

GENERAL BABINGTON'S VICTORY WAS A COULTRON ROUT OF BOERS

Additional Details Have Been Received From Lord Kitchener—Boer Rear Guard Tactics Did Not Save Them From the Gallant Dash of the British.

LONDON, March 27.—A despatch from Lord Kitchener to the War Office, dated Pretoria, March 27, says: "Our casualties in General Babington's action were two killed and seven wounded. The Boers left twenty-two dead and thirty wounded. As their pursuit was rapid many more Boer casualties are likely. "The operations of March 23 drove the enemy north from their positions at Kaffir's Kraal. On March 27 the pursuit was continued by mounted men only. The enemy's rear guard were driven in by a combined movement on both flanks. Their convoy was then sighted at Leeuwfontein. The Greys, New Zealanders and Bushmen pushed on. The enemy attempted to take up a position, but the Greys and other troops rode down all opposition and gave them no chance. The convoy was ridden into, and the enemy's retreat became a rout. The pursuit was continued until the horses were exhausted."

Little Fights Occurring. Cape Town, March 27.—Indecent encounters at widely separated points are reported daily. Fighting took place yesterday at Thabakane and Heningfontein, both in Cape Colony. The casualties were few. A command numbering 200, under Commandant Fourie, has been dispersed at Thabakane. According to reports received here the big above Dewetsdorp, just re-occupied by General Bruce Hamilton, were the scene of a fight lasting several hours yesterday.

Bubonic Plague Increasing. Cape Town, March 27.—The bubonic plague situation is assuming a grave aspect. The proportion of European victims of the disease is increasing. Among those attacked yesterday were three soldiers belonging to different corps. A native employed in the navy died at Simonstown. Eight other colored cases and two of Europeans are reported from three and one native has died.

HAVE CAPTURED AGUINALDO

General Funston's Daring Scheme Was Completely Successful With the Insurgent Chief.

THE PRISONER NOW AT MANILA.

Manila, March 28.—Gen. Frederick Funston's daring project for the capture of Aguinaldo in his hiding place in the Province of Isabela, island of Luzon, has been completely successful.



Gen. Funston's expedition, which was made in the last Sunday World, was looked upon as a daring one. He picked a number of his best men, and started on his mission full of confidence. The success of his undertaking is explained in the above despatch.

WITNESS IN MURDER CASE.

Linklater of Port William Said He Knew Who Killed Todd—Now He May Tell.

Port William, March 27.—Detective Stewart of the Winnipeg police department came down yesterday morning and returned last night with the late Charles Linklater who is an important witness in the Gordon murder case, in which Todd was charged with the murder. Linklater was in the blacksmith shop of James Radford on Thursday and talked freely of what he knew of the case, even making the statement that he knows who killed Gordon. The question is whether he can be induced to tell what he knows. Chief Campbell communicated with the Winnipeg officers and Linklater was held.

FOUR DEATHS IN GUELPH.

John Miller, John McPhedran, William Noble and Mrs. Johnstone Gibson Pass Away.

Guelph, March 27.—John Miller died at the General Hospital this morning. John McPhedran, a prominent merchant, succumbed to pneumonia. William Noble, insurance agent, passed away last night. Mrs. Johnstone Gibson died today, aged 85. She was a daughter of the late Earl of Guelph, the youngest son of the Earl of Guelph.

NAPLES WOMEN AT WILKES-BARRE.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., March 27.—A mob of breaker boys and men and women sympathizers with the striking girls of the Richmond Silk Mills of this city set upon the Superintendent Spears and his assistant this morning and for a time looked as though they would be successful in dispersing the crowd. They too were assaulted, but not seriously injured.

THE OPHIR LEAVES MALTA.

Malta, island of Malta, March 28.—The Ophir, leaving the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, sailed at midnight, accompanied by the British first-class cruiser Anson, the second-class cruiser Diana and the storeship Tyne.

UNDESIRABLE FAME OF MACHINE POLITICIANS—NOT SUSPECTED OF ABILITY TO SWEAR TRULY

Mr. Cook Asked Mr. Preston if He Thought There Were Fools Enough to Give \$10,000 for a Senatorship—'Lots of Them,' Replied Mr. Preston.

Ottawa, March 27.—(Special.)—Most undesirable is the fame of machine politicians. They are not suspected of the ability to swear the truth. The statement was made at a conference and was publicly and deliberately expressed in the Senate investigation of the Cook charges today in regard to W. T. R. Preston and S. C. Biggs. And no one who heard it seemed surprised. When the inquiry was resumed this morning, the cross-examination of H. H. Cook was continued. Mr. Blake put in evidence letters from H. H. Cook to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other members of the Government, of later date than the \$10,000 transaction.

Mr. Blake asked Mr. Cook this question: Of course you regarded the request as infamous? Mr. Cook: Infamous, yes. Mr. Blake then asked if the affidavit of exposure was prepared in The Mail and Empire office. Mr. Cook: Yes. Mr. Blake asked whether David Blair, Sam Barker, W. F. Maclean, J. W. St. John, Sir Charles Tupper and others knew about the affidavit. Mr. Cook: He did not see any one of these gentlemen. Mr. Cook was ordered by the committee on a vote of 9 to 43 to answer Mr. Blake's question as to who did know, he having advised of Mr. Marshall. He said he did not see the party who wrote the affidavit, and would admit nothing further.

HEARD MADE SICK.

Letters written by Mr. Cook with the assistance of Mr. Biggs, to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. David Mills, Sir Richard Cartwright and others, were read. One to Sir Richard Cartwright was written Oct. 15, 1898, in which he said: "You know that hope deferred maketh the heart sick." These letters were intended to show that Mr. Cook continued friendly negotiations for over a year after he was asked for the \$10,000.

SOMETHING MEANT \$10,000.

Complained endeavoring to get from witness a statement as to the exact wording of the letters, which Cameron produced, from Cartwright, but all Mr. Cook would testify to positively were the words: "Shurely our friend Cook must do something." "Something meant \$10,000 for a Senatorship." Mr. Blake: You didn't kick Cameron at once?

MR. COOK: NO! I'M NOT IN THE HABIT OF KICKING PEOPLE DOWNSTAIRS.

BOAT ON OTHER FOOT.

Mr. Blake: Did you want to be bought? Mr. Cook: It wasn't I who wanted to be bought; it was they.

ALLUDING TO THE INTERVIEW AT THE ROSSA HOME, MR. BLAKE ASKED: YOU DIDN'T ASK HIM WHAT HE'D THINK OF \$5000 INSTEAD OF \$10,000?

Mr. Cook: No, nor five cents. Mr. Blake: Had been asked before. The suggestion of Cameron had not started witness because he had been asked for money before. You can ask your brother Edward about that," he added. "About \$10,000?" asked Mr. Blake. "No, but about other large sums," witness answered.

FOR PARTY PURPOSES.

His recollection of what took place at Cartwright's office was that, on going out, he said to Sir Richard: "By the way, Cartwright, Cameron demanded from me \$10,000 for the late Senatorship," to which Cartwright replied: "Oh, yes, Cameron demanded the money for party purposes and took this way of getting it."

MR. BLAKE: DIDN'T HE SAY HE 'SUSPECTED' CAMERON WANTED THE MONEY?

Mr. Cook did not think the word "suspected" was used, but could not be sure. He said he did not see Cameron.

MR. COOK: I DIDN'T KNOW 'DECEASED' WAS SWEARING.

"I wouldn't be allowed in court," Mr. Blake replied unhesitatingly, at the same time folding away the dummy letter.

'LOTS OF THEM.'

Mr. Cook was cross-examined on the Preston visit. The evidence was unshakable as to Preston's asking him for \$10,000 for a Senatorship, but witness couldn't remember whether Preston said the Government or Sir Richard Cartwright wanted the money for party purposes. He said he asked Preston if he thought there were fools enough in the country to give \$10,000 for a Senatorship, to which Preston replied: "Lots of them."

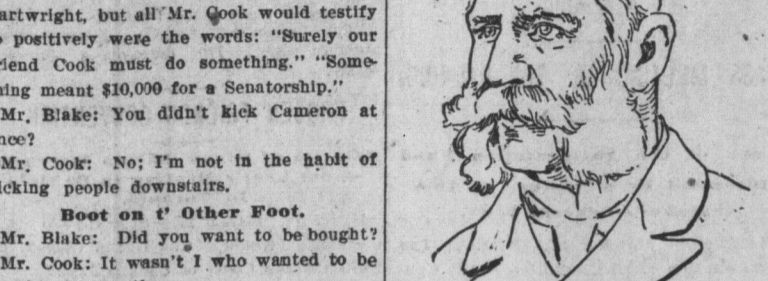
SAME OLD THING.

"But His Grace is dangerously ill," said the physician. "He had an extremely bad attack last midnight, and his heart action was very weak. There has been a little improvement since noon to-day, but not very much."

SOME DAY IT WILL GO.

Woodstock Folk Live in Daily Fear of a Dynamite Explosion. Woodstock, Ont., March 27.—Since the snow has left the people of this city have had a chance to get an idea of how much of the dynamite spilled in the railroad wreck at the Grand Trunk Railway station in this city was scattered around town. Daniel Miller found eight whole sticks of it in his front yard to-day. Someone had thrown it over the fence. Yesterday a pile of dynamite sticks was found just east of the town on the Grand Trunk Railroad. A lot of burnt matches lying around showed that somebody had been trying to explode it. The Grand Trunk Railway station last night was a loud explosion under the engine, which made every body around strike for the open. It is supposed that a little lump of dynamite had exploded. Now that warm weather is set at hand real danger is threatened. Four tons of dynamite on board a train, which is used for the purpose of blasting when the remains of the wreck were gathered up. Not more than half of that has been found.

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SETTLED FOR THIS YEAR.

Modus Vivendi on French Shore Question Concluded With a Peace. St. John's, Nfld., March 27.—The Newfoundland Cabinet received to-day a despatch from Mr. Chamboedon, the Colonial Secretary, announcing that a lobster modus vivendi respecting the French shore had been concluded with France, to be in force from to-day until Dec. 31, 1901, thus removing all fear of conflict during the interim. This fact is evidence of the willingness of the French Government to adopt a conciliatory policy, pending the final adjustment. The Colonial Legislature passed a bill last month giving effect to this convention, if the renewal were arranged.

TORONTO'S MILK SUPPLY PROBLEMS

Interesting Addresses by Mr. W. E. H. Massey, President, and Mr. A. E. Ames, Vice-President, of the New Dairy Enterprise, Describing the Methods and Advantages of the Industry.

NECESSITY FOR RADICAL CHANGES EXIST IN CONDITIONS

Toronto Should be Proud of the City Dairy, Which is Admitted to be the Best Equipped Plant of Its Kind in the World—Some Interesting Details of the Premises and the Work Which is Going on There.

On the invitation of the directors, the shareholders of the City Dairy Company, with a number of friends and several gentlemen, visited the premises of the new dairy enterprise...

Mr. W. E. H. Massey's Address. Mr. Massey's address was as follows: It is with great pleasure, and not without some pride, we welcome our shareholders to our splendid building on the occasion of their first meeting...

Some of my friends have expressed surprise that with all the cares such gentlemen as Mr. Ames and myself have on hand we should wish to devote any portion of our time to such an unimportant business as the handling of milk.

Indeed, I do not hesitate to say, as a result of several years observation and study of the question, that I do not believe the greatest composition of the Board of Directors of this Company can render a higher or greater public service to Toronto than cleaning up the milk supply of this city, and putting it on a proper and scientific and honest basis...

Let me show you a few samples to illustrate this point. No. 1.—Here is a bottle of our clarified milk, just as delivered to our customers regularly. Examining it contains 95 per cent. of butter fat.

The Milk Supply Problem. A bacteriologist in the city of Boston, of my personal acquaintance, was called upon several years since by the authorities of the city of Philadelphia to investigate the cause of a serious outbreak of diphtheria...

Through the bottles were filled in the kitchen of the house (undoubtedly a poor place for such work), things were reasonably clean, and there seemed to be no trace of the origin of the disease...

Effects on Infants. When one of our children and infants taking milk tempered with this water, it strikes my indignation. True, the milk was not rendered when to doctors, but while the substances may not be regarded as poisonous, they are certainly not small doses of milk, they have an injurious effect upon the system...

Recently my attention was drawn to an illustration of the state of things that exists in a small dairy in a private house on a small scale, but the usual and common card racks over the fire in the kitchen...

Milk Easily Contaminated. Anyone who knows even but slightly about milk knows that it readily takes with anything a minute odor which it may be placed. This illustrates the fact that it is rapidly absorbed. Unfortunately, it is just as rapid an absorbent of disease and other germs as of odors.

Perhaps I may be indulging in making a reference to my personal interest in the milk question. I suppose I first became interested in milk as a result of the fact that I was in Toronto Park in January, 1897, when I established a dairy for supplying the homes of myself and family...

City Dairy Methods. The milk after passing inspection is poured into milk cans, and is then taken to the city dairy, where it is clarified and bottled. The clarification is done in a large tank, and is a process largely completed by the use of a large quantity of water...

Domestic Analysts' Report. In reporting an analysis of five samples of milk collected by himself at the City Dairy, the analyst states that the samples are free from pathogenic bacteria...

Business of High Character. Because of the miserable character of the milk supply in Toronto, the City Dairy is a business of high character. It is not a mere speculation, but a business that is conducted with the highest integrity...

Not a Trust. We have been dubbed a "trust," a "monopoly," and a "trust," and we are not a trust or monopoly. We are a company of men who are interested in the milk supply of this city, and we are not interested in anything else...

City Dairy Prices. The price of milk affects more homes than any other commodity. It is a commodity that is essential to the health of the people, and it is a commodity that is sold at a price that is fair and reasonable...
