





# SEWER IN EAST END

To Accommodate Empire Brass Works-Board of Works Deals With Matter.

The board of works last night decided to construct, at its own expense, 252 feet of 15-inch tile sewer on Dundas street to the city limits, to connect with a sewer which the Empire Brass Company will build from a point east of the line to the city limits to con-

The total cost to the city will be about \$475, and the brass company agrees to hand over to the city the 200 feet or more which it will build out of its own pocket to complete the connec-

The latter portion being in the Township of London, it was pointed out by the mayor that the city will not likely be allowed to control it, but it was nevertheless decided to have the brass company sign an agreement making over the drain to the city. If in the future any firms desire to

connect with it, the city will endeavor to have the right to say what shall be done in the matter.

On the suggestion of Chairman Matthews, the board decided to ask the opinion of City Solicitor Meredith as to who is responsible for repairs necessary to an archway over one of the coves on the Pipe Line road. The archway carries the water main from Springbank, but the water commissioners claim that when the road was bullt by the commission it was handed over to the Township of Westminster. That municipality retained control of the road until the amalgamation of South London with the city, when the latter assumed the control. Superintendent Moore also states that if the archway was to fall, the span is so short it would not affect the water main. Consequently the commission refuses to

make the repairs necessary. Mr. Moore estimated the cost of the work at not less than \$300. Mr. Graydon thinks the bill will be higher. Mayor Judd admitted that if an ac cident occurred through the archway being out of repair the city would be

It was then decided to refer the matter to the city solicitor.

Sewer Contracts Let. Sewer tenders were then opened, and on motion of Ald. Saunders the lowest tender in each case was accepted. Blight & Fielder got the contract for the north end main sewer, at \$10,851, and 75 cents a foot for side drains. The only other tenderer for the work was Fred Harding, who asked \$13,481, and 40 cents a foot for side drains.

Engineer Graydon figured out that despite the difference in the cost of side drains, the Blight & Fielder tender was \$1,500 lower than Harding's. Mr. Harding got the following contracts:
