10,000 PERISH IN SOUTH SEA CYCLONE; HUGE WAVES SWEEP ISLAND COASTS

Society and Tahiti Archipelagos Devastated by Worst Storm Ever Known in Southern Pacific---Wind Rages for Two Days at 120 Miles an Hour.

San Francisco, March 4.- The Evening Post states that 10,000 persons perished during the storm on Tahiti and adjacent islands, several of which, its account says, have disappeared. It places the damage at \$5,000,000.

Papeete, Tahiti, Feb. 16, via San Francisco, March 3 .- The most destructive cyclone ever experienced in the Society and Tuamotu Islands occurred on Feb. 7 and 8. The damage in Tahiti is estimated at \$1,000,000, and presumably a similar amount of property was destroyed on the Tuamotu Islands. Struck Island at Midnight.

The cyclone reached the velocity of 120 miles an hour. It struck the islands about midnight on Feb. 7, and continued until about 4 o'clock on the next afternoon. The island of Anaa, Tuamotu group, is telieved to have been the center of the storm.

At Papeete about 7 p.m. on Feb. 7 the sea began to break heavily over the reef the waves in the harbor washing over the quay. There was no perceptible wind. Toward 10 o'clock persons dwelling on the waterfront abandoned their homes, many saving a small portion of their belongings. 


CHART SHOWING SOUTHERN PACIFIC ISLANDS, SWEPT BY DE-

There is in existence a famous cantumor known as Jensen's mouse tumor. It arose about four years ago in a mouse, and has since teen transplanted into some 3,000 mice successively, all of which are now dead. Yet the tumor cells themselves are multiplying in other mice with undiminished activity and producing enormous masses of tissue.

"A number of mice were inoculated with cells from a specimen of this tumor already growing in a mouse of the same species. About five weeks later, during which the cancer had been growing in the several mice inoculated, two were taken for treatment by trypsin, the results of such treatment being carefully compared with tonight. the progress of the tumor in the untreated mice.

The mortars are hollowed from the trunks of trees. The bread of meal and beans is boiled up in kettles and baked over the fire. They make, too, a soup of meal and teans. All this is ready when the guests arrive and seat themselves

about the Long House. The last great death feast was held in November, 1904, for Mrs. Harriet Maxwell Converse, a white woman, and an adopted member of the tribe. She also was of the Snipe clan. She had died a year before. If anything prevents the feast on the tenth day it is held one year after the death, because the soul comes back once a

year. On this occasion the food was distributed among the mourners, and Abrams, sachem of the Snipe clan of then Chester Lay, a head man of the the Seneca Indians, died on the Tona. Woif clan and a friend of the dead, wept, for they are a people of soft hearts. Crow, the "preacher" of his tribe, expounded the doctrine of Ga-Nia-Delo, the Seneca prophet and teacher, and others who had known her fellowed in the Seneca tongue. At the end the Snipe clan gave presents to the runners, the chief mourners, the friends of the dead and the women who had prepared the feast. Semething like this will be the

death feest of Falling Day, known to the whites as Chauncey Abrams, and to his own people as Nis-Nya-Nent, the sachem, and the faithful follower of the old ways. Then the Snipe women will meet and choose a man, the council of men will approve him and there will be a new sachem.

A Tax on Bachelors.

[From the Chicago Tribune.]

Two movements in one week against the peace and comfort of the bachelor are reported, one from the Legislature of Ohio, which is playing a protracted engagement for Ohio as a center for freak legislation, and the other from a belligerent Illinois candidate for the mayorality of one of the smaller cities of this commonwealth. The proposition in each case is that bachelors be taxed, as if their existence in the state of single blessedness were a serious menace to the best interests of American society.

Our colonial ancestors dealt with the problem with determination. They did not allow an unmarried man to live alone. The idea of a cosy flat as quarters for a group of such unfortunates would have been appalling. No bachelor was permitted to select his own lodgings. The town officials looked upon him with suspicion. Hartford, Conn., at one time compelled him to pay a special tax of 20 shillings a week for the privilege of remaining single. The tattling tithingman kept such a close watch upon his movements that many a man sought matrimony for the sake of gaining his freedom in-

stead of losing it, as the expression is now. One Massachusetts town had upon its statute books the curious provision that "every unmarried man in the town shall kill six blackbirds or three crows each year while he remains single; as a penalty for not doing it, he shall not be married until he obeys this order." But why should our legislators stop here? There is another evil that needs the attention of some one who has the brains and the ability to formulate a provision for its uprooting. That is the serious menace to society found in the unmarried female. Our ancestors showed equal courage in the face of that tremendous problem, the old maid. Such persons were discouraged from undertaking any business occupation; they were not allowed to live by themselves; they were looked upon as out of place in the economy of the community. If a girl reached the age of 21 without being married, she was dubbed "an ancient maid," and if she remained single until she was 30 she was called a "thornback." That sort of situation soon drove the girls to matrimony also, so that marriage being the conventional thing, if one did not happen to reach a good old age without getting a husband she was particularly mentioned in the town record when she came to die. Those who attained this distinction were few



It is provided with a small quickaring swivel gun, which can fire 600 shots a minute in any direction.

France also is providing herself with a complete corps of these armored motor cars. The car carries a folding steel bridge, which can be quickly placed across ditches. With the help of this the car showed that it could go across country.

It will be the greatest event in hockey history, should the Argos win the protest, if they should hand the mug over to Berlin's boys. The one test bet is that they will win the protest and the game ordered to be played over.

Prospects for a good soccer team this season in London are extremely good. There are several young Englishmen here who have played on county elevens in the Old Land, and are fast. We look for a good season for this game in this city. It is probable that a club wil be organized soon.

The Turks and Swedes are winning the "rassling" tournament at Montreal this week. They must intend to have a football team in the Royal City this fall. It would be the sight of a lifetime, to see Karrythekauff, the Terrible Turk, and Hal Walters handing each other a few. Lafleur and Tannuhimhard, the Battling Swede, would hack up right, too.

R. Meldrum, who refereed the recent Stanley cup matches, says there is no other team in Canada which can score the number of goals against Ottawas on their own ice that Queen's did. Numerous remedies have been suggested for the elimination of dirty work from the game, and several of them have been tried. One, however, that is not given enough trial is the long penalty.

Others, besides ourselves, think that the last senior game was rather rough. The Toronto journals simply cannot see it, however.

London has many admirers in basketball games and players. Therefore great interest is taken in the Wednesday night games at the Y. M. C. A. Many features are brought forth, and one will be noted, that is the staying power of the Medicals. J. Follinsbee gathered together a number of players and picked the team of five from them. Has there been any collateral handed out to Peterboro hockey players this year? asks the News. If not, why so guilt-stricken a howl from the Review, of that town? That journal ventures the following prediction: "Professional hockey will undoubtedly be all the rage in Canada next winter, Why shouldn't it? Why should the national winter game be placed under false pretenses any longer, any more than the national summer game? Hockey has been played for ten years or more in Canada by men paid good salaries to play the game. Yet they are called amateurs, and that private organization, the O. H. A., which knows just as much of the truth as the C. L. A. did regarding how many lacrosse men were playing for their health, whenever it had what was considered a good chance, has been in the habit of making a lot of fuss about it when some unlucky chap was caught with the goods on him. Better to come out boldly as professionals, because that is what most of the big teams in Canada today are, than to continue the hypocritical farce."

The Telegram finds considerable fault with us for championing the cause of Referee Waghorne. He may not be the best ever, but he is certainly good when the Telegram and the Argonauts are sore on him.

We are informed by the only sporting sheet in Canada, the Toronto Telegram, that one Rowe is as dead as Rameses, as far as hockey is concerned. Then why is the O. H. A.'s money to be squandered in a series of lawsuits and appeals? It might better be hoarded or gives to the Sick Children's Hospital.

Berlin Telegraph: Berlin's senior hockey team will not consider the challenge from the Argonaut supporter for several good reasons. In the first place, O. H. A. rules and regulations forbid their teams from playing for money; secondly, the Argonauts will have to learn how to play hockey; and, thirdly, there will be no advantage gained by either team by playing another game this season. TENNY'S DEATH WILL NOT STOPS FIGHTS AT 'FRISCO

San Francisco, Cal., March 3. - A canvass of the members of the board of supervisors and the police commission reveals the fact that the death of Harry Tenny, the young fighter, as a result of a beating received in his match with Frankie Neil on Wednesday night, will not affect boxing contests scheduled for the future.

All those interested took the view that Tenny's death resulted from an unfortunate accident, and did not indicate that boxing is particularly dangerous.

Three theories have been advanced in explanation of the death of Tenny, who died in the Grant avenue bathhouse, nine hours after the gruelling battle with Neil. The dead man's Barclay. relatives charge that he was poisoned; his trainers think he died of epilepsy, and Autopsy Surgeon Kucich declared that death was due to hemorrhage of the brain, the direct result of a blow

or fall. Which of these theories is correct Jaeger. will require further time to determine. The stomach of the dead boy is in the hands of the city chemist.

Four of the fighter's seconds appeared before Police Judge Cabaniss today on the manslaughter charge, which has been made against them. Frankie Neil, Spider Kelly and John Frayne, through some misunderstanding, did not appear.
