AND WHEREAS the correctness of such finding has been disputed, and it is desirable to refer same to the Supreme Court Appeal Division for determination:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly, as follows:

1. The Supreme Court, Appeal Division, is hereby empowered and required to determine whether or not such finding of the said Commissioners is justified by the evidence before them, and if not, then to determine what amount should have been found as such original cost of the said property. All evidence, documents, reports and other material which were before the said Commissioners, together with their report, shall be transmitted by the Provincial Secretary Treasurer to the said Court, which may also investigate the said matter by means of such expert testimony as they shall require, the expense of which shall be paid by the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer upon certificate of the Chief Justice.





FAILED AGAIN.

The Power Company dispute goes to the Supreme Court. Premier Fos-ter, who seems to have some little when the issue is only of nominal im portance, has evidently no such con trol when, as in this case, an import portance, has evidently no such control when, as in this case, an important principle is involved. He has merely passed the buck to the court, settling on this as the easiest way cut of his dilemma after looking around for some method of shifting the responsibility. The action of the Gevernment in dodging responsibility in this manner, although the result is more satisfactory than the adoption of the Currier Bill would have been, is not the action St. John had a right to expect. But it is what might naturally have been anticipated from a leader who has so little control that his supporters could not even be persuaded to treat the opponents of that bill with ordinary courtesy. As the matter now stands, St. John is saddled with the present power rates for at least another year, the Supreme Court is burdened with a task it does not desire, and one which the Legislature, under intelligent leadership, would have been quite capable of handling, and an important principle involving the organization and management of public utilities is still undefined. All this because the Premier of the province had not sufficient lackbone to compel the support of his followers in a matter which was in no sense political, and which should have been settled once and for all by the Legislature, the only body in the province which has authority to so act. The reference to the Supreme Court is a betrayal of the Public Utilities Commission, and an open confession of weakness on the part of the Government.
