Phillips sent out for his lunch, which was got from McConkey's, and served in a compartment used as a waiting room, adjoining Crown Attorney Curry's office. Phillips must have had a poor appetite. A quantity of succulent pork and luscious turkey, mashed potato, and other eatables suggested that the morning's work of the cheft had been fruitless, so far as Joseph Phillips was concerned. Sliver-plated pots contained a fluid which, during an inspection at 5 o'clock last evening, it would have taken an expert to de-

During the dinner hour Phillips was in the custody of Inspector Johnston.

Phillips Searched.

At the close of the afternoon's proceedings, Detective Twigs, acting under directions, searched the prisoner in the detective's office. Phillips submitted to the process and behaved courteously to the officer, offering, however, the remark that they would have a pretty hard thing to bring home. No documents of any importance was found on Phillips, but he had from \$7 to \$9.

In what manner of conveyance Phillips was half way home. The fire was discovered shortly after 12 o'clock of the same night, but the body was not found until the place was in ruins. It is well-known by neighbors that Parks, who lived alone, frequently engaged Italians living in a box car near Proton to saw wood for him.

The Italians do not work, but seem to be waiting for summer. Parks gave and one of them a ride to his farm several days before his death. He left him alone at the house and went to a neighbor's for some milk. When he returned the Italian had gone, and he missed his 32 calibre revolver.



Lord Granard, agreeing on behalf of the board of trade to give the figures, said there was no doubt that previous to the establishment of the Canadian tariff the general tendency of our trade with Canada was to diminish, but since 1896-7 there had been a gradual increase of imports, not only from this country, but from nearly all countries into Canada. It was really a case of general prosperity. The increase in imports from this country might have been greater but for the effect of the Canadian tariff, which tended to discourage the importation of manufactured goods more than the importation tured goods more than the importation of raw materials.

British goods to the value of £2 4s per head of population were consumed by Canada—the corresponding figures for Australia being £5 12s, and for New Zealand £8 17s. Canada imported goods worth £31,000,000 from the United States, and exported to that country products worth £14,000,000. Bills Respecting Agricultural an-Hortiaultural Societies Are Brought Down.

During a busy session of the legisature yesterday a score or more bilis passed the second reading and committee stage. Several government bills vere read a first time.

Hon. Mr. Foy had a bill re mining corporations. Under the old mining law there were two exceptions, which have been abolished. Mining companies were permitted to issue shares at a discount, and sometimes these sold as low as 5c and 10c. It was also pro-vided under the old act that the party buying mining shares assumed no liability beyond the first payment. Mining companies will now be on the same basis as other joint stock companies. During the last ten days the government has refused to grant charters to ment has refused to grant charters to mining companies. The new law will Agricultural Bills.

Hon, Nelson Monteith introduced two bills, one respecting horticultural societies and one respecting agricultural associations. The main feature of the act respecting horticultural societies is that it takes all such associations out of relationship to the agricultural societies and puts them in their own class. It provides for their indepen-dent organization in towns, cities and incorporated villages, and, instead of sharing with the township in the par-ticipation of the grant, \$8000 is set aside subject to division among the COMMITTEEMAN NOTINACCORD horticultural societies of horticultural societies are fully set forth in section 9 of the act, and do not materially differ from those of the previous act. OBJECTION TO SUNDAY LAW BASED ON MISGONCEPTION

Lord's Day Alliance Replies to Criticism of Mr. Fitzpatrick's Bill.

The Lord's Day Alliance has pre pared a reply to the criticisms of the Sabbath observance bill. It says in

The criticisms so far offered for the nost part are of three classes; first, those based on misconception of the purpose and import of the measure; second, those resting on religious conviction, e.g., the Jews and other Saturdarians on the one hand and infidels and their sympathizers on the other; and third, those of corporate financial interests which would be affected by

The Jews and Adventists and infidels consisting of one per cent, of the peo-ple of Canada, can hardly hope to overide the will of the other ninety-nine cent. It is unreasonable to that they should. There is one day in the week that in Canada can be protected as a rest day, and that is Sunday. And if each citizen is to enjoy the liberty of rest one day in seven it is essential that we have a law of rest for all citizens.

The corporate interests, transporta-tion and industrial, have heretofor been a law unto themselves, and hav very frequently been requiring their employes to work on Sunday when there was no necessity and no excusfor so doing, excepting only the pros pect of larger dividends. The govern ment's bill provides for the continument's bill provides for the continu-ance of passenger traffic and of live stock and perishable goods. It may be found necessary to add "wheat' to this list to avoid congestion from the west. But who will defend th unhindered hauling on Sundays of such "perishable goods" as steel rail and coal and building stone and ties and using Sunday for the clearing out of yards along the lines? of yards along the lines?

etc., pumping out and ventilation of mines and other work that modern industry finds "necessary" are allowed in terms of the government's bill.

Based on Misconception.

But most of the opposition thus far expressed is based on misconception as to how the bill's provisions will affect amusement, recreation, getting about, etc. Even the Montreal city council makes childish and stupid blunders along this line, Sunday cars are not affected by the bill, nor trains nor steamers that "convey travelers." Therefore people can, after the bill be-comes law, get about when and where and as much as they please, just as they do now. The only restriction the bill puts on travel is "excursions for pleasure," that is, special trips gaths with needless and unbecoming hilarity and very often drunkenness and rowdyism, such as usually accompany "excursions." 



"Look at that plaster," was a remark made by one of the workmen yesterday as he picked up a piece of this material he was assiduously engaged in tearing down. "You don't see plaster of that kind these days." The World scribe became inquisitive. He handled the substance, which had more the appearance of cement than the present day lime and sand. We had to leave school as soon as we were able to work in those days, and then after we found we were feficient in knowledge we drifted back to the old school in winter when there was nothing else to do. Mr. Fraser, the schoolmaster, was an army officer from the old country. He handled the schoolmaster, was an army officer from the old country. He handled the stood no nonsense, I can tell you. Two or three of those budding into manhood were delegated by Mr. Fraser to teach the smaller children, and I think the education of those days was just as solid as it is to-day with all the frills. The fight for the building of he school was put up by John Davis, who was elected one of the first trustees. He had experienced lifficulty in getting thru life with a limited education and his great aim when he came to years of discretion was to see that the workingman's child was well provided for in this matter. The late Mr. Davis had a difficult contest to get a school located at Davisville, but he succeeded in getting the York Township Council to issue debentures for the purchase of a lot and building

after several years of hard work.

The school was designed by the father of the present city health officer,
Dr. Sheard, and erected by John Damp.
The opening service was conducted by
Dr. Ryerson on a Sunday the occasion Dr. Ryerson on a Sunday, the occasion being a red letter day in the history of the then village. For several years the church denominations were allow-ed the use of the building on successive Sundays for services, and a union Sunday school was held there for several years. A large tablet placed in the west wall contained the names of the three first trustees, John Davis, D. Mathieson and B. Hammond, Each of these has gone over to the great majority. John Davis was the founder of the Davisville Pottery; D. Mathieson was a merchant tallor in Toronto, who lived in a fine house in Deer Park, and B. Hammond kept a general Atore on the Davenport-road. The tablet will be preserved and placed in



At first glance it might appear that the owner of this account book was in the habit of dodging the conductor's box, but this was not the case. The fact is the fares were saved by riding a bicycle instead of paying the street car company for comings and goings and the fares were contributed on rainy days when the wheeling was unpleasant. On August 6th, 1905, he made an entry against "Bloor and McCaul" as follows: "One fare—last of quarter's worth of tickets bought June 2nd." 


