Price Will Be Higher This Year Than Unusual-P. E. I. Lot Coming.

For some time oysters have been dear in New Brunswick. This is due to the enlargement of the market for the island and Buctouche oysters by the imposition of a 25 per cent. duty on American oysters. Previous to this the States supplied the Montreal and Upper Canadian markets, but now the maritime oysters find a ready sale there.

The first shipment of island oysters is expected to reach this city tomorrow and from that time to the end of the season they will come regularly. Several thousand barrels of oysters are consumed here each year. Of these the P. E. I. are the favorite, and the sales of these oysters are about twice as great as all others combined. The Buctouche deep water oysters alone can rank with them in flavor, but few can be obtained owing to their scarcity. The formation of ice in the winter makes the close of each season, it being declared illegal to catch oysters through the ice.

A VETERAN'S CLAIM

lichael Foight Who Fought in the Crimes and the Mutiny is After Lands in Africa.

feithfully through the Indian Mutiny, is trying to set possession of a grant of land neur East London, Cape Colony, which, from communications received from the war office, and the colonial secretary, it is hardly possible he will ever live to enjoy.

Michael is an old man, a Prussian, and at times it is hard to understand him. However, he tells in broken sentences of his grievances, takes of horror in mutiny times, of the massacres which he witnessed. This old man of war has a good fighting record. On the 25th of Nov., 1855, Folght enlisted for the Crimea in the regiment of the 2nd Rifles. He was attached to the British-German Legion and saw twelve years and ten months of active service with that band of warriors.

Away back in the 30's Mr. Folght set himself in communication, with the home office regarding certain property situated in Cape Colony which, he stated, was assigned to him as a soldier. The ministers replied to the veteran that they had the honor to state that the name of Michael Fogt (not Folght) appears on the register of men of the Legion who were assigned lost at that place. The letter further read: "There appears to be no doubt that applicant is the person referred to in the register, but the ministers cannot assent to the statement that he is still entitled to the land he claims, as all men who volunteered and left for India were discharged at Port Elisabeth or East London, and such of them as failed to return to the colony surrendered all their right to promised grants of land."

This communication was from the prime minister's quarters at Cape Town.

In June, 1902, the old veteran had further word from the war office, London, stating that Field Marshal Lond Roberts expressed his regret that in view of the decision of the secretary of state for the colonies it was not possible to assist him in any way.
