CHICAGO, July 23.—The Rev. Frank J. Probst discussed the Lake Pepin dissater in his sermon Sunday at the Westminster Presbyterian Church. The tornado which swept across Lake Cervais and then down the Mississippi to Lake City, destroying property and causing the death of over 100 persons, was, in his opinion, a direct judgment from God, sent to rebuke the sinfulness of the people in going upon a Sunday excursion, and intended as awarning to the rest of the world. "Last Sabbath," he said, "was a day full of horror. A disaster of a terrible nature swept down upon scores of individuals, who, in stead of following the law of God for the observance of the Sabbath, were engaged in doing their own pleasure, exercising their own peasure excursion across the lake. The tornado came howling and shrieking along, seized upon their craft and overwhelmed it in the deep water. The surroundings, so entirely Godless, were seemingly so secure, so safe. Further Details of the Guate mala-San Salvador Conflict.

ver Two Hundred Persons Killed— Costa Rica and Nicaragua Side with Guatemala,

New York, July 23.—A special dated La Libertad, Salvador, July 22, says the latest news from the frontier confirms the reports in respect to the victory of San Salvador over Guatemala in the battle of July 17. The Guatemalas, 4,000 strong, invaded Salvador. The killed numbered over 200, with many wounded. Thirty refuges from Salvador, among them Gen. Monterross, have given themselves up to the Salvadorans.

Gen. Villavicencio, a San Salvador traitor, met the San Salvador forces July 18 and was defeated. Many cases of rifles shipped from San Francisco for the Salvadorans have been seized aboard the Pacific mail steamer by the Guatemalan Government. It is believed Gen. Morran, who was aboard the steamer, and who is an aspirant for the Presidency of San Salvador, acted as an informer to Guatemala, and that the Government seized the arms on information that he furnished.

JERSEY CITY, Mexico, July 23.—Cipher dispatches from Guatemala state that Gen. Fabio Morran, while en route for San Salvador, where he intended to raise arevolt, has been arrested and thrown into prison. The report, however, is believed to be an invention of the Guatemalan Government. It is learned that three Guatemalan regiments which threated to revolt were diarmed and discharged from service.

Several reports have been made recently of the poisonous effect of drying fruit on trays made of zinc, in connection with the fumes of sulphur for bleaching. Experiments made in Germany have pointed out this danger, and more recently Dr. Coilier, of the State Experiment Station, as reported in the Husbandman, has found in a beautiful sample of apples dried on zinc trays a quantity qual to one-third of a pound of zinc to every 10,000 pounds of evaporated fruit, in the form of sulphate of zinc, and he expressed the opinion that a continued use of this fruit would lead to very serious consequences. Propagating Raspborries.

Please give me the proper time when to lay down black raspberries in order to get young plants; I have a few, the name of which I don't know; they are the very best I ever saw, and I am anxions to raise some from these few. E. E. M., Warwick, Md. [The tips of the recurved canes are to be slightly overed with soil during the first half of September. If done too early they will rot and not grow: and if done too late the roots will not strike. Some judgment must therefore be used. The canes will usually show a slight enlargement at the ends, and a cessation of growth by the time for covering. The tips will become rooted in two or three weeks. When well established, they may be removed and planted out in autumn, covering each plant with a small shovel full of rotted manure for winter. As the tips are not all in the same condition at the same time, it is well to go over them a second time according to their needs. They should not be simply buried in the soil, but only enough earth placed upon them to hold them well in their position, and prevent the wind from displacing them.—Country Gentleman.] Propagating Raspberries.



Profits in Broilers.

A number of New York hotels use from 3,000 to 6,000 chickens per month, and in the same time consume from 18,000 to 30,000 eggs. If a farmer who devotes his attention to poultry can cater to such custom he can make handsome profits, for the demand is always beyond the supply. Hatching at the rate of from 3,000 to 8,000 chicks every month, sorting them out as they increase in size, putting them in the market at twelve weeks old, keeping them growing and moving are essential to profit. Ducks are also very profitable, costing no more to raise than chicks. When chickens sell for 75 cents a pair, ducks are worth \$1 20. They are well worth keeping. Spring is the time to stock up. A few runs below the barn, with a comfortable, well-lighted house, will be necessary. All branches of industry require good management to succeed, and poultry-raising is not an exception. Do not make a mistake by going into it largely at first.—[American Agriculturist. London, July 23.



The Extractors at Work.

In a recent issue of Hoard's Dairyman, John Gould, of Ohio, gives an excellent account of the running of one of the new Swedish butter extractors on the dairy farm of W. L. Gardner, Clarksfield, O. His is the only extractor in the State. He keeps 100 cows, thoroughbred Holsteins and Ayrshires, the former predominating, and the object in view is butter. He makes a gilt-edged article, and for three years, it respective of market quotations, it has made its own price (30 cents per pound the year round), going exclusively to the crack hotels of Cleveland and New York. On the day in question when the extractor got in motion it ran milk choled down to 58°, at the rate of 1,500 pounds per hour, the butter granules as they came from the machine dropping into a tank of ice water. The cows were feeding on grass alone, and 21 pounds 14 onness milk made one pound of butter. The butter was of fine texture—solid, perfectly granulated, and showed no specks or streaks of any kind. All present, for a lot of experts had been invited, liked the delicate flavor, and Mr. Gardner said he could sell ten times as much as he produced. He got a haif pound more butter from 100 pounds milk than when he used a De Laval cream separator, and says lie has unbounded fath in the extractor. Verily "sweet cream" butter is coming to the front.

Argentine Meat; Business. To encourage the exportation of meat, the Argentine Republic has offered a premium of 5 per cent, on all capital employed for this purpose up to \$8,000,000. This annual surplus production of meat in that country is 730,000 tons, of which 15,000 tons are exported. The remainder is sold at about 4 cents per pound—lower than in Australia, Texas or New Zealand. THE FOUNTAIN OF LIFE. Dr. Arnott Talks to the "Y.'s" About the

Heart and Pulse.

Dr. Arnott gave an interesting and intractive half-hour's talk in the Y. W. C. F. U. rooms last avening, dealing chiefly with the circulation of the blood. The commodious apartments in Nitschie Block were well filled with an audience of ladies and denure-looking maidens, who appeared to enjoy the Doctor's discourse. The speaker dwelt on the method of treating wounds, and the presence of mind necessary in handling such cases successfully. The simple application of the thumber a bandage was all that was required in an ordinary abrasion until medical assistance could be procured. The Doctor also described the action the heart and arteries in simple terms, using apt comparisons. The speaker then explained the workings of the pulse and the manner of its regulation by the heart and blood. The average pulse of an adult registered between 60 and 70 beats per minute, and that of a child about 100 throbs during the first year of its life. If the pulse of an adult should run up to about 90 it was not a matter of much concern, but when it registered 100 or over it reached the verge of the dangerous. When the pulse throbbed in a pounding manner it was generally a sign of fever and should be attended to. People would save a great deal of worry if they only understood the workings of the pulse correctly. It would then be possible for them to ascertain if a person were sick merely by feeling the organ instead of going to the fuss and trouble usually attendant upon such occasions. Some people's pulses beat and stopped alternately. This was termed an intermittent pulse, and though sometimes attributed to heart disease, generally arose from digestive disorders. Other pulses throbbed fast and slow alternately, such complaints being termed irregular pulses, which were far more dangerous than the intermittent ones.
