ONE FATAL SHOT, TWO WOUNDED IN A DRUNKEN BRAWL

DOCUMENTS SHOW CONSPIRACY CORONER IS INVESTIGATING LOOKING FOR BALLOONISTS OF GERMANY AND SINN FEIN SUDDEN DEATHS OF WOMEN TO END LONG TRAMP TODAY

ALL NEGOTIATIONS FOR IRISH TRUCE HAVE BROKEN DOWN

Lloyd George Said to Have Refused to Withdraw Home Rule Act.

SINN FEIN M.P. IS HELD

Dublin, Jan. 9.—If an official report is to be credited, all negotiations looking to peace in Ireland have broken down. Definite information is lacking, but it is said that Mr. Lloyd George has definitely refused to consider the Sinn Fein's proposal for the withdrawal of the Home Rule Act.

Officials here take a gloomy view of the situation. The increased activity recently on the part of the military and republicans in the martial law areas is considered as indicating an extension of guerrilla warfare.

Sinn Fein M. P. Arrested. Belfast, Ireland, Jan. 9.—Troops at Derry today surrounded the residence of Joseph O'Doherty, Sinn Fein member of Parliament and arrested him. He will be interrogated in connection with raids on his home were without result.

Raids on rate collectors, the latest form of Sinn Fein activity, are becoming increasingly common. Six are reported in the County of Wexford.

District Inspector McGrath of Balmalee, Longford, was murdered Friday while on patrol duty with a constable. The constable was wounded.

Two houses at Camlough, South Armagh, and property belonging to Sinn Feiners in the Newry district, nearby, were burned Friday night. The fires are said to have been started in reprisal for the death of a small (Continued on Page 4, Column 6.)

Taranto, Italy, Jan. 9.—The arrival here today of legionaries from Fiume provoked a manifestation which ended in a riot. One person was wounded and numerous others arrested. A general strike is believed imminent.

LIBERALS TO ENTER FIELD IN PETERBORO

Call Convention for Friday Next —G. N. Gordon Seems Likely Candidate.

ELEVENTH HOUR MOVE

Peterboro, Ont., Jan. 9.—Last evening the climax was reached in the West Peterboro by-election preliminaries when the Liberals held an informal meeting and decided to call a convention on Friday next for the purpose of selecting a candidate to enter the fight. The only name mentioned was that of G. N. Gordon, a prominent local lawyer.

DROP IN EGG PRICES

Brantford, Ont., Jan. 9.—(Special).—Eggs, which have been retailing as high as \$1 a dozen, took a drop to 75 cents on the market Saturday, while butter fell from 65 cents to 60-62 cents. The attendance was light. Potatoes are down to 22 a big bushel.

U. S. IRISH LEADERS HEAVILY IMPLICATED IN THESE DOCUMENTS

British Government Issues Paper Showing Active Connection Between Sinn Fein and Germany During the War—Embassy at Washington Acted as Intermediary Between Casement and Irish Leaders.

London, Jan. 9.—Correspondence which passed between the German embassy at Washington and the foreign office at Berlin in which the names of a number of Irish-Americans are mentioned to show active connection between leaders of the Sinn Fein and the German government during the war, was issued by the government yesterday in the form of a "white paper."

After the arrival of Sir Roger Casement in Berlin in 1914, he sent messages thru the foreign office in Berlin and the German embassy at Washington, according to these documents, to Judge Cohan, John Devoy, and others, regarding his mission to Germany. This, it is declared, was done through the German ambassador to the United States, to send to the foreign office in February 1916, a despatch "surreptitiously attached to a message concerning the Lusitania," saying that Devoy had informed him of the rising to begin in Ireland Easter Sunday.

The "White Paper" makes reference to pamphlets on the subjects of Ireland and Germany, freedom of the seas, and others, in the publication of which, Kuno Ritter, then professor of Celtic languages at Liverpool, and Sir Roger Casement collaborated, and which were widely circulated in Germany and the United States in 1911 and 1912.

The dispatch adds that the operations appear to have been extended over a wide area, from Leixlip, in the east, through Celbridge, Maynooth and Killock, at all of which places road bridges are reported to have been destroyed, to Ballytown, in the west.

FALLON SAYS MEN SEEM FORGETFUL OF DESTINY Catholic Bishop Declares People Unmindful They Are Not Like Horses or Dogs, But Possess Immortal Souls

London, Ont., Jan. 9.—Some interesting comments on present-day evils were made here today by Bishop Fallon during an address to several hundred members of the Holy Name Society at their annual breakfast held here this morning. In former years, for example, a bricklayer took pride in laying 1,100 bricks a day. Were he to do so now, he would be shot.

THORO INQUIRY INTO DEATHS FROM SERUM

Chief Coroner Investigates Deaths of Monica Kenney and Mrs. Edwin Bond, Following Special Blood Treatment by Dr. J. H. McConnell—Dr. Johnson to Report to Attorney-General After Analysis of Serum.

Following injection by Dr. J. H. McConnell, 1653 West Dundas street, of a serum used in the treatment of anaemia, Monica Kenney, aged 22 years, of 597 Palmerston avenue, and Mrs. Edwin Bond, of 367 St. George street, died within fifteen minutes of each other on Saturday afternoon.

Miss Kenney had walked west only a few yards after leaving Dr. McConnell's office, when she collapsed. She was carried into W. H. Andrews' drug store, 1629 West Dundas street, and Mrs. Bond was called, but before her arrival the young woman was dead.

DR. J. H. McCONNELL, Well-known practitioner of 1653 West Dundas street, who administered the serum, which was followed by the deaths of two women patients.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS COMPLETE SUCCESS, SAYS N. W. ROWELL

Canada Has Suffered Less From War Than Other Belligerent Nations.

MAY ADMIT GERMANY IS TEN ABOVE ZERO

Hon. N. W. Rowell, Canadian delegate to the League of Nations, returned to Toronto yesterday and to his family at 124 Crescent road. Since leaving Canada some months ago with Sir George Foster and Minister of Justice C. J. Doherty, who were also Canadian delegates, Mr. Rowell has visited most of the countries of Europe and was in South Africa for a time.

When seen by The World last night he declared that during his travels thru Europe he had seen no country where conditions, financial and industrial, were so good as in Canada.

PAUL DESCHANEL IS RE-ELECTED Elections to Fill Third of Seats in French Senate Held Yesterday.

Paris, Jan. 9.—Elections to fill one-third of the seats in the French senate were held today. Seven members of Premier Leygues' cabinet were among the candidates. Of these, Frederic Francois-Marshall, minister of finance, and Albert Sarraut, minister of colonies, were elected on the first ballot.

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PREDICT ARRIVAL U. S. BALLOONISTS AT MATTICE TODAY

Said to Have Good Guide and Finest Sleigh Dogs in the World.

IS TEN ABOVE ZERO

Mattice, Ont., Jan. 9.—(By F. J. Lendrum, official correspondent of the Associated Press and Canadian Press, Limited)—Lieut. Walter Hinton, one of the three American balloonists expected here at any time now, was writing a book when Geo. E. MacLeod, the Indian runner who brought the news of the officers' safety, left Moose Factory, on Dec. 23. The book, so MacLeod said, is describing the travels of the United States officers, who disappeared from the ken of the world for some weeks, and Lieut. Hinton, commander, was using up all the paper at Moose Factory, although that was not much.

The correspondents posted here are now more keenly interested in the air-men's experiences on the trail coming out from Moose Factory and on any scientific information they may have been able to obtain in their flight than they are in the actual flight itself on the three days' wandering in the bush.

ATTACKS BUILDING OF BIG BATTLESHIP Lord Rothermere Says No Nation Can Retain Command of the Sea.

London, Jan. 9.—Viscount Rothermere, former secretary of state for the air forces, in an article today in The Sunday Pictorial, under the caption, "The Folly of the Big Battleship," submits a startling contention directly challenging the traditional policy of the British navy.

Lord Rothermere wholly condemns British participation in big battleship rivalry with the United States and Japan, because "they obviously are building against each other and not against us."

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QUARREL OVER PAYING FOR BEER HAS OUTCOME IN A FATAL SHOOTING

Steve Poplink Dies of Wounds and His Wife and Her Brother Are Injured in Affray in Rear of House on Centre Ave. Early Sunday Morning—Man Held By Police as Suspect.

In a drunken brawl, believed by the police to have originated in the refusal of one of the party to contribute his share of 75 cents to a pool with which to purchase beer for the party, Steve Poplink, aged 35, of 162 Chestnut street, was fatally shot, his wife Mary, aged 40, shot thru the left leg, and her brother, William Ostrovitch, also living at 162 Chestnut street, shot thru the left chest, by a man who objected to paying his share in the pool. The shooting took place at 1:10 o'clock on Sunday morning in the house at the rear of 141 Centre avenue.

Assistant Inspector William Wallace and Detectives Peter Strohm and B. L. Ward, accompanied by Interpreter Mankovitch and George Karpuk, 45 Edward street, who is held as a material witness in connection with the shooting, cleared the street from the station at 10 o'clock last night to see a prisoner held there, whose name is Paul A. Antisy, 18 Centre avenue.

Antisy was a party to the shooting, and his description resembled in many respects that of the man who is said to have committed the murder. It was thought that he might be the man wanted.

When he had been seen, Karpuk, who it is claimed, had been drinking in the same room with the man who shot Poplink, is said to have stated to the police that he believed Antisy to be the man.

Low authorities this may be in the case, as Antisy, who was shot, the police claim, Karpuk was not in the room. He had left a (Continued on Page 2, Column 2.)

MOTOR INDUSTRY SHOWS REVIVAL

Five Thousand Men Put Back to Work During Week in Detroit.

DETROIT, Jan. 9.—A beginning of industrial revival in Detroit was noted during the past week in a survey of conditions made yesterday by George W. Grant, secretary of the employers' association. Approximately 5,000 men have been put back to work and indications are that a gradual, though probably a slow, improvement will continue until the automobile industry has reached its normal activity.

Mr. Grant said. He added that manufacturers here generally expect the end of the slump in retail business to follow the annual automobile shows now about to open.

ALTHOUGH some of the largest factories in the city are completely closed and no definite date has been set for their opening, there are indications, Mr. Grant said, that the activity may not be extended. The Ford and Dodge plants are among these.

Numerous other factories are maintaining skeleton forces, to which small numbers of men are being added from time to time.

The Liberty Motor Co. yesterday announced that several hundred additional men would be taken on January 17, and that the force would be gradually increased, while unofficial reports were that the Continental Motors plant would reopen in some departments tomorrow.

The Dodge plant, it is said, is held in readiness to assume operations within a week should it be decided to open. While a notice posted at the Ford plant says it will not reopen this month, there are reports that the suspension may not be for that long a time.

At the Ford plant preparations are being made for the payment of the profit-sharing bonus, which amounts approximately \$9,000,000. The volume of work entailed, it is said, has delayed payment, which was originally set for January 1.

ALLIES IN ACCORD AS TO GREEK LOAN Ministers Will Protest to Premier Rhalhis Against Requisition.

Paris, Jan. 9.—The French minister in Athens has telegraphed the foreign office saying that he and the ministers of Great Britain and Italy would visit the Greek premier and again protest against the Greek government's requisitioning of the second half of the allied loan of 400,000,000 drachmas.

In French official circles it is said that nothing as yet has transpired to indicate whether the French and allied ministers will leave Athens. The French government returned to Athens the time and await developments. It was pointed out today that inasmuch as nothing was done at the moment that King Constantine returned to Athens the time had passed for precipitate action. It is expected that the policy will be to await the results of the efforts of the Greeks to maintain Constantine on the throne without the financial aid of the allies.

JOHN BEATTIE CROZIER IS DEAD IN LONDON

London, Jan. 9.—John Beattie Crozier, physician, philosopher, historian and political economist, died in London, Saturday.

Dr. Beattie Crozier was born in Canada in 1842. He was educated at the Galt Grammar School and Toronto University. His published works include: "The Religion of the Future," "Civilization and Progress" (translated into Japanese), "History of Intellectual Development" and "Sociology Applied to Practical Politics."

GREAT RALLY TO SMUTS IS EXPECTED IN AFRICA

London, Jan. 9.—The special correspondent of the Sunday Observer, writing on the election last month in South Africa, points out that fully 100,000 electors, mostly from the urban districts, abstained from voting in the election last month. He says that if the issue is clearly defined before the country, and especially to the many not hitherto party men, he is convinced there will be a rally to General Smuts as will carry him to victory and South Africa to an immediately prosperous future.

Appointment of Jew to India An Extraordinary Precedent

London, Jan. 9.—An extraordinary precedent is created in the vacation by Lord Reading of the lord chief justiceship to become viceroys of India.

Lloyd George Takes Possession Of Official Country House

London, Jan. 9.—Mr. Lloyd George has taken formal possession of the week-end of Chequers Court at Aylesbury, Bucks., which is to be the official country residence of the prime minister. The estate of Chequers Court was recently presented to the British people by Col. Sir Arthur Hamilton in 1913.

Increase in British Imports And Exports During Past Year

London, Jan. 9.—British imports for 1920 were 1,936,000,000 pounds sterling, an increase of 310,000,000 over 1919.
