



ROJESTVENSKY CAPTURED AND EVERY RUSSIAN BATTLESHIP SUNK OR TAKEN

Togo Announces the Grim Details of His **Great Victory**

Russian Commander, Badly Wounded, Caught on One of His Torpedo Boats--Czar's Great Fleet Practically Destroyed; Sixteen of Them, Including Six Battleships, Sunk and Six in Japs' Hands--Later Particulars of Pursuit May Increase Extent of Russian Disaster--Only Two Vessels Get to Vladivostok as Yet--Russian Captain Tells How Togo Wrought Their Destruction.

Washington, May 31-The state department has received the following despatch from Tokio, May 30: It is officially announced that all of the Russian battleships have been sunk, except the Orel and Nicholas I., which were captured. Admiral Rojestvensky, Volkorsham and Nebogatoff are all prisoners.
