TWO MURDERERS SWING OFF
 One Killed His Wife and Mother-in-Law

THE OTHER HIS MISTRESS
 And Both Were Despatched by the Rope Method at Jersey.

John Mackin was only 24 years old, but he was a very vicious young man whose wife had to leave him and go to her parents—Paul Genz went to the girl he loved and entertained her follows and he killed her when she came home.

New York, April 13—John Mackin was hanged in Jersey City this morning. He killed his wife and her mother on Feb. 27, 1896. He was a native of Jersey City, aged 24 years. Mrs. Mackin, having been compelled to leave her husband because of his habits and inability to support her and her three children, had taken up residence with her father, Patrick Connor. Twice Mackin attempted to kill his wife, but she escaped. On the evening of the 27th Mackin knocked at the door of Connor's home in Jersey City. The father-in-law was about leaving the house when Mackin called, and when he opened the door Mackin forced his way into the room, and without a word shot the old man in the throat. His wife was likewise unceremoniously shot. One bullet reached her heart and another struck her in the chest. Two bullets remained in Mackin's pistol. These he deliberately fired at Mrs. Connor, his mother-in-law. Both took effect, one entering her breast and the other her side as she rested and died on a sofa. Connor, the father-in-law, subsequently recovered.

Paul Genz Also Pays the Penalty.
 New York, April 13—Paul Genz was hanged at 11 A.M. in Jersey City. Genz killed his mistress, Clara Armin, in Hoboken, Aug. 28, 1894. Genz was a native of Pennsylvania and a voyage to America. After their arrival in this country they lived in Hamilton and Hoboken. During the absence of her lover Clara became acquainted with other men, and Genz returned from his trip he became jealous, and on the evening of Aug. 28 bought a revolver and a razor. Clara Armin was visiting on the first floor of the house in which they lived when Genz came home with the bouquet. She met him cheerfully took the bouquet and the couple went up to their own room on the top floor. Five pistol shots were aimed at her. Police men and neighbors who broke in the door saw Genz kneeling on the floor holding the bloody head of his mistress by the hair. She was dead with five bullet wounds in her head and body.

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WONGE BARRIS BOUQUETING. Got Worsted in the Diplomatic Game AND TRIES TO WRIGGLE OUT Year After Year He is Pounding Away at the Paris Award.

The Reason Probably is That the Heavily Monopoly of Bohring Sea Has Been Taken From the Alaska Commercial Company—Very Little Chance of a General Arbitration Treaty—United States Want More Than Their Own in Every Deal.

London, April 13.—A representative of the Associated Press has learned that communications are passing between Washington and London with reference to Bohring Sea.

The Pull Mail Gazette refers to the reopening of this question as "another lesson on the weakness of arbitration," and says it fails to see how Great Britain can be expected to entertain a revision of the subject, adding that they cannot be tossed aside because "one party does not get its full demands."

The St. James' Gazette says: "The United States has intimated another blow on the Bohring Sea question. Could a more complete demonstration of the hollowness of arbitration be given? It is quite possible that arbitration may become as serious as the Venezuelan dispute. We are bound to support the Canadian reasonable claims, and the prospect might make us regret the failure of the general arbitration treaty."

A representative of the Associated Press has been interviewed on the subject with the heads of the sailing industry here. The importers of London, who will be the losers if arbitration is held with respect to the zone, urge an extension of the close time of postage sailing to the end of August and the close of the zone to 230 miles from the British coast.

Mr. Henry White, the United States Charge at London, has had a conference with the Foreign Office on the subject.
