DEFENCE CLOSES THE \$12,000 NOTE CASE

Session Marked by Much Argument --James D. Seely One of the Witnesses at Today's Session -- More Interesting Letters Are Before the Court

The case for the defence was closed, and the evidence in rebuttal was commenced at this morning's hearing before Mr. Justice McKeown in the circuit court in the case of Thomas Nagle vs. the St. John and Quebec Railway Company and the Quebec and St. John Construction Company on their note for \$12,000.

Ross Thompson concluded his evidence, E. S. Crawford, assistant manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, was heard with regard to the entries connected with the transaction when the note was put up as collateral, and James D. Seely was called by the counsel for the plaintiff to establish the consideration for which the note was given and other matters already touched upon in the previous evidence.

The session was marked by constant arguments as to the admissibility of evidence, Mr. Mullin objecting to much of the evidence submitted. When the court opened Ross Thompson, managing director of the Quebec and St. John Construction Company, again took the stand. D. Mullin, K.C., continuing his re-examination, referred to the evidence that the \$12,000 item had been struck out of the accounts of the construction company, and asked "That item does not now appear in the accounts?"

"It does not," was the answer. "Questioned by Dr. Wallace, 'What do you mean by striking it out?' " "It was taken off the books." "You altered the books on March 21?" "Yes." "After this suit commenced?" "It was objected to early in February." "But notwithstanding the objection of Mr. Bischoff it went to the commission?" "Yes, to his objection." "And was not struck out until after the suit commenced?" "The suit had nothing to do with it."

Dr. Wallace, president of your construction company, signed all notes at that time?" "I don't know of him signing any notes of that note. He signs contracts and other documents." Pres. Wilson Appeals To John D. Rockefeller

Seeks to Have Coal Strike Ended—Half Million Men May be Called From Mines of States

(Canadian Press) Washington, D. C., April 27.—President Wilson has made a personal appeal to John D. Rockefeller to bring about a settlement of the Colorado coal strike and end the violence which has cost a score of lives and large property loss. Des Moines, Iowa, April 27.—Unless conditions are improved in the southern Colorado coal strike of the 200,000 coal miners of the country probably will be called next week. John P. White, international president of the United Mine Workers, said today that a meeting of the executive board has been called for May 8 in Indianapolis to consider the question. There has been a great demand for a strike after the country, President White said, "Both east and west have asked for the walkout because of the conditions in the Colorado fields. Telegrams are being received every day, asking for a strike, and a meeting of the board has been called for next week. The international organization can order the strike, if it is found advisable. It would affect 200,000 to 300,000 miners."

BOTH SCHOONERS ARE CONDEMNED AND SOLD

John S. Spiane, of the firm of J. Spiane & Co., returned on Saturday from Southwest Harbor, Me., where he was looking after the schooner Calabria and Oriole. He said this morning that both vessels were condemned and sold. A schooner from Machias, is on its way to the scene of the wreck of the Oriole to transfer her cargo and complete her voyage to Boston. Nothing has yet been done towards salvaging the Calabria's cargo. Both vessels are total wrecks and will likely be smashed up.

ON THE RIVER

The river steamer Champlain this afternoon completed the first round trip of the season. She went up the Belle Isle as far as the ice would permit and then returned making frequent stops. She brought back a large number of passengers and all the cargo she could carry.

MEDIATION NOT YET FULLY ARRANGED

No Official Word From Huerta But Despatch to Press is Bellicose—Carranza's Staff Give Warning of Ruin --Quieter in Capital and Mexico City

Washington, D. C., April 27.—Swiftly moving changes in the Mexican crisis, including receipt of private diplomatic advice that Huerta, like the United States government, had decided to accept the good offices of three South American powers, centered today in interest over possible courses that might be pursued in an attempt at amicable settlement. Ambassador Riano, of Spain, who received the private advice of Huerta's reported decision, expected to be in a position today to place the provisional president's former representatives of the arbitrating countries, Argentina, Chile and Brazil, South American republics.

DOES THIS MEAN FIGHT

New York, April 27.—The foregoing despatch from President Huerta of Mexico, was received at the New York office of the International News Service today. It was in reply to the following despatch sent to him on Sunday: "Chili, Argentine and Brazil offer mediation between the United States and Mexico, will you accept?" Huerta's reply was: "The republic of Mexico has always fulfilled its international obligations, and at every crisis will defend its rights trampled upon by the government of the United States. (Signed) 'V. Huerta'."

MAY BE GAME, SAY REBEL CHIEFS

Chihuahua, Mexico, April 27.—"Any settlement of the difficulties in Mexico, which will bring about the elimination of Huerta, will be satisfactory to the Constitutionalists." This was the general sentiment of members of the cabinet of General Carranza today. But they do not think that Huerta will yield, and declare that any indication from the rebels that they are ready to negotiate is only a ruse to gain time.

WAR NOTES

Zapala, rebel bandit army leader, is said to have pledged support to Huerta. The Federalists and Constitutionalists still were fighting at Tampico yesterday. Several Americans were reported to be prisoners in Mexico City, including Mrs. Schmitt, wife of the United States consul at Aguas Calientes. General Furstenberg's men were loaded at Vera Cruz today. It has been arranged that all American citizens be permitted to leave Mexico City. The 5,000 Mexicans held at Fort Bliss, near El Paso, are to be removed to Fort Wingate, New Mexico. Villa left Juarez today for Chihuahua. He said he was sure the crisis was over. The New York World has a copy-righted despatch from Mexico City, which reports that things are quieter and that there is no longer a rush of Americans to get away. Nearly all the American stores have reopened, and the stores owned by persons of other nationality have removed their shutters. Admiral Bagge says all Americans taken by the revolution at Tampico, General Huerta has not officially replied to the offer of mediation.

FIGHTING TIME AT OTTAWA NEAR

Ottawa, April 27.—Parliament appears to be approaching a fighting stage on the redistribution bill and the Canadian Northern aid bill. Likely the latter will have to be forced through under closure; but the militia estimates, which are strenuously resisted in caucus, parliament will be given the terms on Wednesday.

RIVER ICE AT THE CAPITAL IS GOING

Five Feet of Snow in Boletown Woods —Mr. Corbett Gets Contract. Fredericton, April 27.—There is little change today in the condition of the river. The ice opposite the city is melting rapidly and is considerably broken up. It is being held in place by the bridge piers. Below the railway bridge there is open water for several hundred yards. A Boiestown man today reports five feet of snow in the Miramichi woods. When he left home this morning the crust was strong enough to hold him. R. A. Corbett, of St. John, has accepted the contract to erect the new school building here.

A MODEL IN SILK

with the large "O" perforations running parallel. As no fitting is used, time will be saved in making the waist. First, close shoulder seam; tuck, creasing on slot perforations; stitch 1 inch from folded edge. Pleat lower edge, placing "T" on small "o" perforations and tack. Close under-arm seam as notched. Gather lower edge of front and back between double "o" perforations. Center-front indicated by large "O" perforations. Sew stay to lower edge, centers even, small "o" perforation at under-arm seams. Adjust shield, corresponding perforations in front and in shield even, leaving left side free for opening. Sew, leaving collar to neck edge, center-backs even and along single perforations in shield. Sew standing collar to neck edge as notched.

Close seams of sleeve and cuffs as notched. Sew cuff to lower edge of lower sleeve as notched; sew cuff to lower edge of upper sleeve, double "o" perforations and seams even. Sew in armhole as notched, easing in any fullness.

Close skirt seam as notched. Pleat, bringing "T" to corresponding double small "o" perforations and tack. Turn under front edge on slot perforations. Close center-back seam. Center-front indicated by line of double "o" perforations. Front of tunic indicated by large "O" perforations; adjust on skirt, upper edge even, single large "O" perforation at seam. Pleat skirt, creasing on slot perforations; bring folded edge to corresponding lines of small "o" perforations in tunic and skirt, and stitch. Lap right front edge of skirt on left, centers even, and stitch, leaving edge free above large "O" perforation for placket, and, if desired, allow lower part to hang free below triple "o" perforations. Sew to lower edge at waist over stay, centers even.

The dress is pretty made entirely of one material, but vesting may be gathered by using lace for the full to entice the neck.

Massachusetts Legislation—A State Board of Barber Examiners

Boston, April 27.—The Massachusetts House of Representatives has passed to be engrossed, the bill to permit cities and towns to appoint women as police officers. The measure was not without its opponents, however, and they made an unsuccessful attempt to secure a roll-call.

Mr. Wilson of Lynn spoke for the bill, which, he said, if passed would "throw a safeguard around the young girls in the streets of our cities and towns."

A number of seals was seen on the ice field. Captain Williams, formerly of the Elder-Dempster steamer Benin, is now in command of the Benda.

R. M. S. P. liner Chignecto arrived at Halifax at 4 p. m. yesterday. Furness liner Rappahannock left Halifax yesterday at 6.30 p. m. for London. Manchester Commerce, Captain Payne, arrived yesterday at 8.30 from Manchester direct. The Commerce reported having spoken the tern schooner E. M. Roberts off Point Lepreau.

The E. M. Roberts is bound from Mobile to Dauphin with a cargo of hard pine.

The Manchester boat will load 45,000 bushels of grain and 500 standards of deals here for Manchester and will complete cargo at Philadelphia.

The steamer Manchester Port, which is now docked at the west side, had a very eventful voyage on her last trip from here to Manchester. They met with such high and tempestuous seas that the engineers' quarters on the after section of the saloon deck was badly smashed in and two life boats were crushed to splinters and swept into the sea. The wreckage was thrown by the seas against the funnel, denting it considerably. The doors of the deck-houses were torn off and the hatches loosened, a large amount of water entering the holds and damaging the cargo. Repairs were made at Manchester.

Parcel Post Regulations.

The post office department has found it necessary to issue another notice to emphasize the fact that parcels up to limit of eleven pounds will now be accepted for transmission by parcel post and that the five cents delivery charge for places where a letter-delivery service is in operation has been abolished.

STRANGE DISEASE IN WESTMORLAND

Dorchester, N. B., April 26—Taylor Village, one of Dorchester's suburbs, is this evening in the grip of a mysterious disease. Some four weeks ago a family named Fraser arrived via the port of St. John, from a small village in Scotland and took up their abode in the parish of Dorchester. Mr. Fraser secured work from Norman McKelvie, a prosperous farmer of this parish. On Wednesday evening Mr. McKelvie's youngest child was taken ill and died on Thursday evening. Friday Mrs. McKelvie, mother of the child, was stricken with a severe sickness and Dr. Alfred Gaudet, of St. Joseph was called, together with Dr. Arnold of Dorchester, as consulting physicians.

A few hours later two of the remaining children of the family were taken ill and evening Dr. Price, St. John, White and Bourque, who represented the Westmorland county board of health, were called in consultation with Drs. Gaudet and Arnold.

TOMORROW'S ELECTION

The interests of St. John and of all the citizens are involved in the civic election which takes place tomorrow. Much depends upon the men who will conduct the civic administration for the next two years. The election, therefore, should consider the situation very seriously, and not only vote, but vote for the men they believe to be best fitted to discharge the duties of office.

St. John has made a good beginning under the commission plan of government. This fact is not disputed by anybody. The financial condition of St. John has been commented upon by Canadian and British financial journals in the very highest terms, and this at a time when extensive civic improvements have been made in the departments of public works and water and sewerage.

BRING ON THE ENQUIRY

The St. John Standard this morning prints the following editorial paragraph: "Now that Premier Flemming is able to be about again and has given charges and complete denial to the charges made against him, we hear less from the men and newspapers opposed to him regarding his dirtful fate when Mr. Dugal's allegations are submitted to the Royal Commission for hearing. Possibly this is not surprising for, as a general thing, men like Mr. Carvell and his professional muckrakers associated with him, are less ready to attack a man when he is able to confront them."

AN AFFAIR OF HONOR

The delicate attention which Mr. R. H. Butts, a member of the Nova Scotia legislature, paid last week to the nasal organ of Senator Dennis has added somewhat to the gaiety of nations, and has led an Ottawa correspondent to speculate upon the probability of a duel between Mr. Butts and Senator Dennis, with Regis rifles, and with Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes as seconds for both parties.

have quite contradictory accounts of the thrilling scene. The Herald describes the act of Mr. Butts as a vicious attempt to assault Senator Dennis; and says that when the latter entered the committee room, in the legislative building, Mr. Butts advanced and struck the senator in the face, whereupon Mr. Dennis, with senatorial courage, "grappled with his burly assailant," while others, no less than three of whom are named, pulled Mr. Butts away and led him to his seat at the committee table.

The senator, the Echo informs us, made no response, and it strenuously denies that there is any truth in the alleged statement of Mr. W. R. McCurdy of the Herald's staff that he had "saved the senator's life by grabbing Mr. Butts' arm and breaking his grip on the senator's nasal organ."

The members of the St. John school board had only to journey as far as Bangor, in the neighboring state of Maine, to discover how far the schools of St. John fall below those of a neighboring city in the matter of provision for practical training for office and business life.

President Wilson has heartily assented to the request of Brazil, Argentina, and Chile that they be permitted to negotiate for a settlement of the trouble in Mexico. It is not President Wilson's policy to make war on Mexico, if that can be avoided, and it is his policy to bind all the American republics into as close sympathy as possible.

There is very good reason to regard with some degree of suspicion much of the cable news which comes to this country telling of the warlike conditions in Ulster. A good deal of this news evidently filters through Conservative channels, and reveals the bias of the writers. The British government is not faltering in its policy with regard to Home Rule. The danger of serious war in Ulster is doubtless very much less than is represented.

MONDAY, APRIL 27. Hon. H. L. Drayton, chairman of the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners, was born in Kingston forty-five years ago today. Before accepting his present office, he spent most of his professional life in the City of Toronto, where he rose from assistant city solicitor to corporation counsel.

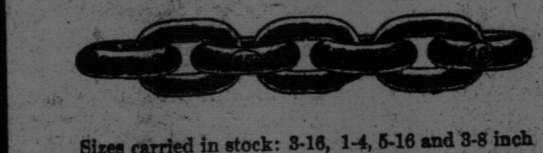

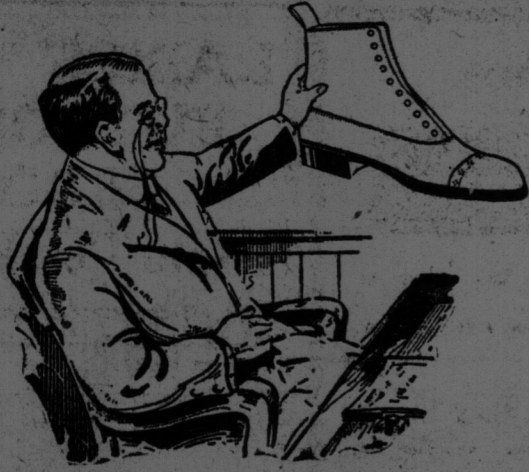

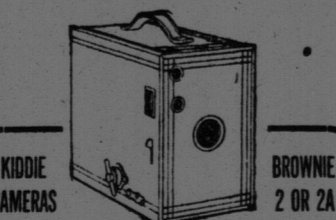

EFFECT OF WAR ON CANADIAN TRADE AND FINANCING

(Financial Times, Montreal).
While the war between the United States and Mexico is not expected to interrupt the present commercial activity in Canada, there can be no doubt that the financial affairs of the Dominion will not be improved by the hostilities.

In some industrial quarters there may be cause for gratification that such a war is in progress, but on the whole a prolonged state of fighting would have a very injurious effect upon Canadians, as it will have on the general trade situation in the states.

Fortunately, the Mexican situation will not have the awful possibilities of a European war as did the Balkan war, and this may have the effect of reassuring European money markets and investors generally.

May Stop Cash Cakes.

So far as we understand the Canadian requirements, the benefits of the natural liquidation in business which has been going on for eighteen months must be regarded as present necessities. The Old Country. It is true that the recent municipal and provincial loans would bring a large amount of capital to this country, but it is a steady flow of more or less private and institutional investment funds, to say nothing of British money advanced by the industrial revolution.

The worst feature of all in these great wars is the aftermath. There is so much destruction of property and of capital that the financial machinery is unable to meet the demands for recuperative purposes, and for normal world-development. That is the very worst stage, from a non-economic point of view, and if the war is at all prolonged we would advise our commercial friends to put their house in order on the first cry of a peace outlook.

LOCAL MILITARY MATTERS

More Activity is Noticed—Army Medical Men to Camp Sussex This Year

A tone of renewed activity is being noted with regard to militia affairs in St. John following the opening of the new armory, and it is expected that the various corps will benefit with an increase in recruits and general strength, as well as in interest. Each regiment in the city now has its own quarters in the armory and the usual spring activities are being advanced with apparently more enthusiasm than for some time.

The rural corps which take their annual training at Sussex Camp are now recruiting for that purpose and are not finding it difficult to secure the desired number of men. During the last few years the local Army Medical Corps has not trained at Sussex Camp but a change has been ordered for this season and, instead of going to Aldershot in the fall, they will encamp at Sussex. This will mean an addition of about ninety men from St. John to this city's strength at the annual camp. There will be a further increase in the local strength in the case of No. 2 Section of No. 9 company of Signallers, now recruiting to their full strength of twenty-four, instead of eight as formerly has been the case. This year's camp will open about June 23. During the last few weeks instructions have been given in signalling in the new armory by Lieut. Allan Leavitt, of No. 2 section, to the men of that body and the "rockies," while A. J. Lindsay, Q. M. S. I. of the same corps, has been instructing some of the 3rd regiment signallers.

Sergeant Instructor Love of the Canadian School of Signalling will arrive here from Quebec this week to conduct a course of instruction in this branch during the following four weeks. The school will be held in the armory and a good number of candidates have expressed their intention of attending. The course of instruction in artillery which had been in progress for several weeks with the members of the 3rd Regiment is now about ended, and examinations are in order. Captain Tremaine, of the R. C. G. A., Quebec, arrived in St. John on Saturday and will conduct the examinations of those who took the course.
