The French Crisis. PARIS. 1 11.—There is a strong feeling in the amber of Deputies, as well as among the general public, that M. Ribot sinong the general public, that M. Ribot has not yet sufficiently purged the Ministry of those who, whether innocent or guilty, have been under suspicion in connection with the Panaméscandal. The public demand is atrongly for a thorough investigation without any hampering influences and for a Ministry free from breath of scandal. If M. Ribot, should fail to explain to the satisfaction of the Chamber the reacons for the changes which have been made in the Ministry the Royalists will interpollate him on the subject. The leaders of the Reyalist party in the Chamber of Doputies came to this decision last evening.

The Royalists have shown greatly increased activity within the past 24 hours, and the authorities appear to be in possession of some new and important information as to their designs. The French Legation in Spain, is keeping a most careful watch for intrigues beyond the Pyrences, and an equally careful watch is being kept on the Royalist piotters in Paris.

The moderate Republican organs accept the new Ministry with good will, while the Radicals are dissatisfied and urgs an appeal to the country. The Monarchists assert that the new Cabinet is powerless to dominate the situation. With Burden removed from the Cabinet it is beheved there will be no difficulty in the new Ministry securing the support of the Chamber.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—The extremely cold weather in this section shows no sign of letting up. At Perth last night it was 30 below zero. At Pembroke 30 below during the night was registered. At Meetawai twas 30 below at 5 o'clock this morning. Chicago, Jan. 11.—The "Diamond" special from St. Louis was frozen to the track for four hours at a watertank near Gibson yesterday. The overflow from the tank had run on the trucks of the tender and frozen the wheels fast to the track. The trainmen cut the ice from the trucks, but to no purpose. Finally the conductor walked a mile and a half to Gibson, where te telegraphed for another locomotive, and walked a mile and a half to Gibson, where he telegraphed for another locomotive, and when it arrived it backed up to the frozen train and bumped it loose. The wheels had been frozen to the track from 4 o'clock in the morning until 8. Railway men say they never heard of a train having been frozen to the track before.

QUEBEC, Jan. 11.—The Montmorency Falls are frozen solid. This has never been known to occur before.

WAS "DEAD" TEN DAYS

Put in a Coffin Over a Week Age, But May Yet Recever.

Toledo, Jan. 11.—Clay G. Hopper, the young man who was supposed to have died ten days age, is certainly alive. The first positive sign of life was the right eye slightly opened and then closed. The body was taken from the coffin, bathed in brandy and wrapped in flannels, and is regaining its natural warmth. The lips seem dry and feverish, and are moistened repeatedly. About 1 o'clock in the afternoon the sleeper opened both eyes so that the pupils were visible, and then slowly closed them again. Slight movements in various parts of the body have also been noticed at irregular intervals.

The parents are fearful that, owing to the weakness of the boy, he will relapse into a sleep from which he will never

awaken.

Among the many callers at the house was Rev. S. D. Hutsinpiller, who preached the funeral sermon a week ago Sunday. He had regarded the young man as dead and deemed it unwise when he was informed that interment would not take place after the funeral ceremony.

Young Hopper was pronounced dead by the attending physicians, and for ten days no sign of life has been perceptible. But the body did not get cold, and even after the funeral sermon the parents refused to allow it to be buried.

FOR SERVICES RENDERED. An Important Promotion in the Face of Several Dismissals.

OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—A singular piece good fortune was announced last week as having befallen that patriot who, out of his high-minded devotion to the old man and having befallen that patriot who, out of his high-minded devotion to the old man and the old flag and the old policy stole from the printing office in Toronto where he was employed as a compositor, proof sheets of a celebrated pamphlet, a manuscript of Sir Oliver Mowat, which he supposed to be political, and also certain instructions to the printer in the handwriting of Prof. Goldwin Smith, all of which booty the patriotic sneak sold to Sir John Macdonald. His price for what he sold was a position in the Civil Service here, and he was given his price. As a result of that bargain and sale he became an extra clerk in the Department of Justice. He has had that position sale he became an extra clerk in the Department of Justice. He has had that position ever since until last week, when an order-in-council was passed transferring him to the Department of Railways and Canals. That order-in-council followed the order which dismissed 39 officials of the Department of Railways and Canals, many of them civil engineers of high standing, and some of them men who had held important and responsible positions in the department for esponsible positions in the department for wenty years. It is true that several of the lismissed ones have since been reinstated, dismissed ones have since been reinstated, but it is none the less a striking and notable thing, at a time when the reason given for the 39 dismissals was that the department was overcrowded with employes who had no work to do, that work should have been found there for the conscientious patriot who had waited nearly three years for his promotion from an extra clerkship. Concerted action is now being taken by the European Powers which possess interests in Africa to put a stop to the indiscriminate slaughter of elephants. The latter are rapidly becoming extinct in the Dark Con-tinent, and have vanished altogether from rapidly becoming extinct in the back continent, and have vanished altogether from districts where they were wont to roam in great herds 20 and 30 years ago. This can scarcely be regarded as a subject for surprise when it is borne in mind that, according to the British official customs returns, the tusks of no less than 75,000 elephants reach England from Africa every year, one Sheffield firm alone absorbing the ivory of 1,280 elephants per annum. As the cow elepant does not bear young until her 20th year, and then only at the rate of one calf in 36 months, it is obvious that the great mammoth, capable of rendering such efficient service to man, must before long disappear as completely from the face of Africa as the bison from our prairies, unless the preventive measures now in course of execution by the British, German, French and Congo Governments prove efficacious.







LONDON, Jan. 12.—Prof. Bryce's remarks n imperial federation at the Colonial Institute are significant owing to the fact that he is a member of the Cabinet. He said he knew the state of feeling existing in Canada. The first thing which would be asked for from the colonies in order to promote federation would be to submit to promote federation would be to submit to seme kind of control on the part of the Im-perial Government, and to make some kind of contribution to Imperial funds. Their duty was to disabuse the minds of the colonists of this idea, and to show that imperial federation involved no surrender of local self-government. In his opinion the question of joint defense was the most practical point to begin with.

Early in February the Duke and Duchess are going to the Riviera, and they will remain abroad until Easter, so that a considerable part of the session will have elapsed before the promised receptions begin. Instructive Address on the Horn Fly and Fodder Grasses by Prof. Fletcher Deminion Entomologist-A Paper on

DR. VANSLYKE, OF GENEVA, N. Y.,
spoke on fat in milk in relation to cheesemaking. In his State experiment was made

Under the present method of paying for milk by bulk the man who produced the best milk was being robbed for the benefit of the man who sold poor milk. In reply to a question by Mr. Hopkins, he said a factory making 100 tons of cheese ought to pay from \$75 to \$100 extra to the maker for making the tests. Extra labor is involved, and in some cases, perhaps, extra assistance. A plan of taking a small sample of milk daily from each patron's supply, and making a test weekly, has been found to be a good one. It milk is thick add some concentrated lye before experimenting. In cooking he advised that the curd should not be heated above 100. Every maker should have a standard to guide him in order to have uniformity in the cheese. The speaker concluded by explaining how the mammoth cheese was made for exhibition at Chicago.

could not be reached. It was a mistake to suppose the horn fly injured the horn. In its natural state it bit beneath the skin and sucked the blood, causing great irritation, loss of flesh and consequent loss of milk. They might talk of being good to eartle, but of what use were gentle words and kind treatment when all the time the poor animals were being worried to death by the horn fly? The warble fly was hatched from a maggot in the animal's back, and lolded on which the insect lived. It was like a deutist drilling into the teeth. All these different kinds of lice had their particular class of animals up on which they fed, and none would stay long upon any other animal than its own. The composition of the remedy for lice and insects was two gallons of coal oil to one gallon of soepside (soap boiled in a gallon of water), thoroughly mixed. Any quantity could be made in this proportion. A quart was sufficient for each animal at a cost of about 2 cents each. The only way to destroy the insects was to prevent them breeding. They were hatched in the fresh droppings of the animal—upon the liquid part. The manure should be dried up by raking it over.


