FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1910. POWER COMPANIES AND PUBLIC CONTROL.

The Brockville Times had a fit of hysterics the other day after reading The World's caution about the Long Sault power project, and characteristically charged The World with the malady from which itself suffers. All the more necessary is caution when The Times and other presumable offenders of the people's rights take such open-handed methods. The World has omitted no consideration that The Times mentions, but it has considered one thing that appears to escape The Times and other estimable people—the possibility of paying too dear for the whistle.

What The World contended for is the necessity of having and retaining control over the production of power under whatever conditions and by whatever agency power is produced. The province has a hydro-power commission to look after the public interest. When a corporation tries to escape being looked after in the public interest The Brockville Times will fail to convince us that the general advantage of Canada is being as fully provided for as the general advantage of the promoters of the power scheme. A new national conservation commission has just been constituted at Ottawa, and there can be no possible objection to this Long Sault power scheme being submitted to that body, if it falls under Dominion jurisdiction.

Corporations are always willing to undertake anything that will lead the people to sacrifice their rights. Afterwards, even if the original promoters set in good faith, they are apt to sell out, and what their successors will do is only bounded by the possibilities of the law courts. It is just as well to look ahead and see what may be done to secure the privileges that The Times is so certain about. When The Times tells us that 95 per cent. of the water to be used in United States water, and yet that the United States company is anxious to bring its potentialities into Canadian territory, we must try and reconcile these statements. But we still think that it is more likely that American financiers will supply power to the market they have in the States, and notably in New York City, than they will spend their money in striving to develop new industries in Eastern Ontario. The Times thinks it is hysterical to suggest that the authorities should make the matter sure for Canada. We think it is common sense.

BRITISH CABINET CHANGES.

According to the reported figures and with only three elections to come, the Liberals alone will have a majority of at least one and probably three over the Unionists in the new British Parliament. It is too small to be of any practical importance, but it suffices to make the straight ministerialists the strongest of the four parties, and no doubt they will derive satisfaction from the circumstance even if it does not bring any additional solidity to the alliance that is meantime in control. Contrary to the mistaken opinion that appears to be widely prevalent, no new government requires to be formed. Governments, the dependent on parliamentary support, do not end with the dissolution of parliament and the talk about Mr. Asquith refusing to accept office is wholly beside the mark. Mr. Asquith was and is premier and his administration remains in office until it either voluntarily resigns, or is compelled to resign, by a hostile division in the house of commons.

No doubt Mr. Asquith elects to meet parliament on next Tuesday week, and there is not the slightest apparent reason to expect otherwise, some reorganization of his cabinet must take place. Mr. Herbert Gladstone is slated first governor-general of United South Africa, and the home office which he vacates is one of the five state secretariats in command of the premier. As it is usually held by a lawyer, the report that Mr. Augustine Birrell will be selected may have foundation. At present he holds the post of chief secretary to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, an official title scarcely descriptive of its real nature. In view of the fact that the Nationalists hold the balance of power, the Irish secretaryship will be of exceptional importance in the new parliament, since upon its holder will rest the chief responsibility for the continuance of friendly relations. It is also an office that usually makes or mars the reputation of its occupant. Mr. Winston Churchill's name is mentioned, and his courage and ambition may make it attractive. Anyway it would keep him in the limelight.

CANADA LANDED AND NATIONAL INVESTMENT COMPANY.

During the year to Dec. 31 last, the net profits earned by the Canada Landed and National Investment Co. Limited (including \$10,797 brought forward from the previous year), after deducting expenses of management

and all other charges, amounted to \$144,797.85. From this dividends of eight per cent. on the paid-up capital stock of \$1,004,000 were paid and \$56,900 carried forward to credit of profit and loss account of \$947.85. With this addition the reserve fund now stands at \$670,000, or over 66 per cent. of the paid-up capital, while in addition the company has a contingent fund of \$10,000, which, with this balance carried forward, raises the proportion to nearly 69 per cent., a remarkably good measure of security. Progress was made in 1909 along all lines of the company's business and finances and, indeed, expansion has been steady, and each year has shown an advance in position. In 1904 the total assets were \$4,339,822; they are now placed at \$5,390,437, and within the same period the net annual profits have risen from \$21,212 to over \$134,000, and the reserve fund from \$400,000 to its present figure. Last year—sterling debentures increased by \$290,700, and currency debentures by \$75,200. Great care has been exercised in placing the company's securities, which are all of the highest character. This excellent record and the sound financial basis laid to the credit of the president, Mr. John L. Blaikie, who for many years has been in control. At 87 he still actively supervises the company's extensive business and his sound and long experience have secured the implicit confidence of directors as well as shareholders.

THE UNION TRUST COMPANY.

At the ninth annual general meeting of the shareholders of the Union Trust Company, Limited, held yesterday, a very satisfactory report was submitted by the directors and with the relative financial statements will be found elsewhere in this issue. In moving the formation of the president, Mr. Charles Magee, was fully justified in congratulating the shareholders upon the favorable result of the business for the year ending Dec. 31 last. Since the formation of the company, in 1901, there has been a steady increase from \$757,907 in that year to \$11,492,886 in 1909, and these figures do not include transactions in which the company acted as registrar or transfer agent or as trustee for debenture issues or other business of like nature, which, if included, would have considerably enlarged them. The net profit for the year, after making provision for cost of management, salaries, fees and expenses, amounted to \$20,254.85 at credit of profit and loss account, made \$187,288.89 available for distribution. The increase in profits was considerable enough to enable the directors to not only to pay the regular dividend of eight per cent., but to declare a bonus of two per cent., and to carry forward \$37,228.89 at credit of profit and loss. In addition \$50,000 was credited to the reserve fund, which now stands at \$550,000, or more than 50 per cent. of the company's business show very satisfactory increases, and the extent of public confidence is disclosed by the large number of wills drawn during the year, in which it was appointed executor. The assets of the Union Trust Co. now total close upon \$11,500,000.

CANADA LIFE'S RECORD YEAR

Largest Assets—Greatest Surplus—Important Announcement As to Profits.

All along the line the Canada Life made gains in 1909, and in several important items previous records were broken. An announcement of special interest to policyholders is that in this the dividend year, over \$2,000,000 will be allotted in profits to policyholders. The year's operations resulted in over \$10,000,000 of paid-for new business, bringing the total business in 1909 to nearly \$125,000,000. The gain in assets of \$2,872,000 was greater than in any previous year, the total assets now standing at \$53,686,000. The responsibility of finding safe and profitable investment for these large funds will be realized when it is considered that they are increasing at the rate of almost \$10,000 for each business day of the year. A striking feature of the meeting was the reference of the president, Hon. Geo. A. Cox, to the quality of the assets of the company, and the manner in which they are distributed amongst a number of the best classes of securities. In view of the increase all along the line in the Canada Life's business, a decrease in the expenses of management as compared with 1908, which in turn showed a reduction as compared with the expenses of 1907, is highly creditable to the management, and indicates the care in the conduct of the company's affairs which has rendered possible the splendid statement now presented. Altho the Canada Life is now sixty-four years old, the vigor of its management and the organization it has built up will doubtless enable it to go forward to even greater success than is shown in the present report.

"Why, sir, you might just as well tell the people of protection," said Sir Wilfrid, who then dwelt on the fact that naval service would not be compulsory—no one would risk his life for a job that would not be his own. Those who object will not go to war. For instance, if Great Britain was at war under the same conditions as in the Crimea, he would hesitate very much before consenting to take part in such a war.

MR. BORDEN'S REPLY. Mr. Borden noted that the prime minister had taken up almost four-fifths of his speech with something which had absolutely nothing to do with the present question. The question of autonomous rights and privileges had been settled 75 years ago. "It is significant," he said, "that when my right honorable friend speaks of public works, he speaks of public works with his own party, he always goes back to days of 1837, and quotes to us, not only from speeches of Lord Durham, but from the original report of the Select Committee. It is an old piece of tactics, and I sincerely condole with him to-day on circumstances in which he finds himself. He told us, in the first place, that he had an absolute right to bring forward a motion, and before long we found him dealing at great length with criticisms which had been made upon his course in the Province of Quebec, and presumably from some of his own party."

FORGETS HIS THINGS. His retrospective glance does not go back to some period that perhaps he might be well inclined to forget. It was his own aspiration in the days of 1837-1832. Speaking in Boston in 1881, he said that Canada should never consent to imperial confederation, but to a confederation of equals, a partnership of equals, a partnership of equals. "In British wars, and Canada would never consent to participate in them," he said.

THE CALIBRE OF THE FLEET. "It has been said that we should have accepted the admiralty's suggestion and had put all our fleet unit on the Pacific. Is there a man who will blame us because we would not agree to that? We have a large Atlantic seaboard and must divide our force between the two oceans."

WARRINER NOW INVOLVES THIRD MAN AS "LOOTER". Declares That His Predecessor as Local Treasurer Was "Short"—Where Did Money Go To? CINCINNATI, Feb. 3.—A chain of embezzlements involving three men, extending over many years, and finally culminating in the almost wholesale looting of the Big Four Railroad treasury, was the story told by Charles W. Warriner, defaulting local treasurer of the road, in his testimony to-day in the trial of Mrs. Jeannette Stewart-Ford, for blackmail.

The market for sheep and lambs was unchanged. Sheep—culls sold at \$3.50 to \$3.75; culls and rams, \$2.50 to \$4; lambs, \$5 to \$6 for inferior to common, and \$6 to \$7 for medium to good.

Hogs.

Selected fed and watered were reported as selling at \$3.25 to \$3.40, and \$3.10 to \$3.15 f.o.b. cars at country points.
