LONDON, June 17.—Lord Rosebery, apeaking at Kelso, Scotland, said last night

when the terms of the home rule measure when the terms of the home rule measure were divulged it would be found as firmly settled as the Magna Charta. It would retain to the Imperial Parliament those powers which the union was accomplished to retain, and would also afford an opportunity to establish a tribunal to which any difference between the Imperial Governdifference between the Imperial Government and the Irish Parliament might be referred. Home rule with such a tribunal would be the means of cementing firmly the union of the different sections of the British Empire. It was a crime, he said, to hint at civil war to accomplish political ends. The Ulster convention was intended not to save Ireland or Protestantism but to save the Government.

Balfour on the Tory Campaign. LONDON, June 17 .- At the annual dinner of the National Union of Conservative Associations Mr. Balfour was the guest of the evening. He said the Gladstonians were applying for situations, but they showed the people no testimonials as to character. Home rule was the first item of Mr. Gladstone's Broggening was the members of the stone's programme, yet the members of the party stood ready to bury the whole ques-tion, while the leaders would willingly sount it.

LONDON, June 17 .- It is stated that Lord Charles Beresford, commodore of the British cruiser Undaunted, of the British cruiser Undaunted, of the Mediterranean squadron, intends to again enter political life upon the expiration of his detail to the Undaunted. He has submitted to the leading admirals and generals a comprehensive plan for the national defense, in which the army and navy are treated as one body. The scheme, it is said, amply meets the report of the Hartington Commission that no combined effectual plan for the defense of the smpire in a certain contingency had ever been formulated. Lord Charles Beresford's scheme has met with general approval, and his friends say it will prove a gigantic success.

A Far-Reaching Trail of Death and Destruction.

The Funnel-Shaped Tornado Desolates Scores of Homes. from Forty to Fifty Persons Killed

in Southern Minnesota.

Further Details of the Ruin Caused by Tuesday's Tornado in Quebec,

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 16.—A special from Mankato, says: One of the worst disasters that ever visited Southern Minnesota occurred between 5 and 6 o'clock last evening. The terrible funnel-shaped tornado again swept over the land and laid waste scores of happy homes and sent 40 or 50 souls into eternity. The extent of country devastated was greater than ever before known of the history of the State. It started near Jackson in Southern Minnesota. SIXTEEN KILLED.

It struck the district school house Shelburne, in which were the teacher and eighteen children. The building was de-molished and the teacher and fifteen scholars were killed.

At Linden many houses were torn from their foundations. One family of three families was killed and others were injured.

SEVERAL FATALITIES IN QUEBEC.

ST. ROSE, Que., June 16.—Further intelligence of Tuesday's great cyclone shows the destruction and loss of life was not confined to its place, but spread to many places in the vicinity. Ste. Ephriam sufficed severely. In that part of the parish annexed to St. Nazaire a poor man named A. Houle lost everything. His babe, 3 months old, was killed in its mother's arms, while the poor woman herself and three other children of Alphonas Miquiette, who were in the house at the time, suffered the fate of the others. The oldest, aged 11, was found dead, and the youngest one was considerably hurt.

At Ste. Helene 52 buildings were wrecked and fifteen persons wounded, some seriously. Many persons have been badly injured and scores have been rendered destitute and homeless.

The fact is, the commission is expressly debarred from inquiring into the charges of wholesale corruption, because the accused knight has managed to have the sections referring to this vital part of the case

2. Sir John Thompson and his newspaper apologists take the ground that it is common thing for political parties to spend large sums of money, and therefore this conspiracy should not be inquired into. Why, they virtuously exclaim, look how much Mercier paid out!

It is a sufficient answer to this allegation that a great crime against the commonwealth can never be successfully defended by the retort, "They all do it." Even though it were true that Sir Adolphe and his fellow distributors of bribery funds operated solely with the view of combatting Mr. Mercier, it must be remembered that the Quebec Provincial leader has been exposed, and sent to private life disgraced by the votes of former friends as well as former foes. If we are to have one law for all, we should have a full and impartial in vestigation into the charges laid against Sir Adolphe Caron, which directly implicate other leading supporters of Sir John Thompson. If Mercier is exposed and punished, if McGreevy is to be put on trial for following in the footsteps of Sir Hector and Sir Adolphe, why keep his pals out of the pillory? Is it because once investigation were begun it would not be confined to Quebec, but would eventually show that the recent electoral successes of Sir John Thompson and his friends were only scored after an enormous expenditure of money, cribbed, as it now appears, from the public funds or "blackmailed from public contractors?" An answer in the affirmative is the only

reasonable explanation. We are fortified in these views through noting the tremendous efforts that have been made to keep the public from a knowledge of the full facts connected with the conspiracy, as well as by the out-spoken deductions of that section of the Conservative press which does not come under the head of "Kept newspapers." 



The transfer of \$1,000,000 in currency from one bank or office to another would entail more or less risk and a wast amount of labor, for that amount of money could not be counted in less than a business day by one man, as the bills of the national currency run.

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
