## TO THE READER.

If so, you will not consider the textual mottos and the daily portions of Scripture given at the commencement of each month, and selected and designed to be the subject of, and to lead your medif tations, as a substitute for reading your Bible, but you will be led by sipping of these little brooks in the way to more copious draughts from their Divine fountain. Is this blessed book valued and honoured by you as it deserves, considered as an immediate revelation of the mind and will of tidr on subjects the most im.

portant to the human family? Do you attend the means of grace with that becoming diligence and regularity which should characterize the man in earnest to increase in holiness and grow in grace? Are you frequent and fervent in the exercise of prayer, which, if you be really in earnest, you will consider your highest privilege, the greatest honour you can enjoy on this side Jordan-the means of Divine appointment whereby a blessing will sttend all your other labours, whereby your graces will be strengthened and called forth into holy and lively exercise, and without which preaching and reading are alike in vain? I ask not, are you always praying ?-the duties of life require a proper share of your time and attention, and you are neglecting, not obeying the injunctions of Scripture if you are not "diligent in business" as well as "fervent in spirit;" but I ask, are you always in the "spirit of prayer?" This is absolutely necessary to preserve you from the temptations of the evil one, and without it you will soon become his prey. Are you much in a "spirit of prayer and supplication," prompting you to a constant, ear. mest, and persevering performance, not to the form, but to the spirit of prayer-the rising of the soul to God.
Again-allow me to inquire how it is with you in this day of general profession, when to be religious is to be fashionable, and when, according to common acceptation, to be a man is to be a Christian! Whether you are or not in earnest in this matter, may in some measure be known from the evidence of your out. ward cenduct. And what does this testify? How long can you remain in the company of those who you feel convinced are still in the gall of bitterness and in the bond of iniquity, without affectionately yet earnestly speaking to them on "God's behalf" and leading them to the consideration of the value of the soul, the infinite importance of its salvation, the vanities of time, the awful realities of eternity ?-may I not say, weeks, months, nay years! How long, think you, would St. Paul have been in the company of a sinner, and not have pointed him to the sinner's friend? What causes this difference? St. Paul was in earnest.

By these and similar tests which might be mentioned may you know assuredly whether you are in earnest on the subject proposed in the outset or not: but remember the fact of your being

## What will the next hour do for me that this cannot?

 Men judge of us by our actions,-God by our motives. Such con. duct is the best comment on the Apostle's words, when he ex. horts his flock to "put on charity above all things, which is the bond of perfectness." 1 Col. iii. 14, or as in Ephes. iv. 3, "en. deavouring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace."

Another.- Luther, when making his way into the presence of Cardinal Cajetan, who had summoned him to answer for his heretical opinions at Augsburgh, was asked by one of the Cardinal's minions where he should find a shelter if his Patron, the Elector of Saxony, should desert him? "Under the shield of Heaven," replied this undaunted champion of the true fatth, and the effect may be imagined-the silenced minion vanished.

The London Religious Tract Society circulated during the year preceding its last anniversary, $16,241,345$ publications, being an increase of two millions two hundred and sixtynine thousand beyond the circulation of the previous year, without including the numerous tracts printed in foreign countries at the expense of the Society. The total circulation of the Society's publications at home and abroad, in ahout 80 different languages, exceeds two hundred and fifteen millions. The sums received from the sales of the Society's publications during the year had been $£ 50,448$, the gratuitous issues $£ 5,226$-and the total benevolent income $£ 4,966$.

## NOTE.

The time of the sun's rising, \&c., is given in apparent or solar time ; to convert this into clock time, it is only necessary to make use of the corrections which are given every three or four days in the body of the Calendar. Thus, for instance, on January 4th, the sun rises at 34 minutes after 7, solar time; but as on that day the sun is slower than the clock 5 min .46 seconds, this must be added to the above time, making 39 min .46 sec . after 7 , the time of sunrise, according to a well regulated clock.

## RECEIPTS.

To Preserve Seeds.-When the seeds are ripe, remove the stalks containing them to an airy room, and, when thoroughly dry, rub or beat them out at convenience. When cleaned, wrap them in papers along with powdered charcoal, which will effectually protect them from damp and insects.

To Preserve Choice Apples or Pears.-Apples and pears are most effectually preserved in the following manner: -After great care has been taken in the picking, procure a clean dry cask and a quantity of bran: Put a layer of the latter in the bottom of the cask, and then a layer of apples well wiped, and with a small piece of paper between each; or, if they are to be removed to a distance, each apple should be wrapped in paper. Over the fruit put another layer of bran, and then a corresponding one of apples-continuing in this manner until the cask is full. If dry moss be used instead of bran, the end will be answered quite as effectually at less expense.

Sandy Soils.-A very sandy soil is not fitted for the growth of wheat unless preceded by a crop of clover, which binds the surface, and confers a temporary strength for sustain. ing grain.

To Preserve Potatoes.-A good method of preserving potatoes is to bring them all home and place them on hard ground, as near the stable as possible, in heaps of about thres or four cart-loads, and cover them up with straw, over which place sods, or a neat thatching of straw; then cover the heaps with the roughest and newest dung to withstapd the severity of the winter. Should the potatoes freeze, the frost may be extracted by letting them remain in cold water for a night,-or, more effectually, by putting them into a running stream.

To bring Horses out of a Stable on Fire.,-Throw the harness or saddle to which they have been accustomed over their backs, and they will suffer themselves to be led quietly out.

Remedy against the Turnip Fly.-Steep the turnip seed in train-oil before sowing.

Ready Mode of Mending Cracks in Stoves, Pipes, Iron Ovens, $\Phi$ c.-When a crack is discovered in a stove, \&c., it may be readily filled up with a mixture of wood-ashes and common salt made into a paste with water and plastered over the crack.

To obtain Maple Sap without injuring the Tree.-Open the ground, and select a tender root about an inch in diameter; cut off the end, and raise the root sufficiently out of the ground to turn the cut end into the receiver; the sap will flow as freely as in the other methods, without injuring the tree.

Barrelled Beef, after some time, generally becomes tainted, which may be effectually restored to its former sweetness by pouring off the offensive pickle, wiping the meat dry : and, on restoring it to the barrel, place lumps of charcoal be. tween the pieces, covering the meat with a fresh pickle.

To Destroy Crickets.-Put Scotch snuff upon the holes where they come out.

To make Shoes or Boots Water-Proof.-Take a pint of linseed-oil with half-a-pint of mutton suet, six or eight ounces of bees' wax, and a small piece of rosin. Boil them together in a pipkin, and let the liquid cool till milk-warm: then apply it to boots or shoes, which should be perfectly dry previous to the application.

Inhabitants of the World.-The supposed number of the inhabitants of this earth is nearly a thousand millions, so vast a number, that, counting at the rate of sisty a-minute, it would take one thousand nine hundred and two years, seven months, eighteen days, ten hours and forty minutes, to enumerate them : yet there is every probability that this immense number, which no man can count, must resign their lives to the hands of Him who gave them, in less than a hundred years.
