

There cannot be any doubt that but politically and imperially. Hitherto the movement of British capital to the Dominion has been more along the line of loan and bond flotations, but the time is ripe for the appearance on the scene of the individual investor in the stocks and shares of Canadian companies, if the necessary requirements for the gaining of his confidence are

This condition marks the great, and for Canada, the invaluable difference, between the British and United States forms of surplus investments. Britain offers no adequate scope within itself for the employment of its constantly growing capital, and certainly cannot devote it to an unlimited increase of its own productive power. Hence its willingness to support the industrial development of new countries, more particularly those with whose government it is in sympathy and in whose administration it finds ground for confidence. But the United States has not yet reached even approximately the stage when its capitalists can no longer find opportunities for investment within its own bounds. A certain amount of money, finds its way abroad, but usually in support of enterprises owned and controlled by United States companies and established largely for the benefit of United States industries. Examples of this are to be found everywhere in Canada, where most valuable minerals, so far as yet discovered, are controlled from the United States, and are acting as feeders for United States manufacturers. How much more profitable would it be for the Dominion, had these rich ore deposits been utilized, as they should have been, for the creation of Canadian industries and the identification of the finished products with the country of their origin! A wise policy can prevent any future foolishness of this kind, and the sooner it comes the bet-

THE RAILWAYS AND THE BOARD OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS

Cheap power and the ability to place our produce and our manufac-ured goods in our local markets and in the markets of the world on as ble terms as our competitors, are the two things necessary make this country great and prosperous. Cheap transportation is the key that will unlock the door that opens the way to an increase in, and continuation of, the prosperity which we are now enjoying. Canada is on the eve of a great development. Ontario is the manufacturing centre, and must of necessity continue to be the manufacturing centre, to supply the requirements of the Dominion. We should see that every portion of this province is placed in a position to get the full benefit of the prosperity which is before us, and no distinction should be made as between local and competitive territory.

Why should a farmer or manufacturer located at a local station have pay more for the transportation of his traffic than one who is at a com-

It has always been the policy of the Canadian railways to favor com-etitive points as against local territory; consequently, the farmer or nanufacturer located at a local station is placed at a disadvantage, and pays relatively higher rates for the carriage of his traffic than his neighbor who happens to be situated at a station reached by two lines of railway. We contend that this policy is absolutely indefensible, and that its continuation has done more to retard the growth and development of the country than any other influence, inasmuch as it prevents the expansion of trade

and compels the farmer to sell his produce at home, instead of giving him the benefit of markets farther away.

One of the prominent officials of a leading Canadian railway recently informed the board of railway commissioners that they were compelled to have the compelled to the compelle ffic on a relatively lower basis than they charged for local ss, stating that if it were not for the thru traffic they would be compelled to advance their rates on local shipments, as there was not sufficient local trade to maintain their lines. Under existing conditions, this statement may be true, and will continue to be true just so long as the carrying companies stand in their own light. Let the Canadian railways give us the same facilities, and the same rates for local business that they now impose on thru traffic, and there will be such an increase in their local trade that it will tax their energies to the utmost to take care of it. Let them continue the low rates on thru traffic—we have no quarrel with them for giving cheap transportation—but we should demand that our own produce and our own manufactured goods shall reach the markets of the world on as favorable terms as the commodities which they are hauling right east our doors, coming from a foreign country, and which are directly cometitive with our own shipments.

We are told that our present prosperity is due to the carrying com-panies, and that if it were not for them we would still be in the back-woods. "Look what we have done for Canada," is their cry, but they nake no mention of what Canada has done for them. The railways are make no mention of what Canada has done for them. The railways are entitled to all the credit due them for what they have done. We have no fault to find with them on that score—it is what they have done "to Canada" of which we complain. The men who are in the habit of using that phrase, if they should happen to be in official positions on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway twenty years from this date, would, no doubt, say: "Look what the Grand Trunk Pacific has done for Canada," quite overlooking the fact that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway owes its existence to Canada and Canadians

The Province of Ontario has a large amount of money invested in the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific rallways. True, we have not any paper stock to show for our investment, but we are just as much entitled to a dividend on our money as the old country stockholder whose name appears as a shareholder on the books of these companies. We are not anxious to have this dividend paid in cash, but it is surely not too much to expect some return in the shape of cheap transportation for our produce and manufac-

We have no desire to hamper the great railway interests of the country but, at the same time, we do not want the great railway interests of the country, the still greater industrial interests of the country. It should be the aim of the board of railway commissioners to protect and develop the commerce of this country, and to see that we are not discriminated against in the matter of transportation charges.

matter of transportation charges. We should demand the equalization of rates from all portions of the province. There is no excuse for giving favors to one part of the country, when such a course retards the progress of another section, which is equally deserving of protection, and the board of railway commissioners should see to it that no difference is made as between local and competitive territory.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.-A deputation from Montreal City Council arrived in the capital to-day to interview Sir Wilfrid Laurier in regard to the sale, lease, harnois Canal, and asked that, in the vent of the government making over the Beauharnois Canal to any person or company, they require a guarantee that the city shall be furnished at the lowest possible rate with all the waterpower that the canal can produce, and that the city may need.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressed himself as favorable to the leasing of available power on the Beauharnois Canal to one of the municipalities, on condition that the latter should expend \$60,000 the first year on urgent improvements, \$20,000 a year to maintain the canal for the purpose of navigation, for which it is still required to a certain extent, and \$100,000 for the installation of necessary plant to take full advantage of the available power.

If the power was subsequently leased to any company, the latter would first have to guarantee to furnish Montreal, Beauharnois and Valleyfield with whatever power they require at market prices, subject to approval. The prevailing price for power in Montreal now is from \$25 to \$30. The price of power from the Beauharnois would be based on the cost of delivering the current in the metropolis. The canal would ultiamtely cease to have any value for purposes of navigation, and when this time came there was no reason why it should not be sold altogether. waterpower that the canal can pro-

In the harney factory there were not more than twenty hands inside the building when the boiler blew up, at about 6.55 a.m. Twenty minutes later there would have been 600 employes at their machines. The flames spread with great rapidity, driven by a southeast gale, and swept thru the district in West Lynn. A general alarm summoned help from Boston, Salem and Saugus, and after two hours of fighting, the flames were under control. The cause of the explosion is not known. Many thrilling rescues were effected, the police department being especially conspicuous for its heroism, while the fire fighters devoted their efforts to keeping the blaze confined to a narrow territory.

A patrolman, as he was on his beat, heard a dull roar and saw the heavy boiler burst thru the engine house,

boiler burst thru the engine house tearing across a section of the mai tearing across a section of the main building. Twelve employes escaped with burns about the head and face. The box-like structure of the Boston and Maine Railroad Station was licked up before a stream of water could be turned on. The flames leaped the railroad tracks to the building owned by H. P. Hood & Sons, which was damaged, but not entirely ruined. The M. J. Northley factory escaped with a bad scorching. B. W. Russell's shoe factory was destroyed. The speaker pointed out many glaring injustices committed by the railway companies, apparently without check from the government or the railway commission. Enter a railway train in Canada and you find sitting side by side a Canadian subject and an American citizen, one paying three cents and three and one-third cents a mile, the other two cents, a mile. Is that a proper condition of affairs to exist? The farmer who lives five miles from Toronto on the C.P.R. and buys some tile forty miles from Toronto, at a point on the G.T.R., is charged local rates and terminal charges by both lines. Public ownership would solve many of these anomalies.

He favored putting the sleeping car companies and the telegraph companies under the railway commission. The Pullman charges were exorbitant and the charge for an upper berth should be

less than for a lower.

The situation at North Bay illustrated the need of government control over telegraph companies. The C.P.R. and ed the need of government control over telegraph companies. The C.P.R. and the G.N.W. refused to join their wires with the state-owned line along the T. & N. O. They joined hands in an effort to discredit the provincial line. Hundreds of important messages between Cobalt and Toronto, Montreal and New York, were held up at North Bay and delayed for hours.

Two Cent Fares.

Mr. Maclean then discussed the amendment providing for the two-cent fare. The C.P.R. and the G.T.R. were making enormous earnings and paying

making enormous earnings and paying high dividends on enormously watered stock. He was not frightened by the cry that lowering passenger fares would increase freight rates. Nothing of the kind had happened in New York, New England, Michigan or Ohio. He assur-

nate against our freight; we are trying to get away from that, but these great railway companies, owned and supposed to be for the benefit of the Canadian people; are constantly carrying the produce of American farmers over the Canadian systems to the European market, where it is competitive with the produce of the Canadian farmer, at a less price than they charge on Cana-

"That is the kind of treatment these great railways can give to the people of Canada. That is the kind of treat-ment I wish to see parliament abolish, and for that reason I wish to see parliament every year have a special com-mission dealing with this subject, and I think we will have it every year after this, dealing with these grievances and forcing these companies to give lief. But we must not only make the law, but we must enforce it."
