. If the cure be vacant, or if it be not vacant, but if the Incumbent be absent, the Minister's Churchwarden shall be chairman.
- 31. The chairman has the usual powers appertaining to the chairman of any public meeting. It is his duty to remain in the chair until the business is concluded, or the meeting adjourned: to keep the meeting when necessary to the specified purpose of its assembling, and to decide all questions of order. He shall have the same right of voting as if not in the chair and an equality of votes shall be considered as negativing a proposition.
- 32. The right of adjournment is not in the Incumbent or any other person, or chairman, nor in the Churchwardens, nor Vestry; but in the whole assembly; and the question of adjournment must be decided by a majority of votes.
- 33. Minutes of the proceedings and resolutions of every Parish or Vestry meeting shall be correctly entered in a book, and unless the minutes were read and approved at the close of the preceding meeting the first business of every meeting shall be the reading, passing, and signing by the chairman, of such minutes of the preceding meeting.
- 34. Every Parish or Vestry meeting shall be opened with prayer.
- 35. Incumbent in this Canon shall include Curate in charge.

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CANON II.

OF LAY READERS.

Under the circumstances of the Diocese with a scattered population in large Parishes and Missions, it is very desirable that Lay Readers should be more generally employed than is now the case; such Lay Readers shall be recommended to the Bishop by at least two licensed clergymen of the Diocese and have either a general license for the Diocese or a special license for a particular Parish or Mission. They shall not be employed in any Parish or Mission but at the request or with the consent of the Incumbent of said Parish or Mission and they shall be entirely under his control and direction; and shall be removed at his request; they may be set apart for the service at such place and with such service as the Bishop may appoint.

OFFICE OF LAY READER:

The office of lay reader shall be to read the word of God in the congregation, and in the absence or illness of the clergyman to read in the congregation any appointed portions of the Morning and Evening Prayer, not including the absolution or any part of the communion service, and such sermons as he shall be duly authorized to use; or to preach or expound the word, if he be specially licensed thereto by the Bishop; and generally to aid in Parochial and Mission work and perform such functions as it is competent for a Lay member of the Church to perform, and as he shall be directed to discharge, under the authority of the Bishop. When officiating he may wear the surplice.

The following resolutions of the Executive Committee relating to St. John's College, the Native Pastorate Fund, sale and transfer of lands, etc., held in trust by the Bishop of Rupert's Land, and St. John's College Ladies' School, were then considered and adopted as follows:

RESOLUTIONS RESPECTING ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE.

Resolved, 1. That the Synod, in accordance with the power conferred on it by 40 Vict., cap. 11, sec. 31, sanc-

tions the formation by the Council of St. John's College of a Theological Faculty for the granting of the Theological Degrees of Bachelor of Divinity and Doctor of Divinity, and for examining for those Degrees, and authorizes the Council from time to time to draw ap such Statutes or make such rules and regulations with respect to the studies and examinations for such Degrees and the granting of the Degrees as shall seem meet to it.

- 2. That the Council draw up Statutes for conferring by examination or otherwise on deserving students of St. John's College, St. John's College School, and Mr. Macallum's Academy, who have been at least two years in the college or school, the title of Associate in Arts as laid down in Statute I. of the Statutes of St. John's College.
- 3. That a body of Alumni be constituted in connection with St. John's College to consist of
 - a. The members of the Council;
 - b. The Honorary Fellows of the College;
- c. The Theological and other Graduate Members of St. John's College;
 - d. Associates in Arts of St John's College.
- 4. That the Council draw up Statutes providing for the admission of a Graduate of the University who has not graduated from St. John's College, or for a Graduate of another University, as a Graduate Member of St. John's College.
- 5. That the Council draw up Statutes for the management of the Library of the College and for determining the conditions under which books may be read or taken out of the Library by Alumni of the College or Licensed Clergymen in the Diocese, and what books shall not be given out.
- 6. That an Alumnus of the College shall enjoy the rights of an Alumnus by an annual payment of \$1, or for a year from the date of the payment of \$1, or he shall enjoy the rights of an Alumnus for life by mak-

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\$1, or or he was ing one payment of \$15 But that such payment shall not prevent the charge of an additional fee or the requiring the lodging of a sum of money as caution money for the use of any Library, Museum, or Laboratory, or other privilege involving cost to the College.

That an Alumnus paying the annual sum of \$1 shall only have the rights of an Alumnus for one year, and that if the annual payment should be increased above \$1, such person, though he may have been paying for some years \$1 a year, shall be liable to the increased rate.

That one half of these payments, whether annual or for life, go to a fund to be called the Library Fund, the interest of which shall be set apart for the payment of a Librarian, the obtaining of books, or other purposes connected with the Library; and the other half to a fund to be called the College Fund, the interest of which shall be set apart for the payment of a Secretary for the College, printing, and other official expenses of the College.

7. That the Council draw up Statutes for the election of four Alumni who shall form four of the sixteen members of Council mentioned in Statute II. of the College Statutes. That these four Alumni be elected by those of the Alumni of St. John's College who are members of the Church of England or Protestant Episcopal Church in Rupert's Land and of the full age of 21 years from among themselves. That the election be made by voting papers to be given in to the Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor of St. John's College before 9 o'clock A. M. on the 1st November, or if the 1st November be a Sunday, before 9 o'clock A. M. on the 2nd November. That on the 1st November, 1877, four be elected, of whom the two having the higher number of votes shall hold office for four years and the other two for two years, and that thereafter there shall be an election of two on the 1st of November or if the 1st be a Sunday, then on the 2nd of November every two years to hold office for four years. That in case of an equality of votes the senior in standing in the College shall be elected, and if the standing be the same then the Chancellor shall determine the elected member.

That in case of a vacancy during the term of office of any such elected Alumnus an election shall be made of an Alumnus to complete his period of office, such election to be made by voting papers to be given into the Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor before a time to be named by him.

That the Council shall by Statute or regulation make all necessary arrangements for the nomination of candidates, the form of voting papers, the time of sending out the papers, and whatever is required for carrying this resolution into effect.

- 8. That the Council draw up a Statute for the holding of the 1st November, All Saints' Day, on which day St. John's College was re-opened in 1866, as an annual Commemoration Day for the College.
- 9. That the Council be authorized to draw up Statutes from time to time as may be required for the studies and conduct as well of general students of the University as of Theological students being at the time members of St. John's College under the provisions of Statute III. of the Statutes of St. John's College respecting Students, and that such Statutes shall include such regulations as may be deemed necessary for the wearing of an Academical dress, for attendance at Chapel, and Lectures, and the College meals, for hours of being in rooms whether in College or lodgings, for licensing lodgings, for regulating or prohibiting, asoccasion may demand, the practising or attending games or amusements and attending public entertainments, for coming into residence and receiving an exeat, for obtaining leave of absence, or being allowed an Ægrotat.

NATIVE PASTORATE FUND.

That the sums contributed to the Native Pastorate Fund from York Factory, the Youcan Mission, Fort Simpson, Devon, Stanley, Fairford, and Fort Alexander, with any proportionate accumulation be set aside as Endowment Funds for those Missions, and where those Missions are in any other Diocese than that of Rupert's Land, the money be transferred to the Bishop

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SALE AND TRANSFER OF LANDS ETC., HELD IN TRUST BY THE BISHOP OF RUPERT'S LAND.

1. At the request of the Incumbent or Curate in charge of any Parish or Mission stating in writing that it is his own wish and that of the majority of the Vestry that the Bishop of Rupert's Land may sell, exchange, alienate, or mortgage real estate in the Province of Manitoba held in trust by the said Bishop of Rupert's Land for the benefit of the incumbent or for other ecclesiastical uses in connection with such Parish or Mission, the Bishop of Rupert's Land may, if he think it desirable, bring the said request before the Executive Committee of the Synod, and on obtaining the sanction of the said Executive Committee may sell, exchange, alienate or mortgage such real estate on such terms as may be agreed upon, and the deed must be signed by the Bishop, the Incumbent or Curate in charge, one of the Churchwardens and two members of the Executive Committee not having any interest in the transaction each signature being attested by a witness, and where such real estate was given as an Endowment the proceeds of the sale must be invested for the purposes of the Endowment.

2. With the consent of the Dean and Chapter of St. John's Cathedral and the Vestry of St. John's Cathedral give separately it shall be lawful for the Bishop of Rupert's Land to convey a portion of the Cathedral land not exceeding three acres in extent to the Corporation of St. John's College for the purposes of St. John's College Ladies' School; and also with the said consent to transfer to the said Corporation of St. John's College on such terms as may be agreed upon by the said parties and the Bishop of Rupert's Land, all the Cathedral land lying on the river side of the public road and of the private road from the public road past the Cathedral to Bishop's Court

3. It shall be lawful for the Bishop of Rupert's Land, with the consent of the Executive Committee, to transfer to the Corporation of St John's College all real estate, bonds, stock, and other securities held in trust by him for the benefit of Professors or any others connected with St. John's College, or for the purposes of the College, and if necessary to seek an Act from the Local Legislature legalizing such transfer.

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4. It shall be lawful for the Bishop of Rupert's Land, with the consent of the Executive Committee, to transfer to the Corporation of the Dean and Chapter of St. John's Cathedral all real estate, bonds, stock, and other securities held in trust by him for the b nefit of the Dean, Canons, or any others connected with the Cathedral, or for the purposes of the Cathedral, and if necessary to seek an Act from the Local Legislature legalizing such transfer.

ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE LADIES' SCHOOL.

That whereas a School has been e-tablished called the St. John's College Ladies' School in connection with St. John's College with the intention of having its property vested in St. John's College; and whereas the said School is, according to its foundation, to be governed by a Board of which the Bishop of Rupert's Land is President and the Rev. Henry Wright, Honorary Secretary of the C. M. S., is during his pleasure Vice-President, and consisting besides the said Bishop of Rupert's Land and the Rev H. Wright of twelve other members, of whom six are to be elected by the Council of St. John's College, provided that the Professor of Exegetical Theology shall ex-officio be always one of these six—and six by the Finance Committee of the C. M. S

And whereas it is desirable that this arrangement should be sanctioned by the Synod as the Body entitled, with the consent of the Bishop of Rupert's Land, to draw up Statutes for St. John's College, therefore, at the request of the Council of St. John's College and of

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ement entitlud, to re, at ud of the Board of Governors of St. John's College Ladies' School, the Synod accepts the said St. John's College Ladies' School as a Collegiate School in connection with St John's College, and authorizes the Council of St. John's College to accept the Trust of the property of the said School and to act as a Corporation on its behalf: provided, however, that the whole management and control of the School shall be vested in the said Board of Governors, who shall draw up Statutes or Ordinances for the appointment and continuance in office of Governors, for the appointment of Teachers, and for whatever is considered needful for the welfare of the School: provided always, that any Statutes bearing on the Board of Governors shall require the separate sanction of the Council of St. John's College and the Finance Committee of the C. M. S., and that no change shall be made in the composition of the Board of Managers without the sanction of the aforesaid Rev. Henry Wright during his life, and afterwards of the Church Missionary Society of England.

And whereas it may be considered adviseable to incorporate the said Board of Governors and to transfer to such Corporation the property held in trust for the School by St. John's College, it shall be lawful for the Executive Committee ...ith the consent of the Rev. H Wright, to seek for an Act of the Legislature for that purpose.

The two following Resolutions were then adopted unanimously:

1. That in the opinion of this Synod the Diocese of Rupert's Land wherever occurring in the rules for the administration of the clergy, widows and orphans' fund must be understood now as meaning the l'rovince of Rupert's Land, and that this Synod empowers the Bishop of Rupert's Land with the advice of the Executive Committee to take such measures as may be necessary for legally securing this with all other changes thereby made necessary and for the government and control of the fund being committed to the Provincial Synod.

2. Whereas the patents for two lots of land, each about 3 chains in breadth one in St. Paul's Parish formerly the property of David Mitchell and the other in St. Clement's, formerly the property of Charles Donald, which were bought by the Bishop of Rupert's Land with his own money for himself have by mistake been made out in favour of the Bishop of Rupert's Land and his successors—leave is hereby given to the Bishop of Rupert's Land to transfer the same to himself personally.

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On motion of the Ven. Archdeacon Cowley, it was unanimously resolved with acclamation, that the Bishop be respectfully equested to convey the thanks of the Synod to the generous founder of St. John's College Ladies' School.

On the motion of the Rev. Canon Grisdale, it was Resolved, That the thanks of the Synod be given to the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge for their grant to the Ladies' School though without a precedent, and to their numerous grants to the Diocese for Churches, Students, and Missionary Printing.

It was moved by the Rev. Canon O'Meara, seconded by the Hen, the Chief Institute

by the Hon. the Chief Justice.

Resolved, That the Synod authorizes the Rev. Canon Grisdale to set forth the needs of the Diocese in England, and wishes him the best success.

On motion of the Rev. W. C. Pinkham, seconded by

the Rev. O. Fortin, and

Resolved, That with the view of interesting the various congregations throughout the Diocese in those who are to be called to the sacred office of the Ministry, and to afford the members of the Church generally an opportunity of offering special Prayer to God for His blessing upon all such, the Synod hereby respectfully requests that as far as practicable the names of the candidates for Holy Orders on the Bishop's list be transmitted to as many of the Clergy as possible at least one month before the day of ordination, to be by them published at each place where they officiate.

It was moved by the Rev. Canon O'Meara, seconded by Rev. M. Jukes, and

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Resolved, That the question of a Special Form of Service for use in Mission Services be remitted to the Executive Committee.

It was moved by the Rev. O. Fortin, seconded by Mr. O'Reilly, and

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed for defraying the printing and general expenses of the Synod.

On the motion of the Rev. Canon Grisdale seconded

by the Rev. H. George, it was

Resolved, That the earnest thanks of the Synod be offered to the Bishop for his excellent address to the Synod, and that his Lordship be requested to publish it in the proceedings of the Synod.

Moved by the Rev. W. C. Pinkham, seconded by the Rev. Canon Grisdale, and

Resolved, That whereas it is expedient that there should be obtained from time to time a full and accurate statistical view of the state of the Church in this Diocese, it is hereby ordered that every Minister having the care of souls shall immediately after Easter in each year prepare in the form and manner hereafter prescribed, and cause to be delivered to the Secretary of the Synod, a statistical Parochial Report stating the number of families and individuals belonging to the Church, of communicants, and of children attending day or Sunday schools or under catechetical instruction in his Parish or Mission for the time being; also the number of persons who have been baptized or confirmed, and of marriages and burials that have taken place, together with the amount of contributions for Church or other objects that have been made during the year ending the Easter previous, and so on; and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Synod to condense and combine in one report the aforesaid particulars in the Parochial Reports, and to print the same together with such other information as the Bishop or the Executive Committee of the Synod may from time to time furnish as an Appendix to the Synod Report, and copies thereof shall be circulated by him under the sanction of the Bishop.

The Synod was closed by the Bishop with the Benediction.
