WAB NEWS

The war situation has assumed a new phase, particularly in the Balkans. Bulgaria has joined Germany and Austria and has declared war on Serbia. Austro-German troops have invaded Serbia and taken Belgrade, but at a great cost of life.

Greece is standing aloof, claiming that present conditions do not require her to fulfil her treaty with Serbia. Meanwhile, Allied troops are landing at Salonika in Greece to assist the Serbians, and Russian troops are also being rushed to the scene. Rumania is armed and watching. Greece's and Rumania's sympathies are no doubt with Serbia. Italy, so far, is not taking any part in the Balkan campaign. Her troops are constantly forcing the Austrians back. The Dardanelle operations are likely to be given up for awhile, at least.

The Russians have commenced to drive the Austro-German back, and are meeting with considerable success. French and British troops in France and Belgium are following up their big recent success by a further advance. British submarines are active in the Baltic Sea, and a number of German ships have been sunk. Efforts are being made to get the Japanese to send soldiers to Europe to participate in the struggle.

Dr. Geisel Addresses The Women and Children

On Thursday morning, Oct. 7th, in the Meth. School Hall Dr. Geisel addressed a gathering of the women and children of Bay Roberts and adjacent settlements. Her talk to the women consisted mainly of advice on health matters, food, drinks, etc. To keep healthy every day and a cold sponge bath daily. Children should sleep in rooms with windows open. Referring to the Nfld. climate Dr. Geisel said: You have wonderful crisp air here and wonderful water. If mothers don't do a good job raising men, the country will suffer. She again pointed out the evil effects of alcohol and urged the women to help the men root out the liquor traffic.

A Poor Man's Question

This Prohibition question is a workingman's question. You ask, Why? Because it is the working man and his family who suffers the most from the effects of intoxicating liquor. You ask again, Why? Because the workingman—be he fisherman, laborer, mechanic or clerk—is usually employed in dangerous places, and under the influence of liquor very often loses his life. A short time ago in St. John's and other places in the Colony about ten accidents occurred within a month or so, resulting in the loss of life in each case. Some of these fatal accidents may be traced to strong drink. The newspapers do not always give the cause out of respect for the feelings of the relatives of the dead man, but in reading the account of the tragedy one can very often read between the lines. Hence, many fatal and other accidents are the result of strong drink. But supposing there were only one or two every 12 months, we ask, Does it Pay?

Shrapnel Shell, Deadliest Missile

It has been calculated that if one man were required to make a shrapnel shell it would take him five days, working eight hours a day, the cartridge case and the powder being already supplied to him. The making of high explosives is therefore an extremely difficult business, requiring the minutest care and precision. A badly-made shell is more than a shell wasted or a shell that explodes at the wrong time. It may destroy the gun from which it is discharged, and in many cases this would be the equivalent from a military point of view of the loss of a hundred men. It is plain, therefore, that inspection cannot be too thorough, for it is conceivable that a battle might be lost through some apparently trifling mechanical defect in the shell. The workmen who are engaged in this business, therefore, are doing quite as much as the men at the front to bring victory to their country's arms.

The Inventor of Shrapnel.
Shrapnel is named after Lieut. Henry Shrapnel, of the British Royal Artillery, who devised the explosive, having received his inspiration at the siege of Gibraltar in 1781. The first test was made in 1803, and the weapon was used successfully against the French at Vimiera in 1808. The first shrapnel was spherical in form, and was filled with bullets and a bursting charge of powder. On occasion rusty nails, stones and all sorts of metallic rubbish have been employed instead of bullets, but when it is possible to get lead bullets or steel-covered lead bullets they are preferred. Shrapnel reaches the maximum of destructiveness, probably, in the famous 75 guns of the French artillery. The shell of this gun is three inches in diameter, and the maximum range is about 8,500 metres, but in general practice the range is about 6,000 metres. The best infantry has an effective range of only about a third of this distance. The shrapnel bullet, moreover, is heavier and therefore more deadly than the rifle bullet.

A Gun Within a Gun.
To make his hit the infantryman must see his mark. The shrapnel needs only the range, for when it explodes it literally sprays a space of 25 by 100 yards with its missiles, which number anywhere from 250 to 375. The rifle bullet at 2,000 yards has nearly spent its velocity. The shrapnel on the contrary, at the moment it bursts has a great velocity, and at the moment it leaves the muzzle of the gun. In other words, it is as though a couple of hundred infantrymen had been instantaneously transported to the very midst of the enemy and there fired upon them. A shrapnel shell has been called a gun within a gun, and with the exception of the torpedo is the most deadly and complicated weapon that has ever been devised. Contrary to common ideas, the case of the shrapnel shell does not burst when the bullets are discharged. The head of the shell continues its flight, and only after it has come in contact with a solid object does this head, which also is equipped with a number of steel-clad bullets, burst into a hundred fragments. In other words, the modern shrapnel fire operates which may be at 2,000 yards, and again when the shell strikes, which may be a couple of thousand yards further on.

How Shell is Fired.
A shrapnel shell is, on the outside, merely a huge cartridge, perhaps 18 inches long and three inches thick. It is discharged by a percussion cap operating on a charge of black powder, which in turn explodes the smokeless powder, which is the real propellant. Half-way down the cartridge, and at the base of that part of it which leaves the gun, is a rim of steel, this copper band when forced through the gun is cut by the steel rifling, and a spinning motion imparted to the shell, which increases the precision of aim. Before the gun is discharged the time fuse is set, and the discharge ignites it. If it has been timed for, say, 4,000 yards, this means that after the complete shell has traveled 1 1/2 seconds another charge of black powder in the base of the shell will be exploded. This is called the bursting charge, and it is this that explodes the bullets which are embedded in a matrix of resin. The reason for thus embedding the bullets is to keep them from moving when traveling through the air; and also because when the black powder reaches the resin it produces a

The Anti-Alcohol Movement

It was not until well into the last century that men began to realize the necessity for concerted and organized effort against the evils of intemperance. Since that time the warfare against liquor has appeared in varying aspects.

At one time the movement assumed the character of a propaganda for personal reform. Temperance evangelists, like John B. Gough and Father Murphy, by their voices and personality, made temperance reform popular, which means that many heard them gladly, and sought to give up their convivial ways. Doubtless these were not a few who radically and permanently turned from drunkenness to sobriety. At any rate, drunkenness ceased to be respectable. But these who seceded moderate drinking have generally been considered extremists; and doubtless many of them did make statements regarding the effects of alcohol which had not been definitely proved and some statements which have never yet been proved. There have been, in fact, two classes, one condemning the use of alcohol, even in moderate quantities, and the other, though deploring the abuse of alcohol, yet deeming its moderate use.

It was in these old days that societies such as the Sons of Temperance and the Independent Order of Good Templars flourished. The latter order has continued from that time to this to do worthy work in the temperance cause, and some of the strongest workers in the antirum campaign today acknowledge that they received their first impressions regarding the evil effects of the drink traffic in a Good Templar's lodge. The lodge was, in fact, one of the nuclei around which the temperance forces rallied.

As it dawned on some of the workers that the effort to reform the drunkard was something like shutting the stable door after the horse has been stolen, the Band of Hope movement was started for the young. Through this instrumentality many children obtained their first impressions of the evils of alcohol, at a time when their minds were most impressionable. Some who belonged to these bands are now prominent physicians, legislators, lecturers, whose influence is potent in the antirum warfare.

There was another movement, started by the women of Ohio. The crusaders went right into the saloons, bearing the lion in his den. Their influence was electric, and as a result there started a wave of reform, and the crusader movement crystallized into the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, which has been one of the strongest and most persistent agencies for moral reform. What this crusader years ago laid aside the methods of the crusaders, the women are none the less earnest and determined in their work for the emancipation of this country from the clutches of the rum traffic.

In 1913 Russia raised 992,587,000 bushels of wheat and the United States raised but 733,880,000 bushels.

In 1912 the United Kingdom imported 23,822,000 bushels of wheat and France 21,131,000 bushels and Russia exported 9,568,000 bushels of wheat.

The black mold belt, which extends across Southern Russia, is one of the most fertile as well as one of the most extensive arable plains on the globe.

It stretches in one long band across the whole of European Russia, and notwithstanding its faulty cultivation, like the Mississippi Valley, is one of the world's great producers of grain.

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern and Northern Districts, respectively, of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:

At Placentia, on Wednesday, the Eighth, and Thursday, the Ninth days of September next;

At Channel, on Monday, the Thirtieth, and Tuesday, the Fourteenth days of September next;

At St. George's, on Thursday, the Sixteenth, and Friday, the Seventeenth days of September next;

At Bay of Islands, on Saturday, the Eighteenth, and Monday, the Twentieth days of September next.

And that Our said Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:

At Bonaville, on Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of September next;

At Bonaville, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next;

At Trinity, on Tuesday, the Twenty-eighth day of September next;

At Brigus, on Friday, the Nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of November next;

At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth, and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of November next;

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinafter prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinafter appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinafter named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinafter stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Goals, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Dr. Geisel's Lecture At Bay Roberts

On Wednesday night, Oct. 6th, in the Public Building, Dr. Carolyn Geisel, the American health lecturer, gave a most interesting and instructive address on Food and Food Values and the question which is uppermost in the minds of our people to-day, viz: Alcohol. The building was crowded, despite the fact that the night was stormy.

Rev. Canon Field occupied the chair and introduced the speaker, who received a very close hearing. She commenced by telling those present that they wouldn't have come from their homes unless they were interested, and she wouldn't have come from her home in Michigan unless she was interested. This is an important time, declared the speaker, and because of the importance of the times she had come to talk about things worth-while.

The King hath need of great men, true men. Therefore, you should make yourselves the best men and women you can be. You should strengthen your bodies and minds so that you may be ready to face the times. Why? Because your country, your King and your God wants you. You can only make your Island great with great men.

The six cords of the cable of health are Diet, Exercise, Fresh Air, Clothing, Rational Remedies for Disease and Confident Faith in a Mighty God. You can keep your health by being careful of your diet. Diet is to the human body what gasoline is to a motor engine. Gasoline to be used in an engine should be strained. We should all be so careful about the Diet we supply the "human engine" with.

The doctor then displayed a chart representing the blood cells. We should keep the blood cells red by using colored fruits and vegetables, such as purple grapes, red cherries, greens, dandelions, tops of beet leaves, etc. Green vegetables will make the blood rich in iron. Eat cabbage, but eat it raw. Yolks of eggs contain iron.

Reference was made to the white blood cells, known as microphages and pellicans. They chase and destroy disease germs in the body. Sleep out of doors or with your windows wide open. But keep your bodies warm.

When alcohol in the shape of wine, beer, cider, or whiskey is taken it makes the white cells or microphages drunk, and they can't do their work.

Another chart was displayed showing two enlarged cells of the human brain, one being a cell taken from a healthy brain and the other cell from the brain of a confirmed drunkard.

It is of tremendous importance to this nation to have sober men.

Your boys are proving their loyalty at the front. How can you prove yours? By declaring and working for Prohibition. Your King has declared for total abstinence and what's good enough for your King is good enough for you. What the King has declared for you should declare for. Lord Kitchener has said that soldiers who drink don't recover from wounds so easily as the teetotalers. The gunshot wounds fester and don't heal up so quickly.

Do you get revenue from alcohol traffic? We cannot afford to take revenue from anything which injures and maims people.

Several charts of the human stomach were then shown, illustrating the healthy stomach, the stomach of the moderate drinker, a drunkard's stomach, the stomach in delirium tremens and a cancerous stomach.

Chew, CHEW, CHEW your food was Dr. Geisel's next slogan. In this connection a chart of a dog was shown on which a Russian scientist made certain experiments relating to the stomach and digestion. He showed that as the dog chewed food, gastric juice, full of pepsin and acid, accumulated in the stomach. This dog juice was drained off and taken by dyspeptics in America as pepsin.

Dr. Geisel declared that we strengthened our health by what we eat, fresh air and vigorous exercise.

Russia was never able to save more than \$15,000,000 a year. But in the month of January, 1915, when Russia was sober, she saved \$30,000,000. She has saved \$1,000,000,000 in 10 months since the sale of Vodka, the Russian intoxicating beverage, was stopped. If you want revenue in Nfld. to run your country copy Russia.

She pointed out how the great Empires of Rome, Greece and Italy went down because their citizens touched the "wine when it was red."

Her concluding words were: Go out of this hall to-night determined not only to keep your own heart but to be your brothers' keeper, too. Let Nfld. be a message to the King telling him that they will follow him any way. (Applause.)

Rev. Mr. Jones then moved a vote of the resolution seconded by Mr. C. E. Russell, which was heartily carried.

THE KIDDIES ADDRESSED

At the conclusion of Dr. Geisel's talk to the women, about 400 children from the various schools in this section were addressed. This was done at the request of a person on Wednesday night who is interested in children, and Dr. Geisel very readily consented to speak to the wee ones. She was rewarded by their attentiveness and close attention.

She talked to them of the importance of health, and warned them about the use of alcohol and tobacco, particularly cigarettes. She asked them to take as their slogan: "Saloons, Saloons, Saloons Must Go."

Canon Field, who was chairman, thanked Dr. Geisel on behalf of the boys and girls present.

At the close a committee was formed with Mr. Martin Sharpe chairman, and Mr. Herbert Sparkes, Secretary, to prosecute the campaign there. Shearstown will go strong for Prohibition.

Public Notice

Passports

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey.

Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are:—

1. Natural-born British subjects;
2. The wives and widows of such persons, or
3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to this Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50 which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.
