New York, May 29—Four hundred thousand trained Halian reservists from the United States are expected to respond to their nation's call to the colors.

Bager Italians have flocked to the consulate to enroll and to urge that they be sent among the first.
While Vice Consul Siletti said that no official order had been received calling the reservisis living in the United States to the colors, Erccole Cantelmo, editor of the II Glournale Italiano, said that the issuance of the call is now a matter of hours only.
