

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

ELDERS' DISTRICTS

District No. 4.—Mr. Wyld: From Concession Street eastward to Bay Street, and from Sparks Street southward to Isabella Street.

District No. 5.—Mr. Cassels: From Bay Street eastward to Bank Street, and from Sparks Street southward to Gloucester Street.

District No. 6.—Mr. May: From Bay Street eastward to Bank Street, and from Gloucester Street southward to Cooper Street.

District No. 7.—Mr. Macoun: From Bay Street eastward to Bank Street, and from Cooper Street southward to Isabella Street.

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District No. 8.—Mr. Gibson: From Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 9.-Mr. Orme: From Maria Street southward to Somerset Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 10. -- Mr. Hamilton: From Somerset Street southward to Lewis Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 11.-Mr. Chrysler: From Lewis Street southward to Billings' Bridge, and from Bank Street eastward to the Rideau River.

District No. 12.-Mr. Drummond: From Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

District No. 13.- - Mr. Larmonth: From Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to the Rideau River..

District No. 14.—Colonel Macpherson: From Mackenzie Avenue eastward to Cummings' Bridge, and from Rideau Street northward to

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PASTORAL LETTER.

My Dear Friends :

The Church year just closed affords us abundant cause for grate fully acknowledging the goodness of God, while it ought to stir us up to an increased sense of obligation in view of the many benefits He has conferred upon us.

Our long cherished hope has been realized, in the erection of the new Church Hall; and now that the building is finished, I think we must all see how much it contributes to the successful prosecution of the Sunday School, and other branches of work. Among other things, it is pleasing to notice the marked effect it has had upon the attendance at our Wednesday evening services. I hope that this increase will be fully maintained throughout the year.

I rejoice in the belief that, by the blessing of God, my ministrations from Sunday to Sunday have not been wholly unproductive of good effects in stimulating christian life and character amongst you. I am greatly cheered from time to time by your acknowledgment of the help these services afford, and it will be my ambition to make them still more profitable in the future.

While my main energies are dedicated to you, the members of this Congregation, I cannot but make mention of the encouragement received from the presence of so many visitors in our public services, who listen intelligently to the preaching of the Word, and, as their frequent testimony assures me, find some helpfulness in it. Let us diligently seek the grace of the Holy Spirit in our worship, so that with whatever weakness the seed is sown, it may be raised in power.

My pastoral visits throughout the whole Congregation have given me more delight than any preceding ones. As we know each other better, it becomes more easy to speak the word in season. I regret that the stress of other duties denies me the privilege of seeing you much in your homes under ordinary circumstances. In sickness or any other adversity troubles,

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adversity, I deem it one of the chief pleasures of my office to share your troubles, and to bring some message of Christian comfort.

The various Church organizations as you can see from their Reports, have been doing faithful work during the past year. The Young People's Society affords scope for various aptitudes, and I commend it to the young people of the Congregation. The Women's Foreign Missionary Society, but recently organized, begins its work with excellent prospects, and deserves our cordial sympathy.

During the past year death has removed from our ranks some well beloved friends, whose loss we mourn sincerely. Among the number is included the oldest member of the Congregation, Mr. Wm. Clegg, who for nearly sixty years was an Elder in this Church, and whose long and faithful service will be held in lasting remembrance. May the abundant consolation of God be given to each bereaved family, that the hearts of those who sorrow may find peace in Him!

I have no other words than those of thanks to the many members of this Church who have so zealously striven throughout the year to minister to its welfare; and I invite the co-operation of every one in the mingled pleasure and pain of Christian service, that this Church may become an increasing power for good throughout the whole community.

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KIRK SESSION REPORT.

With the close of our Church year it again devolves upon the officebearers of the Congregation to report what progress has been made in the departments of christian activity in which they have been engaged during the year.

The Kirk Session in the performance of this duty cannot avoid referring to some discouraging results of our past year's efforts in Christian work, yet they have pleasure in reporting the continuance of much apparent prosperity in our Church affairs—the uninterrupted enjoyment of valued Christian privileges, and the prevalence of peace and harmony in the Congregation.

There has not been very much change in the numerical strength of the Congregation. In March last the Session reported a membership of 543 (five hundred and forty-three), since that date 27 (twenty-seven) have been added to the Communion Roll, 8 (eight) on profession of faith, 19 (nineteen) by certificate from other congregations; and during the same time 37 (thirty-seven) have been removed from the Roll, 7 (seven) by death, 3 (three) by certificate, and 27 (twenty seven) by action of the Session. The Roll thus adjusted, numbers 533 (five hundred and thirty-three); being a net decre se of 10 (ten) members since last Report.

The average attendance at the quarterly Communions of the Congregation during the past year, exclusive of visitors, was 236 (two hundred and thirty-six), which is less than reported for the previous year, and much less than might reasonably be expected from the number of our membership.

The Session have prepared, for publication with this Report, the Communion Roll of the Congregation, containing the names of members in full communion with the Church. The present address of each has been given as accurately as possible; if, however, any error in this respect has occurred, such instances should be reported to the Session, so that correction may be made in the entry of such address. The Se the attendan The average ed for the pr hitherto atter Church, will held in the n in consequen maintained th members removing from the city, or withdrawing from the Congregation, they are reminded that they should apply to the Moderator of Session for certificates of dismission, so that their names may be removed from the Roll when they sever their connection with the Congregation.

In the course of the past year our Church membership has suffered loss by the death of seven members, of whom some were only recently received into our fellowship, others were connected with the Congregation in the earliest days of its existence, and for many years enjoyed its Christian privileges, and always took a deep interest in its work. Their names no longer appear on our Roll, and they will no longer be seen at our Communion seasons; but, with those who die in Christ, their names are enrolled in the "Lamb's Book of Life," and they now enjoy the perfect fellowship of the Church in heaven. The Session sincerely sympathize with the bereaved relatives, and affectionately commend them to God, the unfailing source of consolation.

It is the pleasing duty of the Session to report that the public services on the Lord's day have been on the whole well attended, the seating capacity of the Church was generally fully occupied at the evening services, which, as heretofore, attracted many visitors, among whom were always noticed a large proportion of young people present as worshippers, along with members of the Congregation. Our Pastor in his pulpit ministrations has thus had the responsible privilege of addressing these inspiring audiences week after week, affording opportunity of proclaiming the Gospel of Christ, and of sowing in many youthful hearts seeds of christian truth, which, when followed by the quickening power of the Divine Spirit, groweth and bringeth forth fruits of the Christian life in rich abundance.

The Session are not permitted to report so favorably in regard to the attendance at the mid-week services, held on Wednesday evenings. The average attendance at these Meetings has been less than that reported for the previous year; it is, however, expected that some who have not hitherto attended these services, when held in the basement of the Church, will become regular attendants, as they are in future to be held in the new Hall. It is hoped that the improvement already noticed in consequence of this change in the place of meeting will be at least maintained throughout the ensuing year, and that a much larger pro-

By reference to the Treasurer's statement, it will be seen that the plate collections at the Sabbath-day services of the past year have nearly reached the amount reported in the previous year.

The contribution to interest on Church loan, and to the schemes of the Church for the past year amount to \$3,370 (three thousand three hundred and seventy dollars), which has been allocated as follows:

These contributions are nearly equal to the amount contributed last year, which is considered very satisfactory in view of the increased pew rentals which have been paid. This liberality of the Congregation has enabled the Session to allocate a larger amount than heretofore to the several schemes of the Church, a much smaller sum than usual being required from this fund to assist the Temporal Committee in the payment of interest on the Church loan.

It will be noticed that the former Church Institute and the Young People's Missionary Society of the previous year have recently amalgamated, under the name of the Young People's Society, which, it is hoped, will more successfully accomplish the objects for which both of these Societies were originally organized, and prove beneficial to all who take an active part in its manifold work.

A Woman's Auxiliary to the Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada has also been formed, with the view of awakening in the Congregation a greater interest in the operations of this Mission.

In giving effect to the expressed wish of the Congregation, a modern Sunday School Hall has been built during the year at a large expenditure of money, provided entirely by the Glebe Trustees, whereby much has been done in extending and beautifying the material edifice in which we meet for public worship, and the religious instruction of the children and young people of the Church. The Session refer with pleasure to this tangible evidence of progress made in thus providing not only the most approved accommodation for teachers and scholars, but also affording ample conveniences for carrying on the various forms of social and benevolent work, in which the Ladies' Societies of the Congregation so actively engage.

It is hoped that the completion of this long desired addition to the Church building, and its frequent use by the Congregation, will tend to the fuller development of Christian fellowship in the membership generally, and be accompanied by such increased activity in the various

departments of Christian service as shall greatly promote the special object, for which we exist as a Church—the perfecting of its individual members in the likeness of Christ, and assisting, by its various ministries, in preparing them as "living stones," ultimately to be built into that spiritual Temple whose builder is God, and of which Christ Jesus, Hinself, is the "Chief Corner Stone."

And now as we enter a new year of our Church life full of promise, and under conditions so favourable for efficient congregational work, may our membership realize the nature and responsibility of christian fellowship, so that individual members shall feel their obligation to be helpful to each other, and willing to assist in some of the many departments of service in which they are now invited to engage, for the mutual benefit of the whole Congregation, and may past discouragements as well as successes have the effect of preparing all our active members for patient continuance in well doing, and for entering with renewed zeal into those spheres of Christian activity in which they have hitherto engaged, knowing that in due season they shall reap if they faint not.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Annual General Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, was held in the Lecture Room of the Church this day, Monday, the 5th March, 1894, at the hour of 8 p.m. Mr. Crannell was moved to the chair. The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by Mr. W. Hamilton. Minutes of last Annual Meeting, held on the 6th of March, 1893, and Special Meeting held on May 29th, 1893, were read and sustained.

Reports and accounts of Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, Glebe Trustees, Ladies' Aid Society, Home Missionary Society, Foreign Missionary Society, Sabbath School, and Young People's Society, were read to the meeting.

Moved by Mr. Jas. Gibson, seconded by Mr. W. Scott, that the reports and accounts, just read, be received and adopted.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. F. P. Bronson, seconded by Prof. Macoun, that the Rev. W. T. Herridge, and Messrs. Hamilton, Gibson and Ray, be a committee to attend to the publication of the Annual Report and the distribution of the same to the Congregation.—Carried.

By-law No. 21 of the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church.

Moved by Mr. A. W. Fleck, seconded by Mr. C. C. Ray, that Bylaw No. 21 of the Temporal Committee, be hereby ratified and confirmed. —Carried.

Moved by P. Larmonth, Esq., seconded by W. Hamilton, Esq., that Messrs. L. Crannell and C. C. Ray, be nominated for vacancy in the Temporal Committee, and Mr. Geo. Stockand for the vacancy on the Glebe Trustee Board, and that suspending all rules to the contrary, the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot for the same.—Carried.

The Secretary cast a ballot and announced that Messrs. L. Crannell and C. C. Ray were elected members of the Temporal Committee, and Mr. Geo. Stockand a member of the Glebe Trustee Board for three years.

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Moved by Mr. F. P. Bronson, seconded by Mr. P. Larmouth, that the thanks of the members of the Church and Congregation be tendered the Building Committee for the satisfactory way in which they have discharged their duties in connection with the erection of the new addition to the Church building, comprising the Sunday School Hall, Ladies' Parlors, and Caretaker's residence.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. G. L. Orme, seconded by Prof. Macoun, that the thanks of the Congregation are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society for having undertaken and completed so acceptably the furnishing of the parlors and Committee rooms of the new building.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. Hamilton, seconded by Prof. Macoun, that the thanks of the Congregation be tendered the members of the Temporal Committee for the past year.—Carried.

Meeting was closed with prayer by Mr. F. P. Bronson, at 10 p.m.



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REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church.

The Temporal Committee herewith submit their statement of receipts and expenditures for the past year, duly audited. As will be seen, the balance of cash on hand is seven hundred and eighty-four dollars and thirteen cents (784.13).

Your Committee have to report that all accounts for the past year have been paid, with the exception of six months' interest on Church mortgage, amounting to eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$875.00), which becomes due on the 15th March.

We have also to report that we expect to receive from the Kirk Session the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) from the schedule funds, this being one thousand dollars less than the usual grant.

The advance in pew rents has been well received by members of the Congregation, and payments most satisfactory.

We also report a legacy from the late John Roberts of two thousand dollars (2000.00), to be applied to the erection of a new organ; also a legacy from the late Robert Reid, of one hundred dollars (\$100), to be applied towards the payment of the Church debt. Both of these amounts have been placed in the bank as a special deposit.

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REPORT OF THE GLEBE TRUSTEES.

In presenting the Fourth Annual Report, the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church are pleased to be able to report that they have succeeded to a very large extent in accomplishing the objects for which the Corporation was formed, and that the finances of the Church have already been very much relieved by the application of the sales of the Glebe property.

When the Glebe Trustees first assumed office, they received from the Temporal Committee mortgages and balances unpaid upon lots sold on the east side of the Rideau Canal, upon the property known as Spenceville, to the amount of about \$7,000.

No lots were sold by the Temporal Committee, west of the Canal, during the time the property was managed by the Temporal Committee, as it was then subject to the mortgage upon the Church.

Prior to the 1st March, 1893, the Glebe Trustees had sold from the property upon the west side of the Canal seventy-three lots at the price of \$25,885.00, which were included in the statement made at the last Annual Meeting. During the past year they have sold one hundred and seventy-eight lots, realizing \$40,300. Prior to the 1st of March, 1893, they had paid to the Temporal Committee, for the purposes of the Congregation, out of the principal moneys arising from sales of Glebe lots, several sums, amounting in the aggregate to \$7,927.12, besides paying off the mortgage upon the Glebe property east of the Canal, amounting to \$1,500.

In addition to these sums they have paid during the year which has just closed, \$2,322.88, to pay off the floating debt of the Committee, as authorized by By-law, passed on 12th January, 1893; \$5,150 for the mortgage and interest upon the Manse, held by Mr. Stephens; the proceeds of loan upon a portion of the Glebe property west of Bank street; for the erection on the new School building, over \$20,000, and a further sum for the completion of the building of \$5,500.

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These sums:—\$7,927.12, \$1,500, \$2,322.88, \$5,150, \$5,500, make in all the sum of \$22,400 paid over to the Temporal Committee, and applied on the payment of incumbrances upon Church property.

They have also paid the outlay for opening streets, and taxes, and for necessary charges upon the property, and have a balance of \$900.00 from rents and interest to pay to the Temporal Committee.

The balance on hand, after making all payments, is \$8,874.81 in cash, and there is due to the Trustees, either represented by mortgages or unpaid balances upon lots sold, a sum of \$39,360.48, making the balance in cash and mortgages \$48,235.

This sum, \$48,235, together with \$22,400 already expended, shows the net amount realized from the property so far, namely, \$70,635.

The mortgage liabilities upon the whole property of the Congregation now amount to \$59,500, consisting of the mortgage to Mr. Gilmour, upon the Church building, \$35,000; the mortgage upon the Manse, \$4,500; and the mortgage upon the Glebe, \$20,000; and it is intended to reduce these mortgages by payment as rapidly as possible.

Of these mortgages \$55,000 bear only five per cent. interest, while the Glebe Trustees are receiving six per cent. for the balance due to them, so that the interest account of the Congregation is now nearly balanced.

The property unsold consists of about six hundred lots, of which ninety are east of the Canal, one hundred and three between the Canal and Bank street, and 407 between Bank street and Concession street.

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REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The Building Committee of the Sunday School Hall beg to report that during the year they have held thirty meetings for the dispatch of business.

The plans prepared by Messrs. Gregg & Gregg, architects, of Toronto and Ottawa, having been approved by the Congregation, tenders were advertised for, and on the 25th February, 1893, the Committee met and opened tenders from thirty-two persons or firms, and accepted the tender of Mr. James Strachan for the whole of the work, with the exception of heating and ventilation.

Subsequently contracts were made with Messrs. Torney & Georgeson for heating and ventilation, and with Messrs. P. J. Powers & Co. for steam boiler, etc.

The excavations, drains, foundations, and stone work were done under the supervision of Mr. Donald Masson as clerk of works, and all the other details carried out under the direction of Mr. A. H. Gregg. The Committee are satisfied that all the work has been done well and faithfully, and so as to reflect credit on architects, contractors, and all concerned.

The thanks of the Committee are due Mr. C. A. Biggar, surveyor, for services in surveying the Church property, the charge for which he contributed to the building fund.

The work is completed, with the exception of a few details, such as the clearing up of the grounds, sodding, fencing, etc., which cannot be done until the snow disappears. When all completed, the building will cost in the neighborhood of \$28,000.

The Committee have now much pleasure in handing over to the Congregation, a building which is substantial, elegant, commodious, and eminently adapted for carrying on the work of the Church in all its departments of Christian usefulness.

These to form the Executive Committee and to be ex-officio members of all Committees.

The Ladies' Aid Society have much pleasure in presenting their Report for the year ended on the 28th ultimo.

The meetings of the Society have been held regularly during the year every Friday afternoon, at three o'clock, the Poor Relief Committee meeting half an hour earlier.

The average attendance at the meetings was 16, the largest number present at any one meeting being 25, and the smallest number 10.

It is now some fifteen years since the subject of a Sunday School Hall, with appropriate rooms for the use of the different Societies in connection with the Church was first spoken of.

To many the realization of such a scheme appeared almost hopeless; this year, however, has seen the accomplishment of this important undertaking. On the 26th of January, the Society met for the first time in the spacious and beautiful parlonrs set apart for the purpose of the Society in the new building.

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Many changes have taken place during the twenty years that have elapsed since the Society met for the first time in the basement of what was then the new Church. Death has claimed not a few of our members, others having gone to make new homes for themselves elsewhere, or to help in strengthening sister Churches.

It is a source of much gratification to the Society, that one of its members after years of valuable service, to use parliamentary language, still retains her seat. The esteemed Treasurer recently completed her 20th year in office.

Since our last Report was submitted four entertainments have been given under the auspices of the Society. On the 24th of March last, tableaux, that had been presented in connection with a concert held a few weeks previous, were repeated in the Lecture Room of the Church. The usual Christmas Sale was held on the 13th of December, and on the evening of the 26th of January, a concert by the Lotus Glee Club of Boston, assisted by Miss Marshall, elocutionist, and by Miss Belle Botsford, violinist, was given in the new hall. The success of the concert was undoubted; the music and recitations were all that could be desired; the audience was large and appreciative; the acoustic and seating arrangements of the Hall most satisfactory, and the financial part most gratifying.

The Anniversary Social was held on the 16th ultimo, a later date than usual, the delay being caused by the opening ceremonies of the new hall. An excellent programme was provided by the Young People's Society, after which tea was served by the ladies in the basement of the Church.

The Society closed last season with a balance on hand of \$402.17, \$400 of which was placed to the special fund, leaving a balance on hand of \$2.17 to commence the present season.

The amount realized from the entertainments and from all other sources during the year amounted to \$421.08.

The Society has given assistance this winter to what might be termed a branch of Home Mission work by helping to refurnish some of the rooms in Coligny College.

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Donations of a practical nature have been given to the Home for Friendless Women and to the Home for Aged Men.

Up to this date, out of the special fund reserved for this purpose, the ladies have carpeted and furnished the new parlors, and provided window shades and matting for different parts of the building.

It is with deep regret we have to record the death of two members during the past year, Mrs. W. A. Ross and Mrs. Jamieson. Both these ladies took a warm interest in the work of the Society; Mrs. Ross having been a member since the organization of the Society some twenty years ago.



The meetings have been held regularly every month, now on the first Friday of the month, instead of the second, and the interest in the work seems to grow, as membership fees and collections show a steady increase year by year.

It is now nearly seven years ago since the need of taking up Home Mission work was felt, and as an outcome this Society was formed, which has gone on from small beginnings, steadily increasing, both in membership and funds, until ere long we hope to maintain a missionary without the aid of the Board, and thus feel that this work is entirely our own. Lake Dauphin, a place about 75 miles from the railway, was the field assigned to us, and there the missionary began his labours among a small settlement of about a dozen families and many young men, all much scattered, but the district soon began to fill up with a good class of settlers. One preaching station after another was established, a Church built at Lake Dauphin, and services held on alternate Sundays at the other places.

Last summer this Dauphin district had grown so rapidly that it was necessary to divide it into two districts, as it was impossible for one man to do justice to the entire ground, and Mr. Jarvis a student of

Manitoba College, was appointed to the larger Dauphin district, comprising the stations of Lake Dauphin, Gartmore, Gillies, Ochre, Turtle, and Willow Loop, covering an extent of over 30 miles. In one year, Mr. Jarvis wrote that he had driven over 3,000 miles in all sorts of roads and in all sorts of weather. The need of a railway is very much felt, as there is no market for the produce of the farmer, and when this need is supplied as it promises to be in the near future, it will be a very thriving and prosperous settlement. Many young men from good homes have taken up land there, and were it not for the services of our missionary, would be very much neglected. Mr. Jarvis, in addition to his numerous church services, has established a Literary and Debating Society for the benefit of the young people during the week evenings, and it In connection with this movement, Mr. met with much acceptance. Jarvis wrote begging for reading matter, and thanks to many of the ladies, two large boxes of papers, books and magazines have been sent out, also large numbers of Sunday School papers, and gratefully acknowledged as supplying a much felt want. We, in our comfortable homes, with all their privileges, have little conception of the monotony of life on the prairie, and to an educated young man, removed from all the advantages of city life, the advent of fresh literature, and the thought that some kind friends are thinking of their wants, must be stimulating and encouraging, and it is hoped that this assistance on the part of the ladies will be generously followed up.

Our field is now in new hands, Mr. Jarvis having been obliged to leave in December, but the first monthly letter, always the most interesting feature of our meetings, received and read last Friday from the new missionary, Mr. Fargon, shows promise that the work will not suffer in his hands, as he is imbued with an carnest zeal and purpose in the new charge allotted to him.

Just a year ago, Mr. Jarvis sent an earnest appeal for money to build a new church at Gillies, a much felt want, the ladies responded by making a special effort, and with the help of the Young People's Missionary Society, the desired amount, \$60.00, was sent out and gratefully acknowledged. The Sunday School also showed its sympathy with our work by sending out \$60.00 to be placed at our credit, and with the \$250.00 sent out in December, makes the largest amount yet raised by the Society.

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At the thank-offering in April the sum of \$118.00 was realized. Through the kindness of two of our members, Mrs. Larmonth and Mrs. Mackay, who gave garden parties in aid of the mission, our funds were very materially assisted, \$29.00 being contributed at the former and \$42.50 at the latter.

Last month a Missionary Tea was given in the new parlors and was very successful, owing to the presence of Dr. Robertson, who gave a most interesting account of mission work in the Northwest and especially in the Lake Dauphin field. On this occasion \$27.30 was contributed. We are hoping that next year we shall be able to send the entire \$400.00, the amount specified as necessary for the missionary's salary, which has now to be supplemented by the Board. With increased accommodation for our meetings, we hope that our numbers may be increased, more enthusiasm shown, and that we may not neglect to make the best use of our privileges.

On the 27th of September, 1893, a meeting was called by our Pastor for the purpose of considering the amalgamation of the Institute and the Young People's Missionary Society into a young people's society. At this meeting it was decided to invite all the young people of the Church to meet and discuss the matter. They met on October 13th, and after some discussion a society to be called the Young People's Society was formed, a constitution and by-laws adopted and officers elected. Although only a few months have passed since its organization, this society has now a membership of eighty-eight (88) and has been working as the following brief reports will show.

Invitation Committee.—Through the efforts of this committee sixteen (16) names have been added to the membership of the society, while many others have received an invitation to join us. The committee have an important work also to do in inviting to the public services of the Church young people not attending any other place of worship, and in giving a hearty welcome to strangers; in this they have done good work and helped to increase the attendance.

Prayer Meeting Committee.—Six devotional meetings have been held so far, and the attendance, although not so large as it might be, has been good, and is slowly but steadily increasing. Lists of the topics of the meetings have been printed and placed in the hands of the executive for distribution. The spirit of the meetings has been such as to fill us with gratitude to Him who is guiding our progress so wisely and blessing our efforts so abundantly.

Social Committee.—There have been two social evenings, at which this committee served refreshments and tried in every way to promote a spirit of friendliness.

Music and Literary Committee.—The work of these committees is very arduous, but notwithstanding the difficulties excellent programmes consisting of literary and musical selections and debates have been provided for five social evenings and an "at home" to the young people of the Church.

Missionary Committee.—The duty of this committee is to stimulate missionary interest and zeal among the young people of our congregation. To this end missionary evenings are given every three months to the young people, and a Mission Band has been formed to work among the children. The officers of the Mission Band are:

The number of scholars on the roll is 257; of teachers and officers, 29, total, 286, a slight increase in the number reported last year. The average attendance has been, scholars 151; teachers and officers, 22, total, 173. Eight teachers have resigned during the year, and their places have been filled by Misses Gallup, I. Gibson, Gilchrist, S. McDonald, Perkins, and Messrs. J. R. Reid, A. Gallup and G. Wilson.

The Annual Pic-nic was held at Besserer's Grove, the conveyance being by steamer. It was much enjoyed by those who took part in it, but was fi hope for a success fir

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but was financially a failure. On future occasions of this kind we shall hope for a much larger support from parents and friends, so as to ensure success financially and otherwise.

The opening of the new Sunday School Hall has been the event of chief interest in the course of the year. The School held its first session in the new Hall on Sunday, the 28th January, 1894, by a service appropriate to the occasion, when, besides the Scholars, a large number of the Congregation were present. Suitable addresses were delivered by Rev, Mr. Herridge, Mr. Chrysler, Mr. Macoun and the Superintendent. The Hall has now been in use for several weeks, and is found to be admirably adapted for the work of the School, the separate class rooms for the more advanced classes being conducive to better order closer attention, greater comfort, richer results.

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The Festival was held on 9th February, last. Tea was served in the basement of the Church, after which all adjourned to the new Hall where an excellent programme was presented. The comfort and convenience of this arrangement were much appreciated.

An orchestra of eight or nine instruments, besides the piano, now assists in leading the service of praise, which is greatly improved thereby. A cabinet organ for the use of the Primary class has been kindly presented by Messrs. J. L. Orme & Son; to whom we take this opportunity of conveying our thanks.
